

New Mascot Elections This Week

The Bryant Community will make a historic decision for the College next week when it chooses a new mascot for its athletic teams.

The mascot choices were narrowed down to eight including: Badgers, Bengals, Breakers, Hurricanes, Bearcats, Bobcats, Bulldogs and Panthers.

Out of the 55 initial nominations from the community, the athletic staff, the captains counsel, the athletic advisory committee, cheerleaders and interested faculty submitted a list of top five mascots. The eight mascots which will be voted on came from those mascots receiving the most votes.

"The mascots run the gamut of images, but most of them can be embodied into a physical image," said Assistant Athletic Director Connie Fichera.

Even if the new name given to Bryant's athletic teams is chosen to be Breakers or Hurricanes, there are still plans to have a physical mascot to represent the teams.

"The mascot will interact with the community and the crowds at various events," said Fichera.

The votes will be tabulated like any other election, with the mascot receiving the highest number of votes as the winner.

"We need everyone's input from all areas of the campus. It is a decision which the community will be living with for a long time.

It is important to pick a mascot which best exemplifies the spirit of Bryant College," added Fichera.

In March, the Athletic Advisory Committee decided to drop the current name of "Indians" for the athletic teams. There were many reasons why the committee wanted to change the mascot.

For instance, using the name "Indians" is considered degrading to

Native Americans, several other teams in the area are changing their respected nicknames and the athletes for the most part don't identify themselves as "Indians".

Given all these changes the committee concluded the time was right to change the mascot.

"I think it's a great idea to change the mascot. It gives the athletes something to identify with and be proud of. It should also increase school spirit," said Kim Potrzebowski, volleyball team member.

According to Student Senate President Rob Fontanella, the mascot should help to unify the campus and give more meaning to students.

"All students should take this opportunity to vote and help make a lasting decision for Bryant," added Fontanella.

The voting will take place outside Salmonson on May 2 and 3 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The new mascot will be announced at the Athletic Banquet on May 3. A ballot is located on page 15 of this week's Archway.

try to decide whether they should wait in line to use ProQuest or should they use a reference book instead?

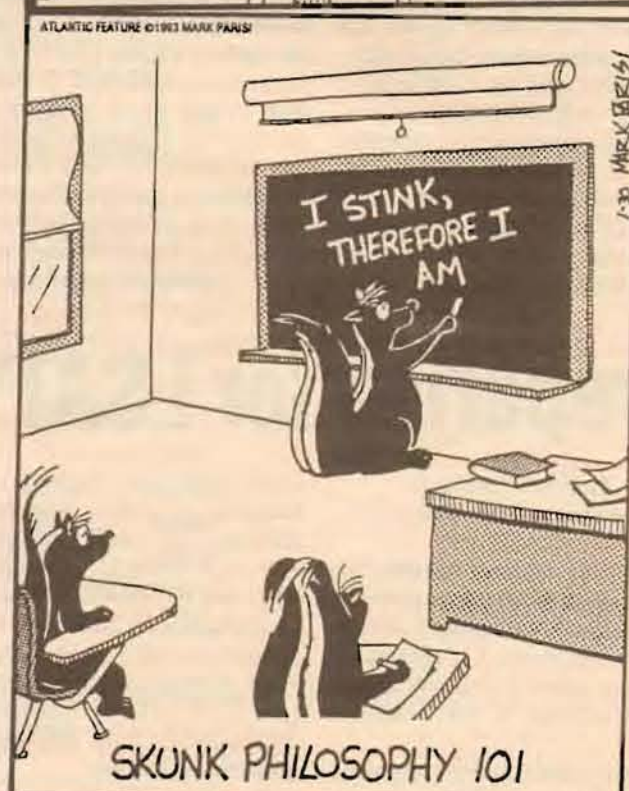

Science Means Business

What does a mid-ocean mountain range and your telephone have in common? If you asked Dr. Doug Levin, Chair of the Science Department, his reply would be money and research material that leads directly back to the classroom.

During spring break when many Bryant students headed off to playgrounds from Florida to Cancun, Dr. Levin was taking his spring break on a 100-foot vessel traveling somewhere between Rhode Island and the tip of Long Island.

Dr. Levin spoke of this recent experience as a perfect example of how science and business relate.

