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Alpha Theta Chi Adopts Korean

The brothers of Alpha Theta Chi have by proxy adopted a boy through the Foster Parents' Plan, Inc. The brother in Alpha Theta Chi who first suggested the idea of adopting a Korean orphan was Orazio Bonaccorso—a war orphan himself. Orazio wrote to the Foster Parents' Plan and asked for information about adopting a Korean orphan. They answered that it would be possible and gave information about the cost of supporting the boy for a year. The brothers of the fraternity were all very interested in this plan and later voted to adopt the boy.

Joe Tammelleo, a brother in the fraternity, is chairman of the adoption committee. Like many other brothers in Alpha Theta Chi, he is a veteran who saw many children overseas who had nothing they could call their own. With this in mind, the brothers all agreed on the idea and were eager to see it carried through.

The boy's name is Lee Jen Kon. His parents died during the Communist invasion of South Korea and he had to find refuge in the Red Cross Orphanage in Pusan, Korea.

The fraternity is contributing \$180 to help support Lee Jen for a year. He will be fed, dressed, and educated with this money. The Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., sent a picture of the boy. The brothers will keep in touch with Foster Parents to see how their "son" is.

Alpha Theta Chi is the first fraternity at Bryant to do this, but they are sure that their fellow Greek Letter organizations will follow suit in the near future. The sixty-two brothers are proud of the fact that they have a "son."

Fraternities--Sororities To Compete On Point Basis

Another step has been taken to give recognition for the many helpful projects done by Bryant's Greek Letter organizations. The Administration has announced today the establishment of the Bryant College Trophy for Community Service.

This trophy will be awarded at the end of each year to the fraternity or sorority that does the most service for the community. The award will be based upon a point system. One point will be awarded for each \$2 donated in cash or the equivalent in goods, to a community organization and one point for each "man hour" of work done for such an organization. "Man hours" are computed by multiplying the number of hours worked times the number of people working. For example, three men working two hours each equals six "man hours." The fraternity or sorority with the greatest number of points, regardless of the size of the organization will receive the trophy.

Each organization is responsible for recording and reporting the amount of points it has earned. Credit slips (see below) must be filled out and handed in to the Student Activities office within ten days of the project. The Activities Office will keep these slips and make periodic audits on them. Any disputes concerning points awarded will be settled by a committee consisting of the Student Activities Director, the President of the Greek Letter Council, and a third person who is suitable to the other two members of the committee. The Activities office will report at the end of each semester the total number of points each organization has earned during the semester. It is to be understood that all fraternities and sororities competing for the trophy will operate under the same system when filling out credit slips.

Competition for the trophy will extend from July 1 to June 30 of each year. Since this is the first year of competition, every organization has an opportunity to submit credit slips dating back to June 30, 1957. This must be done on or before December 6, 1957.

The trophy, with an anticipated life of ten years, will rent annually unless it is won three times by one organization. If it is won three times, not consecutively, it will be retired to that organization.

Joint Greek Letter projects such as the Greek Letter Council Christmas Party for Underprivileged Children will count in the competition for the trophy. If a fraternity or sorority participates in such a joint service venture, it may submit credit slips for the work it did on the project. For example, the X Fraternity supplies 2 brothers to clean up after the G.L.C. Christmas (Continued on Page 2)

Employment Seminars Acquaint Students With Careers; Several Companies Plan and Hold Interviews

Leading businessmen in various fields have been visiting the Bryant campus during the past few weeks to give information about their companies and to recruit prospective graduates.

Mr. William McSweeney, associated for 30 years with the Travelers Insurance Company, spoke on November 19 to third and fourth semester students in the Business Administration Department about opportunities in the insurance business.

Mr. McSweeney divided the insurance business into four fields: Underwriting; Sales; Administration, which includes policy writers, statistical people, and personal people; and Service, which includes adjusters and auditors.

A few suggestions were given by Mr. McSweeney for those students who desire placement in the insurance field. The need for good personnel is great, he said, and the job should be approached with the attitude that the applicant is needed. Although there is no quick path to success in insurance, Mr. McSweeney said that exposure in the field and additional studying is the answer to opportunity.

