Time to Apply For **Fulbright Grants**

The Institute of International Education (IIE) announces that its competition for 1968-69 United States Government gradnate grants for academic study or research abroad, and for professional training in the creative and performing arts, will open officially on May 1st.

IIE conducts competitions for U. S. Government scholarships provided by the Fulbright-Hays Act as part of the educational and cultural exchange program of the U.S. Department of State. Under this program, more than 850 American graduate students will have an opportunity to study in any one of 54 countries. The purpose of the awards is to increase mutual understanding between the people of the U.S. and other countries through the exchange persons, knowledge and skills.

Candidates who wish to apply for an award must be U. S. citizens at the time of application, have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, be proficient in the language of the host country. Selections will be made on the basis of academic and/or professional record, the feasibility of the applicant's proposed study plan and personal qualifications. Preference is given to candidates who have not had prior opportunity for extended study or residence abroad and who are under the age of 35.

Creative and performing artists will not be required to have a bachelor's degree but they must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Applicants in social work must have at least two years of professional experience after the Master of Social Work degree. Applicants in the field of medicine must have an M.D. at the time of application.

Two types of grants will be available through HE under the Fulbright-Hays Act: U. S. Government Full Grants, and U. S. Government Travel Grants.

A full award will provide a grantee with tuition, maintenance for one academic year in one country, round-trip transportation, health and accident insurance and an incidental allowance.

Countries participating in the full grant program will be: Afghanistan, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium-Luxemtourg, Bolivia, Brazil, Ceylon, Chile, China (Republic of), Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, Ecuador, El Salvador, France, Finland. Germany (Federal Republic of), Greece, Guatemala, Honduras, Iceland, India, Iran, Ireland, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, Nepal, the Netherlands, New Zenland, Nicaragua, Norway, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Portugal, the Philippines, Spain, Sweden, Thailand, Trinidad, Turkey, United Arab Republic, the United Kingdom, Uruguay and Venezuela.

For holders of grants to Autralia, Ceylon, China Republic of), Findland, Germany, India, Japan, Nepal, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, and Turkey a maintenance allowance will be provided for one or more accompanying dependents.

A limited number of travel grants is available to supplement maintenance and tuition scholarships granted to American students by universities, private donors and foreign governments. These are to France, Germany, Israel, Italy, Poland, Romania, Spain, Sweden, Turkey and Yugoslavia.

establish better communication between students and the Student Senate and between students and the administration. It is hoped that the office of Public Relations Director will also be a positive adjunct toward strengthening the respect of the student body for the senate by keeping it informed as to what the Senate is doing.

Kenneth Culp, an outstanding veteran member of the Senate, moved that the Bryant College Youth Guidance Club be unanimonsly admitted to the Senate, having fulfilled the organizational requirement. And it was. The purposes of this group were outlined by the President of Youth Guidance, Bob Stutz. He explained that next year's membership would be limited to 36 students and their individual "little brothers or sisters." The prospective members will be screened by an interviewing board before they are accepted. Youth Guidance was formed under the direction of Dr. Jacobs, President of Bryant College and James Hilliard, former Student Senate President. Since its inception the group has been highly successful in helping underprivileged young people to help themselves. Mr. Hathaway, faculty advisor to the senate, stressed the importance of the Youth Guidance philosophy. He suggested that it would be significant to have members of the group stay with their "little brothers and sisters" for their entire college career for the benefit of the youngsters.

Also discussed at the meeting was the need for improvement in the Freshman Orientation Week, Jim Gibney called for greater Senate support and participation in the program. It was generally agreed that the fault lay not in the Freshman Orientation Week program itself, but rather in the administering of it. President Delude has asked Dr. Russell, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, if he could sit in on the Administration's committee formulates plans for the Freshman Orientation Week.