The project, he explained, consisted of examining and mapping the sea floor for a proposed AT&T telecommunications cable link. The objective was to find a path of small sediments, for the proposed cable to be buried under without disrupting the ecology of the area.

Dr. Levin said the proposed link will ultimately tie into the transatlantic cable. With the trans-Atlantic cable having a life expectancy of 25 years and costing approximately \$1 billion, the economic consequences are very high.

Dr. Levin added, when the trans-Atlantic cable crossed the mid-Atlantic ridge, AT&T had to look at Plate Tectonics and the fact that the sea floor was spreading at a rate of 2-4 cm. per year. Which, if not taken into account, it would have cut the cables' life span in half. AT&T must consider the geologic aspects, as well as the business aspect, when undertaking a project, like an underwater cable, Levin explained.

Adding another example of how

business and science co-exist, Dr. Levin pointed to bio-technology. Dr. Levin remarked, "Bio-tech" will see tremendous growth and opportunity in the future; as new products are brought to market. The different phases of a bio-tech company, Levin explained, is to spend roughly five to six years in Research and Development, then move to the business phase, which includes marketing, accounting, and managing.

Levin said that it is imperative that students be able to understand the relationships of science and business, especially with the growing environmental responsibilities businesses must meet.

These issues should be of major interest to Bryant students. Levin asked: "If you're an environmentally conscious company, and are given the choice of hiring a business major with a science background or one without it, which one would you hire?"

Levin remarked that if a student with a business degree were able to acquire a science background, his/her marketability would be greatly increased.

There are many opportunities for Bryant students to combine business and science. Students can look over the bulletin boards, just outside the science classrooms, to see news articles relating to science and business, including articles from the Wall Street Journal.

Dr. Levin added, Bryant students should walk away from a science class with a basic understanding of scientific methodology, and the ability to use it in their business careers, as well as everyday environments. And for those students who wish to pursue science more formally, they can now do so with the addition of a new Science Minors program, which has recently been added to the Bryant curriculum.

Relocating: Finding Information on American Cities

Off The Shelf

Graduation will be here in a few weeks and many of you will be relocating to new jobs in cities across the United States. Frequently asked reference questions at this time of year include inquiries into the cost of living and quality of life for different cities. Thorough research on a city involves reading the city newspaper, contacting the local Chamber of Commerce, reading recent articles about the city, and reviewing any information found in circulating or reference books held in our library collection.

The Chamber of Commerce in a city exists to promote local businesses and to encourage economic development in a particular area. This valuable organization will send you basic information on its city as well as the names and addresses of the particular city's leading businesses and business people. The World Chamber of Commerce Directory (REF HF294.W927) will supply you with the names, addresses, and phone numbers for the Chambers of Commerce of different U.S. cities. This directory also includes information on State Boards of Tourism, Convention and Visitors Bureaus, and Economic Development Organizations.

A city newspaper is one of the most convenient sources to consult to get an idea of a particular city's employment situation, real estate prices, and local news items of interest. The Gale Directory of Publications and Broadcast Media (REF Z6951 .A97 1994 3 vols.) provides information on more than

37,000 newspapers, magazines, journals, and radio and television stations located in cities of all sizes across the United States. As an example, to look for information on Boston publications, look under Massachusetts—Boston. Among the many publications listed are the Boston Globe and Boston Herald newspapers, Boston Magazine, Boston Business Journal, Bostonia, etc. The address, phone number, frequency of publication, circulation, and a brief description of the type of publication will be given.

Articles on a particular city can be found on the Proquest network in Business Dateline, an index of regional journals. By pressing F6, you can access a set of indexes that include geographic, company, and subject entries. Using Boston as our example again, we can find recent articles on the current real estate situation in Boston by accessing the geographic indexes and choosing Boston, the subject indexes and choosing real estate, and then limiting your search to 1994. The final search, stated as GEO(BOSTON, MA, US) and SU(REAL ESTATE) and DA(1994), yielded 11 articles, including a very helpful article entitled: "'93 Sales of Homes in Area up 11.4%".

