

Archway Banquet Held at Admiral Inn; College Officials Commend Staff; Carr and Frazee Named Co-Editors

The graduating members of the Archway staff were honored at a banquet at the Admiral Inn last Monday night, January 28. Speeches by Mr. E. Gardner Jacobs, Vice President of Bryant College, Deans Galski and Mercier, and other faculty members paid tribute to the departing seniors for their diligent, and often unsung, efforts in preparing, editing, and distributing the college news through the Archway.

Gordon Carr, Co-editor in Chief, opened the program with a brief summation of the past Archway season. He thanked all the members of the staff for their fine co-operation during the past semester, and wished them luck in their future endeavors.

The principal speaker of the evening, Vice President E. Gardner Jacobs, was introduced next. Mr. Jacobs described the highlights of the Archway's growth from 1921 until today. He showed the guests one of the first periodicals to be published by Bryant students, the Bryant "Booster." The difference in advertising techniques as well as in news coverage between the "Booster" of 1921 and the Archway of today was very evident. Mr. Jacobs also honored the efforts of the editors and the staff of the Archway for their part in making the Archway one of New England's top college newspapers.

Following the chief speaker, other members of the faculty gave brief laudatory comments concerning the Archway staff. Dean Galski convulsed the entire gathering with his definition of the Archway banquet as a "Boos and Chews" affair rather than the usual "Roast and Toast" dinner that is held by National Newsclubs. Dean Mercier gave thanks to the co-editors for their fine work and wished the incoming staff the best of luck.

Mr. Parkos, head of student activities, told of the important role the paper plays in relating news of student activities on campus and off. Mrs. Hochburg, public relations director, spoke of the close relationship between her department and the Archway. She said that the recent journalistic progress of the Archway made it one of her best sources for news of campus personalities.

Mrs. Love, Dean of Women and Director of the Placement Bureau, added her congratulations to that of her predecessors. Mr. Arthur K. Smith, faculty adviser of the Archway, commended the staff in general and the editors in particular for their fine work during the past year.

In concluding the program, co-editor Carr introduced co-editor George MacDonald, who served as the managing editor during the past semester. George acknowledged the plaudits that had been accorded him and thanked Gordon Carr for his cooperation during their tenure as co-editors. MacDonald then passed out awards of Archway keys to members of the staff. The following students received the pins: Bob Fregeau,

The charter members had been members of the Bachelors' Club, an informal luncheon club founded in February, 1926. The close association in the Bachelors' Club led to the desire for a more lasting organization which would embody the deep friendship existing among the members, and resulted in the formulation of Alpha Chapter. Early in 1929, the Fraternity was reincorporated by the State of Illinois, as the Phi Sigma Nu National Fraternity, empowered to charter chapters in junior colleges throughout the United States.

In 1932 Iota Chapter was chartered at Bryant College.

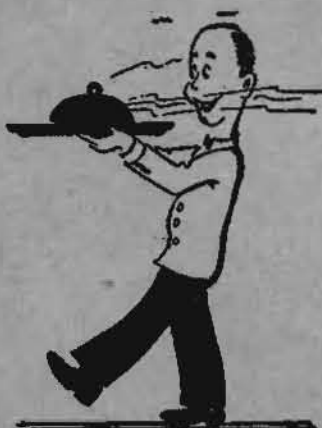
