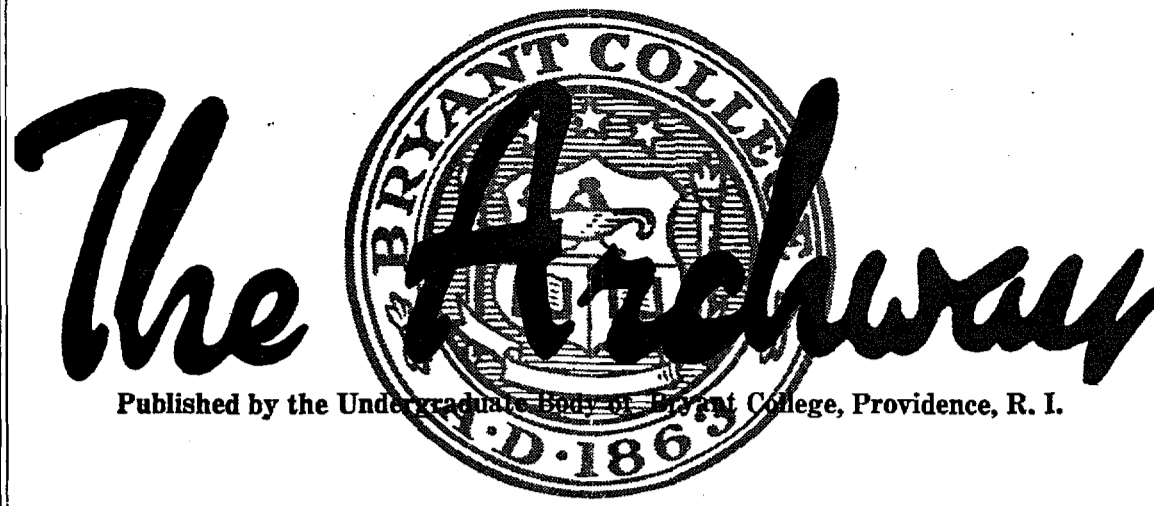


Class Day Awards

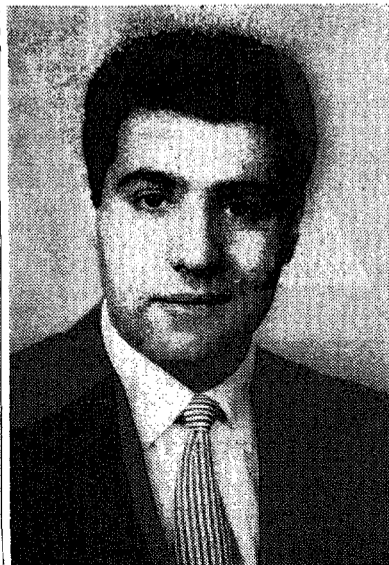
Bryant Losing Top Leader As Graduation Approaches

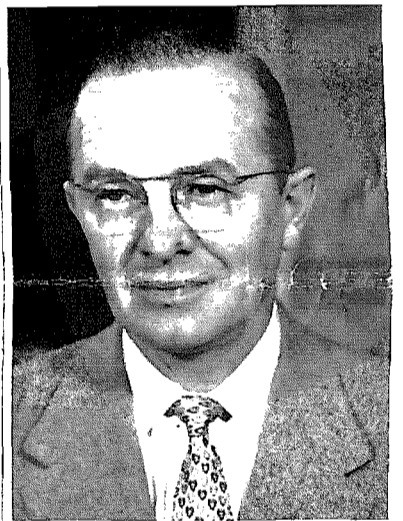

Six Honorary Degrees To Be Given at 91st Commencement

Bryant will confer six honorary degrees during the 91st Commencement August 6. Recipients will be the Honorable Sherman Adams, the Assistant to President Eisenhower; Dr. Harold C. Case, President of Boston University; Rev. Cornelius E. Collins, Chairman of the Rhode Island Board of Education; Miss Inez Graham, Headmistress of the Graham-Eckes School, Palm Beach, Florida; Dr. Clement Kennedy, President of the New Ocean House, Swampscott, Massachusetts; Mr. John H. McMahon, Chairman of the Board of Berkshire Fine Spinning Associates, Inc.

