



## Golf Team Captures N.E. Crown

### *Gary Young's Record 133 Leads Charge*

The Bryant golf team no longer is just one of the best college golf teams in New England. The Indians are now THE BEST!

Led by Gary Young's record setting performance, coach Archie Boulet's linkmen captured their second New England Intercollegiate championship in seven years, sweeping to a five-stroke margin of victory at Cape Cod's New Seabury Country Club last month.

Young, a senior from Whitinsville, Mass., became the first player in the 15-year history of the 36-hole tournament at New Seabury to break par, shooting a nine-under 133.

On the opening day of the tournament, Young became the first player in tournament history to shot a sub-par round on the par 72, 7,000-yard New Seabury Blue Course with a five-under 67. He followed with a four-under 66 on the par 70 Green Course on the second day.

"It was the most impressive performance I have seen in 25 years of college coaching," offered Boulet after Young became the first Bryant player since four-time All-America Jim Hallet to win the New England title.

"We play the New England tourneys in the fall and spring when the wind is blowing very hard at New Seabury," Boulet continued. "As well as Jimmy (Hallet) played winning five championships, he never had a tournament like Gary."

The Indians, who have finished among the top five teams in each of the past five New England tourneys, combined Young's sensational performance with solid efforts from Dave French, Chris McCarthy and Bob Brown for their first New England title since Hallet led the way to the 1981 championship.

McCarthy, who fired a 77 in the opening round, carded a 72 in the second round.

French, who also had a 77 the first day, and Brown clinched the title for the Indians with 73s on the second day. Their performances, combined with Young's 133, gave Bryant a two-day total of 590. Central Connecticut, a Division One entry, was second with 595.

The New England championship was one of three titles the Indians won this fall.

A week before the New England championships, Bryant captured the first Northeast-10 Conference tournament with a commanding 20-stroke margin over Bentley.

The Indians, who had won four of the five Northeast-8 titles before the Conference was expanded to 10 schools this year, took four of the top six individual spots.

French won his second straight Conference individual title with an even-par 70 at Oak Ridge Gold Club in Feeding Hills, Mass., McCarthy was second with a 73, Young finished fourth with a 75 and Brown was sixth with a 76.

The Indians' other title came at the Rutgers Invitational where they outshot 11 other teams, including several of the top Division One teams in the Northeast.

Boulet's troops gave him early notice that this could be one of the best teams in his 25-year tenure as Bryant coach when they started the season with a third place finish in the Yale Invitational, one of the most prestigious collegiate tournaments in the East.

In addition to their three championships and strong showing in the Yale tourney, the Indians also earned their third consecutive berth in the ECAC Championships with a third place finish in the regional tournament. They then finished fifth in the 19-team ECAC Tournament, first among Division Two teams.

The strong fall performance has put the Indians in excellent position to earn their second consecutive berth to the national NCAA Division Two championships in May.

# Men's Soccer Earns National Ranking

To some people it would seem like an overnight success story.

From a string of eight straight losing seasons to a national ranking in only two years.

But coach Lou Verrochi knows the success of this year's men's soccer team didn't happen overnight or even over the past two years.

"We started building a competitive Division II program eight years ago," Verrochi said. "We knew it wouldn't be easy, but every year we felt we moved a step closer to our goal."

## Realized One Goal

Last month Verrochi realized one of his goals for the Bryant soccer program when the Indians were ranked eighth in the national poll of NCAA Division II soccer coaches. It was the first time a Bryant soccer team had earned a national ranking.

The ranking came after the Indians had run off seven straight victories en route to an eventual 13-2-1 regular season record. The 13 victories set a record for most victories in one season by a Bryant soccer team.

The previous record had been set last year when the 1986 Indians booters posted an 11-7 record, the first winning season in eight years for a men's soccer team.

"You have to give the players on this year's team a lot of credit," Verrochi continued. "We lost some excellent players from last year's team. We felt we had the talent for a successful season this year, but we told the players it was going to be a challenge."

## Solomon Leads Attack

Leading the attack was Rick Solomon, a senior forward from Glastonbury, Conn. Solomon set a Bryant career scoring record as he collected 27 points in the 16 games with 12 goals and 3 assists. The performance ranked Solomon among the top five scorers in the Northeast-10 Conference.

