## Newman Club Hears LaSalle Brother Describe Jap Prison Life

Members of the Newman Club met in Alumni Hall on the evening of March 28 to hear the Reverend Brother Cornelius Paulyan of La Salle Academy describe life in a Japanese prison camp during the late war.

Brother Cornelius, having been sent to the Orient in 1938 as a teacher, was in Hong Kong when the Japs bombed Pearl Harbor. Hong Kong was bombed on the same day and at intervals of one hour for four days afterwards. During this period the children huddled in the basement of the school. Wounded civilians were brought in and placed in the classrooms where Brother Cornelius with the help of 60 non-English speaking Chinese internes took care of them.

When Japanese soldiers marched into Hong Kong, Brother Cornelius with all other members of the clergy, was interned. He was finally sent to the Stanley Prison Camp where he remained until the end of the war, being forced to work hard on a near-starvation diet.

A Bryant College Library is one step nearer to reality with the recent acquisition of the old Benevolent Street fire station. On Thursday, March 29, the College bought at public auction the familiar old brick structure on the 4566-square-foot site between Hope and Brook Streets.

President Jacobs immediately announced plans to convert the two-story building into a business library for the college. Such a conversion, he stated, will be undertaken as soon as building conditions permit.

Students and teachers remember well the campaign for a library fund initiated by Bill Connor, ex-student

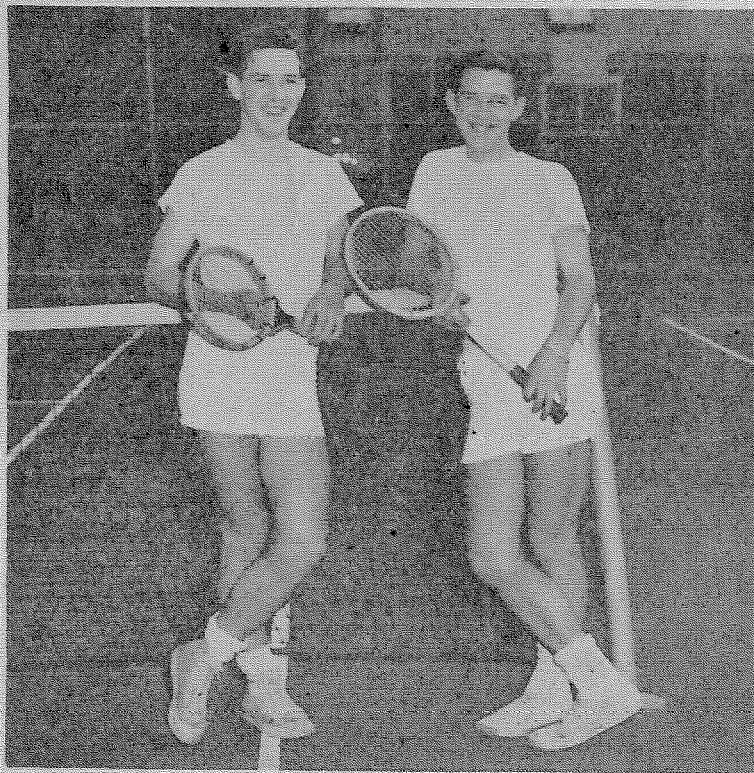

# Public Law 16 Has Helped 600,000 Vets

Under Public Law 16, the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, nearly 600,000 disabled World War II veterans are being given a chance to make their own way in life.

The law, signed by the President during the height of the war, enables disabled veterans to train, at Government expense, for jobs they can hold despite their handicaps. Of all the veterans who have trained under Public Law 16 during the past eight years, nearly half, or 250,000, already have been rehabilitated to the point where they now are able to earn livings as trained workers, Veterans Administration reports.

The peak of the program was reached late in 1948 when 230,000 veterans were in training in schools, on the job, and on the farm. On March 24 the eighth anniversary of

the law, the number in training was about 100,000—less than half of the all-time high.

Of the veterans now in training, about 25% are enrolled in colleges and universities; 15% are taking classroom courses in other types of schools; 35% are training on the job, and 25% are enrolled in institutional on-farm programs that combine school sessions with actual experience on the farm.

