SIB emerged over Kappa Delta Kappa 32-30. Along with Miss Cardarelli the SIB team was superb as they passed and scored their way to the championship.

In the first game it was a see-saw battle with SIB coming up with a 22-15 win. Ellie had 12 points and Debbie Stoutenburgh came in with 8. KDK jumped to an early lead with Jackie Tier and Jan Fontaine swishing the cords. But the second half proved a little different, as Cardarelli hit for 4 and Goodman 2.

SIB left the floor at half time leading 10 to 8. In the third quarter SIB hit for six straight points as KDK only hit for four. Cardarelli hit for 4 and Stoutenburgh for 2. Tier and Fontaine each hit for 2. Going into the fourth quarter, it was SIB—16, KDK—13.

Cardarelli hit for 4 more points in the fourth quarter and Palmisciano for 2. KDK couldn't control the boards and only hit for 2 points. Final score in the first game SIB—22, KDK—15.

In the second game KDK came alive and Jackie Tier dropped in 19 points in leading KDK to victory. This was the first time SIB had been beaten in 3 years, and the KDK team found new confidence.

It was all Jackie Tier scoring 9 points in the first half. Jan Fontaine was rebounding and dribbling as if she owned the court as she fed Miss Tier constantly.

At the end of the regulation game it was all tied up. Requiring a three-minute overtime, Jan Fontaine scored a field goal, came up with

TE Wins Again

As the second half began Billy Burch came alive and hit for jump shots all over the court but at the same time Phil Perlman spotted the hoop and the lead changed hands three or four times.

With 13 minutes to go Tau Ep really broke loose with Burch scoring 8 straight points and McAllister popping in 6. Mosca and Perlman still kept BIB's hopes alive, but Grady scored 2 more and was fouled.

Dropping in the free throws, BIB fought hard to stay alive but TE was not to be beaten. Perlman scored for BIB and brought the score down to 3 points, but TE bounced back with another 3 point play by Grady. Tony Perini thought the hoop had a lid on it as he missed 3 in a row.

Burch brought the ball down the court after McAllister rebounded and sank another 40-footer. It was just about all over and TE started to give its warriors a rest as substitutes ran in and out freely. As the final buzzer sounded it was Tau Epsilon 75, Beta Iota Beta 63.

If you were to pick out the most valuable player in the playoffs, it would have to be PHIL PERLMAN.

He averaged 23 points for the three games and did everything but bring the ball to the game.

Bill Burch was undoubtedly the individual star of the championship game, but Tom Grady came in a close second.

McAllister, Kowalczyk, Carr and Coccoli were all in their pitching as they had to be in order to win.

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The Market Outlook

The three Dow Jones averages have been steadily advancing with the industrial heading toward the 650 mark. Short interests have dropped to a three-month low of 3,700,000 shares. The short interest at the present does not give indication as to bearish or bullish action on the market. Only when the short interest approaches or exceeds the two-day average trading will a gradual advance be expected.

Unemployment and layoffs around the country will certainly not help the individual's buying power. Recessive measures are indicated by the pay cut administered by large corporations to their executives. The recession has both labor and management spurring drives in the States' capitals. In Texas, as many as 5,500 lobbyists have already signed up for the coming "season." With all the entertainment, it is a wonder our legislators can accomplish anything (?)

Gross national production reached a new high of \$503 billion in 1960, and government spending followed suit with a high of \$100 billion. The gross national product expanded some 86 billion over 1954 level, and the government spending rose 13 billion from 1954—business appears to be booming but then what is the value of the dollar today?

An interesting situation is developing for control of Allegheny Corporation (11½) between Board Chairman Kirby and John D. Murchison (oil magnate). Quite a proxy fight should develop as the stock continues soaring upward. It appears Canadian oil and gas issues are about to move. They have been experiencing dormant periods for approximately the past two years, with most issues reaching low plateaus or downside potentials. Bailey Selburn Oil & Gas (6¼) seems to be ready to move as is Baniff Oil (1) and Calgary & Edmonton (16¼). All three show good improvement on proposed production tables, and all are currently selling at under 50% of their high of two years ago.