The 27 points also gave Solomon a four-year career total of 55 points, the all-time Bryant career scoring record. Solomon,

who missed most of his sophomore season with a leg injury, tallied 48 points in his final two years.

Silverio Araujo, a junior forward from Norwood, Mass., also was one of the Northeast-10 Conference's top 10 scorers with 22 points. Juniors Dave Montani and Dec McMullen were the other top scorers with 10 and 9 points, respectively.

## Bevan the Stopper

Senior goaltender Bob Bevan posted the second lowest goals against average in the NE-10 with 0.79 average for 18 games. Bevan also led the Conference in shutouts with seven.

The only dark spot in the season was a 2-0 loss to Quinnipiac in the title game of the NE-10 playoffs. The Indians had earned their title round berth with a 3-1 semifinal overtime victory over St. Anselm, the two-time defending Conference champion.

# Kelly's Title Highlights Women's Harrier Season

Tracey Kelly's individual championship and the women's team title in the St. Anselm Invitational was the highlight of the season for the Bryant cross country teams this fall.

Kelly, who also finished 11th at the Smith Invitational and 12th in the Northeast-10 championships, was the leader of a young women's team, which finished third in the Northeast-10 championships and 15th in the NCAA regional championships.

In other fall sports, a third place finish in the St. Anselm's Invitational was the highlight of the season for the men's cross country team. Senior Steve Duncan, who finished 7th at St. Anselm, was the Indians' top runner in most of the meets.

"It would have been nice to end the season with a victory, but the loss in the championship game doesn't diminish what these players accomplished this year," said Verrochi.

"Once again we are losing some excellent players to graduation, but I think this is only the beginning of some great years for Bryant soccer."

## Co-Coach of the Year

Verrochi was named 1987 NE-10 Conference Co-Coach of the year for directing the Indians to their record-breaking season. The Bryant mentor shared the honor with Tony Martone of Merrimack.

Four players — Araujo, Solomon, Bevan and Steve Tramontozzi — were named to the NE-10 All-Conference team. Araujo captured one of the first-team forward spots. Solomon and Tramontozzi were named to the second team at forward and Bevan was the second team goalie.

## Alumni Games Set for Feb. 6

The annual alumni basketball games have been scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 6.

For the second year there will be both men's and women's games on Saturday afternoon prior to the men's and women's varsity games at night. The Bryant varsity teams will meet Quinnipiac in Northeast-10 Conference games on Saturday night.

## Men's Outlook

# A Season Full of Question Marks

Coach Leon Drury faces several question marks as he begins the 1987-88 season — his 10th as Bryant head coach.

Will Jamie Ryan, last year's leading scorer before being sidelined with a knee injury, have fully recovered from summertime surgery?

Who will take the place of Manny Barrows, the floor general for the past four years, who graduated last spring?

Can junior college transfers Pat Fields and Dave Kierstead make an immediate impact?

If Ryan is healthy, someone can fill the void created by Barrows' graduation and if Fields and Kierstead have an immediate impact, the Indians could enjoy their first winning season in six years.

Kierstead's performance will answer two of the questions.

Drury is hoping the 6-1 junior from Middlesex Community College can take over as the starting point guard, allowing Ryan and Tom Larranaga freedom as shooting guards.

Ryan, a 6-2 junior, averaged 11.9 ppg and hit 48 percent of his three-point shots before suffering his injury in the 16th game of last season.

Larranaga, a 6-foot senior co-captain, finished as the team's top three-point scorer with 51 conversions in 119 attempts last winter.

