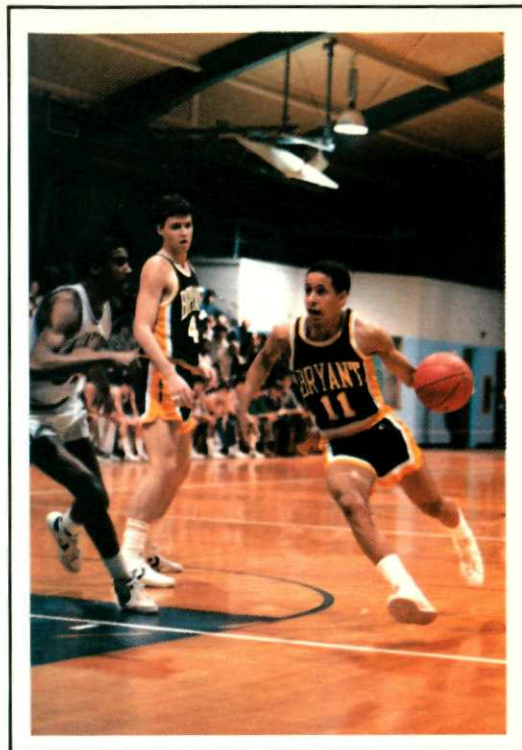
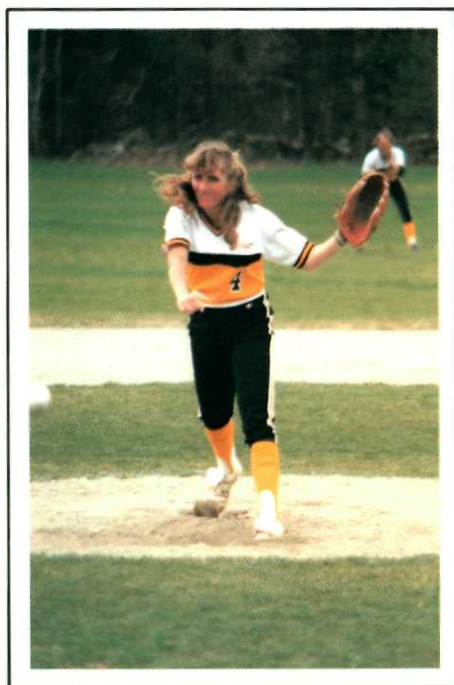
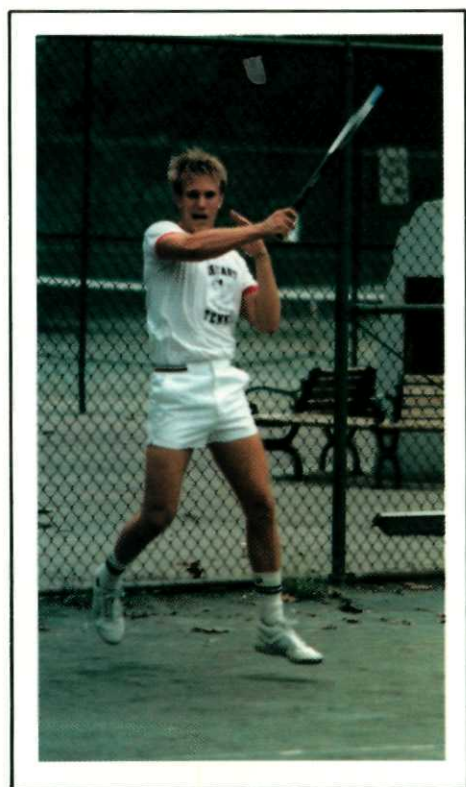

Welcome To Bryant

For well over a century, Bryant College has been dedicated to educating men and women for creative and responsible careers in business, industry and government.

Founded in 1863 as a privately owned commercial college in Providence, Rhode Island, Bryant's motto then, as now, is "Education for Business Leadership."

That motto still is the force behind the College's modern identity. The definition of "business leadership" has been in constant transformation, however, since that motto was conceived and Bryant's educational mission has expanded accordingly.

Today, business decisions have an increasing impact on daily life of even individual in society. This close relationship between business and its environment places a heavy responsibility on the people who must make the decisions — they must be equipped with a comprehensive view of how their actions may affect both present and future lives.

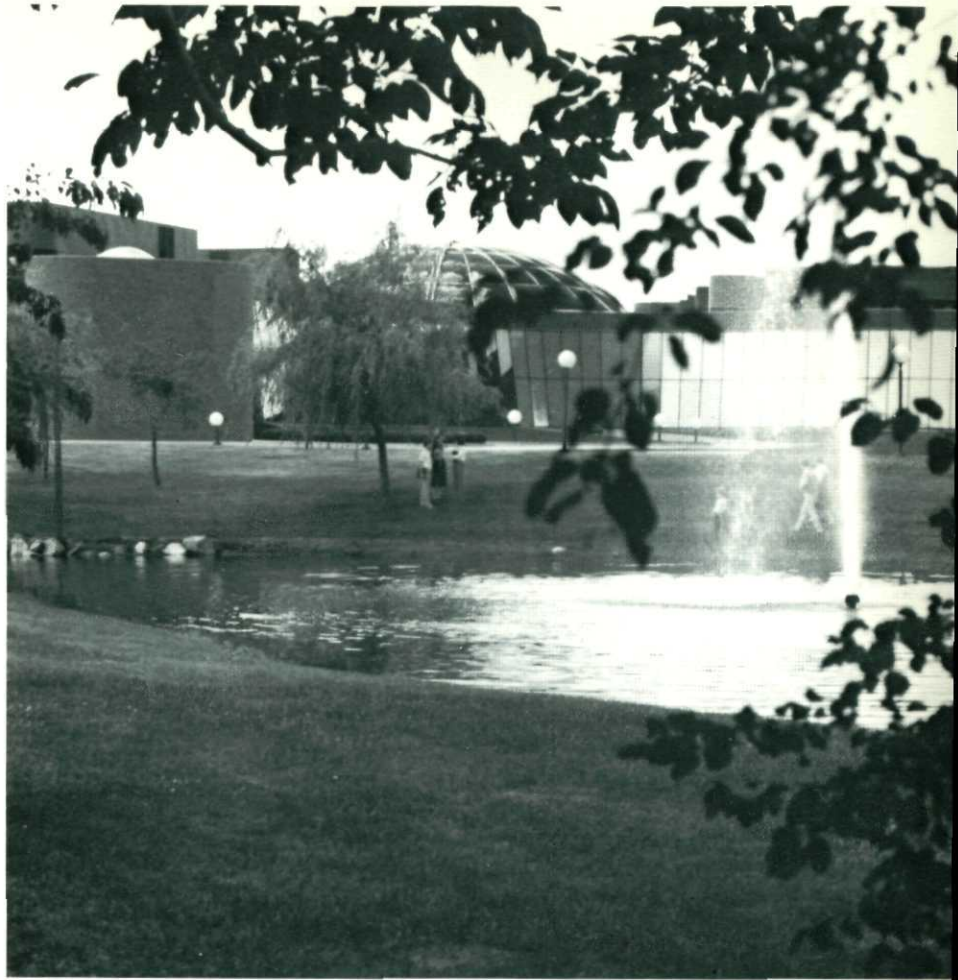
Bryant College's goal is to prepare men and women to take an active part in their society and culture, and to respond intelligently, creatively and humanely to the demands of the modern business world.