A Debating Society at Bryant

It has been approximately five years since Bryant has had a debating society on the campus. Through efforts of interested parties, the society appears to be on its way back to the campus scene. The main objective of the organization would be to promote interest about the campus on controversial matters by means of debates.

A coach will, in all probability, be present at meetings to assist the society members in improving their debating techniques. The club intends to hold its practice debates on the campus. Opinions will then be formulated by the student body through the debates, and these opinions will be useful to the debaters for future encounters with opposing schools.

Organization of the society will take place at the beginning of the February semester, and notice will be given as to when the organizing meeting will take place.

Navy Officer Interviewing Candidates Twice Monthly

Every first and third Monday of the month, from 3 to 5 p.m., Mr. Weaver (Lieutenant, USNR,) is available in the Faculty House, Room F2, to answer questions regarding the Navy Officer Candidate Programs. Personal interviews may be arranged at any time if the time listed above is inconvenient.

The Officer Candidate Program is an active duty program designed to provide a ready and adequate reserve of qualified junior officers. It provides an opportunity for college graduates to receive a commission in the United States Naval Reserve after four months of indoctrination at the Officer Candidate Schools. Upon commissioning from Newport, there will be a

three-year tour of active duty. Upon commissioning from Pensacola, you will serve as an Ensign for 12 to 14 months in basic and advance flight training, upon completion of which you will receive your wings and be designated a Naval Aviator. You will then have a three-year-and-six-month obligation to serve on active duty as a Naval Aviator.

Applicants must be graduates of accredited colleges or universities with a baccalaureate degree, or be within nine months of receiving such a degree, or must have completed the academic work necessary to obtain such a degree which will be conferred at a later date.

Bryant College is considered an accredited college by the Navy.

Information for the Mid-Year Examination Period, 1961

- Classes end February 3.
- On the last meeting of each class all students who are excused from the final examination will be given cards evidencing this special privilege. If you do not receive an "excuse card," you must take the examination during the examination period, February 6 through 10.
- Students who have cuts in excess of 20% and those whose work is incomplete will receive cards notifying them of the fact that they are ineligible for the examination.
- Only the Dean of your department can grant you permission to take the examination if you have over 20% cuts. If you have had excessive cuts (over 20%) and have been ill or experienced other unavoidable difficulties, you may present your case in writing to the Dean who may, for cause, grant permission to take the examination.
- Final examinations will be held from February 6 through 10 according to the schedule which has been posted.
- Students with a grade of D, F, or Incompletes in Shorthand or Typewriting are required to attend Shorthand and Typewriting classes when not taking examination. Students with C averages may—it is optional with them. Students with A and B averages are not permitted to attend the Shorthand and Typewriting classes February 6, 7, and 8.
- Students with an Incomplete or failing grades in Office Machines are required to attend the special classes February 6, 7, and 8 when not taking an examination.
- Registration of "renewal" students in the Secretarial Department for the new semester will take place at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, February 21.
- Since provision will be made to give out schedules and books at the above hours it is imperative that you report at the proper time. Late arrival or failure to register on February 21 will necessitate delays and inconvenience. Please cooperate by reporting at the proper day and hour. A student who arrives after the Opening Date must also pay this Late Entrance Fee of \$5. A renewal student who arrives after the Opening Date must also pay the Late Entrance Fee of \$5.
- Classes begin at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 23, 1961.

Senate News

To bring the students up to date on the activities of the Student Senate, here is a summary of the last three meetings of the first semester.

January 9 . . . Dave Thompson submitted a report on the Island Drive in which he stated that lack of student interest and competitive spirit among the fraternities caused the poor support of this drive.

The long discussion over Bryant's membership in the National Student Association ended when it was voted that Bryant join this national organization which is rapidly expanding its membership, particularly in this Rhode Island area.

The Senators voted to hold a banquet for the Senate in January from funds provided for this purpose. It was subsequently held at the Sheraton Biltmore on Thursday, January 21.

The Senate provided President Spilecki with plenty of backing in his campaign for improvement of cafeteria policy. A number of complaints were approved to be brought to the attention of the administration. Numerous complaints made by the students were heard, debated, and voted on individually.

