

Summer Session Information For Students

1. Registration for Summer Session classes will take place in South Hall on June 19th according to the following schedule:

If your first class is at
8:00 Register at 8:00
9:45 Register at 9:15
12:00 Register at 11:30

At this time you will be given Admission Cards, indicating payment, for each class you are to attend. Admission to class will be restricted to those with approved admission cards.

2. A book list is provided. Books will be available in the College Bookstore. It is advisable to obtain the required text in advance of the first class.

3. There will be three class periods with time breaks as follows:

First Period 8:00 to 9:35
Second Period 9:45 to 11:20
Third Period 12:00 to 1:35

4. The 8:00 o'clock class on June 19 will start one-half hour later than the time specified above.

5. During the Summer Session, one test or one term paper will be required. A final examination will be given on the last day of the session. The final examination will count two-thirds and the test or paper will count one-third of your final grade.

6. The maximum number of cuts has been set at four. Cuts in excess of four will bar the student from the final examination, unless he has permission from the Dean. Permission will be granted only when extenuating circumstances justify cuts beyond the allowance.

7. Grades for the Summer Session will be mailed as soon as possible. No grades will be available from instructors or the Records Office in advance.

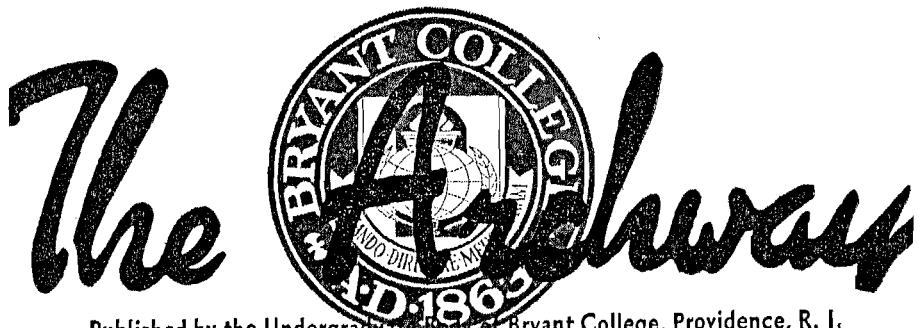

University is still a distant third place.

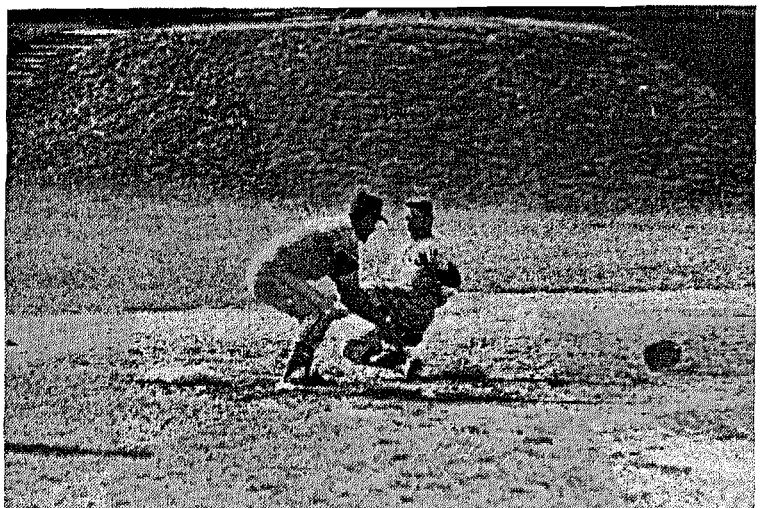

Tradition, Participation, and Aggravation

A college life consists of many things: books, term papers, themes, midnight oil, exams . . . and graduation. Traditionally caps, gowns, tassels, and diplomas have symbolized graduation, the completion of higher education as a job well done. To some people the tradition and ceremony of graduation may be "bunk" but to most, graduation's ceremony and tradition are the necessary finishing touches to a college education.