A number of reference publica-

tions provide a great deal of information on the cost of living and quality of life in particular cities. The Economic Indicators Handbook (REF HC103 .E26) charts monthly changes in the Consumer Price Index for major cities of the United States dating back to the mid-1970's. Life in America's Small Cities (FED HA214 .T46) describes 219 "micropolitan areas" according to their performances in 50 statistical measures. It also provides a written overview of each of the top ten-rated cities. Facts About the Cities (REF HT123 .C385) contains detailed information on 331 cities with populations of approximately 75,000 or more. Data for each city is organized into 17 major categories such as cost of living, housing, crime, cultural resources, etc. Lastly, America's Top-Rated Cities: A Statistical Handbook (REF HT123 .A669) is a 5-volume work organized by region and then alphabetically by city. Each entry includes an overview of the business environment as well as the living environment.

The more information you have available before making a decision to relocate to a new city, the more confident you will feel in your decision and in your ability to control the stress associated with a move. The reference librarians or reference assistants are available to help you find information on your city of interest. We would like to help make your move to a new city and a new career a pleasant and exciting experience!

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Bryant Faculty Federation

The Bryant Faculty Federation has a long tradition of promoting the quality of the academic program at the College. Nevertheless, at a time of turmoil within academic institutions, it seems appropriate to publicly reaffirm the commitment of the Bryant College Faculty Federation to pursuing and preserving the highest standards of academic performance in all our classrooms.

There is widespread recognition of many problems on this and other college campuses: grade inflation, sporadic class attendance, limited class participation, under-utilization of the library, alcohol abuse, aggressive behavior, and vandalism. In these circumstances it is appropriate to make clear where we stand and what we expect of the faculty, students, and administration of this institution. The following statement reflects that intention:

We, the members of the Bryant College Faculty Federation, reaffirm our commitment to rigorous academic standards at this institution. It is our belief that such a program of instruction serves the best interests of our students and of their future business careers. We also believe the purpose of a college education is to impart values and to instill a sense of responsibility for one's community. Therefore, we strongly hold that exemplary citizenship ought to be a condition of remaining a Bryant student.

As faculty members at this institution, we are responsible for developing an environment that cherishes learning and intellectual pursuits. We must therefore resist any pressures to give easy or infrequent assignments and papers or to give undeserved grades. When we, the faculty, set and uphold high standards, our students respond by striving to meet these goals, and their efforts as well as their achievements will benefit them. Failure to demand such effort contributes to an attitude of disrespect for education that is too common on this campus.

Further, we submit that the demands of any first-class academic program require that students spend substantial time each day outside of class - reading, writing, and in other activities germane to their studies. Three to four hours for each hour in class was typically the case at colleges across America in the past, and we encourage a similar standard for Bryant College today.

Indeed, we must communicate to the members of the Bryant student body their need for a "world-class" education. They have to be prepared to contend with graduates around the globe for jobs, for careers and for opportunities. They must understand that a commitment to excellence is their commitment to a serious program of study. person's logic skills, and composed of questions provided by law schools themselves. The tests are highly regarded by law schools and serve as a good indicator of first year performance of law students.

There are five, 35 multiple choice sections in the following areas:

- Logical Reasoning
- (2) Reading Comprehension on a law topic
- Logic Games to test ability to apply rules
- An experimental section

A writing sample is also part of the exam to be sent with scores wherever you apply, but it is not graded.

As far as scoring, final scores range between 120 and 180 points, 180 being perfect. An average score on the exam is in the 150 range, but a change of two or three points in either direction can put an individual in an entirely different percentile. Students can take the exam more than once, but the scores are averaged each time it is taken. The results take an average of eight weeks.

HOW TO PREPARE

- Don't cram - The best time to take the LSAT or any entrance

exam is in October.

• Start preparing this summer - Junior year is the time to be thinking of this

• Think of preparation as training; practice as much as possible in an atmosphere that simulates the surrounding of a real testing experience, as far as conditions and time are concerned.

• Check the dates on the material practice books - they may be outdated.

Kaplan offers ten, 4 1/2 hour sessions for the LSAT, complete with three full length tests, homework books, labs, and extra practice material. Classes run all summer, right up to the test date. There are Kaplan centers all around the U.S., including East Providence. Individuals may transfer credits from one to the other if they wish to start at home this summer and continue back at school.

