



Araujo & Hubler Spark Title Drive

Men's Soccer Team Earns Share of Northeast-10 Title

They played 19 games — 1,790 minutes of soccer — and the only thing separating the Bryant men's soccer team from perfection was four goals.

The 1988 Indian booters became the most successful Bryant soccer team in history and set several school records en route to a 14-4-1 campaign.

The Indians came within four goals of posting an undefeated record as all four losses were 1-0 setbacks. The last was a 1-0 loss to Springfield in the title game of the Northeast-10 Conference tournament held at Bryant in November.

"I know the players were upset about losing in the championship game, but they should be extremely proud of what they accomplished this season," said head coach Lou Verrochi.

"They raised soccer at Bryant to a new level and I think we give Bryant fans some very enjoyable afternoons. I have never seen crowds like we had for the semifinal and final round playoff games."

By the end of the season, Verrochi's troops had set Bryant team records for most victories in a season, highest won-loss percentage and fewest goals allowed.

They also became the first Bryant soccer players to enjoy a championship celebration as they shared the regular season Conference title after finishing in a three-way first place tie with Springfield and St. Michael's.

The Indians' 7-2 Conference record also gave them the top seed in the post-season tournament by virtue of most victories among the three tri-champions.

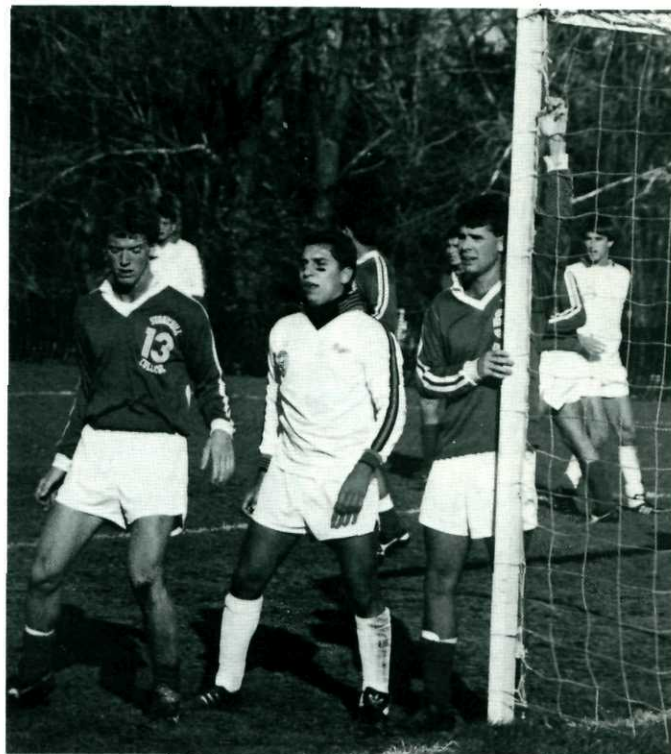
In addition to the team records, senior All-America Silverio Araujo rewrote the individual record book by setting six individual scoring marks. Araujo was the Northeast-10 Conference individual scoring champion with 39 points on 15 goals and 9 assists.

The 39 points set both Bryant and Conference records for most points in one season. Araujo also set Bryant records for most points in a game with nine against American International, most goals in a season (15), most career goals (33), most goals in a game (4 against AIC) and most career points (83). He also tied the school record for most assists in a game with three against Rhode Island College.

Araujo wasn't the only Bryant player setting records this season.

Goaltender Eric Hubler also set Bryant and Northeast-10 Conference records for most shutouts in one season. The freshman

netminder blanked the opposition in 11 of the Indians' 19 games. Hubler also set school and conference marks for the lowest goal against average with an 0.42 mark in 1,700 minutes of play.

After a season-opening 1-0 loss to St. Anselm, the Indians won 13 of their next 15 games, including a six-game winning streak before the title game of the Conference tournament. Included in the string was a 2-0 victory over Stonehill in the semifinal round of the post-season tournament.

The performance earned the Indians a No. 8 ranking in the northeast Division Two soccer poll, the first time a Bryant team had been regionally ranked.

"At the start of the season we felt we had the potential for an outstanding year," said Verrochi. "Even after we lost the first game of the season nobody got discouraged."