By combining business courses with general studies courses in the humanities, the sciences and the arts, Bryant gives its students the foundation for a lifetime of achievement and continue learning.

Nationally recognized four-year undergraduate programs lead to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Business Administration.

The College's Graduate School offers professional education programs leading to a variety of graduate degrees. The Evening Division offers undergraduate courses for degree credit or for personal and professional enrichment.

The College enrolls 2,900 undergraduate day students, 1,900 undergraduate evening students and 1,400 graduate students.



The Bryant Center for Management Development provides seminars and workshops on diverse management topics for business, government educational and community service organizations.

Also, in 1983, Bryant became the first private college in the nation to open a government-sponsored Small Business Development Center. The Small Business Development Center utilizes the expertise of Bryant's faculty, administration and students to help small businesses throughout the New England area.

Bryant's 300-acre campus in Smithfield, R.I. is one of the most picturesque college campuses in the Northeast. Its location, only 12 miles from Providence and 40 miles from Boston, gives Bryant students the best of two worlds — the serenity of a suburban campus and the convenience of an urban location.

The physical hub of the campus is the imaginatively designed, three-level Unistructure. Within this 200,077-square foot building is the College's 187,000 volume library; the computer center; a 1,200-seat dining center; 50 classrooms; administrative and faculty offices; the Center for Management Development; the

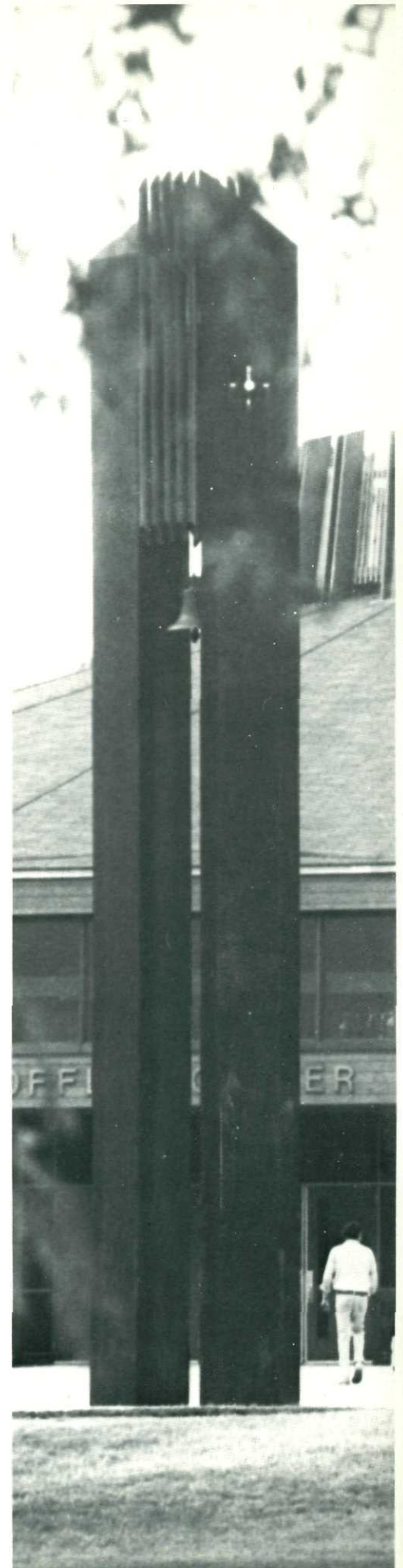
College bookstore; a bank and several service shops such as a hair salon and candy store.

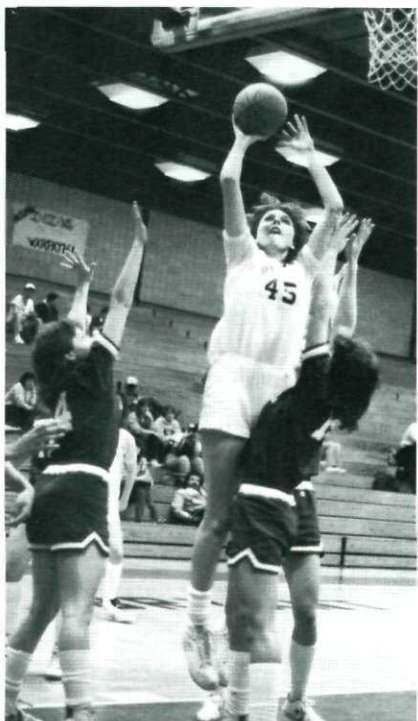
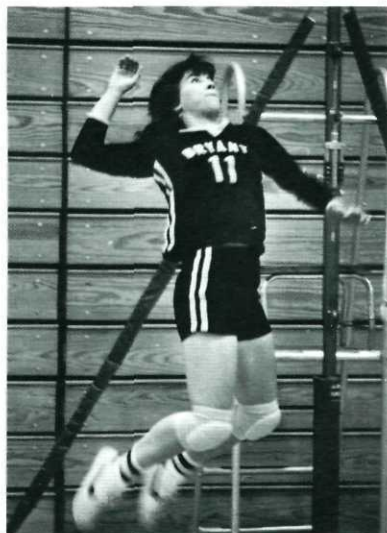
The 1,900 resident students live in some of the most modern and functional college living facilities in the country. In addition to 14 traditional residence halls, 50 town house apartments afford an alternative style of on-campus living.

