

Zoubek Stresses Importance of Speed in Taking Dictation

Demonstration Given By Shorthand Author

Charles Zoubek, co-author of the Gregg Shorthand Simplified for Colleges, spoke and gave a shorthand demonstration to the Secretarial Division on September 26 in the Bryant College auditorium.

Mr. Zoubek stressed the importance of shorthand for business as well as for personal use. He went on to say that in order to decrease mental strain, it is essential for the secretary to have a reserve of speed on which she can rely. Mr. Zoubek added that the more speed a secretary possesses, the easier it will be to take dictation and to transcribe notes and the quicker a raise and promotion will come.

Mr. Zoubek, who was awarded the Gregg Diamond Medal for the taking of dictation at 200 words per minute, possesses a Degree of Certified Shorthand Reporter granted by the University of the State of New York and has taught at Hunter College of New York and at Peck Institute. Miss Priscilla Moulton and Dr. Leger Morrison aided with the dictation for the demonstration.



Over 1400 Students X-rayed on Campus

Last week over 1400 Bryant students underwent the annual Chest X-ray exams in the mobile unit parked outside the Student Union. Any students having tuberculosis or any other chest diseases will be notified by the Providence Tuberculosis League within the next few days.

Housed in the sleek trailer was the latest in X-ray photographic equipment. The van was donated last year by Mrs. Jesse H. Metcalf to the Providence Tuberculosis League, a non-profit organization whose purpose is to advise patients rather than to provide medical care for them.

During 1957, 35,000 Rhode Islanders were X-rayed thanks to the crew manning this "hospital ship." It is through the efforts of these people that tuberculosis can be detected before it reaches the advanced stage. It is through citizen's grants to the United Fund Agency that this league can exist.

EDITORIALS

A problem being viewed with consternation by both faculty and students is the problem of hazing—which might be aptly described as "a slightly clouded mental condition."

Youth in its frivolity demands the privilege of being light-hearted on occasion and the chance to subject itself and others to the dubious pleasure of being mildly ridiculed. There is hardly anything in this world more enjoyable than a good practical joke played at someone else's expense; but the element of humor does not exist when there is malice, or immaturity, or both.

The administration of Bryant college and an element of the student body look upon this type of conduct with much disfavor, for not only do these activities reap discredit on this institution, but also upon the student body as a whole. The sad irony of it exists in the fact that those who instigate these idiotic activities never seem to be noticed by outsiders, while unwilling participants are the ones that share the brunt of the criticism.

Another point that the subversive element of this college has not recognized is that prospective employers may, and often do, obtain knowledge of the fact that questionable procedures are practiced by the student body. There is little question that a business organization would not have much to do with an individual who subscribed to the flagrant mis-use of good judgment witnessed during the hazing period. Imagine, if you will, the surprise and genuine detestation of some friend or business acquaintance of Bryant's upon seeing or hearing of some juvenile prank sponsored by some immature individuals. What sort of impression would you, as an individual, harbor about Bryant? Would you as an employer, hire any one of these individuals? I hardly think so.

It will no doubt interest many students to know that the hazing activities will be strictly curtailed in the future and that any departure from the regulations laid down by the administration will be dealt with severely by that body.

You individuals who will presently be vital components of society; you individuals who will lead people and have them seek your advice; you who will have the world think that you possess stability and maturity should be willing to prove it.

LIBRARY NOTES

This is to serve as an introduction to the Henry L. Jacobs Library, named in honor of our college president, Dr. Henry L. Jacobs, pioneer in business education. Location of the library is through the lower doors of Jacobs Hall, Young Orchard Avenue.

Constantly the library is growing in size. 782 books were added last year; 203 books added during September, 1958. Currently the total number of books contained in the library is 2,620. Comparatively the library is of quite recent vintage. Dorothy E. Keith, Librarian, graduate of Simmons College, Boston, Massachusetts holding a B. S. in Library Science, came to Bryant in September, 1955 and has organized the library to its present station.

If at any time anyone is unable to locate a book on the shelves, all he has to do is ask the library staff members for help. The following personnel is always nearby—Mrs. Angelo Pettine is available on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 A. M. to 2 P. M. Student helpers are Nancy Roach, first semester secretarial; Lois Kauffman, third semester secretarial and Paul Vittulo, fourth semester marketing.

Library visitors are welcome during the hours from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. Students are invited to browse among the books, borrow them, read magazines, use shorthand records, reference shelves, or quietly study.

Visitors to the library are instantly impressed by the portrait of Dr. Henry L. Jacobs located inside the library room. In the center of the room stands the card catalogue, which serves as an aid for the locating of specific books. Cards inside are arranged alphabetically by author, title, and subject.

Of course, library users must follow rules: Books are loaned for a period of two weeks. After this period, renewal may be made if no request or reservation has been placed on the book. Renewal is carried out quite simply by informing the librarian of the book title and the student's name. It is not necessary to bring the book in to renew it. A fine of five cents per day is charged for overdue books. If it is impossible to locate a book, then the student must make reimbursement.

There has been some mention

among students of the desire to have the library open Saturday and some evenings. Students who want this should approach their Student Senate representative concerning this matter.

Many newspapers are available. Barron's National Financial Weekly and Billboard are subscribed to weekly. The dailies are Christian Science Monitor, Home Furnishings Daily, Journal of Commerce, New York Times (daily and Sunday editions), Providence Journal, Wall Street Journal, and Women's Wear Daily.

Approximately seventy-five magazines are arranged alphabetically by title on the shelves.

Notice should be given every week when the bulletin boards in the library corridor are changed. One will contain current events; the other, classical art.

Miss Keith, Librarian, welcomes any and all suggestions by students and faculty.

Bryant's First Blind Student Observes 40th Year As B-I-F Employee

Miss Rose Gadbois, Providence, R. I., class of 1918, is surely one of Bryant's greatest graduates. Rose, who has been totally blind since birth, observed her fortieth year as a stenographer at B-I-F Industries in Providence this year. She has received many national citations for accuracy in dictation and typing of technical subjects.

In 1917 the then head of B-I-F Industries offered Miss Gadbois a position if she could type from a dictaphone. She said she needed some practice. Several schools

turned down her application, but Dr. Henry L. Jacobs, head of the Bryant and Stratton Commercial School offered to experiment by accepting his first blind student... Miss Gadbois.

Because the early transcription machines were not the best, and the regular Braille shorthand had not come into general use, Miss Gadbois perfected her own brand of Braille shorthand. At the office of B-I-F Miss Gadbois is known as an accurate typist, and is often asked to instruct new employees in the use of dictaphones.