THE HONOURABLE SHERMAN ADAMS, Assistant to the President of the United States, who will receive the Degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.), was born in East Dover, Vermont. He received his elementary and secondary education in Providence, Rhode Island, where he moved with his parents. Graduated from Hope High School in 1916, he entered Dartmouth College, where he interrupted his college career to enlist with the United States Marine Corps in 1918, and returned to receive his degree in 1920.

Following his college career, he rapidly rose to management of a prominent lumber concern in New Hampshire. He was elected to the state House of Representatives in 1940 and on his reelection in 1942, he became Speaker of the House. In 1944 he was a delegate to the Republican National Convention. That same year, Governor Adams was elected to the United States Congress. He became Governor of New Hampshire in 1948 and was reelected in 1950. He was one of the first men of national prominence to urge the nomination of General Eisenhower to the Republican candidacy for President. In January of 1953, he was appointed by President Eisenhower as The Assistant to the President.

A former trustee of Dartmouth College and the University of New Hampshire, Governor Sherman has been honored by degrees from Dartmouth, the University of New Hampshire, New England College, and St. Lawrence University. He is a past commander of the American Legion, Honorary Supreme Archon of Sigma

Alpha Epsilon, and a member of the New Hampshire Chapter, Sons of American Revolution.

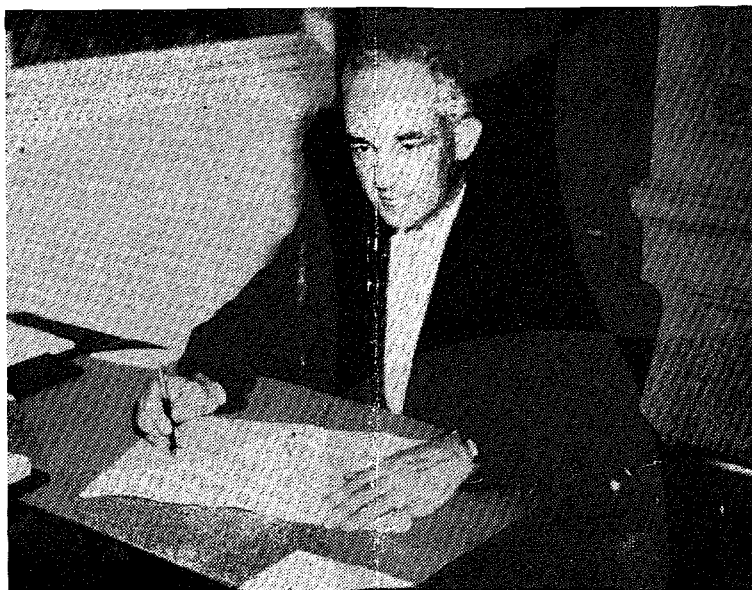
DR. HAROLD C. CASE, President of Boston University, will receive the Degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.). Dr. Case, president of Boston University, with its 26,000 students, continues the tradition of Methodist leadership in this university. Born in Cottonwood Falls, Kansas, he received his undergraduate education at Baker University in that state. While doing graduate work at the Harvard School of Business Administration, he turned to the ministry and was graduated from the Boston University School of Theology in 1927. An outstanding leader in the Methodist Church, Dr. Case has served in pulpits in Glencoe, Illinois; Topeka, Kansas; Scranton, Pennsylvania, and Pasadena, California. He holds Honorary Degrees from Baker University, the Pacific School of Religion, Samuel Houston College, and the Rhode Island College of Pharmacy. He is a trustee of Baker University and Samuel Houston College.

A delegate to two World Conferences, Dr. Case was a member of the Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church and other religious conferences. His speaking engagements have taken him before more than 100 colleges and universities prior to his accepting the post of President of Boston University. He has also spoken before such groups as the World Federation of Women's Clubs, state and national conferences of industrial and social organizations, and churches in many foreign countries.