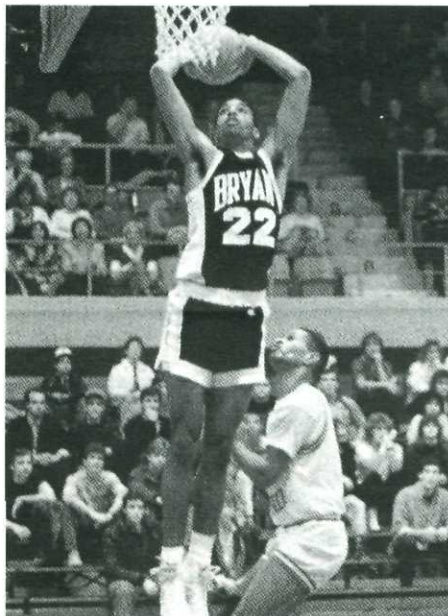
Kierstead was the floor general of last year's Middlesex quartet which reached the semifinal round of the New England JC tournament.

Fields, a 6-6 junior forward, was one of the top scorers on the 1985-86 Community College of Rhode Island team that reached the title round of the New England Junior College tournament.

Drury hopes Fields and junior Derek Higgs (9.9 ppg last year) will give the Indians more scoring punch up front. Higgs, a 6-4 jumping jack from Queens, N.Y., was also the Indians' top rebounder last year with eight per game.

Brian O'Donnell and Bob Arnemann, a pair of sophomore centers who saw backup duty last year, should see more action this season.

Drury also hopes 6-5 freshman Julius Sacko, a three-time All-State selection at Providence Classical High, will make a substantial contribution in both scoring and rebounding.

Senior forward Michael Reed could join the team at mid-year after serving a semester of academic ineligibility.

Obviously, the other Northeast-10 Conference coaches don't feel the new additions will make the Indians a Conference title contender this year.

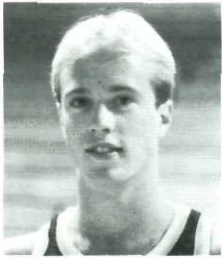
In the pre-season poll of the NE-10 coaches, the Indians were selected to finish 9th, ahead of only Springfield. St. Michael's, which recently was ranked No. 1 in the country in a poll of national Division II coaches, was the pre-season favorite for the NE-10 title. The Purple Knights, who joined the Conference this season along with Quinnipiac, will visit Bryant on Jan. 26.

Included on this year's 30-game schedule are 18 Northeast-10 Conference games and two games in the Chaminade Invitational Tournament in Honolulu, Hawaii.

## THE 1987-88 BASKETBALL INDIANS

### **TOM LARRANAGA** Senior Guard

One of this year's tri-captains, Tom was the leading three-point scorer on last year's team with 51 field goals from beyond the three-point line ... Averaged 9.3 points per game last season for a 5.5 average during his three-year collegiate career ... Also one of the team's top free throw shooters with a .712 career percentage from the charity line.

### **CHRIS O'CONNELL** Senior Guard

Tri-captain with Tom Larranaga and Michael Reed, Chris has been a reserve member of the back court for the past three years ... Played in only seven games during his first two years, he saw action in 14 of the Indians 27 games last year ... Probably will see more action this season with the graduation of Manny Barrows last year.

### **BOB ARNEMANN** Sophomore Center

A former all-league selection at Ward Melville High in New York, Bob averaged 2.7 points and 2.5 rebounds in 24 games last season as a freshman ... A good shooter, his .466 field goal percentage was the third highest on the team ... Also an excellent free throw shooter, hitting on 11 of 15 attempts last year ... Should see more playing time this year.

### **JAMIE RYAN** Junior Guard

Jamie was the Indians' leading scorer last year with an 11.9 average before suffering a severe knee injury in late December ... Underwent surgery last spring and hopes to be back at full strength for this season ... Led the Northeast-8 Conference in three-point shooting with a .484 percentage from three-point territory until he was hurt last season ... Has scored 437 points in his first two years of collegiate competition ... A graduate of Horace Greeley High, he averaged 25 points per game during his senior year in high school.

### **BRIAN O'DONNELL** Sophomore Center

Saw action in 21 of 27 games last season as a freshman ... Averaged 2.2 points and 1.8 rebounds ... Should see more duty this season ... A former All-Western Mass. selection at Easthampton High ... Also led his league in blocked shots during his senior year in high school.

### **DEREK HIGGS** Sophomore Forward

Bryant's leading rebounder and No. 3 scorer last year with an average of 7.8 rebounds and 9.9 points per game in 86-87 ... Excellent leaping ability, he has pulled down 372 rebounds in his first two years with the Indians ... Should be a starting member of the front court this year.

