The following is a letter received from Miss Clarissa Hayfield, last year's recipient of the Genie Fund Award, who is now a student at Columbia University.

"Dear Editor:

Upon receipt of word that the campaign for fund raising for the Genie Fund is to begin soon, I find myself reviewing the particular situation which existed last July. I had been accepted at Teachers College, Columbia, after suffering from innumerable anxieties and frustrations! Now that I am an intimate staff member in the Admissions Office, there comes an understanding that would not have been otherwise possible!

Acceptance meant the first hurdle was over. The idea was to get accepted and then worry about expenses. You know, I figured that "once I get there, I'll find something to do to meet expenses!" However, Good Fortune entered upon the scene, and it placed in my hands the Genie Fund. Anyone within miles must have seen my primary burden of worry take off from within me and fly to greater heights on wings! Now the ideal situation prevailed: acceptance by the University and no initial financial worry. There are no words within my vocabulary . . . or even in the fluency of a man named Webster . . . to describe just how much the Genie Fund meant to me. Those who knew me could tell that my elation was endless, and my enthusiasm for the Fund is without bounds!

There is probably no way in which I will be able to repay all those who are playing an important part in my graduate study. Perhaps some day when I am old and rich (surely few are young and rich these days), I might make an annual contribution to the Fund. I sincerely hope, though, that it will not take a material repayment to show my feelings of gratitude; I shall truly endeavor to show my thanks through my work—that work concerned with the education of our youth. My work at Columbia's Teachers College is extremely interesting, both on the part of my employment and my studies. Although my nature is fundamentally that of a country girl, I find that the city offers a vast amount of education. That about sums up the situation since the Genie Fund was awarded to me last semester.
