t poured before, during, and after Undergraduate Commencement on May 18. Many guests and parents with small children watched the ceremony from inside sites in Hall 16, the Bryant Center, and the Unistructure.

But the weather didn't dampen the spirit of the graduates who had worked so hard for this day. Kerry Beach '03, electrified the audience with her rendition of the national anthem, and Courtney Zullo gave an inspiring Senior Class Charge.

Rick Goings, chairman and CEO of the Tupperware Corporation, one of the world's leading companies with annual sales in excess of \$1.2 billion, received an Honorary Doctor of Business Administration and gave the keynote address. In standard Letterman format, Goings shared the top 10 life ideas he learned from mentors over the years.

"Understand that a little fragrance always clings to the hand that gives flowers," said Goings. "My mother always said this to me. In essence it means that you get by giving. Find your cause and a way to give back and invest yourself in the betterment of society.

And, in spite of what your mother or professor told you about acting your age, don't grow up. Anything worth doing should be fun!"

CEO of Fleet Rhode Island, and executive vice president and corporate director of human resources and diversity for FleetBoston Financial.

The previous afternoon, under bright sunny skies, the first graduates of an innovative MBA distance-learning program created specifically for employees of the Newport Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) joined their traditional classmates at graduation exercises for 140 graduate students. For some of the 26 NUWC employees, it was the first time they returned to the Bryant campus since the program began in 1999. They earned their MBAs using textbooks, high-speed laptop computers, and the Internet. One student was assigned to Australia for six months; another connected from a coffeehouse in Malta. Two who were reservists were called up to active duty after the events of September 11 they were able to complete

their degree requirements while defending our country.

David M. Walker, comptroller general of the United States, received an honorary degree and gave the keynote address. He talked about the importance of public service, developing a solid reputation, and making a difference.

"Life is full of difficult decisions, and the right choice isn't always the easy choice, or the popular choice," said Walker. "But whether we're talking about an individual or a corporation, principled choices based on sound ethical behavior are the surest way to a proud reputation... a reputation that will stand the test of time. As a result, don't hesitate to have the courage of your convictions."



## Local high school unveils new Web site with a little help from Bryant

avies Career and Technical High School in Lincoln unveiled its new Web site on June 10 at the Verizon-Bryant College Telecommunications Center on campus. The site was designed by Bryant intern Scott Limoges '02 and staff from the telecommunications center in conjunction with computer technology students and faculty from Davies.

The center works with small businesses and schools throughout the state to enhance the utilization of telecommunications technology, including the Internet. Davies School administrators contracted with the Verizon-Bryant College Telecommunications Center to upgrade the high school's Web site and make it more accessible and useful for current and potential students.

James Segovis, director of The John H. Chafee Center for International Business, who oversees the telecommunications center, and is a member of the Board of Trustees of Davies, also introduced the opportunity of working with graduate students from Bryant to create a broader marketing plan. A team of four marketing students from Bryant's M.B.A. graduate program have been working with Davies on this effort.



Since 1996, the Verizon-Bryant College Telecommunications Center has provided consultation services to Rhode Island businesses, organizations, schools, and teachers so they can more fully utilize emerging technologies. ## **Entrepreneurial spirit thrives at Bryant**



#### BRYANT ATHLETICS RANKED SECOND IN PRESIDENTS CUP STANDINGS

## Bulldog Women's teams add greatly to impressive tally

According to standings released a few weeks ago by Northeast-10 Commissioner David Brunk, Bryant College is now ranked second among 15 institutions in the final 2001-02 Northeast-10 Conference Presidents Cup.

Bryant moved up seven places from last year's ninth-place finish. The dramatic rise is a direct result of an incredible improvement in the standings of the Bulldogs Women's teams. Bryant ranked 14th in women's sports in the 2000-01 season and moved to second in the course of just one year.

The Presidents Cup standings measure the overall success of each institution's athletics programs in the 20 sports sponsored by the conference. An institution receives 15 points for a first-place finish in a particular sport, down to one point for a 15th-place finish.

Bryant won the regular-season conference championship in baseball and earned second-place points in volleyball, men's golf, men's lacrosse, and men's tennis.

"We're very pleased with the Presidents Cup standings this year," said Director of Athletics Dan Gavitt, "because it shows that the commitment to intercollegiate athletics made by President (Ronald K.) Machtley and the board of trustees is producing results. We were fortunate to send four of our established teams to NCAA tournaments this year, but we also saw terrific finishes from our new teams like men's lacrosse and field hockey."

The final tally on Bryant's 2001-02 athletics season saw the Bulldogs win a Northeast-10 regular-season title in baseball, claim Eastern College Athletic Conference championships in men's soccer and men's lacrosse, and send the volleyball, women's soccer, men's golf, and baseball teams to their respective NCAA tournaments. Four Bryant student-athletes achieved All-America status, with three first-team selections, while five Bulldog head coaches were chosen by their peers as NE-10 coaches of the year.

"Obviously there are a lot of people responsible for our success this year," said Gavitt, "but the credit really has to go to our coaches, who have been outstanding in their efforts to develop their programs and recruit quality student-athletes to Bryant College."

# Latin American and Latina/Latino Studies Minor now offered

ne of the newest programs of study at Bryant is the Latin American and Latina/Latino Studies minor. This program encourages a global perspective and appreciation for the arts and humanities as well as for the varieties of human expression across cultural boundaries. The minor also provides students with a sophisticated and broad-based understanding of U.S. neighbors in the Western Hemisphere through the study of language, literature, culture, and history.

Given the importance of immigration from Latin America to the United States and rapidly developing trade links through such mechanisms as the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), this minor is especially timely, say Professors Paul Lokken and Cileine de Lourenco, who collaborated to develop the program. They find that students who gravitate to Latin American Studies tend to look for employment at the state department, with government agencies that deal with issues in Latina/o communities, or with multinational corporations.

Bryant students who have declared the minor have a variety of academic interests including accounting, marketing, computer information services, and finance.



## The thrill of victory



## Kresge Foundation issues \$750,000 challenge grant

Bryant has qualified for a one-time opportunity in The Campaign for Bryant to complete a major, \$750,000 challenge grant for the new George E. Bello Center for Information and Technology. The grant has been issued by The Kresge Foundation, a nationally known private foundation that has been supporting college and other nonprofit capital projects for several decades.

This is the first Kresge award in Bryant's history. In order to receive the \$750,000, Bryant must meet its \$20 million facilities goal by March 1, 2003.

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## Say it with XBRL

he cachet of XBRL continues to grow as companies like Microsoft write their financial statements in this format. Bryant's leadership role as the world's first XBRL Educational Resource Center was reinforced this spring when the college hosted a daylong conference for academics and business practitioners to focus on how XBRL affects business reporting and data assurance.

In addition, XBRL.org, the international consortium composed of some of the largest software, accounting, and financial services and consulting organizations in the world, held a two-day meeting at the college. The group oversees the development of this initiative and promotes the universal adoption of XBRL. A formal dinner recognized the award-winning projects from the international XBRL Academic Competition that was organized by Saeed Roohani, chair of the Bryant accounting department.

eXtensible Business Reporting Language (XBRL) is an XML-based specification that provides a standards-based method to exchange financial statements in a technologically friendly manner, particularly over the Internet. Utilizing XBRL, business reports can be prepared more easily and published in a variety of formats so information can be extracted reliably and retrieved simply.
