On Friday, June 19, in the gym between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., elections will be held to determine who the new Student Senate officers will be for the 1959-1960 school year. The president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer will be chosen by the student body in a schoolwide election.

This election of officers should be of the utmost importance to each and every Bryant student in that it will have a direct effect upon everyone concerned.

The Student Senate is the mouthpiece of the entire student body, and the ability of the officers who lead it determines how effective the representation of the students will

be. The planning and co-ordination of the various student social activities, which are so much a part of a successful and enjoyable campus life, is only part of the many functions which the Student Senate undertakes. It is, therefore, the duty of each student to make sure that the officers who will represent him in the Student Senate possess the qualities of sincerity, responsibility, and leadership, and that these officers will act in the best interests of the entire student body.

Inasmuch as every student is required to pay an annual activities fee to finance the various student functions, it should, therefore, be important to him to put the dispersion of this money in the hands of competent leaders. He should also be cognizant of

where and why the money is being spent.

The only way you can be sure of this competent leadership is by casting your ballot for the candidates who you think are best qualified for the offices.

To have an effective Student Activities Program, there must be a well organized and responsible Student Senate. It also follows that to have an effective Student Senate, there must be officers with leadership and initiative. Therefore, to have officers with these qualities, there must be the complete support of the entire student body.

It is left to your own discretion to vote for the candidates whom you think are best qualified. However, the most important thing is that you vote.

VR&E Division of VA Moves to Fountain St.

Veterans Administration Providence Regional Office has announced relocation plans for its Vocational Rehabilitation and Education Division.

John L. Reavey, Manager of VA's Providence office stated that the VR&E Division would be moved from its present location at 331 Hope Street to 100 Fountain Street, Providence, R. I. The division's personnel of 15 will occupy fifth floor offices at 100 Fountain Street, formerly used by VA's Loan Guaranty Division whose functions were recently transferred to VA's Boston Regional Office.

The division is composed of the office of the Chief of the division, Educational Benefits Section, Counseling Section, and Education and Training Section. Files maintained by the VR&E Division contain records of war-disabled veterans taking Vocational Rehabilitation, Korra conflict GI Bill trainees, and those persons entitled to War Orphans Education.

Reavey explained that relocation of the VR&E Division would provide closer liaison with other operating divisions of the VA and also quicker and more complete service to veterans calling at the regional office for information and assistance regarding education and training benefits.

Target date for completion of the move is June 15th.

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Notice from the Dean's Office

End-of-Semester Information for Business Administration Department Students

1. Cards indicating that you are excused from, or ineligible for, the final examinations, will be distributed in your last scheduled class.
2. If you receive a card indicating that you are ineligible because of excess cuts and feel that you have a valid reason for this extended absence from class, take the card to the Dean's Office at least three days before the examination and explain your case. If approval to take the examination is granted, this fact will be endorsed on the card, and when presented to the proper instructor, will authorize the taking of the test.
3. If for some reason you have a conflict in time between examinations, please report the facts to the Dean's Office as soon as your complete examination schedule is known. A special examination will be arranged for you.
4. Every student—unless barred because of excess cuts—may take the final examination, regardless of his average, if he wishes. If you elect to take the final in the hope of raising your grade, you must notify your instructor in advance so that he will provide an examination paper for you. Once you report for and take the examination paper, the grade thereon must be considered in determining your final average.
5. All students taking final examinations should provide themselves with necessary paper and writing materials. Unless use of books and notes is permitted in taking the examinations, such material should be left at home or at least placed on the hat racks in the room. Cribbing of any kind can be most injurious to your record.
6. All students must present an identification card at the time of each examination. If you do not have a photo I.D. card, you may obtain a signature I.D. card at the Records Office.

Special information for Students scheduled to graduate in July

1. Classes end on July 10.
2. Final examinations for those not excused—July 13 through July 17.
3. Students scheduled to graduate in July who are taking non-senior courses will be governed by the following rules.
 - a) Required attendance in these courses will not extend beyond July 10.
 - b) Averages and cuts to this point will determine whether a final exam must be taken.
 - c) If a final examination in a non-senior subject is required, it will be given during the senior examination week—July 10-17.
 - d) Every student requiring a special examination as indicated in (c) above, must report that fact to the Dean's Office before 3:00 P.M. on July 10.
4. Senior grades will be mailed on July 22. These reports will be mailed to your home address unless the records office is notified to do otherwise. Grades are not available either from instructors or the Records Office before that date.
5. To expedite plans for graduation and avoid possible disappointments, please respond to requests for information from the Dean's Office promptly.

Although run as a second feature in Providence, here is a picture starring Steve McQueen (Star of TV's western series "Wanted")

Look for... the ex-con who while shaving is driven to hysteria by a dripping faucet... the facial expression of a bank robber as he is hit in the stomach by a point blank revolver shot. Listen for... the labored breathing of men who are trapped... the hollow sound of a tear gas bomb as it rolls down the bank steps... the last words of a suicide... the wail of police sirens... sporadic gun fire...
