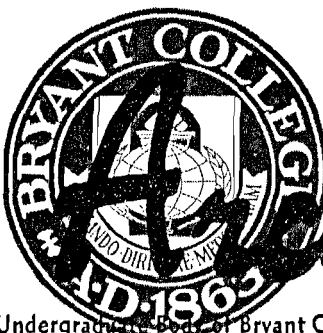
The two most requested songs in the past at Bryant: Loui loul, & SHOUT!

Dr. Priscilla Phillips, Assistant Dean of the School of Teacher Education in Secretarial Science, will preside at the conference of the Eastern States Association for Teacher Education at the Hotel New Yorker on March 16, 17, 18. She is President of the Association.

Dr. Phillips has been on the faculty at Bryant College since 1948. She holds the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Education, Master of Education, C.A.G.S., and Doctor of Education from Boston University. She has served as a demonstration teacher at both Columbia and Boston Universities during summer sessions.

## Science Program To Be Enlarged

Many changes in the Science Department will take place in the fall with the advent of new courses. All science courses will be lab courses with the exception of Physical Science I — The Earth Science.

The present biology multi-purpose room, K5, will be converted into a single-purpose science laboratory. Chairs will be removed and work stations (tables) will be installed. New equipment is being ordered for the new lab.

A course in physics for students who plan to enter into industry where a knowledge of physics is desirable will be offered as an elective. Also, as an elective will be a course in chemistry for students who plan to enter industry where a knowledge of chemistry is desirable.

The new science program will enable students to obtain the science education that they may need upon entering a world that is increasingly scientifically oriented. New England is an out-

standing example, being the leader in such areas as chemistry, research, pharmaceutical, tool making, metallurgy, jewelry, textiles, and electronics.

The introduction of a new course in physics and chemistry may make it possible at a later date to introduce a program for the training of science engineering secretaries.

## DESCRIPTION OF SCIENCE COURSES

**Sc. 1 Physical Science I—Earth Science** 3 semester hours  
 This course is designed to develop an appreciation of the physical universe. The course will include basic principles of meteorology, geology, astronomy, and oceanography. (Lec. 3)

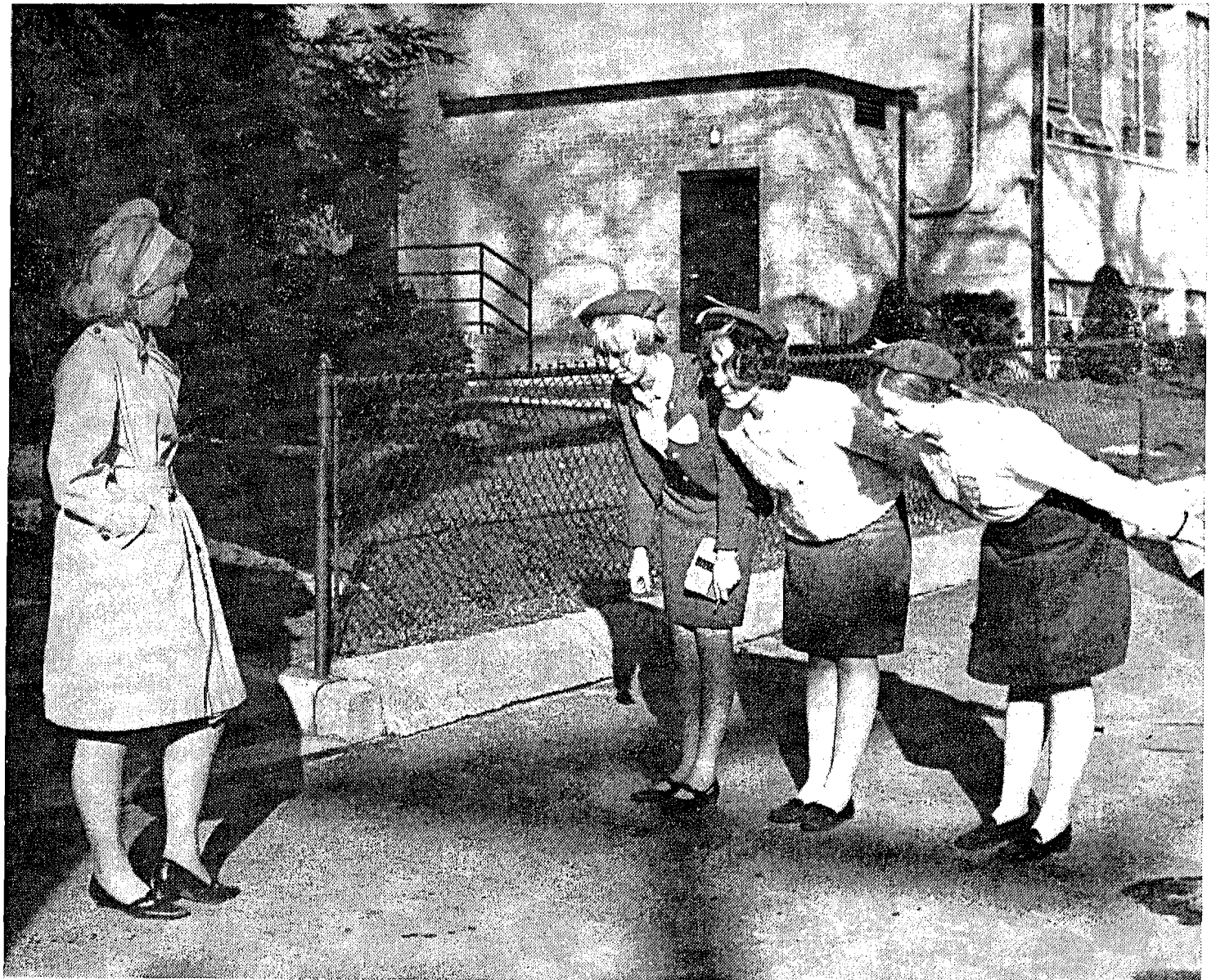
**Sc. 2 Physical Science II — Physics** 3 semester hours  
 A general introduction to principles of physics. The course will develop a general understanding of the laws of electricity, magnetism, wave motion and nuclear fission and fusion. This course is recommended especially for students who plan to enter industry where a knowledge of physics is desirable. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2)

**Sc. 3 Physical Science III — Chemistry** 3 semester hours  
 A general introduction to the elements, their reactions, composition and use in industry. This course is recommended especially for students who plan to enter industry where a knowledge of general chemistry is desirable. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2)

**Sc. 4 Biology I** 3 semester hours  
 An introduction to Biology and the Scientific Method; a study of the cell structure and functions of plant and animal tissues with emphasis on the biochemistry of the human cell. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2)

**Sc. 5 Biology II** 3 semester hours  
 An introduction to human anatomy. This course is designed for the basic understanding of human biology. The development of the total individual including the cell, tissues, organs, organ systems, and organisms. Emphasis is placed on the metabolism, nutrition, genetics, and adaptation of the functioning organism. The laboratory procedures include the area of microscopic analysis, protoplasmic components, structures of unicellular and multicellular organisms as they are related to mammals. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2)

**Sc. 6 Biology III—Physiology of Human Anatomy** 3 semester hours  
 This course includes a comprehensive study of the various systems of the human body and their integration, emphasizing the circulatory, muscular, glandular, respiratory, nervous, digestive, and excretory systems. (Lec. 2, Lab. 2)
