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

The formal Convocation ceremony will be followed by breakout sessions for all students. ### The Tradition Begins! Homecoming marks first home football game in school history

B ryant College Homecoming '98 (September 25 and 26) promises much excitement with activities for everyone. And this



year, we step into the history books as we begin the time-honored tradition of college football on our campus. The first home football game in Bryant history — against Assumption College — will be held in the new Bulldog Stadium with kickoff at 1 p.m. on Saturday, September 26. A pre-game brunch with music, games, and a giant inflatable balloon mark the site near the stadium.

Tickets for the game will be sold at the gate: \$5 for alumni and guests; \$3 for senior citizens and students; students with Bryant ID free; faculty and staff with ID entitled to two free tickets. Children under 10 free when accompanied by an adult. Get tickets on day of game, or call 401-232-6040 to reserve tickets for pick up at the stadium. Hold on to your ticket for exciting half-time contests -- you may be the winner of a new car!

Friday evening, enjoy hypnotist Frank Santos in Salmanson at 9 p.m., followed by a bonfire, pep rally, and fireworks.

No advance registration or advance payment is required for Homecoming BBQ, Pre-game Brunch (a la carte), or Touchdown Club. Tickets are available on event day. All other pre- and post-game activities are free.

Commemorative Keepsake Tickets, suitable for framing, are available for \$20 and entitle owners to free admittance to all 1998 home football games. These tickets will be available at the stadium on September 26, or call the Athletic Department at (401) 232-6070. A limited number of Commemorative T-shirts will be sold in the bookstore, and will be discounted for students at \$10. Other memorabilia will be available for purchase at the stadium and the Bryant Bookstore on game day.

Posters throughout campus highlight events. Faculty and staff should look for detailed programs in their mailboxes.

## **Bulldog Stadium nears completion**

S eptember 26 will not only be the first home game in the history of Bryant football, it will also mark the partial opening of the new Bulldog Stadium.

Construction on the facility began in May. Following Bryant's reputation as a top business specialty school, the new stadium will also be tops in its class. The facility will be used for Bryant women's soccer, and men's and women's lacrosse varsity contests as well as football.

A 2,200-seat permanent bleacher will be erected on the home side of the field, and there will be an additional 1,000-seats available on the opposing side. Three hundred of the seats will have backs and arm rests. The state-of-the art bleacher system utilizes a design that is usually reserved for larger stadiums. This technology will ensure excellent sight lines and maximum comfort.

Underneath the permanent bleacher will be a building with several features: locker rooms for both Bryant and visiting teams, office space, an athletic training facility, and public restrooms. The press box area will be above the stands.

The facilty will be completed this fall.

## Honors program to link scholars, faculty

S tarting this fall, 44 qualified freshmen will participate in an exciting, newly revised honors program. Dr. Patricia Odell, associate professor of mathematics, was nominated by the curriculum committee and appointed by the vice president of academic affairs to coordinate this effort.

The restructured and expanded honors program is designed, according to Odell, to "link a community of Bryant scholars with dedicated faculty who together will develop a challenging and intellectually rewarding experience."

The fall semester offers three honors classes: Liberal Arts Freshman Seminar (Professor Joseph Urgo); Principles of Sociology (Professor Gregg Carter); and Finite Mathematics (Professor Odell). Other honors classes will be added in the spring and as the program develops.

To be eligible, incoming freshmen must have a total SAT score of at least 1200 and rank in either the top 20 percent of their high school class or have a grade point average of 3.6 or better. Other students may apply for entrance into the program after their freshmen year if they earn a 3.5 or better GPA at Bryant.

Enrolled honors students will complete a minimum of 24 credits, which include three to six credits from the liberal arts core, six to nine credits from the business core, six to nine credits of electives, and three credits for a senior honors project. This could be a business plan, a statistical marketing project, a work of art or music, or any other venture of interest to the student.

Odell says the program is valuable in that it gives able and motivated students the added experience of working closely together and challenging one another. Their interaction will not be limited to academics. "Students who take part in the program will also meet outside the classroom, going to events and interacting socially — truly making them a 'Community of Scholars'," she says. Individuals who complete the program with a 3.5 overall GPA and a 3.2 in honors courses will be recognized as honors program graduates on their diplomas and on their official transcripts.

# Bryant supporters set all-time record

hanks to our generous and growing number of supporters, gifts to Bryant during fiscal year 1997-98 set an all-time record of \$1,809,103, a full 30 percent higher than last year. Here are highlights:

- \$\$ The total amount raised toward the College's operating fund was \$786,892, or 97 percent of the annual goal
- \$\$ Alumni gifts totaled \$885,498, representing 18.2 percent participation in the annual fund, up from 17.2 percent
- Parent giving increased significantly with gifts of \$90,493, up from \$55,665 last year
- \$\$ The telefund program raised \$343,295, up from \$291,414 over 1996-97, a healthy 15 percent increase
- \$\$ The President's Leadership Council for annual contributors of \$1,000 or more exceeded its goal of 50 new members. During the course of the fiscal year, 92 new members joined the Council and 79 others renewed their memberships

## Bryant's mission goes global as faculty work with colle

our Bryant professors recently served as "ambassadors" to Belarus, spreading the college's global mission of high-quality business education to one of the newly created independent states of the former Soviet Union.

Four different Bryant disciplines were represented by Professors Judy Barrett Litoff, John Jolley, Joseph Ilacqua, and Gaytha Langlois, who officially served as Visiting USIA American Studies Professors at the European Humanities University (EHU) in Minsk, Belarus, under a

grant from the United States Information Agency. The three-year grant, which runs through 2000, calls for the development of courses in American studies at EHU that promotes civics education and follow American and Western educational practices.

