On a national level, ODK organizes fund raising activities, mediates leadership workshops for high school students and collaborates with alumni associations and other honor societies on a variety of different projects. The society strives to unite leaders on a basis of mutual interest and understanding and

create strong net-working connections across the nation. They pro-vide leadership scholarships and other awards for its members to recognize their past successes and achievements as

leaders on college campuses. Omicron Delta Kappa also holds national conferences that its members can attend to gain knowledge and experience in a variety of different fields. Bryant's own Brian Robinson, a member from the Class of 2009, recently attended the CLT2 conference in Washington D.C., otherwise known as the Campus Leaders Today, Community Leaders Tomorrow. In order for a student to be an eligible candidate for the honor society, he or she must not only be a leader in one of the five phases of campus life, but also must hold junior or senior status, fall within the top 35% of their class in academic standing and remain in good judicial standing with the university. Each candidate is nominated to submit a resume and application, which is given to all current members who then vote on the candidates.

Sunday's induction ceremony will begin at 5:00 p.m. in Janikies Theater and last until about 5:45 p.m. It will include some opening words, a brief his-

New policy tackles poor writing, prepares students

As upperclassmen returned to campus this year and as freshmen arrived for the first time, students became aware of a new policy being implemented across university classes-the Fatal Flaw Policy. This policy places new pressure on Bryant students' writ-ing abilities in ways that affect their grades. In the previous years, professors have set their own guidelines and requirements as to how grammatically correct a paper must be for it to receive a decent grade. Now, due to the F.F.P., a standard has appeared throughout our university. All professors have adopted some variation of this policy and dis-tributed it to their students with their syllabi.

lowed, it can be resubmitted with a 10% or one letter reduction to the final grade.

Most students believe that the F.F.P. is nothing but beneficial for us students. Although it adds a much greater deal of pressure in reviewing our papers knowing that there is a potentially decreased grade if these errors exist, simultaneously it is effortless to

see that our writing is improving. As Molly Briggs, 2011, says, "In every paper that I've written this year I've found fewer and fewer faults upon re-reading them. Also, knowing that there is a sanction for simply skipping over reviews of our papers certainly has motivated me to search a little bit harder for them before the paper is turned in the first time."

Although students don't necessarily disagree with the policy, they do disagree with the levels at which they are applied to various people. Dan Tothill, 2011, shares this belief. "In one of my classes, the sheet which outlined the requirements surrounding the Fatal Flaw Policy, my professor actually had two Fatal Flaws she criticizes! It's unbelievable that our professors expect us to achieve near-perfection in our writing, and then they turn around and mess up the first sheet of

and you lose 10% of it because you misplaced a comma or forgot to capitalize 'I' or something like that?" This is a valid argument: why should a pro-fessor simply stop grading the content of the paper, which was the purpose of the assignment in the first place, when the limit of three per page is exceeded? Although it makes sense that content should be

as, if not more, important than writing style (punctuation, spelling, grammar), it is also true that success beyond university in the "real world" is virtually impossible without these skills. It is unrealistic to expect that a potential employer will over-look misspellings on our resumes simply because we were involved in many activities or took great leadership control. Similarly, it's unreasonable that a senator receiving a letter begging them to consider, for example, lower speed limits in residential neighborhoods, will overlook the grammar of the letter because the point is elegantly phrased. Right now, although it's frustrating and adds time to our already-crammed schedules, editing our papers not only guarantees us the grade we deserve due to the effort put into the content, but it also ensures our ability to succeed 'out there'.

The Fatal Flaw Policy was created in order to emphasize the importance of formal and correct writing in our world today, regardless of the type of school we're in, the major we declared, or the class the writing is for. Although Bryant University is primarily a business school, or maybe because it is a business school, writing is crucial to success in any profession. Research has found that within five vears of receiving their diplomas, 85% of college graduates have changed their career field, not just their job title (source: career.kent.edu). So what if you're an accounting major right now? In 10 years, statistics show that you'll likely be in a job that you could never consider right now.

The F.F.P. covers such errors as misspelled words, fragment or run-on sentences, punctuation, and incorrect grammar. This list of common mistakes is standard in every professor's Fatal Flaw Policy. However, professors vary on how strict they choose to make the consequences of such mistakes. For example, in one management class, the policy is that any paper with more than three fatal flaws on a page, ten in an entire document, or handwritten or unprofessional papers will not be accepted. In fact, the professor will not continue reading the paper after the paper has exceeded the limit of fatal flaws. In a communications class, the rule is the same, but, if a paper surpasses the number of mistakes alpaper they had us for the semester."

