The goal for this year is 150 pints. The drive is open to all students and members of the faculty who wish to bank their supply for their own future needs or that of someone they Choose.



## **A PRODUCTIVE LOAN**

From our friend, The Economic Man, we learn the definition and theoretical technicalities of the productive loan and trading on the equity. Although transmitted to us in the light of a going business, it seems that plans for plant expansion for a manufacturer and plans for continued education for the student have some outstanding similarities, particularly in respect to financing the program.

In these days of rising costs of education, many who have the ability and desire to continue are held back by the lack of ready funds of their own. Examine the facts, however, and you discover this: our state and federal governments are offering unsecured personal loans to needy students who wish to fulfill an education already started on their own initiative. And these particular education loans are available charges and longer repayment periods than are available for ordinary personal loans. Who can get one of these loans? Usually anyone who has satisfactorily completed a year in a program education above that of secondary school level.

Our federal government has appropriated six million dollars this year for such loans to worthy students, and the plan is for more later. In most ases, students inquire and apply for loans of this type at the college at which they are enrolled. They are authorized in amounts up to \$1,000 a year, and repayment of these loans, together with interest charges, starts one year after completion of education.

A representative state program operates in a similar manner; however, application is usually accepted directly by banking institution within the state in which the student is a resident. The maximum annual loan may often be lower than those available from federal government sources, but the funds are readily available.




