Prior to 1958 the Student Senate officers were elected by votes cast by the presidents of each of the Bryant student organizations. Under the new system a campus-wide popular vote is held. The results! In the first election only 34% of the eligible students cast a vote. The total vote was 408 ballots cast, out of a possible 1200. In the election just held, only 20% of the eligible students voted. Total vote was 325 out of a possible 1600. The total votes cast decreased by 14%, while campus population increased by 25%.