REVEREND CORNELIUS B. COLLINS, Chairman, Rhode Island State Board of Education, who will receive the Degree of Doctor of Education (D.Ed.), is a native of Pawtucket, Rhode Island. Father Collins was educated in the elementary schools of that town. He received his high school and college education at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, Nova Scotia. His Superior First Class license from his Provincial Normal College was awarded in Truro, Nova Scotia. After an additional year of philosophy in Montreal, he studied

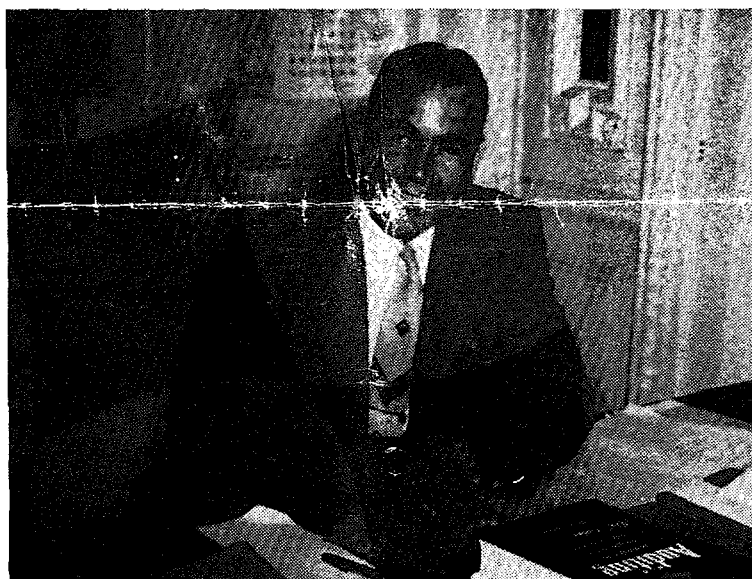
May I, on behalf of myself and the faculty, commend each and every one of you upon the successful completion of your training to enter the business world.

Special Meeting of Senate Passes Reorganization Plan

On Friday, July 2, a special noon meeting of the Student Senate was held in Memorial Hall for the express purpose of clarifying the issue of Senate reorganization. Mr. E. Gardner Jacobs presented a plan whereby each active organization on campus would have one representative in the Senate.

During the discussion of this plan it was brought out that, when the Student Senate was originally founded twelve years ago by the Vice President, it was for the purpose of permitting a representative of each organization on campus to meet and discuss mutual problems of both the student body and the administration.

It was not the intention to let groups, such as the Inter-faith Council with 4 members, the Greek Letter Council with 15 members, or the newly formed Dormitory Council with 11 members, to have a representative in the Senate for each of their individual organizations.

After a heated discussion, a vote was called for and twenty-seven Senators voted in the affirmative. This was more than the two-thirds majority needed to change the Constitution of the Senate to accept the new plan.

Here is the new plan which will go into effect next September. Each group listed will be represented in the Senate by one person elected by the group.

The passing of this plan brings to a close one of the most controversial issues ever to confront the members of the Student Senate. This plan is not intended to be a cure-all for all the ills of multiple representation on the Senate. It should, however, provide a solid foundation on which the incoming president, Paul Dunne, can build a Student Senate that Bryant students can be proud of.

BIB Scholarship Award Presented To John Starr

The first Beta Iota Beta Scholarship Award was presented to John Starr at the BIB-SIB Installation Banquet on Saturday evening, July 10, 1954. The Banquet was held at the Commodore Room of Johnsons Hummocks. Principal speaker of the evening was Mr. Alfred Pascale whose subject was "Objectives in Life." New officers and members were installed at this time.

One of the featured highlights of the evening was the presentation of the first Beta Iota Beta Scholarship Award. Tom Ireland, Chairman of the Scholarship Committee, stated the requirements for the award as scholastic standing, fraternal participation, and necessity. This cash award is to be given semiannually to a third or fourth semester fraternity brother. The first winner, John Starr, is a fourth semester student who has had a consistently good scholastic record, and has been very active in fraternal affairs. The BIB Scoop Sheet for Alumni is the result of John's untiring efforts as Alumni Secretary.

"Real objectives can lead one to a successful life," said Mr. Pascale.

"Each individual can start with short-range objectives right here in school with fraternity and sorority problems."

