The following is quoted from the "Student Handbook":

"Examination Conflicts—Every effort is made to prepare examination schedules which will avoid conflicts. However, students who transfer credits or fail to stay up with their class will be taking courses out of sequence and may have conflicts between two

or more examinations. Examination schedules are posted well in advance and ample time is allowed to report conflicts. For those who report as scheduled special examinations will be arranged at no charge. However, when a student fails to report his conflict within the period specified, he will be assessed a fee of five dollars for his delinquency."

"Late Examinations—When a student, through negligence, fails to take an examination at the time scheduled, he will be given a special late examination only upon the payment of a five-dollar fee. This regulation does not apply to students who are genuinely ill or who have a death in their immediate family. Avoidance of the fee, however, will ordinarily require notice of inability to take the examination at the time of the examination."

Duckworth Interviewed On WJAR

On Sunday, December 4, the Current Events Club of Bryant College and Mrs. Marjory Vinal of the World Affairs Council interviewed the state chairman of Young Americans for Freedom, Howard Duckworth, on the purposes, aims, and stands which his organization takes on current political and social issues. Previous to this the Council has taped other programs for broadcast.

Mr. Duckworth stressed the importance of the voice of youth in political affairs. YAF is a conservative group founded in 1960, which has since grown to a membership of over 45,000 students with chapters in all fifty states. It is not against the civil rights movement, nor is it against the United Nations. In fact, the work of UNICEF has been brought into prominence by programs which the group has sponsored.

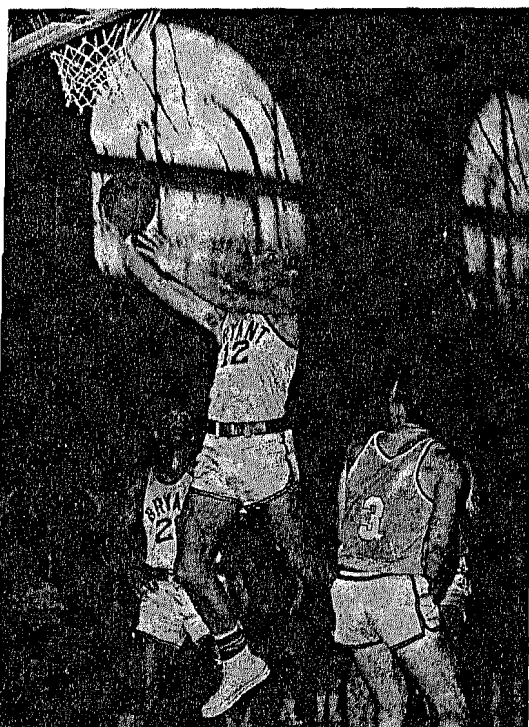
The aim of Young Americans for Freedom is educational. As a public service, it sponsored an ad in the Providence Journal in an attempt to educate voters on the proper procedure of writing in candidates on the ballot—something which is not very widely known. In commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the Hungarian Revolt, activities including a special Mass and a speaker were held.

YAF's definition of conservatism is prudence as opposed to liberals, and concession as opposed to the complete selfishness of extreme conservatism. Under this definition, former President Kennedy was a conservative.

Young Americans for Freedom is pro foreign aid, but not to communist controlled countries. It is against the admission of Red China to the United Nations because it feels such action is not in the best interests of our country. It would like to see a victory in Vietnam, but not through any drastic escalation. YAF also feels that cooperation between the United States and the Soviet Union over cultural exchanges, technical exchanges, and transportation and communication between countries would be beneficial not only to the countries directly involved, but also to the rest of the world.

In ending, Mr. Duckworth stated that organizations such as the John Birch Society and the Ku Klux Klan are the products of sick minds and moral decay and have no place in our society.

Students' Check Sheet of End-of-Semester Responsibilities

1. Have you filed your renewal application blank indicating your plans for January? This applies to every student, whether he plans to return, graduate or drop out.

2. Do you have your I.D. card? It must be shown in each examination. If you have lost your photo I.D. card, you must get a signature I.D. card from the Records Office.

3. Have you made out your own final exam schedule—and checked it for accuracy? Failure to take an examination when scheduled involves a special final and a \$5.00 late examination fee.

4. Do you have conflict between examinations? If so, arrangements for a special examination must be made with the Deans' Office between January 3 and January 6.

5. Do you know where your exams will be given? Most classes are divided between two rooms. Make a note of the room on your exam schedule when the instructor makes the announcement.

6. Do you plan to change your major? If so, you must report the change to one of the Deans or the Registrar before the end of the examination period.