### **JULIUS SACKO** Freshman Forward

A three-time All-State selection at Providence Classical High, he led the Purple to the title round of the 1986 Rhode Island Class A state tournament ... Should provide scoring and rebounding help up front.

### **PAT FIELDS** Junior Center

Pat transferred to Bryant this year from the Community College of Rhode Island ... In 1985 he played a major role in the Knights' drive to the title round of the New England Junior College tournament ... At 6-8, he gives the Indians a big man with proven collegiate experience.

### **DAVE KIERSTEAD** Junior Guard

A talented ballhandler, Dave is battling for the starting point-guard spot left open by Manny Barrows' graduation ... Transferred to Bryant this year from Middlesex Community College ... Led Middlesex to the semifinal round of the New England Junior College tournament last year.

### **ROB FRITZ** Freshman Guard

Rob was an all-league selection at East Lyme, Conn. High last year ... Could see action at either point guard or the off-guard spot this season.

### APRIL PECKHAM Freshman Guard

Her ballhandling and playmaking skills led Central Falls High to the Rhode Island girls Class B championship last year ... She should see plenty of action in her first year of college competition.

### STEPHANIE COOPER Freshman Forward

An all-league selection last year at North Attleboro High, she played a major role in the Red Rocketeers' drive to the Massachusetts Class B state title ... Will be a welcome addition to front court.

### KARRIE GIARAMITA Sophomore Center

Karrie was the first member of the front court off the bench last year ... She saw action in all 27 games, averaging 5 points and 5.7 rebounds per game ... Her rebounding average made her the No. 2 rebounder on the team behind Stephanie Ladd.

### JAMIE EMIDY Freshman Forward

A Rhode Island All-State selection as a junior at Cumberland High in 1986, she missed most of last season with a knee injury ... She underwent surgery last spring, however, and appears ready for duty this season.

### KRISTEN DAIGNEAULT Sophomore Center

Kris hopes to rebound this year after missing most of her freshman season with mononucleosis ... She appeared in only three games last year, averaging 2 points and 3 rebounds per game.

### KRISTEN COOK Freshman Forward/Guard

Averaged 16 points per game last year at Mt. Pleasant High School in Providence ... Has the size (5-8) to play forward and the shooting talents to play in the back court.

### PATTI COELHO Senior Forward

One of this year's co-captains, Patti is one of the most versatile athletes on the team ... In addition to being a four-year varsity basketball player, she also was a member of the varsity volleyball team for two years. Last year, as one of the first players off the bench, she saw action in 25 of the Lady Indians' 27 games.

### LAURA SCINTO Junior Guard

Laura was one of the biggest, and most pleasant, surprises of the 1986-87 season. After averaging only three points per game as a freshman, she earned a starting role and averaged 11.6 points and handed out four assists per game last season.

### LORI MAHLER Senior Guard

A three-year veteran, Lori has been one of the team's leading free throw shooters each of the past two years ... Last season she connected on 70 percent of her 69 free throws, giving her a .739 career percentage.

### CHRIS ROOT Junior Forward

Another of coach Ralph Tomasso's returning starters, Chris averaged 5.6 points and 5.2 rebounds per game last year ... After serving as a backup to All-America Karyn Marshall in her freshman year, she started in all 27 games last year.

### STEPHANIE LADD Junior Center

A Northeast-8 Conference All-Star selection last year, Stephanie was the Lady Indians' leading scorer and rebounder in 1986-87 with a 13.3 scoring average and a 9.3 rebounding mark ... In two years of varsity competition, she has scored 468 points, an 8.6 average.

### DONNA O'BRIEN Sophomore Forward

Donna was one of the top first-year players in the Northeast-8 Conference last year ... A former Rhode Island All-State basketball and softball player at Coventry High, she averaged 5.9 points and 4.0 rebounds in her rookie season last year.

### KATE THIELBAR Freshman Forward

At 5-10, Kate could give the Lady Indians welcomed rebounding depth ... She is a former standout player at Manchester, Mass., High School.