Over 50 acres of the campus are occupied by athletic facilities. The center of the athletic complex is the main gymnasium with its 2,700-seat area; men's and women's exercise and weight rooms; locker facilities and athletic department offices.

In addition, the newly constructed multi-purpose activities center houses a 30,000-square foot, all purpose gymnasium for both varsity and intramural sports, plus five racquetball courts. Outdoor facilities include over 30-acres of playing fields, an all-weather running track, six tennis courts and an international style cross country course.

Each summer, the campus serves as the summer training camp of the New England Patriots of the National Football League.

Athletic Director

Men's Basketball Coach



As both an administrator and coach, Leon Drury's name is synonymous with success.

In his role as Bryant athletic director, Drury has upgraded the entire Bryant athletic program, making it one of the most prestigious and successful Division

Two programs in the Northeast.

Under Drury's direction, the Bryant varsity sports program has increased from 11 to its present 16 teams. In addition, nearly 90 percent of the College's 3,000 students take part in the 16-sport intramural program.

Since he assumed the position of athletic director in 1978, Drury has spearheaded a drive that has seen the College's on-campus athletic facilities nearly double in the past four years with the addition of the Multi-purpose Activities Center in 1980 and the opening of 10 acres of new varsity and intramural athletic fields over the past two years. The new athletic fields and Activities Center gives Bryant students nearly 25 acres of athletic facilities.

One of the moving forces behind the creation of the Northeast-8 athletic conference, he has diligently worked to promote the conference image throughout the country.

In six years as head men's basketball coach, the Springfield College graduate has become one of the most successful Division Two hoop coaches in the country. His six-year combined record of 88-64 gives him an impressive .580 victory percentage.

In 1980, he was named Rhode Island Coach of the Year (all sports, all divisions included) by Words Unlimited, the Associa-

tion of Rhode Island sportswriters and sportscasters. His selection was the result of the Indians' performance in 1979-80, when they were the No. 1 ranked Division Two team in New England throughout the entire season along with a variety of national rankings.

Before taking over as the athletic director and head coach, he had served six years as the college's assistant athletic director and assistant men's basketball coach. During his tenure as assistant coach, he was responsible for the recruitment of two of Bryant's three All-America basketball players — Ernie DeWitt and Paul Seymour.

Drury came to Bryant in 1973, following a three-year tenure as Brown University freshman basketball coach.

In 1971-72, his third year as Brown freshman coach, the Brown Cubs posted the best record in Brown freshman basketball history with an 18-2 slate. Many of those freshmen players went on to give Brown its most successful basketball era in history from 1972-75.

In the spring of 1972 he left Brown for Bryant. The 110-52 record the Indians' basketball forces posted during his tenure as assistant coach and his recruiting accomplishments led to his selection as head coach in 1978.

A 1966 graduate of Springfield, Drury was captain of the 1965-66 Chief basketball team which recorded the best record in Springfield history, 20-4.

He appeared in the 1966 New England Hall of Fame All-Star game and was a member of the 1965 Springfield team which conducted a 62-day Around the World good will tour on behalf of the U.S. State Department.

MIKE McGUINN

Assistant Athletic Director

Assistant Men's Basketball Coach



Mike has been the principal "behind the scenes" man in the Bryant athletic department for the past six years.

As assistant athletic director, he has been responsible for upgrading the schedules of all 16 varsity Bryant athletic teams. In addition, he also oversees the

operation of the College's physical athletic facilities and coordinates the purchasing for the entire athletic department.

In his position as assistant men's basketball coach, he is responsible for recruiting and scouting. During his tenure as chief recruiter, six of his discoveries have gone on to earn regional or all-conference honors.

Mike joined the Bryant staff on a full-time basis in 1978, follow-

ing a year as a part-time assistant basketball coach. Before coming to Bryant, he had been an assistant basketball coach at Rhode Island College. A graduate of Providence College, he was a member of the Friars' nationally ranked basketball team in 1974.

In addition to his administrative and basketball coaching duties, Mike also had served as the College's varsity baseball coach for five years before relinquishing that post after the 1983 season.

During his tenure as baseball coach, he totally changed the fortunes of the Indian nine. In 1979, he inherited a team which had won only three of 32 games the previous season. In his final season as head coach, the Indians posted a 17-17 overall record and a 17-12 mark against New England competition.

LORRAINE HUDAK

Women's Athletic Director

Women's Volleyball, Softball Coach



As women's athletic director, Lorraine has been the moving force behind the growth of the Bryant women's sports program over the past seven years.

When Lorraine came to Bryant in 1977, the women's program consisted of only three teams and she was the only coach

for all three teams. Today, the program has seven varsity teams and a women's coaching staff of seven people.

The program, however, has not only expanded, but also has become highly successful. Last year, six of the seven Bryant women's teams enjoyed winning records against the toughest competition in the program's history.

Lorraine joined the Bryant staff following a four-year teaching and coaching career at Warren (R.I.) High School. While at Warren, she coached tennis, basketball and volleyball.

In addition to her administrative duties at Bryant, Lorraine also serves as the Lady Indians' head volleyball and softball coach.

JOHN GILLOOLY
Director of Sports Information
Men's Tennis Coach

John has been the Bryant sports information director and varsity men's tennis coach for the past 15 years.

He is one of the veteran collegiate tennis coaches in New England. Since 1969, he has directed the Bryant netmen to winning campaigns in 12 of the 15 seasons.

His teams have posted a combined record of 79 victories and 53 defeats during his tenure for a .599 victory percentage.

In his capacity as sports information director, he is responsible for the dissemination of information for Bryant's 16 varsity athletic teams and approximately 300 athletes. In the past four years, three of his sports publications have won national awards in the CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) publications contests.

A member of both CoSIDA and the ECAC Sports Information Directors' Association, John is also an executive committee member of Words Unlimited, the Association of Rhode Island Sportswriters and Sportscasters, a member of the U.S. Basketball Writers and U.S. Golf Writers.



