Beta Iota Beta, Kappa Delta Kappa Excel in Scholastic Achievement

One of the outstanding highlights of the Greek Letter-Student Senate Banquet held on Tuesday evening, Jan.

The awarding for the first time of the Scholastic Trophy to the fraternity and sorority whose brothers and sisters maintained the highest academic averages of Bryant fraternities and sororities.

One Scholastic Trophy was presented to Thomas DelSanto, representing the brothers of Beta Iota Beta. This award reflects the standard of scholastic achievement attained by the brothers of Beta Iota Beta during the past semester. They maintained the excellent average of 2.1745 quality points. Beta Sigma Chi placed a close second with an average of 2.1292 quality points. Third was Chi Gamma Iota with an average of 2.1230 points. Fourth was Phi Sigma Nu with an average of 2.0526 points. And fifth was Alpha Omicron with an average of 1.9445 points.

The other winner of the Scholastic Trophy was Kappa Delta Kappa Sorority with an average of 2.7435 quality points. The award was presented to Miss Lois Kaufman, who represented the sisters of KDK. Placing second was Sigma Lambda Theta with an average of 2.7413 quality points. Placing third was Alpha Phi Kappa with an average of 2.5665, followed by Phi Upsilon with 2.4541, Delta Sigma Chi with 2.4465, Sigma Iota Chi with 2.1382, Sigma Iota Beta with 2.0823 and Delta Sigma Omicron with 2.0761.

Thus closed the awarding of the trophies for the current semester, but only for the current semester, because the Scholastic Trophy will be awarded again on July 31 at the end of the next semester. Between now and July 31, there is bound to be some keen competition for the awards and the only thing definite right now is that it will again be awarded to the fraternity or sorority with the highest quality-point averages.

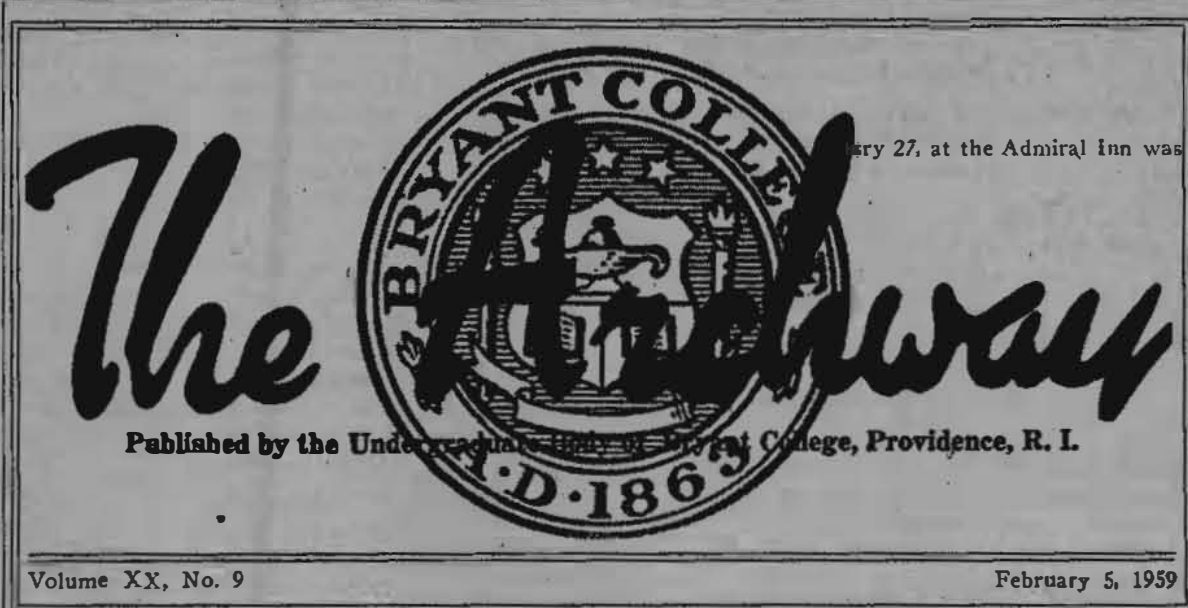

The chief finding of reporters at the 48th annual National Retail Merchants' Association convention was that sales this year are expected to rise 4% to 5% over what they were a year ago.

Places at the site of the convention, the Statler-Hilton Hotel in New York City, were filled by many Bryant College retailing students. The students were among 5,000 department and specialty store executives.

At a session in the Grand Ballroom, "Selling is Everybody's Job," the students received many beneficial ideas concerning the analogy of customer wants, gearing the store to sell more, and operating for

main point was the idea of being by top-notch executives in the retailing field concerning the cutting down on various customer services and the using of more self-service as a replacement. A statement was made that "the retailer should put the customer on top and himself on the bottom." There was agreement by all that close contact with customers help to fill consumer wants.