Many students don't share this perspective, and that is understandable.

As Vaidehi Patel, 2011, says, "I don't think grammar is as important in the world today as maybe it once was. But aside from that, the content of the paper is what is important. What if vou've written the best paper in the class, analysis-wise,

How did you locate your internship?

I had been applying there since freshmen year – I initially learned of the internship from an email through the ICC – I kept applying each year. They remembered me each time I applied! My interview was more of a conversation then an interview; they wanted to know about me; they knew I traveled to Italy so we talked a lot about that and they made me feel really comfortable. ing my sophomore year. I was interested at the time

to be really interested in your aspect of the business. The classroom is good for preparing your foundation of concepts but it was my experience this summer that helped me learn the actual skills that will be helpful to me when looking for a job.

What were your major responsibilities?

Kim Vo

My biggest tasks occurred as a result of being down an analyst in the department I was in so I took on more responsibilities – I had cate gories (coordinates in sports teams in ladies fashion). I had to check when merchandise would hit the warehouse, then plan/allocate where I wanted the merchandise to go before it hit the warehouse. So I'd pull data when orders had been made by buyers, I planned strategy, saw what the top stores were for sales in coordinates, figured out how much would go to each store. It was frustrating sometimes because you want to make it right – you want to ensure the products





but they told me you had to be a junior so knowing that when junior year came it was the only thing I applied to. I interviewed on campus and the interviewer was really nice; then I went to TJX Headquarters for the interview – that process was long, almost a full day. They interview you the same as they would a job and the human resources people are much more serious then the first interview. It was a little nerve wracking but it could have been worse.

What did you learn about the profession?

Kim Vo

It's really different. Before I was just a consumer so I only saw what was on the floor - interning made me realize how much it takes to get merchandise to the floor, how important relationships with vendors are so that they send products on time to get it to the store on time. It was very fast paced. We were always one step ahead of everything.

Alex Turgeon

It's definitely always interesting, always changing from week to week. You deal with a lot of numbers but since it's the product you like that you're thinking about it never gets boring. You're always thinking a season in advance. I think the people who are most successful in the field are those who really, really enjoy the department they were assigned - you have will be bought. I did a lot of store visits to see how what was planned for merchandise was actually presented in the store to see if the employees followed instructions for being displayed.

At first I wasn't really sure what to expect from my internship. I was just hoping that I wouldn't be running mindless tasks for my department all day. Instead, my department made me feel as important as the other workers. The work that I accomplished on a daily basis was not tedious work to keep me busy. Rather it was problem solving and helping with projects that made an impact on my department, and in turn the company. This internship definitely exceeded my expectations because I didn't think I was going to have as much responsibility as I did. Alex Turgeon

Most people enjoy drinking an ice cold bottle of water on a hot summer day. Even more people enjoy wearing that same bottle on a chilly fall day. You see, plastic bottles are made from a resin called polyethylene terephthalate (PET). Some clothing companies are now utilizing a new polyester fiber in their products known as EcoSpun, which is made from recycled PET. This fiber is being used in all sorts of products, including handbags, car-pets, blankets, socks, and the Polartec fleece we all love so much when the cold weather comes along.

Alternative materials are increasing in popular-ity when it comes to clothing and shoes. Chaco makes many of their products out of organic cotton. They even use bamboo in their t-shirts! IPATH specializes in using alternative materials in their shoes such as hemp, organic cotton, and co-conut husk.

When you support companies that utilize alternative materials, you help preserve the earth's

natural resources. For instance, buying fleece made from EcoSpun helps keep over 3 million plastic bottles out of landfills each year. This in turn saves over a half million barrels of oil and eliminates 400,000 tons of harmful air emissions

Growers of conventional cotton use unbelievable amounts of chemicals and pesticides; 20,000 deaths occur around the world each year from pesticide poisoning. It takes ³/₄ of a pound of chemicals to produce enough cotton for those jeans you are wearing right

now. Organic cotton completely eliminates the use of these chemicals and by doing so increases the sustainability of the land that the crop is grown on. There is no chance of harmful pesticides seeping into the water supply or depleting the health of the workers that pick the cotton. Check out some organic clothing and shoes at Christine M. Hayden Ĉhacousa.com, IPATH.com, and Polartec.com. Look good, stay warm, and recycle those bottles.