EARL MATHEWSON
Baseball

Few rookie coaches have enjoyed the success story Earl directed in his first year as Bryant head baseball coach last season.

In his initial season as a head collegiate coach, Earl was named the Northeast-8 Conference Coach of the Year as he directed

the Bryant nine to its first winning season in 12 years. Of course a winning season was only part of the Cinderella story written by the 1984 Indians. They added frosting to the cake when they closed out an already successful season by winning the championship in the Rhode Island Collegiate Tournament with consecutive victories over the University of Rhode Island, Brown University and Providence College.

But Earl's success wasn't surprising to those who knew him. A graduate of Springfield College, Earl is recognized as one of the most knowledgeable baseball men in New England.

For eight years, from 1972-80, he was a highly successful schoolboy coach at Lincoln, R.I., High. Over the final six years of his tenure at Lincoln, the Lions compiled a combined 54-26 record, highlighted by a pair of R.I. Interscholastic League divisional championships in 1975 and 76. Twice, in 1977 and 1980, Earl was named Coach of the Year by the Rhode Island Baseball Coaches Association.

After leaving the high school coaching ranks in 1980, Earl served as assistant coach at Rhode Island College in 1981 and assistant coach at the University of Rhode Island in 1982.

Each summer since 1976, Earl has been a member of the Ted Williams staff at Ted's baseball camp in Lakeville, MA. Since 1981 he has served as Director of Baseball Operations at the camp.



PETER BARLOW
Women's Tennis

This is Peter's fifth year as the women's tennis coach.

A familiar figure in New England amateur tennis circles, the North Providence, R.I., native was a member of the University of Rhode Island tennis team for four years from 1966 to 1969 and served as captain in his senior year.

Still an active player, Pete has been a member of a team that qualified for the national Michelob tournament in two of the past three years.

In addition to his coaching and playing, Pete also is a member of the New England Tennis Officials' Association. Pete also has been the Director of Resident Life at Bryant since 1975.



BERNIE BLUMENTHAL
Women's Soccer

Bernie is beginning his second full year as the women's head soccer coach.

A former soccer captain at Plattsburg State, Bernie had taken over as head coach midway through the 1982 season and led the Lady Indian booters to a 4-3-1 record over the final five weeks of the

season.

Last year, in his first full year as head coach, the team set a school record for most victories in a season with a 5-8 slate.

Immediately after being named head coach, Bernie undertook an extensive recruiting effort which produced several outstanding freshmen on last year's team and some promising prospects for this season.

Before taking the reins of the women's team, Bernie had served as the assistant men's varsity coach for two years. In addition to his coaching duties, Bernie is the Assistant Director of Resident Life at Bryant.



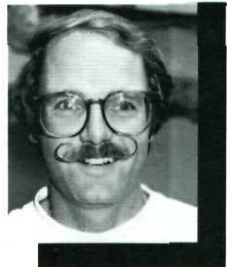
ARCHIE BOULET
Golf

Archie is one of the most successful collegiate golf coaches in the nation. For the past 13 years either an individual member or Boulet's entire team has qualified for national post-season competition. Included in that string is participation by the entire Bryant team in two of the past four national NCAA Division Two Tournaments.

Also for seven of the past 11 years, a Bryant player has been a member of the national coaches All-American team.

In the past 11 years, Boulet's teams have compiled an amazing 241-47 record in dual match competition and have won numerous tournament championships, highlighted by the 1982 New England Intercollegiate title.

CHARLIE MANDEVILLE - Women's Cross Country

Bryant athletic director Leon Drury didn't need to look very far five years ago when it came time to find a coach for Bryant's cross country team.

In the past five years, Charlie Mandeville, Bryant's fulltime athletic trainer, has become an expert on running techniques and treatment of running injuries.

Since taking charge of the women's running program, Charlie has developed some of the top college-division runners in New England. In 1981, after only two years of competitive running, Jenny Proud became the first Bryant woman athlete to compete in a national NCAA event when she qualified for the NCAA Division Two cross country championships.

Mandeville, however, is continually developing new talent. Last season several of his first-year runners broke course records set by Proud in 1981.

Mandeville also practices what he preaches. A former All-State hockey player at Mt. St. Charles in Woonsocket, R.I., Charlie has become an avid runner and annually runs in at least two marathons and several of the top New England road races.



MIKE MCKEE - Women's Basketball

Under Mike's direction, Bryant's women's basketball has become one of the most successful Division Two programs in the Northeast.

Beginning his eighth year as head coach, Mike has taken a program that had won a combined total of only three games in two years and turned it into a 20-game winner.

Over the past two years, playing against the top Division II competition in the East, the Lady Indians have compiled a combined 39-15 record. Since 1978-79, Mike's teams have enjoyed winning records in five of the six seasons. During that stretch, the Lady Indians have posted a combined record of 81-42. In each of the past two years, the team has set a school record for most victories, highlighted by last year's 20-6 mark.

A graduate of St. Francis College in Biddeford, Maine, Mike was a star performer for the Red Knights in 1972. Before taking over as Bryant women's coach, Mike was head coach of the boys team at Mt. St. Charles Academy in Woonsocket, R.I., for four years.



KEN MCKENZIE - Bowling

Over the past five years, under Ken's direction, the bowling team has been one of the most successful collegiate bowling teams in the country. Each year Ken has sent at least one member of his team to the national collegiate championships.

It isn't surprising, however, that Ken would be a successful coach. During his undergraduate years, he was one of the most successful bowlers in Bryant history. During his college career, he qualified for four consecutive national NAIA and ACU tournaments during the early 70s.

In addition to his coaching duties, Ken is also a member of the College's Admissions staff.



FRED REINHARDT - Men's Cross Country

Fred is founder of the modern Bryant cross country and track programs. Except for a two-year absence in the mid-70s, he has directed the Indian trackmen since 1965.

During Fred's tenure, the Indians have become one of the top college-division cross country teams in New England.

One of the leading track officials in New England, Fred also has served as president of the R.I. Timers Guild.

In addition to his coaching duties, he is professor of mathematics at Bryant.



JIM ROCH - Men's Volleyball

Two years ago, Jim took over a team that won only three matches the previous season and turned it into an immediate winner. In his first year as head coach in 1983, he directed the Indians to a 9-4 record. Last year, the program's development continued with a sensational 16-6 record.