"It helped a lot to have a freshman like Eric (Hubler) come in and take over in the goal. But a lot of the credit has to go to the seniors. SA (Araujo), Paul Alderucci, Dec McMullen, Dave Montani and John Donahue were both outstanding players and excellent team leaders. That's what made this team so successful."

Ten Earn Top NE-10 Conference Awards

Men's soccer coach Lou Verrochi and nine Bryant athletes were recipients of major Northeast-10 Conference awards this fall.

Verrochi was named the NE-10 men's soccer Coach of the Year after directing the Indian booters to a 14-4-1 record and a share of the Conference regular season title. The award marked the second consecutive year Verrochi has earned Coach of the Year honors. Last year he shared the award with Merrimack's Tony Martone.

Over the past two years, Verrochi has directed the Indians to a combined 27-7-3 record, one of the best college soccer win-loss marks in the northeast. This year the Indians set a Bryant record for most victories in one season.

Bryant made a clean sweep of the men's major soccer awards as senior All-America Silverio Araujo was named the Conference Player of the Year and freshman goaltender Eric Hubler was named Rookie of the Year.

Araujo became the first Bryant player to win the individual Conference scoring title. The Norwood, Mass., native tallied 39 points on 15 goals and 9 assists. The total set both Bryant and Northeast-10 Conference records for most points in one season.

Araujo is the second Bryant player in the past three years to be named Conference Player of the Year. Former Bryant All-America Mark Verille won the award in 1986.

Hubler was named the outstanding rookie after registering 11 shutouts in his first season of collegiate competition. The performance set a NE-10 record for most shutouts in one season. Huber's 0.42 goals against average also was the lowest average in the Conference.

In addition to their Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year honors, both Araujo and

Hubler earned first-team All-Conference selection.

Six other Bryant athletes also earned first-team All-Conference honors. The golf team led the selections with five first-team members — Dave French, Chris McCarthy, Bob Brown, Dave Olender and Scott Trethewey.

Women's cross country star Theresa Kelley was Bryant's other first-team selection.

French, Brown, McCarthy, Olender and Trethewey earned their Conference honors by finishing among the top 10 at the Conference championships in October. (See page 3 for more details on the Conference tournament).

Kelley's fifth place finish at the

Northeast-10 cross country championships gave her a spot on the women's All-Conference team.

Two of the best rookies in the Conference this fall were wearing Bryant uniforms. In addition to Huber's selection as the men's soccer Rookie of the Year, freshman Noelle Emmette was named the women's volleyball Rookie of the Year. Emmette played a key role as the Lady Indians finished fourth in the NE 10 regular season standings with a 5-3 Conference mark.

Four Bryant athletes also earned second team honors — Steve Hearn in men's soccer, Lori McLaughlin in women's volleyball, Diane Gracey in women's cross country and Sandy Wilson in women's soccer.

Men's Outlook

Looking for New Results This Winter

Coach Leon Drury hopes six returning lettermen and several outstanding newcomers is the combination the Indians need for their first winning season in seven years.

Heading the list of returning vets is 6-5 senior forward Derek Higgs. He was the No. 2 scorer and leading rebounder among the Bryant regulars last season with a 12.3 scoring average and a 9.4 rebounding mark.

"Derek (Higgs) should be one of the top players in the Northeast-10 Conference this year," declared Drury. "He has the potential to be both one of the conference's top scorers and rebounders."

Drury also hopes Jamie Ryan, a sharp-shooting senior guard who has missed most of the past two seasons with injuries, will be back in top form this winter. Ryan averaged 14.4 points and was the Northeast-10 Conference's top three-point shooter before he was injured after 13 games last season.

Although Ryan's injury was the most serious suffered by a Bryant player last year, he wasn't the only Indian hit by the injury bug during the 1987-88 season.

The injuries proved disastrous for the Indians last winter as they suffered through a 7-22 campaign. But last year's hard times may have set the stage for better results this season.

"Quite a few kids who probably wouldn't have played much last year got a lot of experience because of the injuries we had," said Drury. "This year that experience should help out quite a bit."

The Indians should be solid in the front-court with the return of senior Pat Fields, junior Bob Arnemann and sophomore Julius Sacko. Arnemann, a 6-6 forward, averaged 10.2 points and 5.9 rebounds last year. Fields, also a 6-6 forward, averaged 6 points and 4 rebounds per game in his first season with the Indians after transferring from the Community College of Rhode Island.