In 1948 there were 2,134 veterans training under PL 16 as compared to

573 as of March 1, 1951. 1948 figures include 1,257 veterans training on the job, 560 in colleges, 313 in schools below college level and 4 in on-the-farm programs; in 1951, 300 were training on the job, 137 were in colleges, 127 in schools below college level, and 9 in on-the-farm programs.

Veterans seeking such treatment during other than office hours may be treated by their own private physicians provided the VA Medical Division is notified the following day.

"There, Money," I said, "you see what comes of being thrifty and planning for the future? Wasn't I right?"

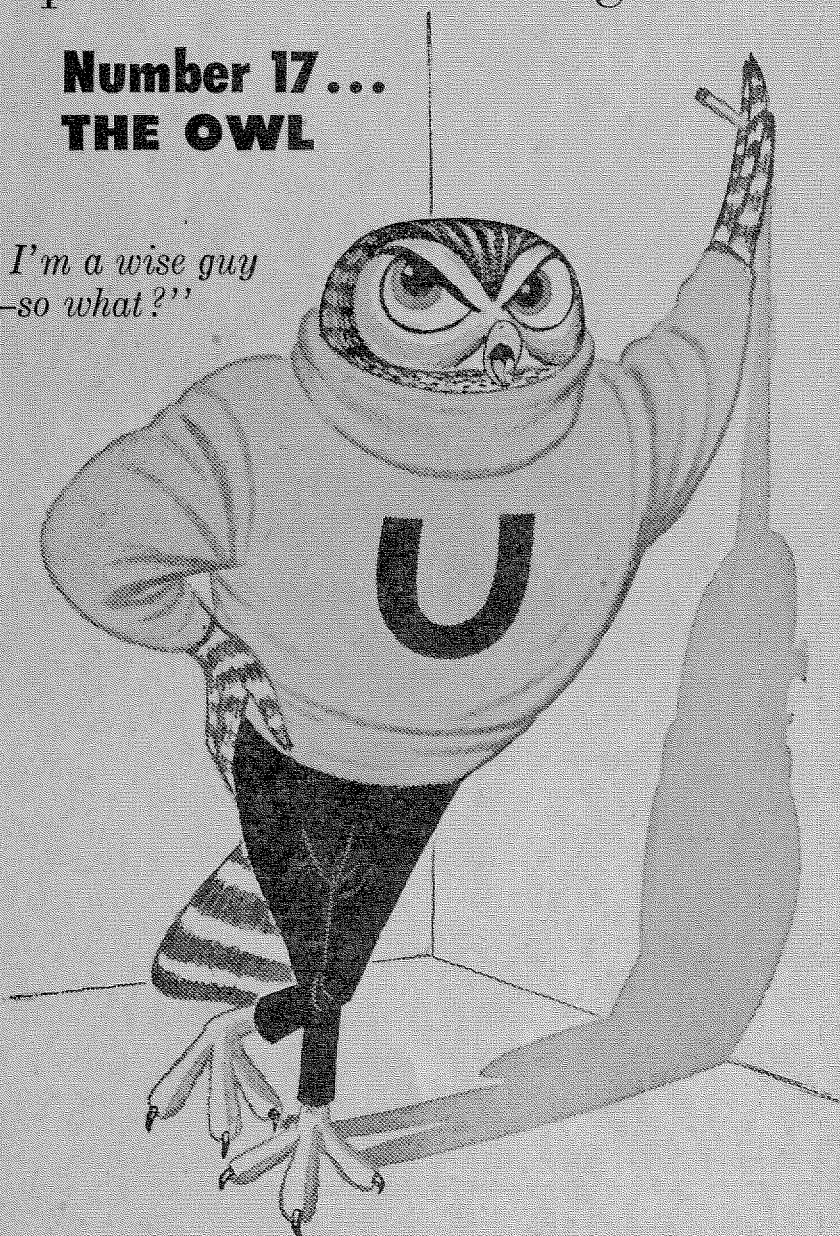

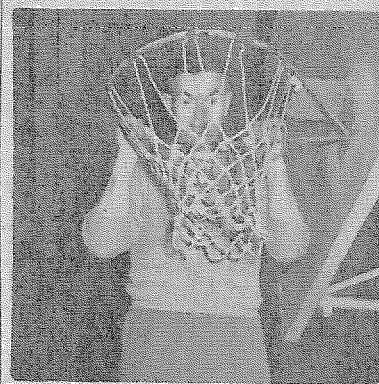