Of course, being associated with successful volleyball teams is nothing new for Roch. In addition to his head coaching responsibilities at Bryant, Jim also serves as an assistant coach of the Toll Gate High girls team, which had won four consecutive R.I. state titles from 1979-83.

A native of West Warwick, R.I., Jim also is an active player on the New England amateur volleyball circuit.



LOU VERROCHI - Men's Soccer

Soccer is the fastest growing sport in America and thanks to Lou Verrochi, the Bryant men's soccer program has kept pace with the popularity explosion.

Beginning his fifth year as the Indians head mentor, Lou has directed the transition from a Division Three program to an extremely competitive Division Two program.

A native of Walpole, Massachusetts, Lou came to Bryant after a highly successful schoolboy coaching career at Tri-County Regional High in Massachusetts.

In addition to his collegiate coaching, Lou is also a staff member at several top soccer camps throughout the country, including the John Rennie Camp at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina.

A graduate of Boston State College, Lou served as captain of both the Warriors' soccer and lacrosse teams in 1972-73.

GREAT MOMENTS IN BRYANT SPORTS



January 25, 1967

Bryant College granted membership in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

January 12, 1968

Tom Duffy, Bryant basketball coach, named R.I. Words Unlimited Coach of the Year.

December 3, 1971

The first regular season game between Bryant and Rhode Island College officially opens the new Bryant Gymnasium in Smithfield, R.I.

March 1, 1975

Bryant College wins ECAC Division Three hockey championship.

March 4, 1975

Bryant College wins New England NAIA basketball championship.

February 26, 1978

Bryant basketball team is selected for the NCAA national Division II Basketball Tournament, making it the first Bryant basketball team to qualify for an NCAA tournament.

March 16, 1979

Sophomore Ernie DeWitt becomes the first Bryant player named to a National Coaches Association All-American team. It is the first of three All-America awards DeWitt earned during his collegiate career.

May 26, 1979

Keith McWhorter pitches for the Boston Red Sox, making him the first former Bryant player to play in the major leagues.

February 5, 1981

Bryant basketball coach Leon Drury is named 1980 R.I. Words Unlimited Coach of the Year.

February 17, 1981

Ernie DeWitt becomes first collegiate player in Rhode Island history to score 2,000 career points and grab 1,000 rebounds.

April 28, 1981

Jim Hallet wins his first of a record-setting five consecutive New England Intercollegiate Individual Golf championships.

September 29, 1981

The Bryant golf team, led by individual champion Jim Hallet, wins the New England Intercollegiate team championship.

November 7, 1981

Jenny Proud becomes the first Bryant woman to qualify for a national NCAA championship by qualifying for the national Division II Cross Country championships.

September 3, 1982

Jim Hallet becomes the first New Englaner in 25 years to reach the semifinal round of the U.S. Amateur Golf Championship.

January 23, 1983

Jim Hallet named R.I. Words Unlimited Athlete of the Year.

April 11, 1983

Jim Hallet wins low amateur award in the Masters golf tournament.

April 21, 1983

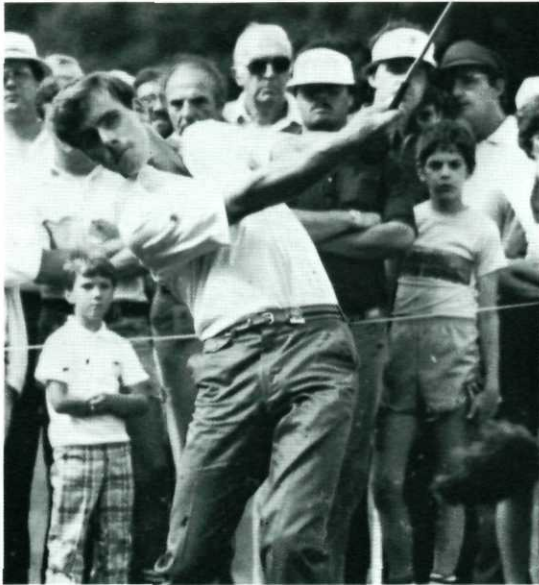
Sue Crisafi becomes Bryant's first Academic All-American when she is selected to the college division Academic All-American women's basketball team.

May 7, 1984

Bryant wins fourth annual Rhode Island Collegiate baseball tournament with successive victories over the University of Rhode Island, Brown and Providence College.

JIMMY HALLET

Golf



Jim Hallet is the most nationally recognized athlete in Bryant College history.

In the summer of 1982, he became a New England golf hero when he became the first New Englander in 25 years to reach the semifinal round of the U.S. amateur golf tournament. Earlier that summer he had become the first player in 40 years to win both the Massachusetts Amateur and the New England Amateur in the same year.

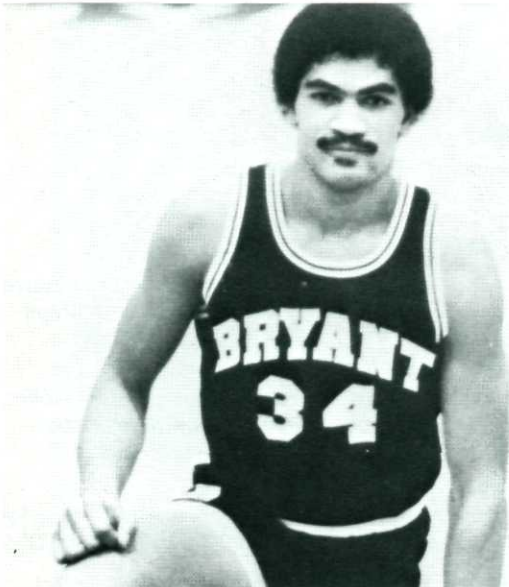
But the high point of his amateur career came at the 1983 Masters tournament in Augusta, Ga., where he captured the tournament's low amateur prize, after having led the entire field during part of his second round.

But his performance on the national amateur circuit is only part of the legend Jimmy Hallet built while he was a student at Bryant. During his four-year career he became the most successful player in the history of New England Intercollegiate golf.

He won a record-setting five consecutive New England Intercollegiate individual championships in addition to individual titles in virtually every major college tournament in the Northeast, including the Yale Invitational, three Toski Invitational championships and the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference championship.

