## Homecoming & Reunion

Homecoming & Reunion 2007, held September 28-30, featured alumni and athletic events, tailgating festivities, and the Bulldog Fun Zone with plenty of food and activities for all ages. Bryant hosted its largest ever Homecoming & Reunion crowd as close to 5,000 students, faculty, staff, and alumni converged on Bryant's campus to celebrate the Bulldogs 22-19 victory over Pace.

On Sunday, more than 1,000 participated in the 7th Annual Shawn M. Nassaney Memorial Cross Country Race/Walk held in memory of the 1998 Bryant graduate and former cross country team captain who died on United Airlines Flight 175 with his girlfriend, Bryant alumna Lynn Goodchild '98. Proceeds from the race were added to a scholarship established in Nassaney's memory by his family, friends, and classmates.

# Bryant holds inauguration for Confucius Institute

On September 14, Bryant welcomed Zhuang Zedong, the Chinese table tennis player who helped start what became known in history as "Ping Pong diplomacy."

Zhuang retold how a simple act of friendship toward an American competitor in 1971 opened the door for improved relations between China and the United States, and, in his mind, paved the way for Beijing to host the 2008 Summer Olympic games.



His talk was part of the official inauguration of the Confucius Institute at Bryant, one of 20 centers around the country dedicated to the promotion of Chinese language and culture that are named after the revered Chinese thinker, educator, and philosopher.

Zhuang was also awarded an honorary professorship by the Confucius Institute.

Following the talk at Bryant, Zhuang took part in a table tennis demonstration with Richard Bowling, the top ranked player from Rhode Island. The pair wowed the crowd with a dazzling display of speed and skill.

Other activities during the week as part of the institute's grand opening were a photograph exhibit, a film festival, and a quiz show about China's landmarks, traditions, and people.

The Confucius Institute, part of the U.S.-China Institute, reflects the mission of Bryant University – to educate the community and prepare students to succeed in a global environment.

"This is a wonderful transformational opportunity for us to be the leaders in helping people in the United States to learn the language, understand the culture, and be able to communicate in ways that have not historically been possible," said President Ronald K. Machtley.

## Students reach out to alumni for support

Bryant students are once again an integral part of relationship-building with alumni.

Each spring and fall, students pick up the telephone to solicit donations, and many find themselves updating alumni on campus activities and school accomplishments. The telefund program, a part of Bryant's Annual Fund, uses alumni gifts to provide students with more scholarships and enrich their daily lives through academic, sports, cultural, and social events.

"Though the job is challenging at times, our students find that the rewards can be beyond anything they'd imagined," said Susan Detri-Souvé, director of the annual fund.

Through their work in the telefund program, students have made new friends, expanded their networks, and even obtained job interviews with alumni.

"Our alumni know it's important to give back, and they do in many ways," said Detri-Souvé.

Professor Morahan-Martin collaborated with Assistant Librarian, e-Resources, Colleen Anderson '05 MBA, and Instructional Support Specialist Enoch Park on a paper titled "Facilitating More Effective Use of Internet-Based Research Resources." Morahan-Martin presented the paper at the meeting.
- Professor Bradford Martin has published "'Unsightly Huts': Shanties and the Divestment Movement of the 1980s" in Peace & Change: A Journal of Peace Research, vol. 32, no. 3, July 2007. The article is the basis of a chapter in The Other Eighties: A Secret History of America in the Age of Reagan, a book by Martin slated to be published in 2009 by Hill and Wang.

textbook Mathematics of Finance and Insurance has been published with an accompanying financial mathematics software CD. Professor Muksian also recently appeared in a national teleconference presentation via Lorman Educational Services titled "Social Security: The American Worker's Greatest Investment—Is it Worth the Delay?"





#### Women's soccer kicks it in Italy

"Bryant is an outstanding university that has demonstrated excellence both academically and competitively," said Weare. "They are an excellent fit for the NEC, and we look forward to them joining us in the fall of 2012."

"I think this is great for the Northeast Conference," said Vice Admiral Paul Gaffney, President of Monmouth University and Chair of the NEC Membership Committee. "We were extremely impressed with the commitment of their President, trustees, and athletic department staff."

## Bryant hosts 12th annual Public Safety Academy


