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## Gambling Update

While Bryant students were flocking to Cancun and Daytona last week, the investigation into the gambling ring that was allegedly masterminded by former Bryant senior Matthew Zimmerman continued.

As far as campus activity is concerned, the gambling ring story quieted down while the students were away on Spring Break. Although the pace is less frantic than it was when the story first broke, the State Police have resumed interviews with students this week, according to Jack Oldham, the Associate Vice President for External Relations.

Oldham also indicated that Dr. Walter B. Roettger, Executive Vice President/Provost, was scheduled to give the faculty and staff an update on the gambling story when he met with them yesterday.

Oldham said the college's investigation is two-fold. A six member task force, headed by President Emeritus Dr. William T. O'Hara, was appointed to study the problem of gambling on campus. The task force has held several meetings and "hopes to hear from students now that they're back from break," said Oldham.

The other part of the investigation is headed by F.J. Talley, Dean of Student Life. Oldham indicated the focus of Talley's study is "the investigation of possible violations of student disciplinary codes."

Although there were few students following the news over Spring Break, the media continued to cover the controversy extensively.

WJAR-Channel 12 released the names of five Bryant basketball

players, who have been implicated in the gambling investigation, on the March 5th news. They also indicated there was a sixth player involved, but did not give his name. The news report did not mention the source of the names.

Bill Reynolds penned a column in the March 5th edition of *The Providence Journal* that attacked Bryant President William E. Trueheart in "an open letter" for his response to the scandal. "...and with all due respect," wrote Reynolds, "I'm having a few problems with the way you're handling it."

Two days later, Trueheart's reaction was published by sports writer Kevin McNamara in *The Providence Journal*. In that interview, Trueheart explained, "We first started warning our students about the problems associated with gambling more than two years ago, so it hurts even more that it happened, but it's good that we already had our (warning) program in place."

In a later issue of *The Journal*, McNamara and Reynolds co-wrote an article about Trueheart's meeting with the state police "for the first time...to map out guidelines for Bryant's cooperation with the investigation of the case."

On Sunday, March 8, Channel 12 aired a *Newsmakers Program* on the topic of gambling. The show, hosted by Jack White, discussed the college gambling ring and its relation to the larger community. State Police Detective Commander, Capt. Brian Andrews, Marianne Sorantino, a talk show host on 63 WPRO AM, and Bill Reynolds, a sports columnist for *The Providence Journal* were guests on the show.

## Two Halls Held from Sign-ups

Several changes have been made to this year's housing sign-up process, which is slated to begin on March 25.

According to Director of Residence Life Bob Sloss, there are three major changes that students should be aware of when deciding on their roommates before the sign-up process gets underway.

Hall 6 will not be a housing option this year. The returning residents of that building, who are primarily sorority members, will be moved to Hall 3, which was closed this year. Hall 3 will be made into a co-ed "Greek" building as the sororities from Hall 6 will be joined by Delta Chi and Phi Kappa Tau, two fraternities that are not currently housed with the other fraternities in Halls 1 and 2.

Sloss noted that the move to Hall 3 will consolidate the Greeks into a corner of the dormitory village.

Because the projected number of residents was low for this year, Hall 3 was held from housing sign-ups and eventually closed for the year. "The primary purpose of shutting

down Hall 3 was the cost savings generated by consolidating the vacancies," said Sloss. He noted that the college saved a considerable amount by eliminating the cleaning and residence assistants staffs and utilities costs by closing one residence building.

Next year, Hall 6 will be used to accommodate the need for administrative offices. The bottom floor of that building currently houses the offices of Residence Life, Project Venture, the President Emeritus and Family Business Enterprises, and the residence of the campus chaplain.

The second major change is that Hall 8 will be held from housing sign-ups. The decision to close a hall was made primarily as a cost saving measure based on the large number of vacancies this semester and projected figures for next year.

Hall 8 was chosen because it has the least number of returning students projected. Therefore, the fewest students possible will be disrupted in their squatting rights.

Sloss indicated that the disrupted residents of Hall 8 will be given some form of priority to after other squatters, but before the general

housing lottery.

Sloss also said that by holding the hall from sign-ups, they have not completely ruled out re-opening the hall. "If we need the beds we'll open it back up," he said. "It all depends on the number of new incoming students."

The other major change in housing sign ups concerns suite requests. Instead of being based solely on a total SCN for the group of students, the groups will go into the lottery based primarily on the number of students in that group. For example, all groups of six students will go into the lottery on one night. That lottery will then be based on SCN totals. The groups of five students or less will be held on other nights, and their lotteries will then be based on SCN numbers.

