The Draft and the College Student Part two: Opportunities at Bryant College for Students to be Commissioned in the Reserve Forces of the United States.

ARMY-ROTC

Sophomore students may participate in the joint Bryant College Army ROTC Program. This Program requires six weeks of summer camp between the sophomore and junior years, and two weeks of summer camp between the junior and senior years.

During his junior-senior years, he will take one ROTC course at Providence College each semester and will receive credit at Bryant College for this course.

Upon graduation he will be commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Army Reserve for three years.

AIR FORCE-ROTC and NAVY-ROTC

Sophomore students may participate in the joint Bryant College-Brown University Air Force and Navy ROTC Program. This program requires six weeks of summer camp between the sophomore and junior years, and two weeks of summer camp between the junior and senior years.

During his junior-senior years, he will take one ROTC Course at Brown University each semester and will receive credit at Bryant College for this course.

Upon graduation he will be commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve or Naval Reserve for three years.

Requirements and Standards

These requirements and standards are set forth in the laws and regulations governing the program. If you qualify in all respects, you should promptly submit your application. Take care in evaluating physical fitness. The very nature of the program requires the highest physical standards. If you have an obvious defect, do not apply. To be eligible for consideration for Regular ROTC status, you must—

- * Be a male citizen of the United States.
- * Have reached the 17th anniversary of your birth by 30 June 1966.
- * Have not reached the 21st anniversary of your birth by 30 June 1966. Those contemplating a college course which takes five years to complete must not have reached the 20th anniversary of birth by 30 June 1966.

Check Presented to Bryant By New York Foundation

Roy Dickinson Welch, Director of Development at Bryant, has recently announced the award of a \$5,000 matching grant to Bryant College by the C.I.T. Foundation of New York City. Notified in April of this year, Bryant College in order to receive the award had to raise an equal or matching amount of money from private business firms; however, in the short period of four months the needed money, totaling over \$5,200, was pledged. Thus, as pointed out by Mr. Welch, and many other members of the administration and faculty, Bryant is most fortunate to have so many Rhode Island businessmen who are actively engaging in the continual development of privately supported colleges.

The C.I.T. Foundation, Incorporated, is an affiliate of the C.I.T. Financial Corporation. Organized in 1955, the College Accreditation Awards Program was formed to make contributions for charitable, scientific, literary, and educational purposes. In a recent bulletin published for the C.I.T. Foundation President, L. Walter Lundell, outlined in more specific terms the motives of the organization. "The C.I.T. program is designed as a form of recognition and encouragement for colleges who have achieved accreditation as a further step in helping to meet the ever-increasing demand for higher learning." An advisory committee with members Dr. Frank G. Diekey, executive director of the National Commission on Accrediting; Dr. John A. Pollard, vice president of the Council for Financial Aid to Education; and Dr. Theodore A. Distler, educational consultant and former executive director of the Association of American Colleges, determined the eligibility of Bryant College and ten other schools to be offered the monetary gifts in 1966.

Alfred Wolfmann Addresses Current Events Club

On October 10, Mr. Alfred Wolfmann the East-West Journalist, gave a lecture to the Current Events Club on the development of East Germany since World War II and on the constitution of the East German Government. Highlights of his speech stressed that the constitution of East Germany provides for a democratic government but that those in power refuse to follow the constitution as it is written, and that policies are made which are contradictory to the Constitution. Specific examples were given with comparisons drawn between the theory of the East German constitution and the actual policies of the Communist Party which controls the East German government. Following the speech various questions were asked by members of the club pertaining to East Germany and were answered by Mr. Wolfmann.

Mr. Alfred Wolfmann who had previously talked to the students of Dr. Lebovitz's International Relations class was a former foreign news editor with an East Berlin Communist radio station who in 1951 fled to the West. In the West he became a special reporter for the West German radio station in Cologne. Since 1956 he has been the German correspondent of a large Israeli newspaper published in Hebrew in Tel Aviv. In the evening Mr. Wolfmann addressed the World Affairs Council at the Wayland Manor.

Bryant College European Tour

Soon after the close of the spring semester of '66, twelve enthusiastic Bryant students boarded a plane which was to transport them across the Atlantic Ocean. So began the fourth annual tour of Europe which is sponsored by Bryant.

It all started in 1958 when a tour through Europe was offered to the students of Nichols College. This excursion enabled the students to spend about six weeks observing different European aspects of their course of study, gaining credits, and also taking part in a comparatively inexpensive vacation abroad. Approximately four years later, Mr. Camper came from Nichols to Bryant to teach, and brought with him the idea of a summer tour of Europe and successfully introduced it as a part of Bryant's activities.

The tour consisted of visiting eight to eleven countries. The countries seen by last summer's group were England, France, Germany, Belgium, Holland, Spain, Luxembourg, Italy, and Switzerland. Usually the number of students who participate is from ten to twenty. The departure and return dates also vary from year to year; however, the last tour began on July 1, and was completed by August 12.