The cost of the whole course is \$745, with financial aid for those that qualify. A payment plan is also available. For further information on any of the standardized tests that Kaplan offers, contact Career Services. 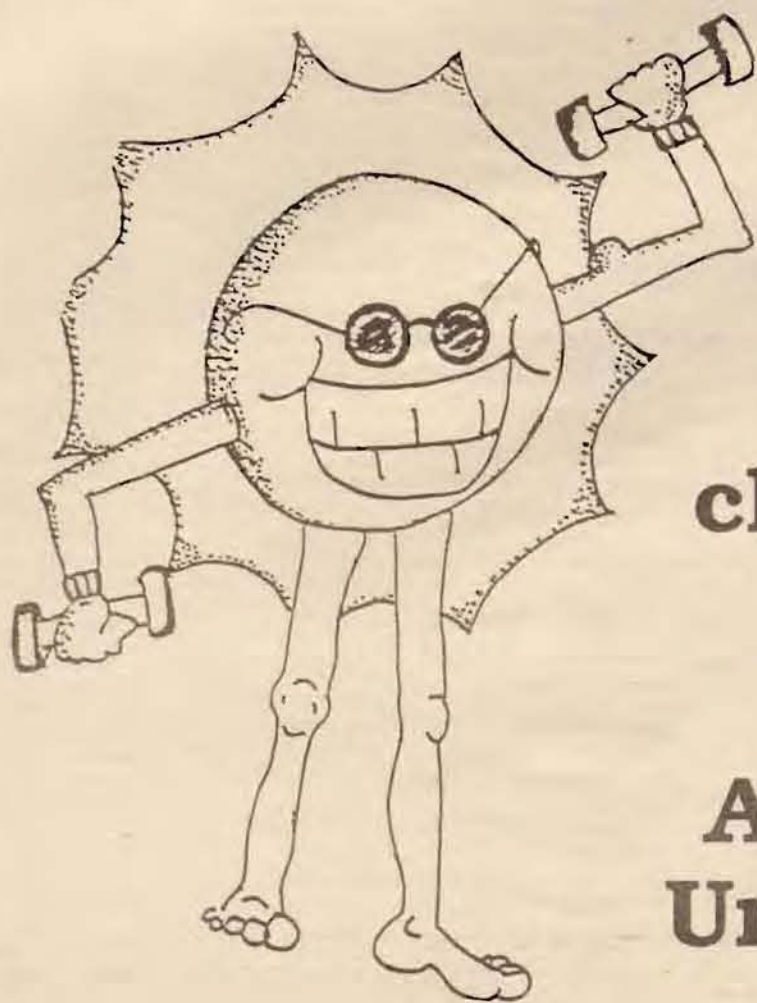
good hands.

Tri-States: A Day in the Sun

Women Take First; Men Place Third

Records fell, and champions were crowned as the men's and women's track teams hosted the Tri-State Championships, last Saturday.

Prior to the meet, women's coach Charlie Mandeville was a bit skeptical.

"Our times were not what they should have been, and I wasn't really sure if we could win," Mandeville added. "They put their heads together, and I was really pleased with the results."

Mandeville's skepticism were put to rest when his team was able to pull away from the crowd and capture their second Tri-State title in three years, by scoring 190 points (108 points better than second place Bridgewater State).

"It was a total team effort, you can't score 190 points with out that," women's coach Mandeville said. "You can start anywhere, everyone had a great day and contributed to the team."

The men, on the other hand, could not hold off the strong teams of Bridgewater State and Eastern Connecticut State, as a result they finished third overall.

The field events were first on the agenda, and gave the women their first scoring opportunities. This set the tone for the day, as two meet records fell, early in the day. First, Heather Brown hopped, skipped, and jumped 34 feet 3/4 inch for a first place finish, as well as, a new Tri-State record in the triple jump. Right behind Brown, was Ellen Bolland who placed second covering a distance of 33 feet 11 3/4 inches. Jen Hagen covered a distance of 31 feet 10 3/4 inches for a fifth place finish.

Marsha Orr, also added her name to the record book by jumping 16 feet 11 1/2 inches in the long jump. The feat tied a Tri-State Meet record, and was a new Bryant College record.

Also adding some points to the board in the long jump, was Bolland who finished fourth with a jump of 15 feet 10 3/4 inches; and Brown who finished fifth with a jump of 15 feet 6 3/4 inches.

Other field events also played a major role in the day for Bryant. Dottie Beattie was second in the javelin with a toss of 105 feet 2 inches.