According to Sloss this system was changed to encourage people to fill their suites themselves. This will reduce the number of groups of six that have to be broken up because suites were already filled by smaller groups with greater SCN totals. This allows students to choose all of their roommates, instead of having people assigned to fill the vacancies within each suite.

## Vandalism Continues to be a Problem

The vandalization of property and equipment on campus is not only expensive, but in many cases it is a felony as well. If a person is arrested, they will have to face the consequences of having a felony conviction on their record. This may in turn cause problems with employment.

The widespread vandalism on campus not only detracts from the school's image, but it also causes an increase in tuition and the loss of room deposits. Students who are not even involved in such activities are paying heavily for the maliciousness of others. Residence Life sends stacks of work orders to the Physical Plant each week. Edward Richard, an engineer from the Physical Plant said, "We do our best to bill the person responsible in order to be fair to the rest of the student community."

Certain areas in the suites and townhouses have higher rates of damage. Just recently, a stop sign was dug out of the ground in front of dorm 16. Two students were caught carrying it around campus. There are also reports of stolen fire extinguishers and extinguishers that have been discharged.

These are just some of the incidents which have occurred on campus. Other incidents include the continuous tampering of fire alarms and related fire equipment. Since

March of last year, there have been 180 fire alarms, 48 of which were said to be "malicious."

John Raddigan, Fire and Safety Coordinator, remarked that the signs and extinguishers are for protection and are not toys. He adds, "My job is to enhance student awareness."

One way to enhance awareness has been to hang posters as constant reminders. The stated warnings on the posters are as follows: "Every person who unlawfully and without just cause willfully or knowingly, tampers with, interferes with or in any way impairs any public fire alarm apparatus, wire or associated equipment, shall be guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one thousand (\$1,000) nor more than five thousand (\$5,000) dollars or shall be imprisoned for not less than one (1) nor more than five (5) years, or both."

Associated equipment includes: pull stations, smoke detectors, heat detectors, horns & flashers, fire extinguishers, and exit signs.

These alarms and equipment serve as precautionary devices in preventing any sort of a catastrophe.

Richard says, "My biggest concern is for everyone's safety." Bob Sloss, Director of Residence Life adds, "To play around with something that could jeopardize someone's life...it's a sad thing that someone smart enough to be at Bryant and a soon-to-be professional would find that amusing."

Vandalism is a serious matter and is quite costly. Reporting any vandalism that you may witness is one way to prevent paying for damage that you did not cause. All calls will remain anonymous.

## Will Electric Boat Survive?

In what is seen as a window into the next decade, a government panel affirmed the Pentagon's decision to award the Seawolf contract to Electric Boat.

The board was formed when Tenneco Inc.(VA), Electric Boat's main competitor, protested the awarding of the Seawolf contract to Electric Boat last month.

Unfortunately, the plans for the second Seawolf have been all but scrapped, given the opposition to the \$1.7 Billion dollar price tag of the submarines in a peacetime economy.

In place of the Seawolf, the Pentagon is now considering the production of a smaller, more advanced Los Angeles class submarine.

Congress is expected to approve this plan, even though it will be seised with heavy lobbying from states like Rhode Island which depend on the jobs at these mili-

tary plants.

Although the Navy doesn't need any new submarines right now, this plan was proposed by the Pentagon in order to insure that the skills, equipment, and technology related to submarine building will stay current and progress into the next century.

This affirmation by the panel became especially important when the Pentagon suggested that it might not have enough work to keep both shipyards open. The Navy stated in a recent report to its top acquisition official that it is looking at "consolidating submarine design and support...under one contractor."

The combination of this report and the recent ruling by the panel make it likely that, if the Pentagon chooses this path, Electric Boat will be the surviving shipyard.

A spokesman from the Navy said that these issues are still being discussed and that the Navy had not yet come to a final decision on any of these matters.

The campus has been abuzz for the last few weeks about various issues. The exposure of a gambling ring centered around a now-former Bryant student has obviously been the most discussed concern.

In the wake of the media coverage of this story, it came to our attention *The Archway* was experiencing a potential identity crisis. Of course we know who we are! The problem is that you had no way of knowing who we are.

The problem first came to light when the administration held a press conference to discuss the latest gambling news. As part of the media, *The Archway* was invited to attend this conference, but it was just that: a conference, not an open meeting for students. Three members of *The Archway* staff were authorized to attend the press conference. However, there were several more students at the conference, some of them claiming to be from *The Archway*.