Most students probably feel that it would be almost impossible to really enjoy a chaperoned trip of this nature, but anyone who has ever gone will say that they are mistaken. The transportation to the continent was by plane which was provided by a major airline; and the trip home was by an ocean liner, both of which prove that just the transportation alone is a pleasant experience. When on land, the students travel via a rented bus driven by a capable guide. As for the hotel accommodations, they should please any tourist. A tour related to a course in college immediately brings a mental picture of spending the entire time in mu-

seums and art galleries, but although museums and art galleries were included in the tour, they were just a part of what was to be expected. There were tours of such places as the Mercedes Benz plant in Germany and Lloyd's of London. All this took place during the day and the group had most of the nights to go off and do whatever they wished with few restrictions.

Qualifications for the trip were almost non-existent. All that was needed was the approval of the Dean and Mr. Camper, and \$1200 to spend.

Professor Camper feels that this is an excellent opportunity for any student who has a strong desire to see Europe, to do so while earning credits at the same time. This also includes the two-year secretarial students who would like to tour Europe before beginning their careers.

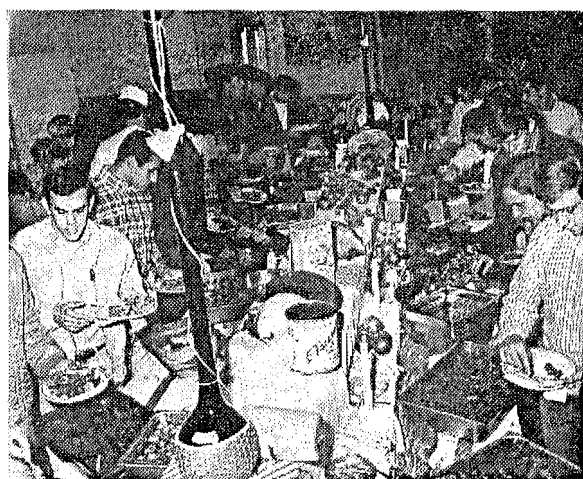
\$25,000 Essay Contest Sponsored by Lions Club of Providence

The youth of Providence have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club—a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational and/or career assistance grant.

The Providence Central Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today—Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Illinois, in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made. The contest, open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967, was announced by The President of Lions International, Edward M. Lindsey, of Lawrenceburg, Tennessee, during the Association's Annual International Convention in New York.

The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes. The Club's winner will receive a U.S. Savings Bond and advance to Lions District competition in his (her) effort to qualify for the multiple district contest. The Contest sponsored by more than 20,000 Lions Clubs in more than 130 countries in the free world, will be the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today. The purpose of the contest is to develop a formula for world peace by alerting our youth to the need for world peace, and by focusing attention on that important goal.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words. Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, 10 per cent to organization, 10 per cent to style and 5 per cent to mechanics. (The mechanics segment will be used to appraise the grammatical construction of the essay.) Three judges will be appointed to evaluate the entries submitted to the Providence Central Lions Club. If the winner can advance through the judging stages up to the world finals, he will receive an expense paid trip to Chicago to attend the Lions International 50th Annual Convention for the final judging of his essay in addition to the \$1,000 award. It is hoped that local young people will accept the challenge and enter their club's section of the contest. Closing date for the club's contest is December 10, 1966. Students wishing to enter the contest should contact Miss Cronk or Mr. Handy to get full details of the contest.

- * Have no moral obligations or personal convictions that will prevent your conscientiously bearing arms and supporting and defending the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic.



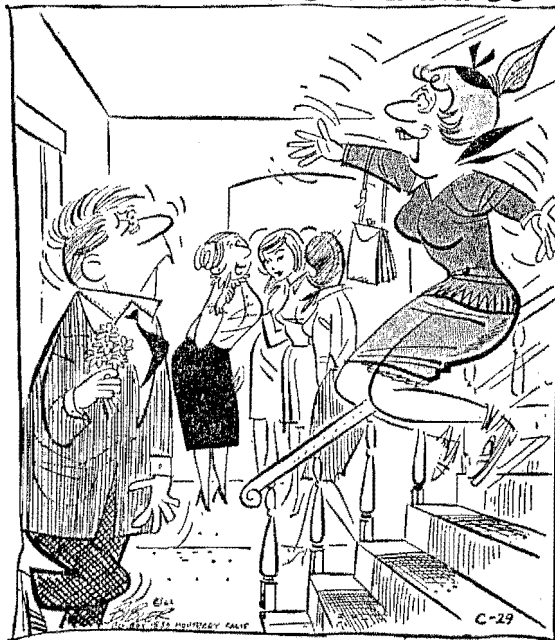