### DENISE POULESON Forward

Denise gained valuable experience as a backup forward last season ... A strong rebounder she could see more playing time this season.

## Women's Outlook

# Vets, With Help, May Make Title Run

A group of talented newcomers joining 11 returning veterans should make the Lady Indians a Northeast-10 Conference title contender this season.

Seven of last year's leading scorers will be back in the lineup, led by Stephanie Ladd, a 6-2 junior center who averaged 13.3 points and 10 rebounds per game last year.

Joining Ladd once again will be two other players who averaged in double figures last year — Lori Mahler and Laura Scinto. Mahler, a 5-6 senior guard, averaged 12.6 ppg last season. Scinto, a 5-7 junior guard, collected 11.6 points per game last year.

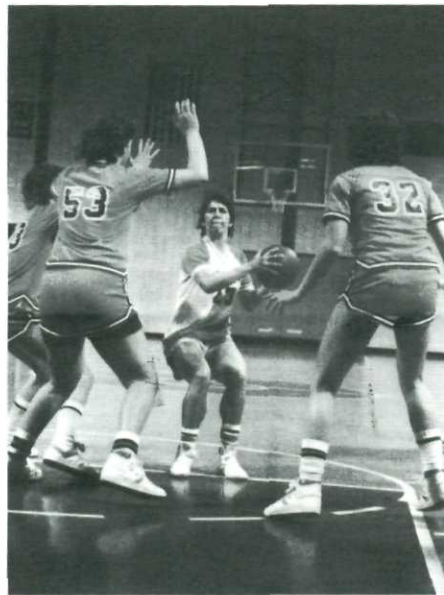
In addition to the two proven scorers in the backcourt and Ladd up front, coach Ralph Tomasso also has veterans Chris Root, Karrie Giaramita and Donna O'Brien in the front court.

O'Brien was one of the top first-year players in the Northeast-8 Conference last year with a 5.9 scoring average and a 4.0 rebounding mark. The former Rhode Island basketball and softball high school All-Stater could see action both up front or in the backcourt this year.

Giaramita, a 6-foot sophomore center, and Root, a 5-11, junior forward, were the Nos. 2 and 3 rebounders, respectively, last season. Giaramita pulled down 5.7 re-

bounds per game in addition to scoring 5.0 points. Root averaged 5.7 points and 4.2 rebounds.

Tomasso also expects help from a corps of newcomers. Included among the rookies are two Rhode Island All-Staters — April

Peckham, a 5-3 guard from Central Falls and Jamie Emidy, a 5-11 forward from Cumberland.

Stephanie Cooper, a 5-9 forward from North Attleboro, Mass. and Kristen Cook, a 5-8 guard from Mt. Pleasant High in Providence, R.I., are two other first year players who should see plenty of action.

The Lady Indians, who posted a 16-11 record last year in their first year under Tomasso's direction, were selected third in the Northeast 10 pre-season coaches poll.

"We surprised a lot of people last year, but this year everyone will be watching out for us," said Tomasso. "We have some good talent, but we need to be ready for every game."

## Young Continues One (Wo)man Show

Sophomore Debby Young continued her performance as a one-woman show for the Bryant women's golf team this fall with appearances in three regional women's collegiate tournaments.

A sophomore from Pawcatuck, Conn., and a former runner-up in the Connecticut girls high school championship, Debby hopes she will not be a one-player show for much longer.

"I hope we can get a few more girls to come out for the team this spring," Young said. "I know some of the girls are hesitant because they don't have very much tournament experience. But most of the college tournaments here in the East are designed for new players because they have a novice division as well as a championship division."

# Lady Booters Finish Runners-Up in NE-10

The women's soccer team made 1987 a year for the record book.

The '87 lady booters entered the record book, along with the 1984 team, as the most successful women's soccer teams in Bryant history as they posted nine victories.

Led by freshman Nicole Taglione, the Lady Indians rolled to a 9-7-2 regular season record, including a 5-1 mark in Northeast-10 Conference competition.

The 5-1 conference mark earned Bryant a second place finish in the regular season Conference standings.

