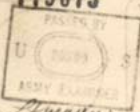

INSPECTOR'S STAMP

5 AUG 1943

Dear Folks:

Inasmuch as I really do not know you personally it seems that this is a correct salutation. This is the new address and if you send any more mail, please note and bare it on file. In your list of servicemen sent to me, I noticed Harry Yoken listed. We both live in the same city and have known one another a long time. He graduated days in 1933, I did evenings 1935. I can tell you that this is written from somewhere in England. But here pleasure cars are out, young and old drive bicycles. Everything is rationed, yet these people after such a long time of war are smiling. The money system is different and it takes just a little time to get accustomed to it. Personally, I think our American system is much superior to the English currency. The houses are built on a different scale here also. They are made of brick or concrete, wood is a very scarce article. Expressions are different, and the English accent is much different. Being a newcomer here, this is just a few observations I have made.