In previous years, Bryant graduations have been scheduled later in the year than the graduations of other colleges to allow those students on the Bryant Three-Year Plan and those students whose graduation requirements lack a few credits to complete their courses in the intersession and summer session. Beginning with next year's Bryant graduation in June, students on the Bryant Three-Year Plan and those students who need intersession and summer session courses will not have completed their requirements and therefore will not be able to graduate with the class in whose activities they have participated. For example, a student who entered Bryant in the Fall of 1965 on the Bryant Three-Year Plan votes in the elections of and takes part in the activities of the class of 1968. Under the present situation, students on the Bryant Three-Year Plan will receive certification of the completion of their graduation requirements following their intersession and summer session courses but should return for formal graduation with the following graduating class.

This return for formal graduation could cause problems for the already-alumnus. For the residents of other states, the trip could be an added expense, especially for those students who will be attending other colleges and universities in pursuit of post-graduate studies. For those constructively-graduated students who have found employment, how would one ask his employer for the day off so that one could graduate?

A possible solution to the problem might be the issuance of blank diplomas to those students on the Bryant Three-Year Plan and those who must complete their graduation requirements in the intersession or summer session. These diplomas could be filled in after the student has completed his required courses. The use of the blank diplomas would allow the Three-Year Plan students and others to have this "finishing touch" of graduating with their friends and truly classmates.

VA Explains New Benefits

The eligibility of children of service-connected deceased veterans or of living veterans who have a 100% service-connected disability considered to be total and permanent in nature for benefits under the Orphans Education Assistance Act is not affected by subsequent adoption or even by marriage, the Veterans Administration pointed out.

They remain "children" as far as this benefit is concerned even if they marry, and "orphans" even if one parent is still living or if the remarriage of the surviving parent results in their legal adoption, VA said.

Eligible ages are between 18 and 23 years but exceptions provide earlier or later use of the benefit, in certain cases.

Students approved for training may receive \$130 a month, if enrolled full time; \$95 a month if three-quarters time and \$60 a month if half-time. No payment is made for less than half-time schooling. An eligible child may receive up to 36 months of schooling.

Guardians of prospective students meeting these requirements and the children themselves are urged to arrange for vocational counseling in order to select the proper course of training and make the necessary application for enrollment.

PLAN AHEAD

Now is the time to estimate your college expenses and resources for 1967-68. For those whose resources are less than their expenses, it is the time to seek out financial assistance. If you fall into this category, and expect to need financial aid at any time during the 1967-68 academic year, you must apply before July 1, 1967.

Two documents are required for financial aid, an application to be completed by you and a Parents' Confidential Statement to be completed by your parents or guardian. Both of these documents may be obtained from the Financial Aid Office, Room 3A, Administration Building. If your family has already submitted a PCS this spring, you need only complete a financial aid application.

Please note that you must apply for financial aid each year. It is not automatically renewed.

U. S. Women's Army Corps Offers Commissions To College Grads

Opportunities exist for some 75 qualified college graduates to be commissioned in the U. S. Women's Army Corps within the next 2 or 3 months, according to Major Mary J. Grimes, WAC Coordinator at Headquarters, U. S. Army First Recruiting District, Fort George G. Meade, Md.

After their commissioning as lieutenants in the Army, this select group of women will attend the WAC Officer Basic Course which will begin in August. This 18-week-long orientation covering 30 subjects is given twice yearly at the Women's Army Corps Center, Fort McClellan, Ala., and is included in the 2-year Army commitment of the newly commissioned officers.

Upon completing the course, the young women will be assigned to responsible positions in such career fields as personnel, administration, education, intelligence, communications, public relations, graphic arts, and many others, at Army installations throughout the continental United States, and in Hawaii, Alaska, Europe and the Far East.

Major Grimes states that WAC officers receive the same privileges, pay and opportunities for promotion as their male counterparts. They may join Officers' Clubs and use all recreational and shopping facilities at Army posts. They also receive free medical and dental care.

Applicants must be between the ages of 20 and 29 and hold a bachelor of arts or science degree from an accredited college or university. They may be married or single, but must have no dependents under 18 years of age.

Prerequisites also include United States citizenship and the possession of high personal and scholastic qualifications and moral standards. Candidates also must meet the physical and mental standards of the Army.

