

Top New England Quintets Slated for Action in Holiday Tourney Jan. 1 & 2


Three of the top small college teams in New England will invade Smithfield on New Year's Day for the start of the second annual Bryant Alumni Holiday Basketball Tournament.

Defending champion Stonehill led by small college All-American Mike Allocco, heads the list of enteries in this year's tourney which also includes Colby College of Waterville, Maine and Middlebury College of Middlebury, Vermont. Middlebury has drawn the awesome task of meeting the Chieftains in the opening round, on January 1st.

The Stonehill-Middlebury contest, scheduled for 7 p.m. on New Year's day, will be the opening attraction in the twoday tourney. The host Bryant Indians swing into action at 9 p.m. on the 1st when they entertain ever dangerous Colby The winners of Saturday nights opening round games will meet in the championship final Sunday night at 9 p.m. The two semifinal losers will meet in a consolation contest scheduled for 7 o'clock.

New Home for the Indians



Folliard giving instruction during a break in the action against RIC.










Above: Bryant President Dr. Harry Evarts officially dedicated the new gymnasium before the start of the RIC game.

The setting was perfect.

The new million dollar gymnasium. A special dedication game with intrastate rival Rhode Island College. A packed house of 2,400 excited specators.

Everything seemed perfect for one of the most memorial nights in Bryant College athletic history. Only one thing went wrong? Someone forgot to tell RIC that it was Bryant's party.

For about 40 minutes the Bryant fans went wide as the Indians appeared on their way to one of the top upsets of the season. But midway through the second half RIC's superior height began to take its toll and by the end of the game, the highly rated Anchormen has taken a 92-78 decision.

But the RIC game was only the start of what looks like it could be an extremely successful season. A sensational new backcourt duo of Brian Ahearn and Ned Bohan have given the Indian fans reason to cheer with some outstanding ballhandling performances. The Indians are carrying a 3-3 record into the Holiday Tournament. An important fact is that all three victories have been against Naismith Conference opponents giving the Indians the early Naismith Conference lead with a perfect 3-0 slate. If the Indians can continue their winning ways in Naismith competition it means an automatic berth in the regional N.A. I.A. playoffs at the end of the season and possibly another game against Rhode Island College.
