## Genie Fund Campaign Will Begin Monday

The Genie Fund opens its winter collection campaign, Monday, January 18 and will run through January 22. Here is the lowdown on just what the Genie Fund is.

During July, 1952, the Class of 1952 decided that a living memorial would make the best class gift and therefore originated the Genie Fund. This fund was to be carried on from semester to semester.

The Genie Fund is your fund because you and every student at Bryant College have the opportunity to further your education by attending graduate school. It is the Genie Fund that gives you this opportunity.

To be eligible to receive the benefits of the fund, all you have to do is apply to the Genie Fund Committee when you are a senior provided you have been accepted by a graduate school. Only one senior is chosen each semester; therefore, there is a selection board of five outstanding businessmen. This board selects the one senior who will go on to graduate work through the benefit of the Genie Fund. Attendance at graduate school must be within a five-year period after which time the balance will revert to the fund. The provision helps those graduates who will enter military service after graduation.

The following qualifications are considered by the Selection Board when they consider the applications each semester:

1. Scholastic performance as attested by a transcript of the candidate's grades.
2. Character as attested by reference and by the character records kept by Bryant College and which shall be available to the Selection Board on a confidential basis.
3. Participation in extracurricular activities.
4. Degree to which the prospective graduate school has accepted the candidate for graduate work.

5. The written request by the student which shall accompany the above data.

6. The deservingness of the particular student.

In order to keep the Genie Fund a success it is you, the student, who must see that this fund is perpetuated. This fund is your fund and it is run by the student body. Collections will be made by class presidents.

Of you undergraduates all we ask is that you make a dollar contribution at this time and that next semester you carry on the work for the Fund. Of our fellow graduates we ask you to make the same contribution with this thought in mind that one of us is going to benefit from this fund. Of everyone we ask your cooperation and support for a successful drive.

Help yourself by helping support the Genie Fund.

## Frats at Williams Join to Cut Costs

(I. P. Release) — Fourteen of the fifteen fraternities at Williams College are participating in the Campus Business Management plan this year in an effort to cut costs through a system of centralized purchasing. Under the new program, purchasing is handled by the college's director of dining halls. Each fraternity buys its foodstuffs from a central storage center incorporated in the new \$1,400,000 Student Union, under construction.

The fraternities will continue to operate their individual dining halls and kitchens. The college will operate a central dining hall in the Student Union for the use of the non-affiliates and freshmen. The special dining hall is part of a plan to de-emphasize fraternities under a system of deferred rushing.

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In the future, no freshmen will be pledged. Only the three upper classes may be rushed. The Student Union will provide dining facilities for freshmen, many of whom would have been pledged by fraternities before the school year began under the previous system.

The central buying plan was suggested last spring following a system similar to that which has been in operation successfully for six years at Bowdoin College (Me.). Most of the fraternities sent representatives there to investigate operation of the system.

## "Bryant's View" In 13th Week

Last week Professor Lucian Appleby gave a talk on the *Guide Post to Investing*. He stated that putting money to work is not just for the wealthy. One out of every three that invest earn less than \$5,000 a year. It is not necessary to buy a great number of shares.

He also told of the three goals of investing. Number one was growth. This is when the original investment multiplies over the years. This is usually done by investing in common stock of a new corporation. Number two is income. The investor is interested in dividends to supplement his normal income. The preferred stock of going concerns is thought of in this goal. Number three is safety. The investor is concerned with maintaining his principal with a steady, though usually small, return. This is accomplished by investing in government securities.

Different types of investments and security holders were discussed. He told how the price of stock depended upon what the buyer and seller sets its value at. He finished by giving a few hints to sound investing for the small investor.

He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for the only piece of property he had on earth, and that was his coat. When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

"Nineteen wide centuries have come and gone, and today he is the central figure of the human race and the leader of the column of progress.

"I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that were ever built, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as has that One Solitary Life."

school hours has no effect whatsoever on the GI allowances paid them by the Government.

The monthly allowances will remain the same, regardless of outside earnings, VA said. In fact, these earnings need not even be reported to the VA.

The only "ceiling" under the Korean GI Bill applies to veterans taking on-the-job or apprentice training. But even this "ceiling" of \$310 a month imposes no limit whatsoever upon how much a veteran may earn.