Sacko was one of the top newcomers in the Northeast-10 last season. A former All-Stater at Providence's Classical High, he averaged 10 points per game once he began seeing regular playing time during the second half of the season.

The addition of Brian Spano, a junior who sat out last season after transferring from the University of New Hampshire, should provide some of the muscle up front that was missing last year.

Richie Rose, a 6-6 freshman forward from Roslindale, Mass.; Scott Meyer, a 6-4 freshman from Troy, N.Y.; Jeff Jarry, a 6-4 freshman from Cumberland, R.I. and Jack Newbauer, a 6-4 freshman from North Kingstown, R.I. also will provide front court depth.

Veteran Dave Kierstead will be battling several newcomers for the starting point guard spot. Kierstead started 26 of 30 games last season and averaged 5.3 points and 4 assists per game.

Also vying for the point-guard post is David Cingiser, a 5-11 freshman from North Kingstown, R.I.; Willie Favro, a 5-11 freshman from Monroe, Conn. and Chad Creamer, a 6-foot sophomore transfer from Providence College.

Sophomore Bob Fritz, C.J. Simmons, a 6-4 freshman from Wall, N.J., and Dennis Fisher, a 6-2 freshman from Barnstable, Mass., will be sharing the shooting-guard spot with Ryan.

If the Indians make a run for the Northeast-10 title this season, they'll be the Cinderella team of the league. In the pre-season poll of the Conference's 10 coaches, Bryant was selected to finish ninth. Quinnipiac earned top billing with 96 points. Bryant had 17 points, just ahead of Springfield which was last with 17.

There'll Be No Surprises This Year

Coach Ralph Tomasso lost only two members from last year's Northeast-10 Conference championship team, but they were big loses.

Missing from the lineup for the first time in four years will be Lori Mahler, last year's leading scorer, and Patti Coelho, last year's leading rebounder. Combined, they averaged 25 points (Mahler 18 and Coelho 7) and 10 rebounds (Coelho 7 and Mahler 3) per game last year.

"We will miss both the talent and the leadership that Lori and Patti gave us last year," said Tomasso. "But I think we have the potential to be one of the Conference's top teams once again this year."

Last year the Lady Indians may have surprised some of the teams in the Conference with a late-season surge in which they won 11 of their final 13 games. Included in the string were three straight victories in the post-season NE-10 tournament.

Nobody will be caught off guard by the Lady Indians this season, however.

"After last season, everyone will be gunning for us this season. We will need help from a lot of people if we hope to be successful," said Tomasso.

Tomasso will have eight returning letter-winners and five outstanding newcomers on the roster as he begins his third year as head coach. The veteran roster will make Bryant one of the preseason favorites for the NE-10 title.

Topping the list of Tomasso's returning vets are Laura Scinto, Stephanie Ladd and Chris Root, three seniors who were the Nos. 2, 3 and 4 scorers, respectively, last year.

Scinto, a 5-6 point guard, averaged 12.8 points and led the team in assists last year with 150 in 31 games.

Ladd and Root should be the mainstay of the front court this year.

Ladd, a 6-foot center, averaged 12.6 points and 7.2 rebounds per game last year. She delivered some of her top performances of the year in the post-season tournament, especially a 16-rebound effort against Bentley in the title game. The effort earned her tournament MVP honors.

Root enjoyed her best season in three years of varsity play last winter, averaging 9.3 points and 7.0 rebounds per game. She hit on .473 percent of her 203 field goal attempts, second only to Ladd in team field

goal shooting.

Also returning is Donna O'Brien, a junior forward from Coventry, R.I., who has been either a starter or one of the first two players off the bench during her first two years of collegiate action. Last year she averaged six points and four rebounds per game.

Sophomore point guard April Peckham was the top first-year playmaker in the Northeast-10 Conference last year and will play a major role in the Bryant offense again this year. Peckham was second to Scinto in team assists last year with 83 in only 594 minutes of playing time. In addition, she also averaged 4.6 points per game last season.

Jamie Emidy and Stephanie Cooper are a pair of sophomore forwards who gained valuable experience last year as freshmen and should see more playing time this season. Cooper averaged 4.6 points and 3.7 rebounds per game; Emidy averaged two points and two rebounds per game.