Bill Buchanan, new representative of the Bryant Christian Association, was introduced to the Senate.

January 16 . . . A special meeting of the Senate was held on this date. Vice President E. Gardner Jacobs outlined for the Senate his future plans for Bryant, including the expansion of the physical plant, orientation of freshmen, accreditation, and raising the academic standards.

Discussion of the Winter Formal brought out again the all too evident fact that student support is lacking in almost all phases of campus activity. As a result, purchase of a ticket was made compulsory for all the Week End's events, and a letter was sent to the Greek Letter Council requesting better coordination of their events with other scheduled campus activities. The abundance of fraternity activities scheduled for the same dates as the Winter Week End is believed, in part, responsible for the poor sale of tickets for the Winter Week End.

Mental Hygiene Clinic Offers New Services

Mr. John L. Reavey, Regional Manager, announced today that the Mental Hygiene Clinic of the Providence Veterans Administration Regional Office, located at 331 Hope Street, has added a new therapeutic program to provide progressive, many-faceted treatment to eligible veterans.

Central Office has authorized the Clinic, one of a few in the country so recognized, to begin a Day Treatment Program. With the assistance of volunteers, the staff of the Mental Hygiene Clinic is now equipped to offer Occupational Therapy, Recreational Therapy, Bibliotherapy, Music, and special vocational services to many of its patients.

The addition of this program offers specialized treatment to many veterans who are severely handicapped in effecting a satisfactory social and vocational adjustment in the community. The program has been developed in close cooperation with the staff at Veterans Administration Hospital, Brockton, Massachusetts. Patients being prepared for discharge from the hospital are referred directly to the program in many instances. The treatment philosophy of "total push" as conceived through constructive, social activities is the foundation of the program. Prescribed programs within the Center are tailored to the individual problems and resources of each patient.

A research project is being developed to evaluate the effects of this specialized treatment program offered eligible veterans on an ambulatory basis. The staff at VAH, Brockton, Massachusetts, is cooperating with the Mental Hygiene Clinic staff in this project.

Reserve Program Offers Good Future

The United States Naval Reserve Officer Candidate School offers college graduates the opportunity for continued growth and improvement while they discharge their military obligations to the nation.

The Naval Reserve Officer program is tailored to fit the needs of college graduates who are obligated to render service to the nation under Selective Service. It equips them to serve as junior officers in the Navy in many types of duties. In time of national emergency they will provide the nation with a trained pool of experienced naval leaders. Reserve Officers receive the same pay and benefits while on active duty as Officers of the Regular Navy.

The Officer Candidate School is located at Newport, Rhode Island and provides four months of training in navigation, seamanship, engineering, naval weapons, operation, and orientation. Upon completion of OCS, the candidate is commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Reserve. He then serves 3 years on active duty, followed by one year and eight months in the Ready Reserve, and one year in the standby reserve.

The commission in the Naval Reserve under this program offers the applicant the opportunity to extend and refine the education and experience acquired at college. Travel and adventure await all trainees under this program with the Navy's global commitments making the world his workshop. The Navy has many jobs at home and abroad in administration, communications, or other fields. G.I. Insurance Benefits Available In Four Ways

A World War II veteran holding National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) may choose from four options the manner in which the payment of his policy's proceeds will be made after his death.

John L. Resvey, manager, VA's Providence Regional Office, who made the announcement today, listed the four options as:

Option 1—Lump sum payment

Option 2—Equal monthly installments for 3 to 20 years, in multiples of 1 year.

Option 3—Equal monthly installments for life of beneficiary, with 120 installments guaranteed.

Option 4—Equal monthly installments for life of beneficiary; total payments guaranteed to equal face amount of policy.

Reavey pointed out that if the insured chooses Option 1, the beneficiary may elect any of the other options at time of settlement.

Reavey said Options 3 and 4 are not available if certain types of beneficiaries, such as corporations or estates are named by the policyholder.

Complete information about the optional payment method is available at the VA Regional Office, 100 Fountain Street, Providence, R. I. the VA Office, 757 Pleasant Street, New Bedford, Mass., the VA Office, 144 North Main Street, Fall River, Mass., or from the VA district office which services the policy, Reavey said.

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