In the high jump, Beej Kruzal cleared 5 feet for a second place finish; and Mandy LaPierre cleared 4 feet 10 inches for fourth place.

Megan McInerney was second in the shot-put with a toss of 35 feet 4 1/4 inches. McInerney also finished third in the discus and hammer throw, with tosses of 108 feet 6 inches and 103 feet 2 inches, respectively.

On the track, the women also had their share of success. Megan Davis, despite running with an injury, won the 100 meters with a time of 13.63 seconds. She also was second in the 200 meter with a time of 28.21.

Davis then teamed up with, Mary Gates, Lisa Wainwright, and Melissa Roberts for a third place finish in the 4 x 100 meter relay, posting a time of 53.04 seconds.

"It was nice to see Megan do so well," coach Charlie Mandeville said. "She was injured during her first two years, and last year never returned to form. However, this year she had a great year and proved to be a team leader."

Roberts was also crowned Tri-State champion when she placed first in the 400 meter high hurdles with a time of 1:09.49.

Next, was Karen Groebel with a time of 1:11.31, Jen Hagen was fourth with a time of 1:14.85.

In the 100 meter hurdles, Samina Vahidy was second with a time of 17.28, and Jen Oakes placed fifth with the a time of 17.97.

"Everyone on the team ran outstanding," Mary Gates said. "It all came together on Saturday."



In the longer distance Erath was first in the 5000 with a time of 20:30.

Friedrich was next for Bryant with a time of 20:22.01. Out the scoring, Heather Brown placed fifth with a time of 11:30.96.

"Jackie had never run on a track before this year won the 5000," Mandeville said. Mandy LaPierre was the runner for Bryant in the 3000, finishing third with a time of 11:30.96.

Friedrich also added scores to the board for Bryant by finishing fifth with a time of 11:40.

Finally, in the 800 meter Duval came in third with a time of 2:32.77. Duval, then teamed with Groebel, LaPierre, and Hagen to take third place in the 4 x 800 relay with a time of 4:23.

"[The race went] really well, we did a lot better than we had expected," Heather Cronce said.

"Everyone did a good job of pushing up to challenge, and we had finished first before," Megan Davis said. "Everyone had a good day."

The men's team started out on the right foot with Montecalvo won the javelin with a toss of 167 feet 7 inches behind Montecalvo in second was Brett Ingram with a toss of 162 feet 2 inches. Tim Norcor placed third, finishing with a toss of 136 feet 9 inches.

Phil Moran was the top shot-put with a toss of 43 feet 3 inches. Moran also placed second in the hammer with a toss of 136 feet 3 inches.

In the triple jump, C. finished sixth covering a distance of 37 feet 5 inches. Unfortunately, Jiran would go down with an injury during the 100 meter hurdles and was unable to finish.

"We had some real obstacles to overcome this year," Ellen Bolland said.

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said. "We lost Stretch (Chris Jiran) and other key members. We have a small team and everyone had to run a lot of events."

The team received the bulk of their points from the track events. Dave Shaidnagle was the first across the line in the 100 meter hurdles with a time of 16:44. Shaidnagle also finished second in the 400 meter hurdles with a time of 1:00.79.

Tom Gaspar came from behind to win the 800 meter with a time of 2:01.28. Gaspar also placed second in the 1500 meter with a time of 4:10.98. He then rounded out his day by finishing sixth in the 400 meter with a time of 53.47 seconds.

The 4 x 400 meter relay team, consisting of Gaspar, Eric Nelson, Elliot Yepez, and Michael Walsh placed second, posting a time of 3:36.67.

In the 10,000 meter, Pete Gosselin placed fourth with a time of 35:55.95 and Paul Daily came in eighth with a time of 37:31.48.

Yepez also had a good day individually for Bryant. He placed fourth in both the 100 meter and 200 meter with time of 11.6 seconds and 23.78 seconds, respectively. Yepez also teamed up with Sujoy Singhi, Ingram, and Shaidnagle in the 4 x 100 meter relay to finish fourth with a time of 45.51.

Other scorers for Bryant included: Mike Walsh, fifth in the 1500 meter with a time of 4:18.88; Mike Noon, sixth in the 5000 meter with a time of 16:52.1; and Eric Nelson, fourth in the 400 meter with a time of 52.99 seconds.