Another session, "Unblocking the Downtown Comeback Road", was one that really stirred up attention, for this is a problem that is facing retailers right here in Providence. Various ideas were presented. One suggestion was to develop better architectural constructions in a mall which would attract people downtown. Another consisted of free bus rides and free parking facilities for downtown patrons. It was stated that in the future one may never see a car in the city district. There may be the development of underground lead-ins and parking facilities. The basis of any development is the cooperation of all people in the city to work together to overcome this problem facing many of the nation's largest cities.

Bryant students rounded out the convention at the special session for students—"The Student Looks At Retailing." Speeches were given by both people in retailing and students studying retailing. After each speech the students held discussions, and each table had a student moderator. Representing one of the roundtable discussion groups was Dave Simpson of Bryant College. The highlights concerning the good and bad aspects of retailing work were presented by all speakers. The students were shown a special 30-minute sound motion picture film concerning the future in retailing.

Third Straight Win By Alpha Theta Chi Retires Trophy

Tuesday night, January 27, at the Student Senate-Greek Letter Council Banquet, Mr. Kenneth C. Director of Student Activities, awarded the Community Service Trophies to Alpha Theta Chi Fraternity and Alpha Phi Kappa Sorority. Mr. George Campbell accompanied the trophy for Alpha Theta Chi, and Carol Zinno accepted for Alpha Phi Kappa.

Alpha Theta Chi has the honor of being the only fraternity ever to win the Community Service Trophy. The trophy was first awarded three semesters ago, and at that time it was decided that a fraternity or sorority must win the award three times to retire the trophy. Alpha Theta Chi now has permanent possession of it.

Alpha Phi Kappa won the trophy for the first time this semester. Their total of 1093 points was higher than the number of points amassed by any other fraternity or sorority, and more than doubled the total points of their closest competitor. They are the only organization to cross the 1000 point mark since the trophy was originated.

In the fraternity competition, Alpha Theta Chi was high with 988 points, Chi Gamma Iota was second with 522½ points, Kappa Tau third with 503½ points, Phi Sigma Nu fifth with 257 points, and Sigma Lambda Pi sixth with 154½ points.

For the sororities, Alpha Phi Kappa's 1,093 points was first, Sigma Iota Chi with 540 points was second, Delta Sigma Chi with 395 points was third, Sigma Tau Gamma with 350 points was fourth, Phi Upsilon with 111 points was fifth, Sigma Iota Beta with 47½ points was sixth, and Kappa Delta Kappa with 12 points was seventh.

Competition for this semester's trophy closed on Monday, January 26. Of the eighteen fraternal organizations on campus, only thirteen entered into the competition.

The services rendered by the students included aid to local charitable organizations, support of a Korean orphan, collection of clothes to be sent overseas, and the donation of blood.

Competition for the next semester's award will close on June 26, 1959. Everyone will be trying to win the new trophy which will be bought to replace the one retired by Alpha Theta Chi.

I hope all of you watched the latest Timex All Star Jazz Show. For you moderns who are always currying up the "moldy figs" for being corny, may I remind you that Diz-zie's dance and his piano players' shouts was the height of corniness for the night. Also that Mr. Stroug's two disciples were on stage, namely, Roy and Diz. Yes, Mr. Stroug was the first.

Eldridge patterned his style after Louis, and then Diz dug Roy's style. I thought this was a four star show — the best Timex has done by far.

Rules Listed for Secretarial Exams

FOR THE MID-YEAR EXAMINATION PERIOD, 1959

- Classes end February 6.
- On the last meeting of each class all students who are excused from the final examination will be given cards evidencing this special privilege. If you do not receive an "excuse card," you must take the examination during the examination period, February 9 through 13.
- A student who has a quiz average of 75% or better on the number of quizzes required by the instructor and who has had total cuts not exceeding 10% of the scheduled classes will be excused from the final examination and will be given a grade equal to the average of the quiz grades.
- Students who have cuts in excess of 20% and those whose work is incomplete will receive cards notifying them of the fact that they are ineligible for the examination.
- Only the Dean of your department can grant you permission the examination if you have over 30% cuts. If you have had excessive cuts (over 20%) and have been ill or experienced other unavoidable difficulties, you may present your case in writing to the Dean who may, for cause, grant permission to take the examination.
- Final examinations will be held from February 9 through 13 in South Hall according to the schedule which has been posted.
- Students with a grade of D, F, or Incomplete in Shorthand or Typewriting are required to attend Shorthand and Typewriting classes when not taking an examination. Students with C averages may—it is optional with them. Students with A and B averages are not permitted to attend the Shorthand and Typewriting classes during the week of February 9 through 12.
- Students with an Incomplete or failing grades in Office Machines I or Office Machines II are required to attend the special classes February 9 through 12 when not taking an examination.
- Registration of "renewal" students in the Secretarial Department for the new semester will take place at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, February 25.
- Since provision will be made to give out schedules and books at the above hours it is imperative that you report at the proper time. Late arrival or failure to register on February 25 will necessitate delays and inconvenience. Please cooperate by reporting at the proper day and hour.
- Classes begin at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 26, 1959.
