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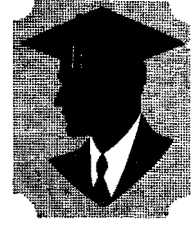

Professor De Haas Addresses Seniors

On Monday, February 26, Professor J. Anton de Haas of Harvard University, addressed the senior class of the college on the subject "What Lies Ahead in the NRA."

Professor de Haas was introduced by our own President Jacobs.

The address included a discussion of the recovery programs of Russia, Germany, Italy, France and the United States.

The NRA is a challenge to the American business world. Will American business develop a social responsibility so that business can be trusted to set up the necessary measures of discipline so that business may work in harmony with social needs and more primarily for the sake of the individual? I don't know the answer but I feel that this is the turning point in American history. Either business proves itself capable of organizing and by means of discipline subduing the profit motive and substituting a social consciousness so that it will be safe to put social control into the hands of business, or we shall have state capitalism or no capitalism at all, but we shall have a system as found in the USSR.

If you ask me as a crystal gazer what will be the answer then, I will have to say, I don't know, but it will be well to watch what is going on in Washington, whether you grow up under a system in which everything will be in the hands of the government or whether you will grow up in a system in which we shall have to work out under a capitalistic system as they have done in Russia or whether you will grow up in a system in which the social group will be served through discipline on the part of business itself, will be determined in the next few months.