Interested women college graduates or those approaching graduation may obtain comprehensive information about opportunities for officers in the Women's Army Corps from Army Recruiting Stations, WAC Recruiting Officers who visit college campuses, or by writing to Major Mary J. Grimes, Women's Army Corps Coordinator, Headquarters, U. S. Army First Recruiting District, Fort George G. Meade, Md. 20755.

fall.

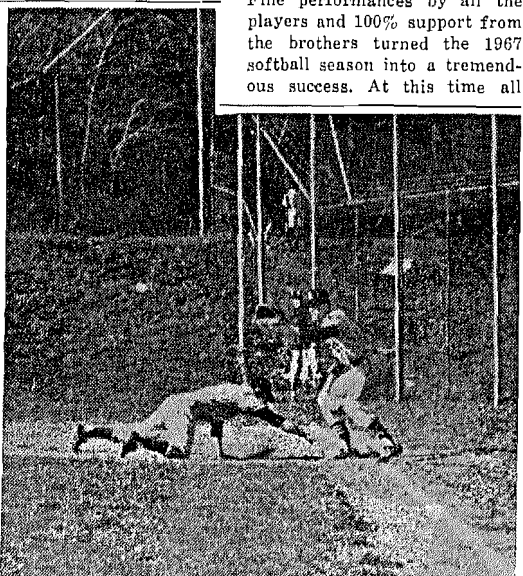
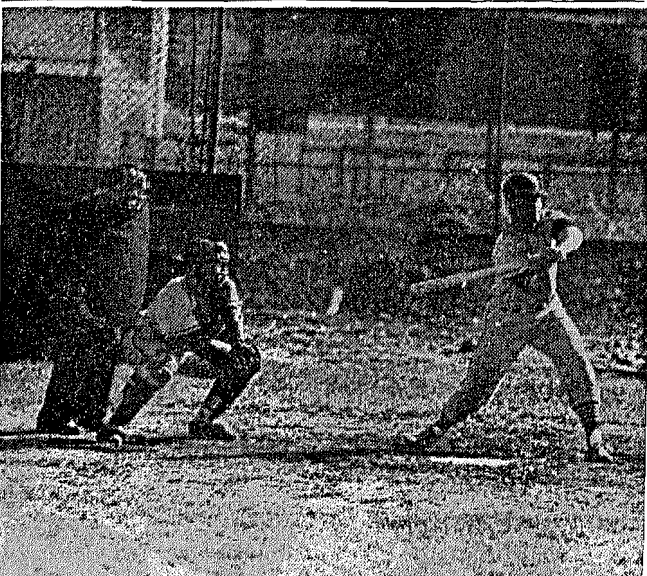
May 13 turned out to be a

their engagement.

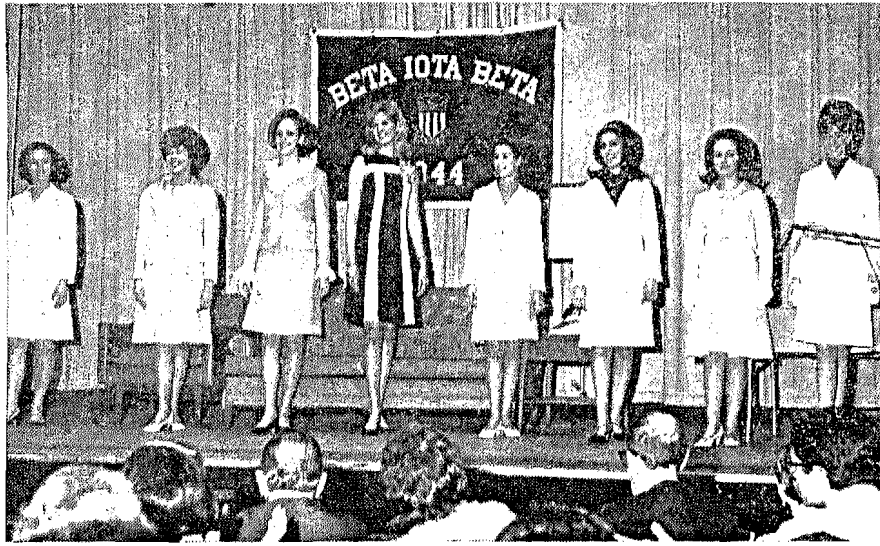