Gifts were presented to the advisors of BIB and SIB; to Vic and Arlene, departing presidents; certificates of membership were given to the new members of the fraternity and sorority; guard pins were presented to the outgoing officers.

The spontaneous talent show was the entertainment highlight of the evening. The "Commuter's Can Can" won over acts presented by the Benevolent Street boys and the Comery House boys.

In the typical BIB-SIB manner, the evening wound up with dancing to the music of Lou Carl and his orchestra.

The bearers will march down the aisle, four on each side, with one vine of ivy extending from shoulder to shoulder of each group. As they reach the stage,

the girls will turn, facing each other across the aisle with the ivy being transferred to their hands. This action forms a chain—commonly known as the Ivy Chain. At this point, the graduates pass through.

Two partners will be dressed in yellow, two in blue, two in mint green, and two in pink.

The two marshals—Shirley Bourbeau and Audrey Perreault—will be dressed in white. These girls will lead the graduates down the aisle.

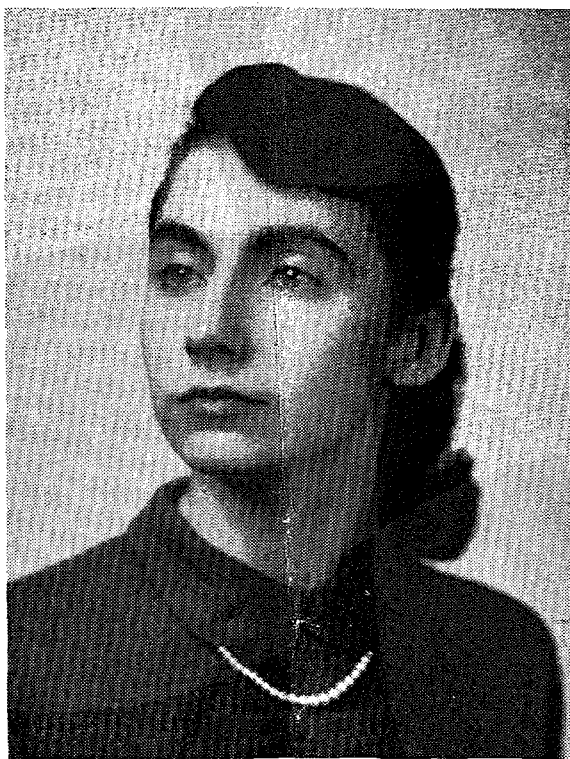

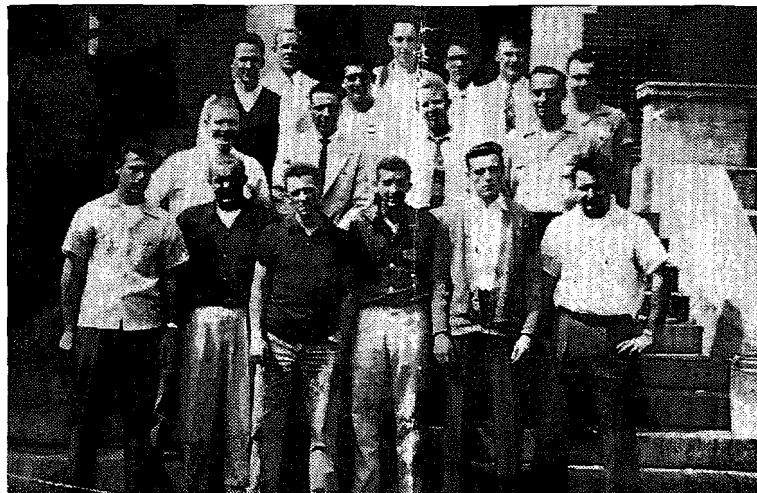

theology for two years in St. Paul, Minnesota, after which he was sent to the American College of the University of Louvain in Belgium, where he was ordained.

Returning to Rhode Island, Father Collins taught classics at La Salle Academy for nine years. When he was thirty-five years old, he was appointed President of St. Paul's College in Winnipeg, Manitoba. In 1935, he returned to La Salle Academy as Spiritual Director, during which time he was appointed Diocesan Director of Religious Instruction by the Bishop of Providence. In 1941 he was sent to the National Office of Religious Instruction in Washington, D. C., where he became Religious Consultant at the National Office of the USO during World War II.