Be a greener student! - Reduce the amount of paper, plastic, and Styrofoam waste by buying reusable plates and utensils. This applies especially to freshman and seniors who have access to dishwashers! Make sure they are filled to capacity before running them.



The CDC announced today that Herpes Simplex 1, a common virus among college age students, has risen 230% since 2007. This number reflects reported cases; there could be many more cases. These numbers are blamed on the sharing of cups in such ways as the "beer pong game", shared water bottles, or pass the cup traditions among college students. Other concerns we have been aware of such as slipping unknown substances into cups or the spread of viruses, and mono are still a worry. Now you have this other reason Herpes Simplex 1.

Herpes Simplex is a virus that enters the body through a break in the skin around your lips or mouth. The first symptoms may be tingling, itching, burning or pain to the lip. Then redness, swelling and tiny blisters develop in a cluster. The blisters may break, allowing a clear fluid to leak then scab over. Thus the cold sore you are familiar with. This process may last up to two weeks. This virus remains in your body and may cause recurrent outbreaks. Numerous outbreaks may warrant a pill to prevent outbreaks. The virus can be spread. You can spread this to other areas of your body or to others if they come into contact with the infected fluid from the lesion.

Study Abroad Spotlight: Reilly Flaherty '09

Name: Reilly Flaherty Class of 2009 University: University of Otago Location: Dunedin, New Zealand Partner: Arcadia Semester abroad: Spring 2008 Duration: Early February- Late June

Reason for going: Why spend your entire college experience at just one university when you have the opportunity to spend a semester at another university anywhere in the world you choose?

Best Experience: I don't have one in particular. In the five or so months I was abroad I met the most amazing people from all over the world, each with much different backgrounds and ways of looking at the world. These people all changed me in their own way and opened my eyes to things I had been missing. I guess things like traveling and backpacking through the unrivaled natural beauty of New Zealand every weekend, seeing the very famous and culturally important Maori war dance the "Haka" performed live, scuba diving the Great Barrier Reef in Australia, and basking in the tropics of Samoa were all decent as well.

Funny Cultural Experience: Before heading back to the U.S I flew to the small Polynesian island of Samoa for a few days. One of the days I met an American guy who was in the Peace Corps there doing volunteer work. He invited me to spend a few

days living with him and his Samoan host family in a traditional village where there was no running water, television, or modern amenities. The day I arrived I was getting a tour of the village and teenage girls kept coming up to me and asking if I would go for a walk with them later. I had no idea at the time but apparently it is a big deal to go on a walk with a girl in a Samoan village because they expect you to propose soon afterward. My friend in the Peace Corps told me it was a good thing I was leaving the next day.

The school couldn't be more different. The campus was much larger but still manageable and defined at the same time. The architecture was very traditional and beautiful Victorian style buildings, the lively city of Dunedin was a 5 minute walk, 23,000 students attend the university, most classes are in lecture halls, there was an astounding international student body, and there was a sweet jazz bar on campus. Also, many students there live in "colleges," our



equivalent to resident halls. The difference is that most students get accepted to the actual university, it is the various colleges that are competitive to get into. The colleges have their own dining halls, they host parties for the students who live there, and are extremely competitive with the other colleges. In addition, it isn't uncommon to hear Kiwi's (New Zealanders) complain about their \$3,000 debt after they leave school. If they only knew how expensive higher education in America is and how little our government helps students pay for it.

For me, going abroad enabled me to step outside of every aspect of my life back at home and forced me to draw comparisons and gain valuable insights that will shape my character forever.

Would you study abroad again? Studying abroad should be mandatory.

duties but that was not the case. I was given much more responsibility than I thought I would get. My biggest job was to analyze sales and then ship the sweaters according to their performance.

As an intern they gave me my own category (I worked in the Ladies Sportswear department for TJMaxx and was given my own category, fine gauge sweaters) and I had to pull information on how well it was doing, its sales, and how it was doing in certain zones of the country and then notice any trends – was it selling better or quicker with a certain group of people by pulling demographics. That was a typical Monday – pulling the info and analyzing it. On Tuesdays you'd provide all your information and describe how you planned on shipping the merchandise out to the stores according to what you found and you'd be told if it was a good idea or not. You'd make decisions on whether you should hold merchandise at the distribution center or ship to the stores. The rest of the week would be assisting the analysts with Excel sheets of selling and merchandise information based on past sales. Sometimes I would go on store visits to see what was out on the floor, how did certain stores look. If it was a top selling store then what was on display would be treated differently then at other to at first. Once you got by all that though it was fine. They were all really, really helpful and understood I had no background and knew nothing yet. Sometimes it was intimidating talking to management as an intern, but I had to. For example, If the customer isn't responding to a certain style shirt or competition doesn't have that style in their mix, the analysts need to report that to the buyer so they will no longer purchase that style. TJX encourages their analysts to work hand in hand with their supervisors and buyers.

