Alumni Tour London

Want to combine an exciting vacation with a stimulating learning experience? Then plan to join Professor Chantee Lewis and other Bryant alumni on an international finance tour to London this summer.

The Bryant Alumni Association is sponsoring the tour that will feature visits to the London Stock Exchange, Lloyds of London, the International Tea Auction, the International Financial Futures Exchange, the Metals Exchange, and talks by London business experts. Also included will be sightseeing, a London theatre performance, Thames River cruise, and much more.

Professor Lewis, coordinator of the Graduate School finance program, is an international finance and real estate expert. He holds a DBA in finance from George Washington University. In addition to his teaching experience at Bryant, the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island College,

and Salve Regina College, Professor Lewis' background includes several top management positions. He is also the author of numerous articles relating to small business, taxation and other financial topics.

The nine-day excursion leaves from Boston on Wednesday, August 9, and returns Thursday, August 17. The cost of \$2395 (per person, double occupancy; \$350 single supplement) includes round-trip air transportation on a major scheduled airline, all ground transportation, seven nights accommodation at a superior first class hotel, and many meals and other services.

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Bryant was called a "hot school" this fall in an article that appeared in *Newsday*, a large circulation daily newspaper that serves New York City and its suburbs. Bryant is described as "a northern school whose ratings are on the rise these days" in the lead article of the newspaper's annual College Fair supplement published September 25. The article, titled "Where the Hot Schools Are and Where They're Likely to Be," lists about 100 schools from all areas of the country. The ratings were based on surveys in national magazines such as *Time*, *Money*, and *U.S. News and World Report*, and college selection guides aimed at high school seniors, according to the story.
