Amidst the turmoils of the killings at Kent State University in Ohio and the chanting of "We've Got the Whole Wide World in Our Hands" in South Hall at the old Bryant campus, Dr. Manion reasoned with student leaders and made the ultimate decision to permit students to involve themselves in political activities by giving them the option of taking final examinations.

Dr. Manion's ability, dedication and desire, as well as his efforts to please both students and faculty, have not only made him one of the more respected administrators at Bryant, but has furthered both the efficiency and organization within the Department of Academic Affairs.














Among the more prominent functions as Provost, Dr. Manion is given charge of creating a favorable academic atmosphere for both students and faculty. Under his auspices, four new major concentrations of study (institutional management, finance, law enforcement and systems management) have been added to the curriculum. In addition, the number of faculty members have increased approximately 30%, a more varied selection of general studies electives have been offered, a separate graduate school conferring the Master's Degree has been created, library facilities have been vastly expanded and a more relevant curriculum for the Bryant student has been implemented.






Within the past two years Bryant College moved ten miles from a plant worth \$4.3 million to one worth \$17 million. The college has grown 25%; it has increased its endowment through sound investments; over \$1 million has been raised in pledges and contributions; the academic organization has been streamlined; the Board of Trustees has been reorganized by adding nine individuals, all of whom are outstanding in their respective fields.


Dr. Hagan's hard work, unselfish devotion to the college and expertise have helped to enhance the image of Bryant College as a respected educational institution in today's academic community.



A major shake-up was particularly evident in the Department of Student Affairs for the 1972-73 academic year. An abrupt change of personalities was seen through the arrival of Dr. Barry A. Fullerton, new Vice President for Student Affairs. Bryant students were greeted in September with a new array of rules and regulations including stiffer parking fines, stringent punishments for tampering with fire alarms and extinguishers, threats of drug raids and dormitory damage assessments.

Although these policies were not welcomed by most students, Dr. Fullerton eventually proved himself to be an administrator with an open ear who was most honest and displayed a King Solomon-like disposition.

Under his direction, the Office of Student Affairs comprising the Placement Bureau, Activities, Sports, Medical Services and Financial Aid, were all organized into a well-run and efficient operation.




The Carnegie Commission has stated three objectives that a college or university must achieve in order to gain the support of students, faculty, parents, taxpayers, foundations, donors and legislators:


## Science Boasts Cooperation Among Its Faculty



















# Marketing — "The Better Mouse Trap?"




## Computers + New Ideas = A Mathematical Approach














#### Secretaries Strive for Eventual Perfection

The brothers of Kappa Tau Fraternity have built a proud organization during the past twenty-eight years and continue to maintain their impressive tradition.





In retrospect, the year was marked by good times, good friends and many great memories.








# Indian Boy Supported by BSO

The Folk Mass has proved to be a pleasant diversion for a large number of Bryant devotees.




# 110th Freshman Class Enters Bryant

#### Intramurals: the Year of the Upset














Without photo editors Jeff Millman and Steve Valenti, the '73 Ledger would have been but a


dream. The long hours of frustration and work in the darkroom by both Jeff and Steve all made things worthwhile for the entire *Ledger* staff.


Just as the sun sets, and the *Ledger* becomes another part of our memorable past, so will it rise making tomorrow the present for those who follow.







#### Auditorium Becomes Battleground for Senatorial Debate




On the walls are displayed the






## Paddlemen Place a Surprising Second


















#### Cheerleaders Root Indians to Victory




Among the more noticeable changes around the campus this past year was the performance of the Bryant College cheerleaders.




### Bowlers Place First in Tri-State Conference


Currently in first place in the Tri-State Conference, Bryant seems assured of a post season NAIA Tournament berth for the seventh consecutive year.


### Choutka Paces Golfers to 5th Consecutive Winning Season






### Swimmers Win First Meet Ever!

### Racqueteers Plagued by Inexperience





Stone exhibits record performance in the 880 sprint










### Trackmen Possess Talent for First Place Finish


First year coach Lee Drury greeted a host of returning lettermen and several promising freshmen at the start of the 1973 outdoor track season.