What did you find most rewarding about your internship?

Tying into going to the store and seeing your prod-uct in the store and that you were the person that picked that store to carry that merchandise, then going back a week or so later and see that it's gone or been shopped. The knowledge I've gained – I knew a little about off price retail but the whole experience taught me so much more and I was lucky to get chosen and participate in what the company does. All of my on the job training is something that I would never learn in textbooks. But the most important is how to build relationships and maintain them. Communication and relationships with those you work with are vital. I was able to identify a role model during my internship. She was the one who took me in and trained me on everything I needed to know. She was a great teacher because she wouldn't just ramble on, rather she would ask me questions to see if I could make reasoning to why I was doing what I was doing. She was a very good listener...always asking what I wanted to gain from this internship and helped to make it happen. The one behavior that I did not want to emulate is that she always seemed frantic! It was only because she had so much on her plate and she wanted every task to be delivered perfectly.

contacts are great. Getting your foot in the door is a great opportunity to start making contacts. My supervisor also told me that the internship is for your own personal benefit, not the company's, so really use your resources and take advantage of the opportuni ties while you have them.

I have always been involved and speak my mind but in a corporate setting I held myself back a lot which is not good for moving up in the career path because when you do that you're blocking yourself off from doing your job to the full potential and you're presenting yourself to be not as great worker as you could be. I grew as a person because I never realized I would be so quiet – I learned I need to take initiative and speak out – which I'm like in everyday life but when I'm put in a new environment I do get hesitant. I've learned from what my supervisor told me and grew from it – just because you're new that doesn't mean you hold - back you give it your all. ASK QUESTIONS! Never be afraid to ask questions or think that any question is a silly question. This was the biggest thing that I learned in this internship.

I don't know exactly what I want to do now but I'm very glad I did this because it was a great experience; I learned a lot in the corporate world, it's a great opportunity for a college student to have, and I can say I walked away with a lot more knowledge of the working world then I had before.

A discussion of the financial crisis with insight from the last week's financial symposium

With the Dow Jones Industrial Average spiking 936 points on Monday, following a week of historic losses on the New York Stock Exchange (NYSE), it is easy to speculate whether or not the worst of the financial crisis is behind us; yet for many, the financial crisis continues to prove arduous. While the volatility of the stock market has served as an excellent barometer for our confidence in the global financial system, it does not act as an appropriate measure for our country's current economic state of affairs.

Though retirement accounts and IRAs may find themselves rebounding through short-term movements in the marketplace, many things about our society, economy, and way of life have changed as a result of the financial crisis. As Time magazine put it in the cover of their October 13th issue, we are now and will be experiencing a series of "New Hard Times". As consumers find credit increasingly difficult to come by, the collateral backing mortgages – their houses – have begun to depreciate. The belief that property will forever create equity for homeowners has unraveled, subsequently making the "American Dream" harder to achieve. Americans have overextended and overleveraged themselves using precarious financial products created by Wall Street. Investors blindly bought into this system under the impression that such investments were triple-A and secure.

Now the bubble has burst. After many years of growth and economic prosperity, we've lost the light at the end of the tunnel. With no light in sight, we lost our confidence, and turned to those who help instigate some of the chaos employed by Wall Street – the government. Deregulation allowed many investment banks, hedge funds, and individuals with large pools of capital to overexpose themselves to risk while stimulating the progression of structured finance.

What we now have is a \$700 billion "bailout"

