Student Body Again Made up of Men and Women From Many States, Nine Foreign Countries

Wednesday, September 3, 1958, saw Bryant College entering its 96th year. This year the freshman class, which consists of 709 members, is the largest since World War II. Among the class are representatives of 26 states and 9 foreign countries including Canada, Costa Rica, El Salvador, France, Hong Kong, Mexico, Nicaragua, Venezuela, and the British West Indies. Campus population now exceeds 1400 students in the day division.

After a whirlwind of aptitude tests, counseling, dances, sightseeing tours, parties and general confusion, the new freshmen settled down in order to adjust to their full schedules. Now after

two weeks the frosh are hard at the books, anticipating that first round of exams.

As were all the other past beginning classes, this one has been subject to the student monitors and the school vigilantes. Beanie regulations have been strictly enforced and vigilante courts have doled out punishment to offenders. The freshmen have taken this good naturedly, and last Saturday during the Liberation Day Dance, they were allowed, for the first time, to doff their caps on Bryant's grounds. Now the frosh may appear bare-headed at will without the fear of reprisal.

Pledge week is due to start after mid-semester. The freshman will begin then the grind leading to acceptance in fraternity and sorority activities. Once the initiations are over, the frosh will be on the long (or short) road to those coveted degrees.

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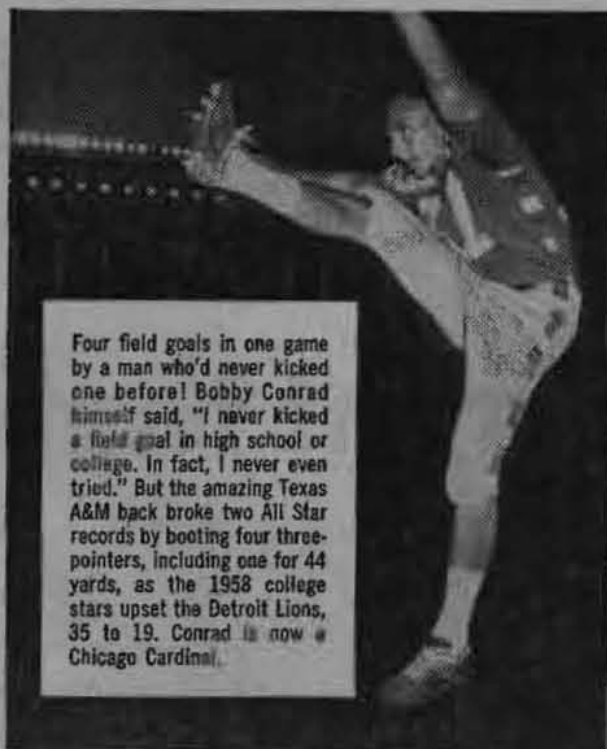