Instead it works this way: When the veteran's earnings as a trainee, plus his monthly GI allowance, exceed \$310 a month, VA scales down the allowance accordingly, to bring the total within the \$310 limit.

The \$310-a-month ceiling applies to all on-the-job trainees, regardless of the rate of GI allowance they are receiving. The beginning allowance rate for a veteran with no dependents is \$70 a month; with one dependent, it is \$85; and with more than one dependent, it is \$105.

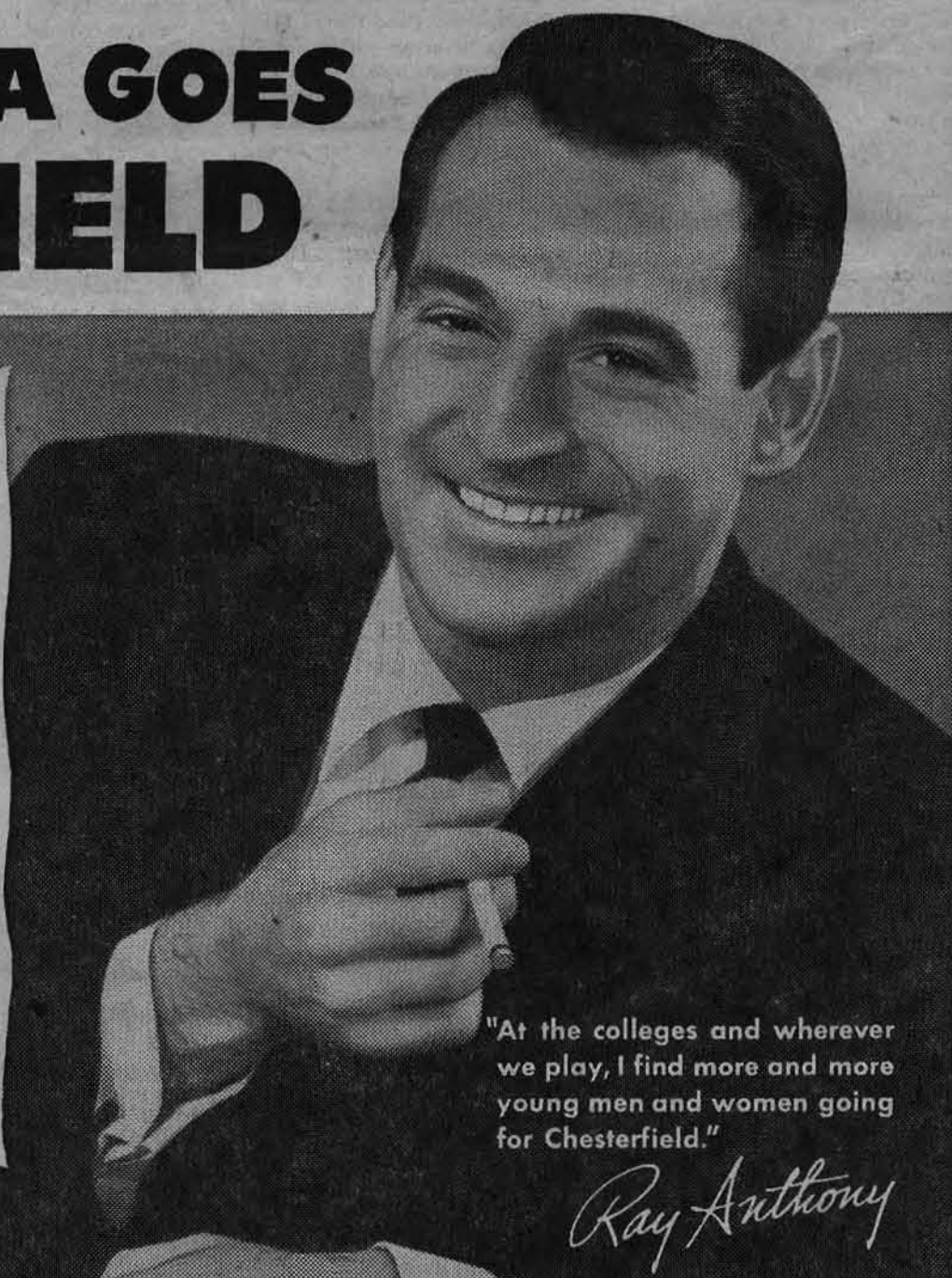
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