Credit Craze: Brokerage Accounts 101

What you should know before you invest

As someone just starting out in the world of investing, I felt pretty lost amid all the technical terms and financial savvy that comes in the fast paced world of finance. I asked a friend for some help and he said that as a beginner, you've got to start with the basics, Investing 101 if you will. Those basics come in the form of a brokerage account, allowing you to purchase stocks and bonds, thereby building your portfolio as an in-vestor. These accounts are available through broker firms such as TD Waterhouse, Ameritrade, and Charles Schwab. In order to open one of these accounts, you first have to apply for them either online or mail in an application with a check equaling the amount of a minimum deposit, usually ranging from \$500 to \$1,000. On the other hand, E*Trade offers "starter brokerage accounts" that simply require a minimum initial investment of \$50, which may prove to be more reasonable for young investors. Once your account is opened, you use your money to purchase stocks, bonds, and mutual funds. Most brokerage accounts also allow the investor to short sell, hedge, and or simply invest in IPO's and common stock. Over time, these purchases you make through your brokerage account accumulate in terms of wealth, paying you dividends; however these variable markets may prove to reduce your initial investment as well. All in all, it is a gamble and all depends on your research and knowledge of investing. Brokerage firms are split into two categories; those being traditional brokerages and discount brokerages. The traditional types offer a full range of services where professional money managers offer advice as to where you should put your money; in exchange for their full service, you have to pay a high commission fee. Discount firms are less expensive in terms of commission, but they offer no advice; leaving the investor to make their own financial decisions. Ultimately whether you qualify to receive the full range of services provided from the brokerage company depends on the size of your investments. All in all, brokerage accounts are about as simple as it gets to the first time investor. It's a great way to get your feet wet, maybe accumulate a little money, and gain some experience in investing and the financial world.

package passed by Congress nearly three weeks ago to help our economy regain confidence (and capital) during these pressing times. The bailout, more formally known as the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 (EESA), adds to what is already years of unrestrained spending and debt accumulation, bringing our national debt to somewhere above \$10 trillion.

Originally, the rescue plan allowed the government to purchase illiquid assets from troubled financial firms using a price discovery mechanism known as reverse auctions. Doubts over the effectiveness of reverse auctions have caused many to question whether or not the government would be able to purchase assets for "pennies on the dollar". Many of the bad level 3 assets held by banks are highly complex and difficult to value, making it difficult to determine if the government will be paying a fair price for the securities.

However, this week the Treasury has released details about a more comprehensive financial rescue program, focused on spending \$250 billion of EESA's funds by taking equity stakes in U.S. banks. By recapitalizing banks, the Treasury believes these institutions will have the funds available to begin their normal financing activities. This new course of action follows developments over the weekend by many European banks, which have felt the effects of this global credit crunch as well.

Still, the Treasury plan leaves opportunities for the government to deal with bank assets on a caseby-case basis. At this point, measuring success is more about minimizing the final cost to taxpayers. According to *The Economist*, the average financial crisis costs approximately 16% of GDP. At face value, the EESA plan currently measures 6%. But do not be swayed into thinking we are better off this time; many of the indirect costs associated with the current credit crunch have yet to be determined and the extent to which taxpayers will be impacted continues to lie in the now ever-more-powerful hands of Treasury.

On October 6th, Bryant professors M. Cary Collins and Peter Nigro presented their research and expertise at the finance symposium. The discussion included some key points about how our economy has arrived to the state it is in today. Firstly, over time, the mortgage lending industry had abandoned their basic fundamentals of loan origination. Many loans were issued with little or no borrower background investigation work prepared. For example, during the symposium Professor Nigro referred to a type of mortgage called "NINJA" loans, which gave credit to those with no income, job, or assets. Even worse, many of these mortgages coupled the required down payment into a secondary loan known as a "piggyback". Instead of banks and lenders assuming the risks of such loans, they would sell them to institutions like Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, among others, and receive payment for "securitizing" the debt of borrowers.

The process of securitization packages loans into financial instruments for which investors can buy into, thus spreading risk across the marketplace. As one may guess, securitization is a technically lucrative process, making it difficult for investors to understand the risks involved. Subprime loans became the perfect constituents for such collateralized debt obligations. Between 2000 and 2006, subprime loan origination grew at a compounded annual growth rate of 37%. Professor Collins believes that the complexity of our financial system has been, in part, responsible for the subprime revolution. To prevent such crises from occurring again, he suggests we must become more simplified in our investment methods.

As Professor Nigro pointed out at the symposium, over time the Fed has become better at reducing the longevity of recessions. But this is a different problem, one with unprecedented challenges and complicated, untested strategies. And even with government intervention aside, the outcome of this crisis has affected all Americans. The credit flexibility and spending habits we have become so accustomed to has vanished overnight, changing the way we pay for college, automobiles, and homes for the unforeseeable future.