This is something that should definitely concern the administration. When they hold a press conference, it is intended for the press, not the student body. *The Archway* is allowed to attend these events because it is part of the press, not just nosey students.

The whole concept of immediate access to information by the administration is threatened when anyone can walk into one of these events. As a result, *Archway* reporters and photographers will soon be carrying special press identification, thanks to the cooperation of the Office of Public Safety. Chief George Coronado and Ginny Bowry have agreed to work with the staff on a specially designed press badge.

*The Archway* Identification Card will bear a striking resemblance to the ordinary Bryant student ID. It will not, however, list the staff member's social security number. Instead it will be clearly marked "The Archway ... Photographer/Reporter." There will also be a special yellow "Press" tag embossed on the back.

All *Archway* reporters and photographers will carry this press identification with them when covering events. If someone shows up to cover an important event, please ask them to show their "press pass." You may ask to see their regular Bryant ID as a back up picture.

You may need it necessary to ask for identification when a staff member comes to take pictures of your organization's event or cover a regular story.

However, if the information should be handled carefully, please make sure that the person is who they say they are...an *Archway* staff member.



# Careers In Sports

Approximately 100 students attended the discussion of opportunities in the sports field presented by the panelists of Careers in Sports, on Monday, March 2, in the Galski Dining Room.

The panelists included both professionals in the Sports field, as well as letters from Bryant Alumnae who are actively working in the field.

Bryant's own Director of Sports Information, John Gillooly, sat on the panel and moderated the evening.

The first panelist to speak was Mark Stenning, the Director, Newport Operations, International Tennis Hall of Fame, in Newport, RI. Stenning, graduated from Rhode Island College with a degree in Psychology and had "no idea" of what he wanted to do after graduation. He then got involved in the sports field by working for a sports promoter distributing flyers. He then worked tournaments at the Hall of Fame for five years.

Last year, Stenning became the director of the Hall of Fame and said he has "fun every minute."

Bob Chassey, from the Institute for International Sport at the University of Rhode Island was also on the panel. Before graduating from Providence College in 1985, Chassey spent his junior year in Switzerland. After graduation, he worked in sales for a year and then started at the Institute in 1986. He then knew he had an interest in sports, specifically the international aspect.

Chassey received his Masters in International Sports Management. He said he liked being "behind the scenes so you can see the dirty work that goes on." He was also quick to add "it is not a glamorous job and it doesn't pay well. You have to put yourself to the grindstone."

Will Tsonds was the catcher for the Bryant baseball team during his time here. While an undergraduate, he applied to, and was accepted, by the Pawtucket Red Sox for an internship.

While he was an intern, he stated

he learned "top to bottom how a business works." The internship was for an entire year. During the off-season, he handled ad sales for broadcasting rights to the games and also sold billboard space and dealt with ticket sales.

Once the season started, Tsonds stated, he was involved in stadium operations, ranging from both pre-game and post-game concessions, and clean-up after the games. He also worked the "Banquet Circuit" and realized how important the teams' appearance to the public was.

Tsonds stated the internship was very "hands-on" and he made a great number of contacts through his efforts. He also said there was no glamour in the job, and many nights, he would sleep in the on the clubhouse floor due to late nights and early games the following day.

Tsonds left the organization due to "philosophical differences" and went to work for Fleet Bank in their Auditing Department.

Gillooly then read excerpts from letters from Bryant graduates who had gone into the Sports field. Jennifer Proud Means, '82, is now the Vice President at the Sports Partners International in New York City. This is not however her first position in the sports field.

Means did an internship at Madison Square Garden in New York City where she was involved in Public Relations. She worked with the ice shows at the Garden, gymnastic meets, and tennis events, which helped her land her next job as the Public Relations Director for

Men's Tennis, where she served as the media liaison on tennis tours. She eventually left the tennis tour and traveled with Ivan Lendl since she knew how to effectively handle the media.

Gillooly then discussed options current Bryant students had at their disposal. He emphasized the importance of experience on a resume, although most positions at this level are non-paying internships and volunteer. He stressed good communication skills are a necessity and suggested involvement in *The Archway* staff to gain experience.

Mark Stenning then spoke and told the students "things are tough but don't be scared." He also said "you needed something besides a 3.9 cum to make it in the sports field. You need actual, practical experience."

Bob Chassey suggested inquiring to associations to see what was

available in the individual associations.

Gillooly was quick to point out a willingness to travel and relocate would open up more doors than staying local. He said he didn't hate going to work, but it was "seldom a 9-5 job. There are times when you will have to work weekends and nights, and when you have a family, it will be something you will all have to adjust to."

