## **Student-athletes honored**

t is a night that Bryant student-athletes look forward to all year. For some, the annual Athletic Awards Banquet is the last sports-related event of their college life.

Of this year's 185 student-athletes, there were those who earned much deserved recognition. Senior baseball co-captain Bill DiStefano, the Northeast-10 Conference's best hitter, and senior Jennifer Carvalho, who capped a record-breaking volleyball career at Bryant by leading her team to the NCAA Division II Tournament, were chosen Male and Female Athletes of the Year.

David Azzolina, the lone senior on this season's tennis team and a finance major with a 3.4 GPA, and Jaime Eichen, the starting third baseman on the softball team and a financial accounting major with a 3.97 GPA, certainly deserved the Alumni Association Scholar-Athlete Award.

Senior Luke Robustelli,

arguably the best baseball player in school history, and senior Stephanie Zanfagna, a four-year starter on the softball team, took home the William T. O'Hara Award.

But for all the obvious outstanding athletic and academic achievements that take place each year, there are those student-athletes who have not broken any records but are equally deserving of recognition. These student-athletes are honored with the Bulldog Award, given by each team's head coach in recognition of an individual's contributions to his or her team and Bryant athletics. This year, no story was more captivating than that of junior T.J. Valentine.

Valentine overcame a season-ending leg injury last season to earn a starting job at second base on this season's baseball team. His successful comeback abruptly ended when a devastating knee injury wiped out what promised to be a terrific season.

With his knee encased in a brace, Valentine is a presence at each and every game, cheering for his teammates from the dugout. He hopes for one more comeback in his senior year.


## The tradition begins: football schedule announced

ead football coach Jim Miceli announced the schedule for the 1998 season at an alumni reception at the Downtown Athletic Club in New York City on April 23. The Downtown Athletic Club annually honors college football's top player with the Heisman Trophy Award.

The Bulldogs will play a seven-game schedule next season mainly against Division I-AA teams, and Division II Eastern Football Conference members, where Bryant will compete in the 1999 season. Bryant's home opener against Assumption College on Saturday, September 26, will coincide with the college's Homecoming celebration.

The college is planning the construction of a 2,000-seat stadium to be used for football, lacrosse, and soccer that will include bleachers, restrooms, locker rooms, and a press box.

In addition to football, Bryant is adding four other intercollegiate sports as part of its strategic plan, including field hockey (fall

#### in the news

In the past two months, the achievements of Bryant College faculty, staff, and students attracted media attention. Here are selected highlights:

**Dan Jansen's** appearance on March 30 as the second speaker in the Trustee Speaker's Series was covered by WJAR-TV 10 that evening and resulted in a major article in the *Providence Journal-Bulletin* on March 31.

The opening of Bryant's downtown location for advanced computer training received a "Coffee Cup Salute" on WJAR-TV 10's morning newscast on April 9. Coffee mugs were used from Bryant and c.w. Costello, Inc., a downtown Providence management information systems consulting firm where the training will be held.

In April, the *Providence Journal-Bulletin* and two local television stations carried a story on Bryant's proposed **football stadium**. New England Cable News Network aired a story that Bryant will have football for the first time in its history.

**George Gendron**, editor in chief of *Inc.* magazine, appeared in a feature article in the *Providence Journal-Bulletin* on April 16. Gendron was the keynote speaker at an April 24 conference sponsored by the Center for Design & Business, a partnership between Bryant College and the Rhode Island School of Design.

**Professor Judy Barrett Litoff** tells the women's side of World War II in a cover story titled, "Letters from the Home Front," that was published in the *Providence Journal Bulletin*'s "HERS" section on March 19. Litoff has written five books on the subject.

**Professor William Sweeney** and his latest economic forecast were the subject of a feature article on page one of *Providence Business News* on April 5, and a feature article in the April 9 *Observer* (Greenville).

**Professor Richard Smith's** book, "Mastering Mathematics: How to be a Great Math Student," was featured in an article on math success in the April issue of the *Rhode Island Parent's Paper*.

A story on page one of the "Local & Regional News" section of the March 22 *Providence Sunday Journal* focused on the recent advent of two professional women's basketball leagues and featured Bryant Women's Basketball **Coach Mary Burke**.