If junior Kerri Giaramita can recover from a knee injury that kept her out of most of last season, she'll give the Lady Indians added scoring and rebounding strength. The 5-10 Saugus, Mass. native played in only 11 games a year ago, but as a freshman she averaged five points and five rebounds while appearing in 27 games.

The five freshmen are all former Massachusetts high school standouts. Bridgett Casey, a 5-7 guard from Oliver Ames High, is the only newcomer in the backcourt. Joining the frontcourt are Jennifer Spencer, a 5-10 forward from Pingree High; Heather Houle, a 5-9 forward from Dennis-Yarmouth; Lynellen McDonnell, a 5-8 forward from Methuen and Colleen Monahan, a 5-9 forward from Danvers.

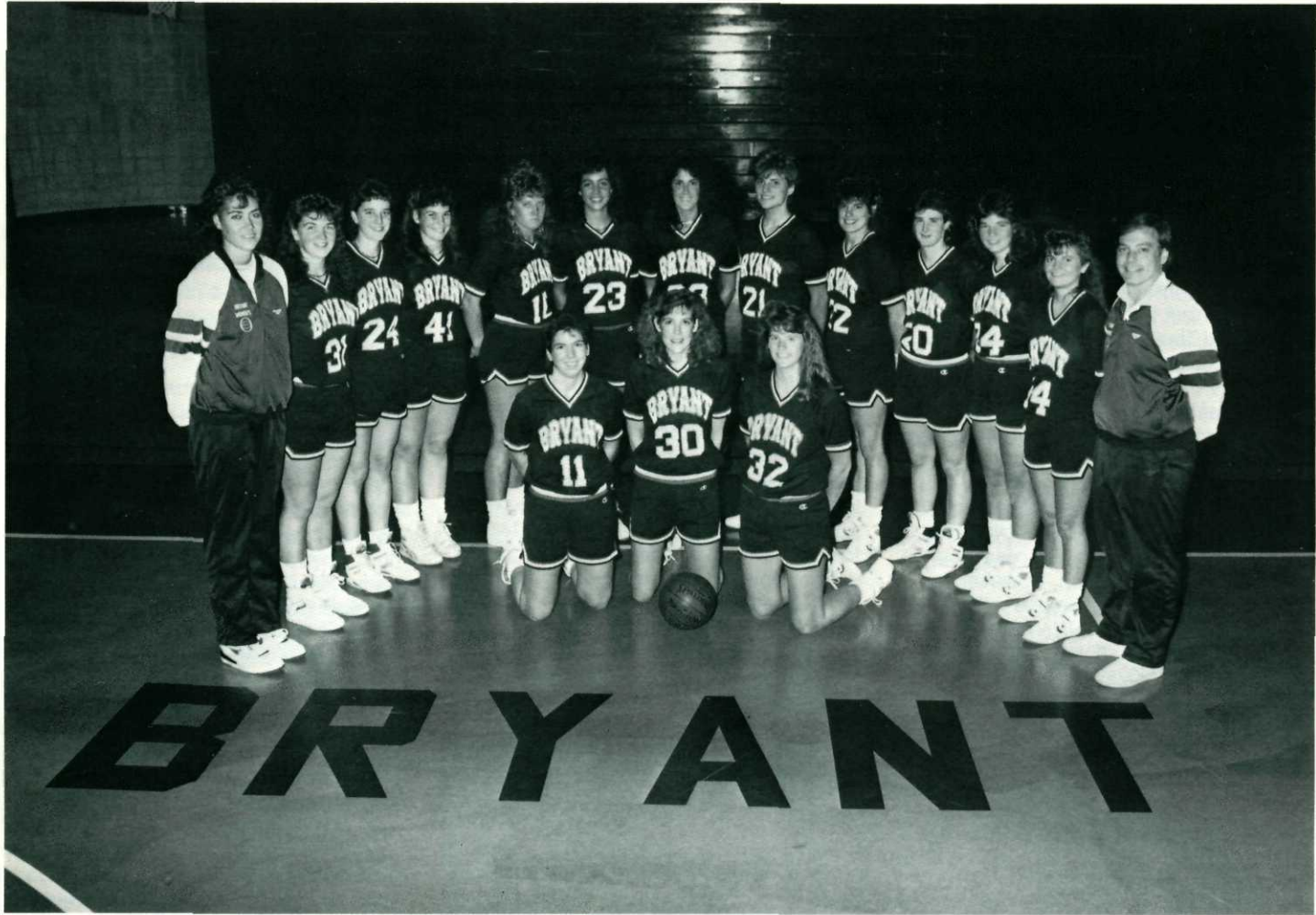

Women's Tennis Takes No. 2 Spot in N.E. Again

For the second consecutive year, the Bryant women's tennis team was one of the top two Division Two teams in New England.