ERNIE DeWITT

Basketball



Ernie DeWitt is the most famous basketball player in Bryant College history.

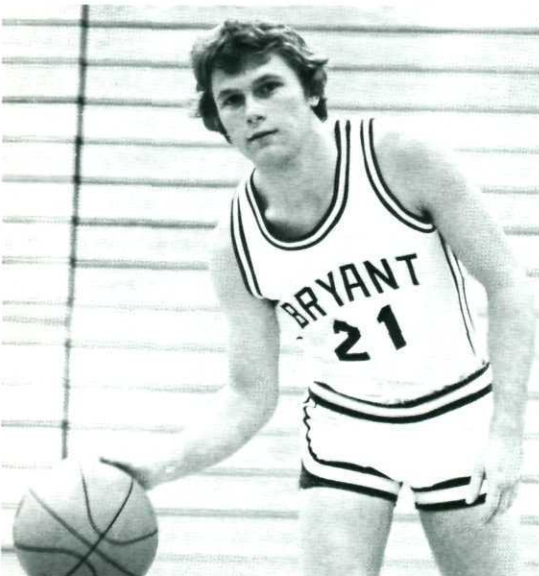
In his first year in a Bryant uniform (1978), he was named both the New England Rookie of the Year for all divisions and the ECAC Division Two Rookie of the Year.

In each of the next three years he was one of the top Division Two players in the nation, being named to Division Two All-American squads in each season. He climaxed a sensational career in 1981 when, in addition to being named first team All-American by the U.S. Basketball Coaches Association, he also was selected the ECAC Division Two Player of the Year.

In February 1981, he became the only player in Rhode Island collegiate basketball history to score 2,000 points and grab 1,000 career rebounds. His 2,266 career points put him second on the all-time Bryant scoring list.

PAUL SEYMOUR

Basketball



Paul's sensational outside shooting made him a favorite of Bryant basketball fans from 1976 to 1978.

The son of basketball Hall of Famer Paul Seymour of the Syracuse Nats, young Paul helped the Indians gain their first NCAA post-season playoff berth in 1978 when he averaged 18 points per game while hitting on 58 percent of his shots from the floor and 78 percent from the free throw line.

His performance earned him selection to the Associated Press's Little All-America team.

All-Americans



DAVE SORAFINE

Basketball

Dave became Bryant's first basketball All-American when he was named to the NAIA All-American team in 1976. That same year, he also was selected the ECAC Division III Player of the Year.

It was in 1976 that Big Dave (6-11) set a Bryant single-game scoring record with 53 points against St. Francis College of Maine.

He currently holds the No. 3 spot on the Bryant men's all-time scoring list with 1,834 points.

SUE CRISAFI

Basketball

Sue became Bryant's first Academic All-American when she was named to the CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors' Association) College Division Academic All-American women's basketball team in 1982.

In 1984, the East Haven, Conn., native became the first woman basketball player in Bryant history to score 1,000 career points. She finished her collegiate career with 1,267 points.

In addition to being the all-time Bryant women's scoring leader, she also holds seven other school records. A 1984 graduate, she compiled a 3.4 cumulative grade average during her four years at Bryant.

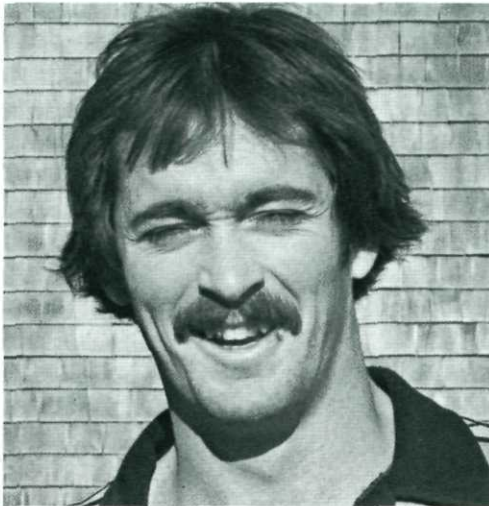


JOHN FEELEY

Soccer

John became the first Bryant athlete to receive All-American recognition when he earned Honorable Mention Selection on the 1975 NAIA All-American soccer team.

A standout goaltender, his play during his junior year in 1975 led the Bryant soccer team to its first post-season tournament berth. He also became the first Bryant athlete to sign a professional sports contract when he joined the Rhode Island Oceans of the American Soccer League upon his graduation in 1976.



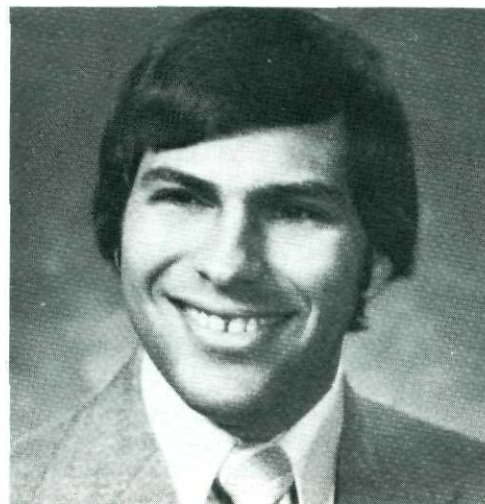
JIM SILVA

For two consecutive years, 1975 and 1976, Jim was one of the top NCAA Division Two golfers in the country.

He earned third team All-American honors in 1975 when he finished among the top fifteen in the national tournament.

But he saved his best performance for his final collegiate appearance when he finished fifth in the 1976 NCAA Tournament, earning a first team All-America berth.

1985 OUTLOOK

Last year Bryant was the Cinderella team of New England collegiate baseball, now the Indians must prove there can be happiness "After the Ball is over".

Under the direction of first-year coach Earl Mathewson the 1984 Indians became Bryant's first winning baseball team in 12 years as they posted a 15-10 seasonal record.

The highlight of the campaign was winning the championship in the fourth annual Rhode Island Collegiate Baseball tournament. A 4-3 victory over Providence College in the title game followed earlier round triumphs over the University of Rhode Island and Brown as the Division Two Indians swept the state's Division One teams.

"It could be difficult duplicating what we accomplished last year, a lot of things fell into place for us," Mathewson offered. "But I think the players now have a winning attitude and that's one of the most important ingredients in a winning program."