Taglione became one of the Conference's top first-year players as she tallied 21 points on 9 goals and 3 assists. The production made her the No. 6 scorer in the NE-10.

Gretchen Jefferys, a sophomore from Cincinnati, Ohio, was the No. 2 scorer with three goals and seven assists for 13 points.

Another newcomer, Pricilla Wong, was the Lady Indians' No. 3 scorer with four goals and two assists for 10 points.

Their performances helped offset the loss of several key players due to injuries.

All-New England forward Jenny Wilson was lost for the year only two weeks after the start of the season when she reinjured her knee.

Coach Paul Ribeiro also was forced to move regular goaltender Tracy Cirillo to

midfield and veteran Teri Clayton into the goal when Clayton suffered a foot injury that prevented her from kicking.

Despite being forced to switch positions, Clayton and Cirillo combined for one of the top goaltending records in the Conference.

In 11 games in the net, Cirillo posted a 1.69 goals against average, allowing only 19 goals in 1,010 minutes of play.

Clayton also had three shutouts in her five games in the goal. Combined, the two women posted a 1.41 goals against average.

The Lady Indians captured four spots on the NE-10 Conference all-star team as Cirillo, Taglione, Dierde Sullivan and Sandy Wilson all were chosen on the All-Conference second team.

Merrimack, the regular season champion with a perfect 6-0 record, dominated the first team with five selections.

With Clayton and Cirillo both graduating in the spring, Ribeiro will need to find a new goaltender if the Lady Indians hope to have another outstanding season in 1988.

Offense, however, shouldn't be a major problem with the top three scorers — Taglione, Jefferys and Wong — all scheduled to be back in the lineup. All totaled, Ribeiro should have 12 of the 18 players on this year's roster back in 1988.

# Women's Tennis Enjoys Record Season

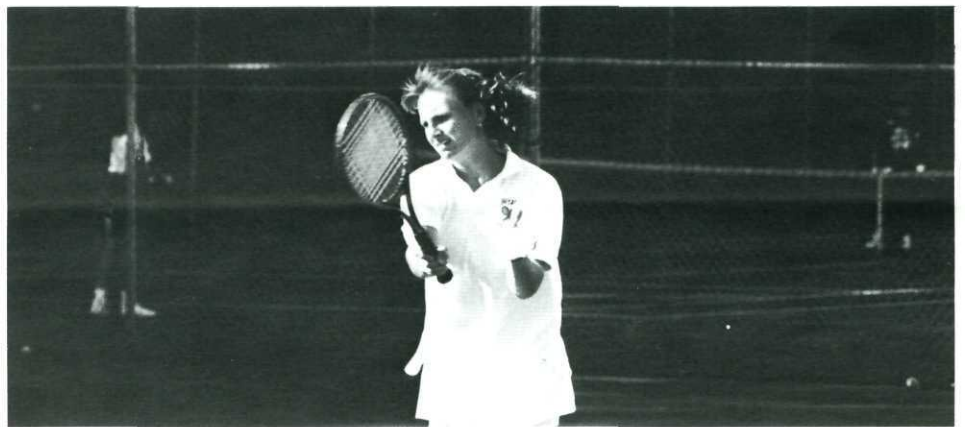
The women's tennis team was one of the top Division II teams in New England for the second consecutive year as the Lady Indians posted a 10-2 regular season record and captured runner-up honors in both the New England Division II and Northeast -10 Conference tournaments.

The 10 victories put coach Peter Glanz's squad in the Bryant record book, tying it with the 1983 team for the most victories by a Bryant women's tennis team. Over the past two years the Indians netwomen have registered a combined record of 19 victories and only 4 losses.

Senior Joy Proccacino was one of the top Division Two players in New England once again with a 6-2 dual match record against No. 1 singles players.

Proccacino also combined with Kim Bickell for the duo's second consecutive Northeast-10 No 1 doubles title. During the regular season the pair rolled to an 8-2 record in dual matches.

But the best doubles record was posted by juniors Tina Galley and Pat Conant. The twosome, who highlighted their season by winning the New England Division Two No. 3 doubles crown, rolled to a 9-1 slate during the regular season.