Two more employment seminars are scheduled for December 5 and December 19. Mr. Martin Held of the First Regional District, Boston office, will speak on December 5 of the opportunities in the Federal Civil Service Field. Placement in the credit field will be discussed on December 17. Mr. Howard Almy of the Collyer Wire Company will talk on mercantile credit; Mr. E. R. Gilmartin, credit manager of GMAC, will discuss installment credit; and Mr. Joseph Holzinger,

office manager of Retail Credit Corp., will cover opportunities in retail credit.

Mr. R. E. Jenks, Coordinator of college recruiting, and Mr. H. T. Courtright, assistant manager of employee relations, financial and accounting, interviewed prospective graduates on November 20 for the Socony-Mobil Oil Company of New York.

It has been found that these lectures and interviews have proved profitable to both company and student.

Navy to Come Aboard

Representatives from the office of naval officer procurement, Boston, Mass., will be on the BRYANT COLLEGE campus on December 4, 1957, for the purpose of discussing current Navy programs with interested students. These officers will be available for the convenience of those desiring information.

Students who have not fulfilled their military obligations and who are not committed to an ROTC or other military program will have an opportunity to obtain detailed information regarding requirements for appointment to officer candidate or aviation officer training and subsequent commissioning as ensign in the professional areas of line, aviation, or staff corps. Information will also be available for junior and senior women regarding wave officer opportunities.

Navy representatives will be available to discuss the various programs for student groups or organizations as well as for individuals desiring specific information.

As a result of last week's basketball action, Chi Gamma Iota and Phi Sigma Nu's were the only remaining undefeated teams in the Men's Intramural League.

On Tuesday afternoon the hoopsters of Phi Sig copped their second win without a loss by edging a stubborn Tau Epsilon five 38-34. Casciano and Nolletti threw in 14 and 11 points respectively for the winners, while Jim Aiello and Paul Petersen each garnered 10 markers in a losing cause. The difference came from the free throw line where Phi Sig outpointed the losers 10-6.

In the second encounter of the afternoon, the Westerly Commuters, paced by Ballin with 18 and Whitey Bennett with 12, whipped Phi Sigma Nu's "B" quintet by a score of 44-34.

The big tilt of the week was played on Tuesday when Chi Gam chargers bumped heads with the Alpha Theta Chi five. A sizeable crowd was on hand with expectations of a tough tussle, and they were not disappointed. Sparked by Dick Gawlick's treacherous hook shot and consistent rebounding, Alpha Theta's aggression forged ahead and maintained a reasonably safe point margin throughout the game.

But in the final period, Chi Gam's superior bench strength began to take its toll. Alpha Theta's lead dwindled to two points, when, with one second remaining, Don Haggerty of Chi Gam was fouled. Haggerty stepped to the foul line and calmly threw in his penalty shot. "Nerves" Haggerty's second shot swished through the mesh, and there was bedlam in the Cafegymnasium. This led to the first overtime period of the season.

In the extra stanza, Alpha Theta's Nolan dunked two quick hoops, but Lubinsky matched these for Chi Gam and his teammates. Paul Malley and Ed Houle each added another bucket to win the ball game 61-47. The result gave Chi Gam a 4-0 record, while Alpha Theta dropped to third place with a 3-1 count.

On Tuesday, November 19, the well-balanced Phi Sigma Nu five downed the Tau Epsilon basketball team 38-34.

Led by Richie Gayer, the Green and Gold jumped into an early lead and were in front at the end of the first quarter 14-4. Largely through the efforts of Ray Nolletti, who controlled the boards throughout the game and scored 11 points, Phi Sig's lead was increased to 19-10 at the half.

Tau Ep rallied in the third period and pulled within three points of Phi Sig. The score remained close during that period with each team furnishing good defensive play. Phi Sig managed to withstand Tau Ep's repeated threats in a hard-fought fourth period and finished on top by a 38-34 score.