In 1946 he returned to Rhode Island where he was assigned as Pastor of St. Andrew's Church, Block Island, and after that, of St. Bernard's Church in Wickford. He was appointed to his present post in 1951 by the Governor of the State. An honorary degree was conferred on him by his alma mater, in Nova Scotia, in 1931.

MISS INEZ GRAHAM, Headmistress, The Graham-Eckes School, Palm Beach, Florida, who will receive the Degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.), was born in Minnesota and educated in private schools there. Miss Graham also attended Northwestern Conservatory, the University of Minnesota and Columbia University in New York. A major in music and very active in musical circles in her state, she conducted a private piano studio, and worked with the University of Minnesota in connection with the "Matinee Musical." She is also a member of the Professional Women's Club of Duluth, Minnesota.

In 1926 she organized with Miss Evelyn Eckes, the Graham-Eckes School at Daytona Beach, which moved to Palm Beach in 1941. Miss Eckes is a member of the National Association of Principals of Girls' Schools, the Cum Laude Society, the Educational Records Bureau, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Her speaking engagements include talks before the Palm Beach Rotary Club and the West Palm Beach Kiwanis.

DR. CLEMENT KENNEDY, President of The New Ocean House, Swampscott, Massachusetts, will receive the Degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.). Colonel Kennedy was born in Fall River, Massachusetts. He is a descendant of Stephen Hopkins, a passenger on the Mayflower and member of the original Jamestown Colony. A graduate of Worcester Academy and Harvard University he served for two years as a Lieutenant in the Air Corps during World War I. On his return to this country he entered the hotel business at the New Ocean House where he has been president and general manager since 1925. He has

lectured on hotel management at Boston and Cornell Universities. He was decorated twice by Pope Pius XII with the Orders of Malta and Equestrian. He served throughout World War II, for four years as a member of the General Staff Corps.

He served his alma mater as Governor of the Harvard Club of Boston and in other committees. In 1951 and 1952, Colonel Kennedy was Chairman of the Resort Hotels Committee of the American Hotel Association. For eight years he was a vice-president and trustee of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston. He has been decorated with the Legion of Honor by the French Government and the Legion of Merit by the United States Army.

He is president of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, Sons of the American Revolution and Society of First Families of Virginia, among others. Colonel Kennedy is chairman of the Massachusetts Branch of the National Security Committee and a member of the Advisory Committee on Civilian Defense of that state. He was a member of the Hotel Advisory Committee of the National Production Authority. 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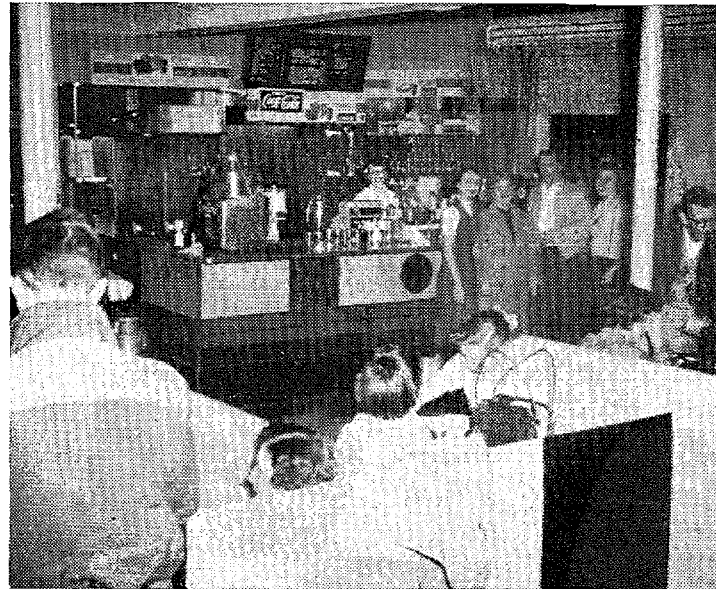
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