He mentioned there were many people who started out in the business but then left because they couldn't stand the "crazy hours."

The panel as a whole stressed the importance of experience and the ability to communicate with people. Chassey suggested the best way to find out information is to volunteer, and intern "to find out what it's all about." He also said it was a great field, but "you had to work hard to get places."

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
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## Juice for Thought

about three to four days after drinking - even though it makes depression disappear for about four hours immediately after drinking.

Alcohol causes anxiety. Although it is an almost universally effective anxiety reducer for about four to six hours after you drink it, alcohol actually increases anxiety for about three to four days after drinking.

Since most people are unaware of this, they may again use alcohol, in an attempt to reduce the increased stress caused by their previous drinking. Each time this happens, the anxiety level increases, but is always related to drinking.

Alcohol is a lousy aphrodisiac. Because alcohol distorts our judgement, we may have sex with someone about whom we may later have regrets... or under the influence of alcohol, we may forget about birth control and risk and unwanted pregnancy.

with people you would not choose as partners if you had not been drinking? been unable to remember what happened "the night before"? been unable to perform sexually, or to enjoy sex, after drinking? In these and other ways alcohol can actually reduce or destroy our ability to experience the full pleasure of sex.

## A Visit From an Author

Free lance author Marianne Verges remembered what was on her mind when she decided to sit in on a reunion of World War Two W.A.S.P.s, (Women Air Force Service Pilots), in Oklahoma City that cold December day in 1985.

"I knew a little," she recalls "enough to write a feature story." She had to hear a few more stories and details, write, and send her feature to an interested publisher. By the time she was through with the project, six years later, she had writ-

ten *On Silver Wings*, a best selling history of Women in the Air Force in the 1940's.

Verges was on campus two weeks ago as a guest in Professor Judy Litoff's honors History course. She said her biggest problem writing this book was deciding which stories to put in, and which to leave out. There were so many stories about these extraordinary women she wanted the whole world to know.

Her book is a detailed account of these women's lives in time of war. "These were young girls. They had really no idea about what was going

on," said Verges. The author also told the class that most of these women followed normal civilian lives after returning home, with a few exceptions of the women who stayed active in the Air Force.

Mrs. Nancy Samuels, a guest in the class, collaborated with stories about WASPS, and an album with old Air Force pictures, including some of the women who died in service, and the planes they flew during the time of the war.

To the people in the class, the enthusiasm Verges, Litoff, and Samuels talked with, was a key factor in making this class an overly interesting one.

Since Professor Litoff is a renowned author, having another au-

thor talking on such an interesting subject made it more exciting.

After the class students gathered around the author so she could autograph their books, and ask any questions they had about it.

*On Silver Wings* is a required reading in the course.

One student was heard commenting, "These women changed history, I'm glad people are finally taking notice of the role women played in World War II."

Last year's program was a huge success and Eric Duffy, a 1991


Bryant student who attended the program, became so interested in the rewarding experience he applied to become a volunteer and was accepted.

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
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## Sophomore Candidates



Burke was later appointed to the head coach position at Bryant starting with the 1991-92 season. Burke describes this season as Holly's "best season."

Grinnell is the senior power forward for the

Lady Indians Basketball Team. She transferred into Bryant full-time as a second semester Freshman, in 1989, after a fall semester of night school.

This year, she averaged 19 points and eight rebounds every game. She was the team's leading scorer this season, as well as the past two seasons.

Grinnell accomplished these outstanding statistics despite the occurrence of an aggravating knee injury that happened during a practice in November.

"I thought when my knee injury happened that it was going to be the end of my career, but I'm very proud of myself for not giving up and dealing with playing injured," stated Grinnell.

Holly had a successful high school career. In her senior year, Foxboro High came in second in the state to Wakefield. Grinnell says she will always remember the trip to the state finals that year.

"I'll never forget playing in the Boston Garden for the finals, and how heartbroken I was when we lost after we had come so far."

Grinnell started playing basketball in the fifth grade "because my older brothers played. I'd play against them or in a pick-up game down at the playground."

Grinnell never went to summer basketball camps during high school.

Her only formal training she received was from her high school coach. The rest was learned from playground pick-up games.

She looks back on her years at Bryant as being a learning experience.

"I learned that having to work so hard for each win made me realize that things aren't going to come so easy to me as they did in high school."

Grinnell has future plans to finish her work at Bryant, and then further her education as in an undergraduate pre-med program and become a doctor.

No matter what her profession ends up to be, she has earned her place in the Bryant record books.


The team is batting .345 with five