Mathewson's biggest problems in 84-85 will be finding replacements for Leon Fairley, the Northeast-8 All-Conference first baseman who graduated last year. Fairley was one of five lettermen Mathewson lost from last year's team.

But Mathewson still has six starters back from last year, including Jim Abbott, the 1984 Northeast-8 Conference batting champion and Rookie Of The Year.

Also back with Abbott will be senior catcher Dave Day, the number-three hitter on last year's team; Darryl Buchanan, the senior shortstop who trailed only Abbott in doubles and stolen bases last season and Vaughn Marecki, the sophomore outfielder who was the No. 2 RBI man on the team last season.

Mathewson also will have the three winningest pitchers on last year's staff back again. Bruce Gaudreau, who led the NE-8 with a 1.52 ERA last season; Sean Chalmers, four wins in five decisions, and Chris Train, 3-0, should give the Indians a strong pitching nucleus.

1984-85 OUTLOOK

Six lettermen and four talented newcomers will be trying to give the Indians their first winning season in three years.

Only 16 points separated last year's Bryant quintet from a winning season and their actual 6-21 record. The Indians lost 11 games by four or less points last year and coach Leon Drury is hoping the addition of some talented freshmen will provide the little extra firepower the Indians lacked last season.

Heading the list of returning veterans will be Gregg Cooper, the 6-6 junior forward who averaged 13.8 points per game last season.

The late-season play of Manny Barrows last year also helped give Drury an optimistic view toward the 84-85 campaign. Barrows, a sophomore guard, earned a starting berth midway through last season and averaged close to 10 points per game for the final 10 games of the season. The six-foot former Providence Classical All-Stater also was the Indians' best shooter last year, hitting on .571 percent of his shots from the floor.

Michael Reed, also a Providence Classical grad, tops the list of newcomers. The 6-6 Reed led Classical to the Rhode Island Class A state championship last season with a 20 ppg average. The performance earned Reed his second consecutive first team All-State selection.

Seven-foot David Ewing will be the biggest player ever to wear a Bryant uniform when the Katonah, New York freshman takes the court this year. Tom Larranaga, a 6-0 guard from Wayne, New Jersey and 6-4 Art Whitehead of Terryville, Conn. also should give the Indians some offensive punch once they gain some collegiate experience.

1984-85 OUTLOOK

With seven of last year's top eight players returning the 1984-85 season should be another banner year for Bryant women's basketball. Last season the Lady Indians highlighted a 20-6 season by reaching the title game of the Northeast-8 tournament.