"Following seventy years of communist authoritarian rule, with its rigid hierarchical educational system, there is now a tremendous yearning among faculty and students in Belarus to learn about America and to incorporate our system of education in their learning," says Litoff.

At EHU, the professors conducted workshops on paper assignments, syllabus development, and research projects, among other topics. "Our approach to teaching was foreign to their own educational system," says Litoff. "Both the students and faculty were bowled over with enthusiasm by our collaborative

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Ilacqua says the visiting professorships grew out of a 1994 Defense Department grant examining defense conversion and technology transfer in New England and the Commonwealth of Independent States, the successor to the U.S.S.R. Because of his and Litoff's travels to and research in Belarus, the USIA felt Bryant was a logical choice for the visiting professors program at EHU.

Also, during their stay the professors brought together key representatives of EHU, a non-state-support-

Sciences of Belarus, to develop a proposal to create a Center for International Collaboration. The Center, which will be headquartered in Minsk, will provide a collaborative environment for research and education for all educational institutions in Belarus and beyond.

"Because of the political situation in Belarus and the small piece of educational pie that is available, there is little trust between state and non-state institutions," says Ilacqua. "Starting this center is a big step forward for Belarus, and we were proud to play a part."

Not only does the program serve to spread the message of Bryant's global perspective, but also a reciprocal program allows EHU professors to visit and teach at Bryant. In September, the rector, or president, of EHU, Dr. Anatoli Mikhailov, will spend three weeks at Bryant, giving lectures, making presentations, and teaching classes.

"You can't put a price on this level of visitation," says Ilacqua. "It stimulates a great deal of research and publication that might otherwise not have occurred."

Following their stay in Minsk, the group traveled to Moscow, where they were joined by CIS Professor Hal Records. The five faculty participated in an international conference on distance learning and presented a multi-media workshop that included a demonstration of web casting at Bryant.

#### Selected highlights:

An editorial by **Donald Gregg**, chairman of the Korea Society and keynote speaker at World Trade Day held in June, appeared in the *Providence Journal-Bulletin* in July. Gregg commended Bryant for educating young executives with a global focus and the leadership skills necessary to compete in international business.

**Professor Janet Morahan-Martin** was quoted extensively in an article on Internet addiction in the *Birmingham Post-Herald* (Alabama) in July.

**Professor Judy Barrett Litoff** was quoted in an article on the psychological and physical effects of frequent business travel in an August issue of *Providence Business News*.

In June, high school students from Central Falls conducted an interactive videoconference with students from Costa Rica using **Bryant's teleconference facilities**. A feature article followed in the *Providence Journal-Bulletin*; it also appeared in the Spanish section of the publication.

He was also interviewed by WLNE TV-6 reporter Kathy Connelly for a segment on the stock market swing, which aired on August 5.

Announcement that the **Rhode Island Small Business Development Center at Bryant** has received national certification by the Association of Small Business Development Centers is appearing in newspapers statewide.

News releases on the achievements of **Bryant students** were distributed to hundreds of hometown newspapers following Commencement in May and the publication of Dean's List in June.

## LaFore named dean of admission and financial aid

ictoria J. LaFore, former assistant dean and director of admission at Western New England College School of Law, has been named dean of admission and financial aid.

"It is with great pleasure that we welcome Victoria LaFore," says President Ron Machtley. "Victoria is an experienced professional who will bring the skills and talents necessary to lead our admission team in

attracting highly qualified students to Bryant, and assist us in developing new strategies for further enhancing the quality and diversity of our student body."

LaFore will oversee student recruitment efforts at Bryant, including the establishment of enrollment goals, and the disbursement of financial aid and scholarships to students. This fall, Bryant will enroll its largest freshman class since 1988.

Among her responsibilities at Western New England College (WNEC) was the design and implementation of marketing strategies, with special emphasis on non-traditional students and students of color. She worked in the law school's admissions office since 1992.

Prior to joining WNEC, LaFore worked in the Office of Enrollment Management at Commonwealth



College in Virginia, first as admission representative and then as marketing services coordinator.

She is a member of the American Association of College Registrars and Admission Officers, the Law

School Admission Council, and the National Association of College Admission Counselors.

LaFore holds a bachelor's degree in marketing and management, which she received magna cum laude from Siena College, and an MBA from the University of Massachusetts.

"I am delighted to be joining the Bryant College team and the talented group of professionals in the Office of Admission and Financial Aid," says LaFore. "Bryant has made some wonderful strides in student recruitment this year, and I look forward to being part of even greater success in the future."

## **College A-OK with Y2K**

Like many organizations, Bryant must zap the "millenium bug" that is projected to have a major impact on computer operations throughout the world. Known as Y2K (for the Year 2000), the problem focuses on systems that are programmed in COBOL, a computer language that uses two digits to represent the year in order to conserve memory the crux of the Y2K problem.

Marsha Maxwell, executive director of information technology says, "Nearly 100 percent of Bryant's computer systems are already year 2000 compliant. Any remaining systems that need to convert will be handled well before the deadline." Maxwell adds that five years ago the college converted to a Datatel computer system that is year 2000 compliant. This gives us an advantage that many organizations do not have as they race to beat the clock.

The Center for Management Development (CMD) is reaching out with programs to help businesses throughout the region resolve this date dilemma. It offers intensive training in a four-tiered computer strategy to help companies prepare for the new millenium. Call the CMD at 232-6323 for more information.


