National, regional, and local speakers, as well as Bryant faculty and staff, will join together for a day of discussion, workshop sessions, and networking aimed at cultivating leadership skills and values in the workplace.

Bryant reaccredited by AACSB International

Accreditation by AACSB International – The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, is considered to be the hallmark of excellence in management education. Bryant underwent a rigorous peer-review process in November 2003 and was notified in December that its undergraduate and graduate business-degree programs were reaccredited.

The college was originally accredited for a 10-year term by AACSB in 1994 after implementing significant changes that brought it into compliance with AACSB standards. This recognition placed Bryant among an elite group of educational institutions in the United States and abroad. Of the many colleges and universities offering business degrees in the country, only 452 have received

AACSB accreditation as of August 2003. There are only 384 institutions with graduate and undergraduate programs similar to Bryant College that are accredited by AACSB.

The peer reviewers are deans of other accredited business schools who assess the institution's curriculum and degree requirements, faculty qualifications, computer and library resources, admission process, and intellectual climate. These reviewers place great emphasis on all of those factors supporting the institution's mission. Dedicated, hard-working faculty, administration, staff, trustees, students, and alumni prepared for this review for more than two years.

Accreditation provides Bryant College stakeholders with the assurance that:

- A Bryant education is based on a carefully constructed mission.
- This institution selects and supports students who can become outstanding graduates.
- We deliver high-quality degree programs taught by qualified faculty.
- The Bryant faculty contributes to knowledge through research and scholarship.

"This reaccreditation demonstrates Bryant's commitment to the successful pursuit of academic excellence, and confirms the continuous improvement associated with our programs," states V.K. Unni, vice president for academic affairs.

Original AACSB standards for business administration were set in 1919. In 1991, AACSB adopted new "mission-linked" accreditation standards and procedures for business administration and accounting programs that support institutional diversity in management education. Recently, AACSB International has changed it reaccreditation policy and will conduct reviews every five years instead of 10 years. Bryant's next on-site review will be in 2008-2009.



Panel discussions explored topics such as global public health, defining and building community, and study abroad. Since he was a boy, James
Nicholas '03 possessed a sense of discipline and a strong entrepreneurial spirit.
These characteristics were nurtured at Bryant while he studied CIS and ran a successful Internet business at the same time.

In November, Nicholas was named New England Collegiate Entrepreneur of the Year at the Collegiate Entrepreneurs' Organization (CEO) Conference in Chicago. The Global Student Entrepreneur™ Awards is a two-tiered program founded and run by Saint Louis University's Jefferson Smurfit Center for Entrepreneurial Studies. Eighteen regions including all of North America, the Caribbean, China, Australia, New Zealand, and Sweden, participated in the awards program. The first-place winner from each region competed for a prize of \$10,000.

Nicholas was recognized for founding and running

JE2000, LLC (www.je2000.com), a global Web services company specializing in Web hosting. Founded in 1997 when Nicholas was a high school sophomore, the company has since expanded its client base worldwide. Says Nicholas, "In a such a competitive business, I set myself apart by providing high-quality customer service, 24/7 support, full e-commerce solutions, support of multiple programming languages, and special attention to the customer's specific needs."

Sounds like pretty serious stuff. But Nicholas insists he's just a regular guy who likes to have fun with his friends as much as he likes mulling over business plans and usability testing. He thinks of himself as well rounded, and cites the many opportunities that Bryant offered both in and out of the classroom.

"I think one of Bryant's strengths is the liberal arts courses that make you more well rounded in the business world," James explains. "In dealing with clients you have to be able to discuss current events, so it's not just 'let's get down to business.'"

Now that he's a new Bryant alumnus, Nicholas plans to conduct business from his family's home in Quaker Hill, Connecticut, where he can devote more time to Web development, training, and testing. And, of course, be his own boss.

Lessons of leadership at Trustee Speaker Series Feb. 10

Sir Ernest Shackleton was a legendary explorer who was shipwrecked for two years in Antarctica with his 27-man crew. Against all odds, he brought every man home alive. His story is an extraordinary account of endurance and leadership.

On Tuesday, February 10, author Margot Morrell will speak about leadership practices in a lecture based on her international bestseller, "Shackleton's Way,

Leadership Lessons from the Great Antarctic Explorer." This presentation, part of the Trustee Speaker Series, begins at 7 p.m. in Janikies Theatre, and it is free and open to the public.

Morrell's driving passion is leadership – particularly the life, exploits, and leadership example of Sir Shackleton, and her interests and activities have been profiled in publications such as *The Wall Street Journal* and *Fast Company*. In addition to numerous radio interviews, she has appeared on "NBC Nightly News," CNBC's "Power Lunch," and "A&E Biography."

Professor Hong Yang presented "A molecular approach to paleo-plant ecophysiology: deciduous

conifers from Early Tertiary Arctic deposits as examples" at the Geological Society of the America Annual Conference, Seattle, Washington, on Nov. 5.

Professor Petra Kuppers has published a new book, Disability and Contemporary Performance: Bodies on Edge (London and New York: Routledge, 2003). It explores the relationship between contemporary performance practice and disability, and investigates the ways in which disabled performers challenge, change, and work with existing stereotypes through their work.

Men's basketball enjoys early success

Have you seen those Bulldogs? In only his third season as basketball coach, Max Good has taken a team from near the bottom of the conference standings to a legitimate contender for the Northeast-10 (NE-10) Conference this March.

The Bulldogs are off to one of their strongest starts in school history. With an 11-2 overall record, Bryant is enjoying its best season in 33 years and the most successful since joining the NE-10 in the mid-1980s.

Leadership is key

With nine years as head coach at the collegiate level and 10 years of coaching success at Maine Central Institute, Good is a talented teacher of the game and emphasizes the team concept on the floor. Thus far, results have been positive. Bryant is currently leading most statistical categories in the conference, including scoring offense and defense. Bryant is holding opponents to just 62 points per game and ranked second in the league in field goal defense at 37.2 percent.

Success equals teamwork

The Bulldogs have received a balanced contribution from several key starters, as well as from some new faces to the program including Providence College transfers Romuald Augustin '04 (Montreal, Quebec) and Chris Burns '07 (Merrimack, N.H.). Augustin, a three-year starter at Providence, has led the Bulldogs in scoring throughout the season. Burns, his teammate at PC, has been a valuable addition in the backcourt.

Four-year veteran Jason Noel '04 (Berlin, Mass.) has averaged 10.4 points and more than six rebounds per game. Six-foot-11 junior center Mike Williams (Ellington, Conn.), the school's all-time leader in blocks, is averaging eight points per game and has 23 blocks this year. Junior Mario Correia (Brockton, Mass.) has enjoyed a breakout season, ranking second on the team in scoring and establishing himself as one of the better defensive players.

One game at a time