The Lady Indians were runnersup in the New England Division Two women's championships, finishing four points behind defending champion Springfield in the eight-team tourney held at Springfield in October.

Freshman Patty Blair gave the Lady Indians three points as she captured the Second Flight singles title with three victories. Blair completed her title drive with a convincing 6-1, 6-2 triumph over Miriam Meyer of Merrimack in the title match.

Four other Lady Indians — Meredith Molnar at No. 3 singles, Kim Dunphy at No. 6 singles and Chris O'Connor and Amy Tucker at No. 3 doubles — posted two victories before losing in the title round.

Molnar dropped a 6-1, 6-2 decision to Springfield's Danielle Despathy in the championship match and Springfield's Kathy Holbrook handed Dunphy a 6-2, 6-3 setback in the No. 6 final. Holbrook also was part of a championship doubles team as she and Sandra Greenwood combined for a 6-2, 6-2 victory over O'Connor and Tucker in the third doubles title match.

The New England tourney closed out one of the most successful seasons in the history of the Lady Indians women's tennis program. In addition to their second place finish in the New England tourney, the Lady Indians also finished second to Springfield during the regular season Northeast 10 Conference season with a 7-1 record against NE 10 competition.

Overall the Lady Indians posted a 10-3 dual record, the third best record in the 13-year history of Bryant women's tennis. Over the past two years coach Peter Glanz's squad has rolled to a combined 21-5 record.

In other women's sports this fall, the soccer team earned its third consecutive berth in the Northeast-10 Conference post-season tournament with a 2-2-2 record in regular season NE-10 competition.

Unfortunately, coach Paul Ribeiro's booters drew top-seeded Springfield in the opening round and dropped a 2-0 decision.

Senior Sandy Wilson led the Bryant attack with 21 points on eight goals and five assists. The performance earned Wilson second team All-Conference honors.

Priscilla Wong, Rachell O'Dell, Nicole Taglione and Susie Carroll also were double figure scorers as Wong collected 18 points, O'Dell and Taglione each scored 16 and Carroll had 14.

The women's cross country team, led by Theresa Kelley, finished third in the Northeast-10 championships. Kelley's fifth place finish earned her first team All-Conference honors.

The women's volleyball team rebounded from a disastrous 9-18 record last year and finished 10-13. The Lady Indians also finished fourth in the regular season Northeast-10 standings with a 5-2 record.

Golfers Capture Sixth Straight Conference Title

It may not be as certain as death and taxes, but Bryant College winning the Northeast-10 Conference golf championship definitely ranks as one of the sure bets in collegiate sports.

Coach Archie Boulet's team captured its sixth consecutive NE-10 title in October with a commanding 12-stroke margin over runner-up Bentley in the 18-hole tournament held at the Indian Ridge Country Club in Andover, Mass.

In addition to their sixth straight, the title also was the Indians' seventh in the eight-year history of the Conference championships.

Senior All-America Dave French led the Indians with a two-over par 74, finishing second in the individual race, two strokes off the pace set by Mike Jones of Bentley who won the individual title.

All five Bryant players placed in the top 10, giving the Indians five spots on the 10-player All-Conference team. In addition to French, Scott Trethewey was fifth with a 77; Bob Brown sixth (78), Chris McCarthy ninth (80) and Dave Olender 10th (81).

The Northeast-10 title was one of several outstanding efforts by the Indians during the fall season.

Ranked fourth in the national Division Two poll conducted by Golf Week magazine, the Indians were the top Division Two team in each of the six tournaments they played this fall.

In addition to their Conference championship, they also finished third in both the New England Championships and the Yale Invitational and fourth at the West Point Invitational.

French posted the best medal average of the season — 76.4 — in 14 rounds of tournament play. McCarthy, another senior All-America, was second at 77.7 and Brown, a sophomore All-America, was third at 78.8. Trethewey rounded out the top five at 79.0.