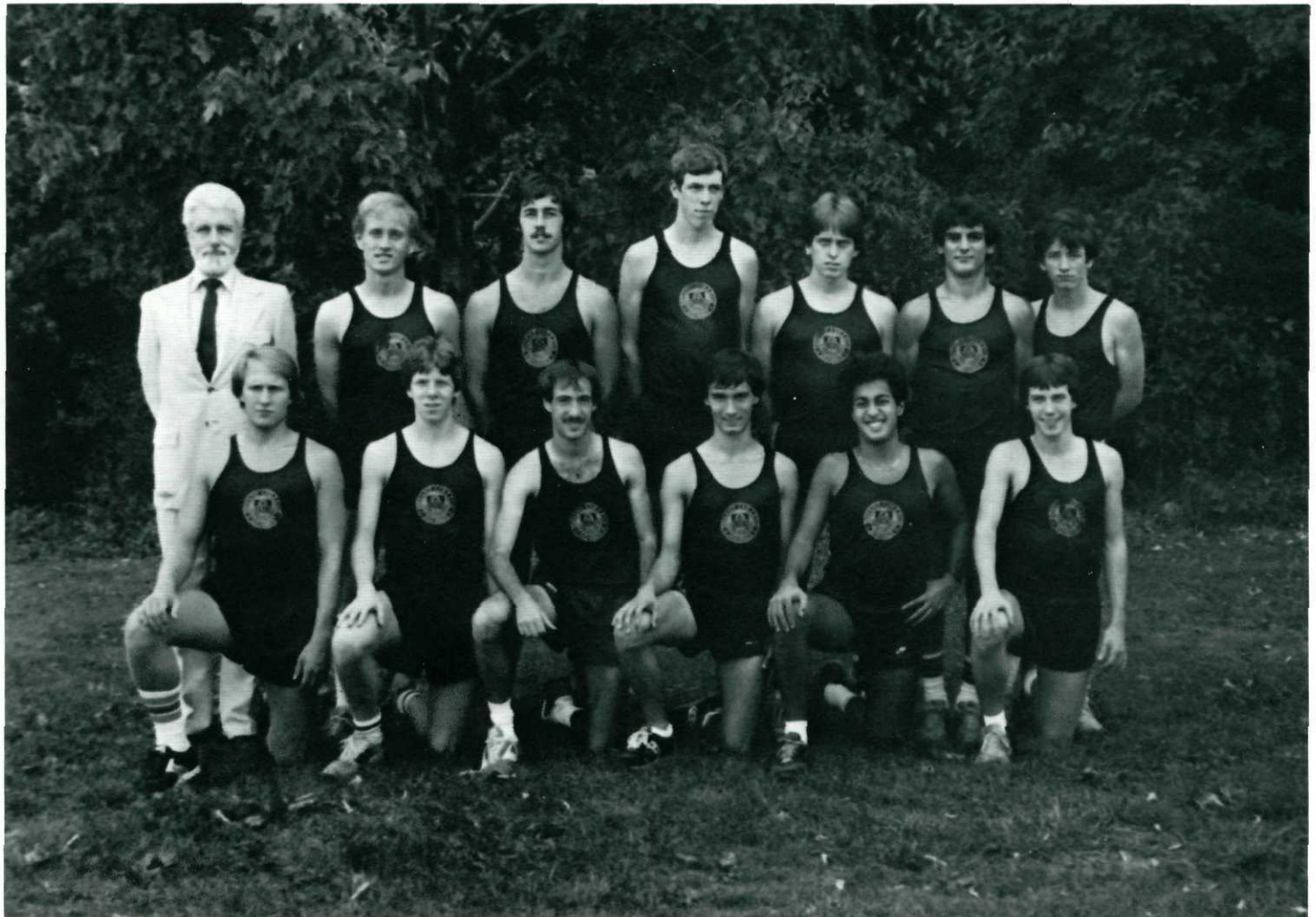

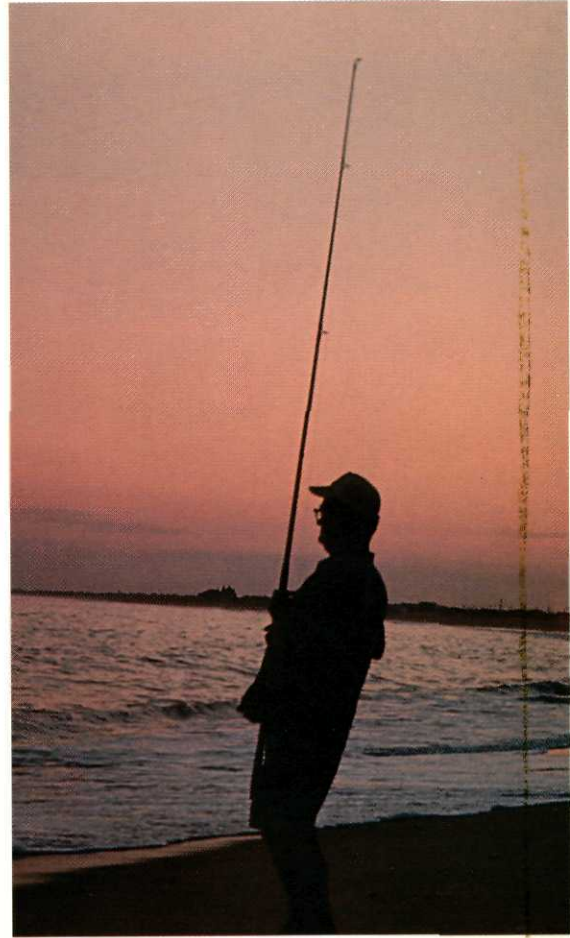

The Northeast-8 Conference is the premier Division II athletic conference in the country.

Officially formulated in June of 1980, the NE-8 was the model upon which several other conferences have been formed in recent years.

That shouldn't be surprising, however, as the NE-8 membership roster reads like a Who's Who of Eastern college-division athletic powers — Assumption, Bentley, Bryant, Merrimack, Stonehill, Springfield and St. Anselm.

Even before conference champions began earning automatic berths in national NCAA tournaments, NE-8 member teams had made more combined national tournament appearances over the past 15 years than any other conference.

In men's basketball alone, NE-8 members have combined to make 55 trips to the NCAA national Division II tournament over the past 14 years.

Since the Conference's initial season in 1980-81, the number of sports in which Conference titles are decided has tripled. Today, a combined total of 11 Conference championships are crowned each season in men's and women's sports. In 10 of those 11 sports, Conference tournaments are held, in addition to the regional season dual competition between schools.

Located on Route 7 in Smithfield, Rhode Island, Bryant can be reached:

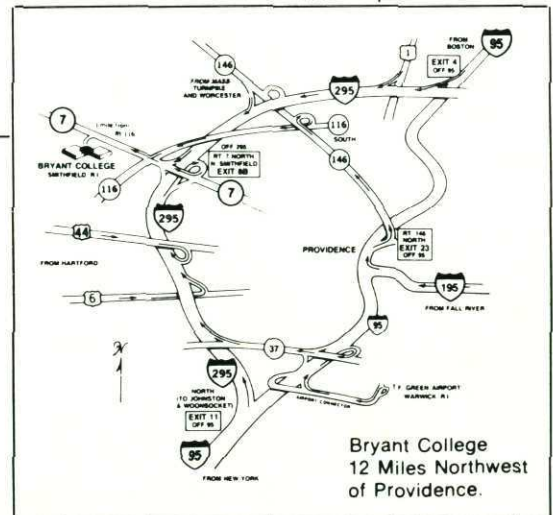
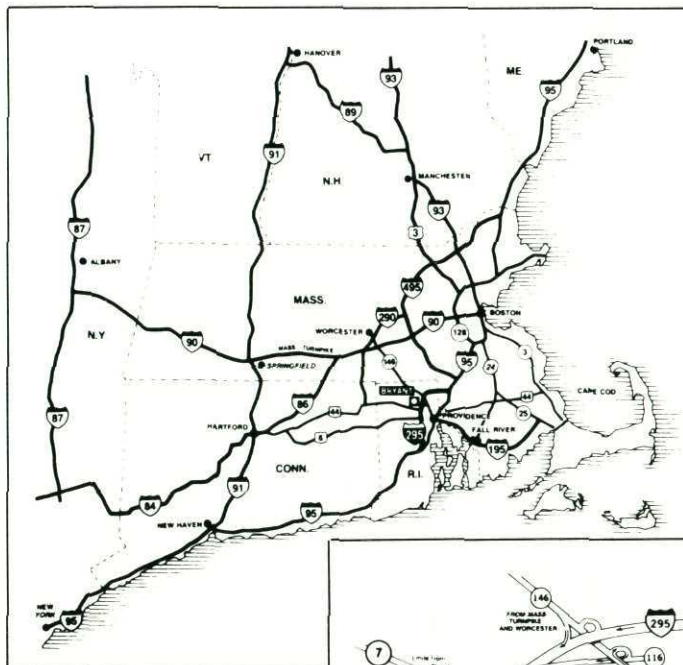
From the north (northern New England, Massachusetts) by taking Routes 91, 89, 93 or 95 south to Route 295 south in Rhode Island, to Route 7;

From the west (Connecticut, up-state New York and points west) by taking Routes 87, 90, 84, 86, 44 or 6 to 146 south or 295 north in Rhode Island, to Route 7;

From the east (eastern Massachusetts) by taking Routes 44 or 195 west to Route 95 north, to Route 146 west, to Route 116 south to Route 7;

From the south (southern Connecticut, southern New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C. and points south) by taking Route 95 north to Route 295 north in Rhode Island to Route 7.

The Theodore F. Green Airport, 22 miles from campus in Warwick, RI, and the main bus terminal and railroad station in Providence provide convenient transportation from all New England states and beyond. Transportation to campus from these terminals must be arranged by the parents and student.
