On February 22, many new students began a new experience in life. That particular day brought them to Bryant College to obtain an education. Although those first days of registration were marked with some degree of confusion in that many of the new students found themselves lost, nevertheless, the Vigilante Committee helped many of them find their way around school.

After the initial registration the new students were sent to the gymnasium to obtain books and other needed equipment. The high lights of the freshmen's trips to the gymnasium were the receiving of the beanies and name plates. These beanies were taken off at the President's Ball on Saturday, March 12.

After registration, the freshmen participated in a four-point testing program. The test, diagnostic in nature, furnished indications of the ability of the new students to do work in accounting and English, and furnished the school with important information about the interests and intelligence of each student.

The new students come from seven states and two countries: New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Rhode Island; Pakistan and Egypt. The total enrollment is 135 students. There are approximately 65 in B.A., 30 in Secretarial, and the remainder are in the Business Education division.

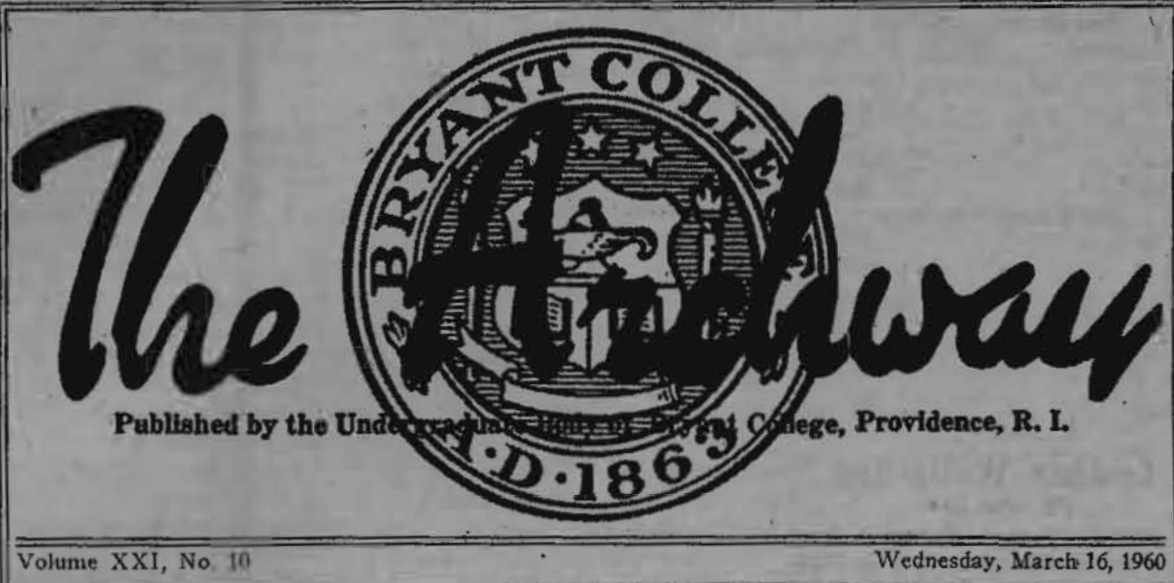

Open Letter to the Student Body

After reviewing the lack of interest in the scheduled class elections, I have made my decision on two very important facts. First, many students didn't hear the announcement concerning elections that was read in each class at 10 o'clock March 7. In all fairness to all students I think those that didn't know about the election should be given a chance to run for a class office if they wish. Second, if things were left the way they are now, there would be no real election except in the second-semester or sophomore class.

The senior class which has the most important job to do did not have a full slate in the BA Department. The senior secretarial class has a full slate, but it is unopposed.

According to the constitution of the Student Senate, there shall be a President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer for each class—Preparatory, Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior. The President shall be the representative for his class in the Student Senate; and the Vice-President or Secretary-Treasurer, his alternate. To be eligible to run for a class office, a person must place his name on a petition along with the names of thirty-five persons from his class. The petition must then be submitted to the Student Senate for approval. No person can place his name on more than one petition for the same office.

Let's all join in and make this election a big success and in so doing gain back some of the school spirit that seems to be lacking this semester. Here is a schedule of dates that all candidates should be familiar with:

Nomination papers can be picked up any time in the Student Activities Office. A group picture along with a short article (at least 75 words) about each candidate will appear in the April 1 issue of the Archway. This article should contain information about the background, experience, and objectives of each candidate. This article should be typewritten, double-spaced, and information presented in chronological order. This article must be returned to the Student Activities Office along with the Nomination Papers before 3:00 p.m., Thursday, March 24. Candidates should dress properly. Candidates will give a short speech at the assemblies on Tuesday and Thursday. Students who have already completed their nomination papers need not do so again; however, they must appear for pictures on March 24.
