Sergei N. Khrushchev, son of Nikita

Khrushchev, the former Prime Minister of the Soviet Union, lectured recently on "Russia Today." He discussed current economic and political developments in Russia and gave an update on the transition of the former Soviet Union from a centralized to a decentralized society, and the transformation from a central to a market economy. Dr. Khrushchev is a senior fellow at the Watson Institute of International Studies at Brown University.

Town meeting

In two one-hour town meeting sessions held February 24, President Ron Machtley shared his thoughts on the exciting changes and challenges ahead for the Bryant Community.

The President talked about The New Century Plan for Excellence, a roadmap for strengthening Bryant's future. He stressed the need to maintain Bryant's focus on undergraduate education, enhance the Graduate and Executive Education programs, and develop Bryant's niche as a nationally recognized educational institution with strong business outreach programs.

Good news included a continuing increase in applications, and, with enrollment now at 2,500 fulltime undergraduates, it looks like the trend will continue through 2008. The college has attracted new faculty from Cornell, Johns Hopkins, and Michigan State. The endowment has grown to \$150 million due to reinvestments and market appreciation.

President Machtley discussed the campus master plan and noted that although Bryant's physical plant is stable, competitors have been investing significantly to enhance their campus environments. Enhancing Bryant's physical plant will increase our competitiveness and have the greatest immediate impact on student life, the quality of academic programs, and recruitment opportunities. Priorities include:

- A state-of-the-art facility to house a traditional library as well as emerging learning resources
- An environment that reflects new teaching and learning trends

- The expansion of current recreational facilities to reflect new consumer interests and expectations
- The enhancement of the college's reception area to better reflect the quality of its academic programs
- Plans for future growth in academic programs
- The creation of additional green space and settings more in keeping with traditional college campuses

Groundbreaking for the Center for Information and Technology will be held May 18, with construction slated to begin this summer. Construction of the Wellness Center will begin in July. Completion dates for each building are December 2001 and July 2001, respectively. The buildings will be located on a new central quadrangle that will be the focal point of the campus.

Project funding will come through a threepronged program that includes balancing the operating budget, borrowing from a local bonding authority, and private gifts.

As construction begins, President Machtley pointed out that parking will be a bit farther away. And the sound of jackhammers may test the patience of staff this summer, as the pool is removed from the Unistructure to make way for additional office space and classrooms. He asked for our understanding, and urged all of us to develop an entrepreneurial spirit.

"The world is changing and changing fast," he said. "Let's work together to maximize our existing resources."

Jerry Greenfield to speak on April 5

The Trustee Speaker series presents Jerry Greenfield, cofounder of Ben & Jerry's, on Wednesday, April 5, at 8 p.m. in the Multipurpose Activities Center. Greenfield's lecture is titled, "Radical Business Philosophy, Social Responsibility, and Free Ice Cream for Everyone!"

Greenfield and long-time friend and business partner Ben Cohen are the men behind one of the most talked-about and least conventional success stories in American business. By making social responsibility and creative management strengths instead of weaknesses, they helped to build a storefront venture into a \$160 million publicly held ice cream empire.

Now, with his new bestseller, Ben & Jerry's Double-Dip: Lead with Your Values and Make Money, Too (co-authored with Cohen), Greenfield has created both a nuts-and-bolts guidebook to the promise and pitfalls of "values-led business," and an inspiring wake-up call about the growing international influence of the "socially conscious" or "mission driven" corporation.

Student-athletes aim high

They are students like any other here at Bryant. They attend classes, study outside of the classroom, and struggle to maintain the delicate balance of the academic and social pressures of the traditional college student.

But for the 112 students named to the Bulldog Academic Honor Roll this past fall, the high level of academic achievement means just a little bit more.

When you turn on sports-talk radio and hear about everything that is supposedly wrong in college athletics, you don't hear about these students. But each one of them is an example personified of how success in ath-


letics and academics isn't mutually exclusive.

