Mrs. Messner was my typing teacher. Lord! Do I remember that time. Fifty typewriters and speed tests. I was so frightened I was unable to function as I should. My first effort was 30 words, 33 errors. I made it, thanks to her.

I had a free period for Mr. Russell's class in penmanship. All my hard work for eight years in grammar school really paid off!

I was an executive secretary for 12 years and I was married for 47 years. My husband was a local pharmacist. On the *Front Lines*

with William Charboneau '50

Bryant alumni have many distinctions, but it's probably safe to say that William Charboneau '50 is the only one who has a framed letter from Steven Spielberg on his wall.

By the time he enrolled at Bryant in the fall of 1946, Bill was a decorated World War II veteran. In 1945, as a rifleman with the 355th Infantry Regiment, 89th Infantry Division, he helped to liberate a concentration camp.

"From that day on we knew what we were fighting for," he remembers. "I was 19 years old at the time, but I became a man that day."

Years later, he recorded his personal impressions of the experience for the video archives of Survivors of the Shoah, established by Steven Spielberg in 1994 after filming "Schindler's List." The Shoah Foundation was founded to tape and preserve the testimony of Holocaust survivors and witnesses; it has collected more than 50,000 eyewitness testimonies in 57 countries and 32 languages.

Fate stepped in to bring Bill's story to the attention of the Foundation through a friend of a colleague of Bill's son, Anthony (yes, it is confusing). In December 1998, she sent a film crew to Bill's home in Pasadena, Texas, a suburb of Houston. About a month later, a tape of the interview arrived—along with a letter of thanks from Spielberg.

"The Shoah Foundation had done many thousands of interviews with survivors and wanted

to tape interviews with liberators," Bill says. "I feel quite honored to have been included in this group.

"I get very angry with neo-Nazis and their ilk, who say that the Holocaust never happened."

During the war, Bill received 10 awards, not the least of which were the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart Medal. After an honorable discharge in 1946, he enrolled at Bryant and earned a degree in Business Education in 1950.

His career took him from Rhode Island to Houston, Texas, where he retired from Brown & Root, Inc. as chief accountant in 1985. He took another job with Houston Natural Gas – now Enron Corporation – and ultimately retired from there in 1990.

Bill and his wife Nancy have lived in Pasadena, Texas for six years.