The Financial Crisis: Who's to blame? Credit rating agencies are, along with several other parties, a major contributor to the subprime fallout plaguing our economy today. snail mail, which saves you time and money.




of four titles in 2000. The Yankees run

started in the mid 90s when they were able to develop some of their own draft picks to be the foundation of their franchise (Derek Jeter, Bernie Williams, Mariano Rivera, Jorge Posada) Yes they spent a lot of money but they also had plenty of role players and overachievers who always seemed to come through in the clutch and made those championships possible (Paul O'Neil, Tino Martinez, Scott Brosius, Andy Pettite, Mike Stanton, Joe Girardi). But the Yankees were rolling in dough and suddenly those players weren't good enough for them. They began signing

more mercenaries (Jason Ask the Yankees whether dynasties can Giambi, Johnny Damon, last forever. Gary Sheffield, Jeff Weaver, Carl Pavano,

Bobby Abreu and Alex Rodriguez). Many of the signings you couldn't argue with because, on paper, many of them had All-Star caliber stats that dwarfed those of their predecessors. 



Making Marriage Equal

The total has now reached three. It is not enough, but it is continuing a saga that started with Massachusetts over four years ago. In this generation's equivalent of the civil rights movement there has been, and will continue to be, much hostility towards same sex couples who wish to become married. Once again, like many instances in this nation's past, we are arguing over the ruling of what is "equality". We live in a country where at one point gender was the question of equality, then race, and now sexual orientation becomes the third in a long line of reforms that have tested the will and strength of those who are considered the minority. Who a person is should not be a factor of how they live their life. Marriage is a right, and whether you are gay or straight that right should not be jeopardized.

I hear people claiming that marriage is a "sacred institution that is meant for a man and a woman only". Well that is a farce; if it was sacred we would not have a fifty percent divorce rate and shotgun marriages in Las Vegas. We have learned this since grade school. This precedent is most commonly referred to as Brown V the Board of Education. Although education and marriage differ widely, the suppression of individuals from having the same quality as the majority represents bigotry. It is a social injustice that contradicts the constitutional notion of equality. So even though same sex couples have civil unions in some states that does not take away from the fact that those unions do not have the same sanctity and meaning of marriage.

Conversely, there are dissenting opinions that show how ignorance is blind-ing the sight of others. Justice Peter T. Zarella wrote in his opinion that "The ancient definition of marriage as the union of one man and one woman has its basis in biology, not bigotry". My response to Justice Zarella is it is not your job to assess the definition and meaning of marriage, your job in this case was to assess whether a civil union was inherently equal to marriage despite the fact that the separation was meant to create inequality. Biology is not an excuse for deter-mining people's equality. The Americans with Disabilities Act proves such a point. Simply because a person's biology is different does not mean that they are not afforded the same rights as others. As a country we cannot continue a march of prejudice over gay pride marches everywhere. As a country we question the morality of same sex marriages, but why? Why is someone living the life that they were born to live, or chose to live an immoral act? Is it really so far beyond society to accept differences based upon who a person chooses to spend their life with and sleep with on a nightly basis? We all share this small planet, we are all people, yet through thousands of years of trial we cannot agree that as people on this planet our differences are meaningless when compared to the fact that we are all humans; a trait that no matter your religion, color, ethnicity, sexual orientation, etc., can be taken away. 
Motherly and fatherly preaching is not

And an agent known and hated by all has just killed himself. Think of this as "Three Movies and a Funeral."





Eric Clapton may be best known as a guitarist from the 1960s, but he is still an influential artist in today's music industry. Clapton has lived a storied past that may interest guitar aficionados from all styles of music.

Clapton's autobiography details his per-

sonal life and relations along with an in depth account of his personal journey thus far as a musician for all ages. Eric Patrick Clapton

was born on March 30, 1945 in Surrey, England. His parents were Patricia Clapton and Edward Fryer. Clapton, who grew up with his grand-parents, thought Patricia (his mother) was his sister until he was nine years old. He relates how he was traumatized when he found out his true parentage.

On his thirteenth birthday, Clapton re-ceived his first acoustic guitar. Through dedicated practice and determination the self taught guitar virtuoso has become an acclaimed member of several bands with the in-fluence of Rhythm and Blues as well as Rock.

Clapton later earned the nickname "Slow Hand" because he played his guitar so fiercely that the strings would break during his con-



certs. Clapton would then proceed to change the strings as the crowd clapped slowly. He was also given adulation by graffiti artists in a London subway where they wrote "Clapton is God". A book reviewer quoted Clapton, referring to the aforementioned accolade, saying Clapton was ambivalent about the phrase but then added "it was really quite nice". Clapton's muse for some of his most com-

mercially famous songs was model Patti Boyd, his now ex-wife. In the 1970s, he wrote "Layla", "Wonderful Tonight", and "Bell Bottom Blues" for Boyd.