Take Greg Wolyniec for example. A Dean's List student and accounting major, Greg was also at the top of his class on the football field. He was an all-conference linebacker and a district academic All-America pick. Peter DiMartino — an All-New England placekicker earned a 3.60 GPA in finance last semester.

Need more proof? How about the seven members of the volleyball team who earned at least a 3.0 while marching to the NCAA tournament. Or basketball player Ali Curry, who made the Dean's List in the fall and earned All-Northeast-10 Conference honors as one of the best players in the region. Cross country standout Jason Eddy scored a 3.90 last fall while earning all-conference honors as well.

The group of student-athletes on the Dean's List comprises 24 percent of Bryant's students who compete in varsity intercollegiate athletics.

Award-winning poet



Cathleen Calbert, award-winning author of poetry collections *Bad Judgement* and *Lessons in Space* will read from her work on Wednesday, April 19, at 7:30 p.m. in Papitto Dining Room.

Sarkisian Professor R.D. Norton appears in the new Third Edition of "Who's Who in Economics" as one of the 1,000 major living economists, based on citations of his work by other scholars. (Bryant and the Sarkisian Chair are also featured in the book's promotional flyer, which was distributed to 20,000 economists worldwide.) In addition, he has a book contract for the fall 2000 publication of *Creating the New Economy: The Entrepreneur and the U.S. Resurgence.*

Yvonne Arruda, academic advisor for undergraduate programs, has been appointed regional representative for the Transfer Students Commission, one of several commissions of the National Academic Advising Association (NACADA). She will be responsible for identifying and promoting trends and issues, including state and government mandates, which affect institutional effectiveness.

Professor Marsha Pripstein Posusney spoke on "Labor Representation in the Age of Globalization: Trends and Issues in Non-Oil-Based Arab Economies" at the third meeting of the Mediterranean Development Forum (MDF3), which was held March 5-8 in Cairo, Egypt. The forum brought together more than 600 leading figures from business, government, academia, NGOs, and the media to discuss ways to boost economic growth in the region, improve integration in the world economy, and reduce poverty and inequality.

Neal Hannon, lecturer in the management department, is the author a new book Managerial Accounting Activities Workbook (1999 Southwestern College Publishing). The book, which uses real-world situations that require teamwork and the Internet, is designed to supplement any managerial accounting course at the community college or four-year college level. He also spoke on the subject, "E-Commerce 2000," at the Manufacturing Jewelers & Suppliers of America Expo NY 2000 on March 4.

Professor Jay Reedy presented a paper titled "Post modernism and the Counter Enlightenment" at the annual conference of the southeast meeting of the American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies, which was held in Savannah, Georgia, in March.

Professor Janet Morahan-Martin recently attended the annual meeting of the Society for Computers in Psychology held in Los Angeles, where she chaired a symposium on "Research on the Internet." She also presented two papers: "Loneliness and Internet Use and Abuse" and "A Comparison of Computer and Internet Competency, Experiences, and Skills by Gender," which she co-authored with **Professor Phyllis Schumacher**.

Professor Terri Hasseler has been elected secretary of the U.S. Association for Commonwealth Literature and Language Studies. She is among the organizers of this charter organization, along with Professor Amritjit Singh of Rhode Island College. The Association's first conference, jointly sponsored by Bryant and RIC, will be held May 5-6 at both campuses.

Professor Kenneth Sousa presented "Data Warehousing: Practical Perspectives," at the Decision Sciences Institute National Conference held in New Orleans.

Laurie Hazard, director of the Academic Center for Excellence and the Writing Center, and Jean-Paul Nadeau, assistant director, presented the paper, "The Role of Learning Assistance Programs: Helping First-Year Students Join a Community of Scholars" at The First-Year Experience Conference in San Francisco in January. The conference was sponsored by the National Resource Center for the First-Year Experience and Students in Transition.
