





THE 1949 CLASS GIFT

Library Endowment Gift from the Class of 1949

► General Idea

Each graduate of the Class of 1949 (to include both February and August seniors) shall be assessed \$6. The fund accumulated shall be collected and invested by a board of directors composed of four members of the Class of 1949 in such a manner as to yield the highest return, yet not endanger the principal sum. The yearly interest realized on this trust fund, shall be presented to Bryant College at each Class Day Exercise. The interest on this endowment fund to be expended only on suitable reference books for the College Library, imprinted with the words "Gift From The Class of 1949".

► Board of Directors

College officials were asked to select the Directors. They made the following appointments: August— Chairman, George Brinkerhoff; Secretary, Joseph Bruno; February—Vice-Chairman, James O'Laughlin; Secretary, William E. Connor. These directors have been appointed for life. The Secretary of the College was also appointed a member of the board for the purpose of consultation and to serve in a non-voting capacity.

► Collection of Fund

Each senior of the Class of 1949 is to be assessed \$6. The notice of amounts due shall be sent to all graduates. Personal recognition will be given each contributor in the ALUMNI QUARTERLY. General reports of the fund shall also be reported herein. An accounting of the books purchased by the College Library shall be published in the QUARTERLY, too.

► Early Returns

The trustees of this fund informed the Alumni Association that they had not expected returns until November first. However, they did report a number of people were turning in their contributions early resulting in the attainment of ten per cent of the expected goal of twenty-five hundred dollars by 1954. CONNECTICUT VALLEY