"It was a disappointment that we did not defend our title, [However] we had a small team and a lot of young guys," Tom Gaspar said. "We did our best, and we were happy to have a home meet. We were also happy for the women's performance."

The team will be at the WPI Invitational on Saturday.

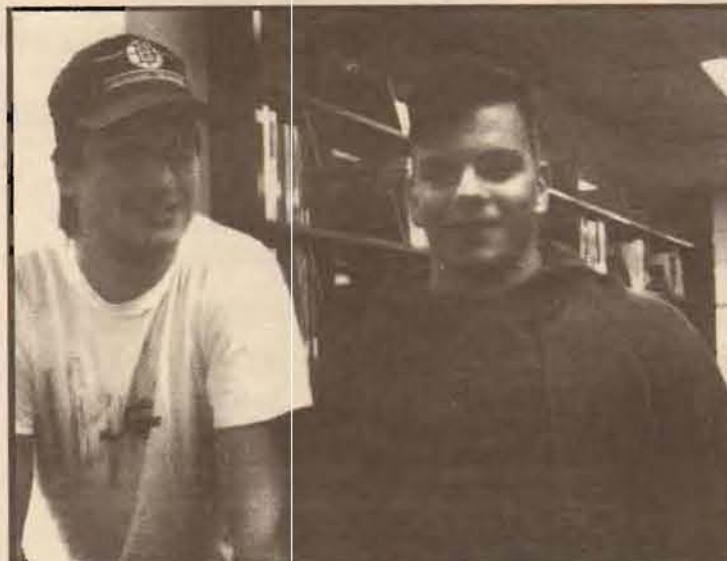

Treat Senses to Healthful Experience

A restaurant that serves strictly health food, has no bar and is non-smoking, sounds terrible, doesn't it? On the contrary, The Extra Sensory restaurant is healthfully sensory-sational.

The food is not only good for you, but actually tastes good. I must admit that many of the menu items I had never heard of, but experimenting is half the fun when dining out.

They offer flavorful vegetarian meals: chicken, turkey, fish, and meat dishes. For those who want to pretend they are eating meat there's vegetarian hot dogs, tempeh burgers, and reubens. But, with these great veggie meals, there's no need to pretend.

We started lunch off with their organic house blend coffee while we read the menu and took in the atmosphere. Classical music filled our ears and bodies. The sun shone through the front window and over the lavender colored walls, giving the impression of being seated in-

side a tulip garden.

There are two levels to the dining area, both with light oak tables and flower settings. Green plants flourished in the curtained windows of the top level. I couldn't help but notice a strange mural painted on the wall. It reminded me of a bizarre dream. There was no beginning and no end, just odd pictures of people and a fire hydrant.

The luncheon specials for the day were posted: Vegetarian Shepherd's Pie, Yucatan Wood Grilled Chicken Sandwich, and Falafel, which is a patty made with chick peas, French bread, garlic, onions, herbs and spices, and baked and/or fried on a sesame pita bread.

I ordered a Houmous (another chick pea delight but uncooked) from the regular menu with tabouleh (a leafy green) in a sesame pita with fresh tomato and cucumber for \$5.00. It was light but filling and very tasteful despite the non-reputation of chick peas, which most of us don't know what to do with except throw them in a salad.

My lunch partner, a little less

daring, ordered what they call Just Pasta with marinara sauce. That is just what it is, pasta, but with a very unique sauce made with fresh tomato quarters, ground pepper, and cheese. All very tasty for \$5.00.

They also offer a wide range of salads like Noodles with eggplant, Seasonal Bean and Grain, Classic Chicken, Stir Fry and the list goes on. The prices for them are from \$4.00 to \$9.00 or you can order a sampler of the three for \$6.50.

The highest price on the lunch menu is \$12.00, so it's very reasonable, and you won't ever leave with that full, and over-indulged feeling that some meals leave behind.

This is an excellent time of the year to try The Extra Sensory restaurant; I'm sure most of us could do without the fat now, as our sweaters hibernate for the summer and the less concealing clothes wake from their wintry sleep.

The Extra Sensory is located at 388 Wickenden Street in Providence (401) 454-3920. They also offer take-out, fresh bakery items and great low-fat desserts.

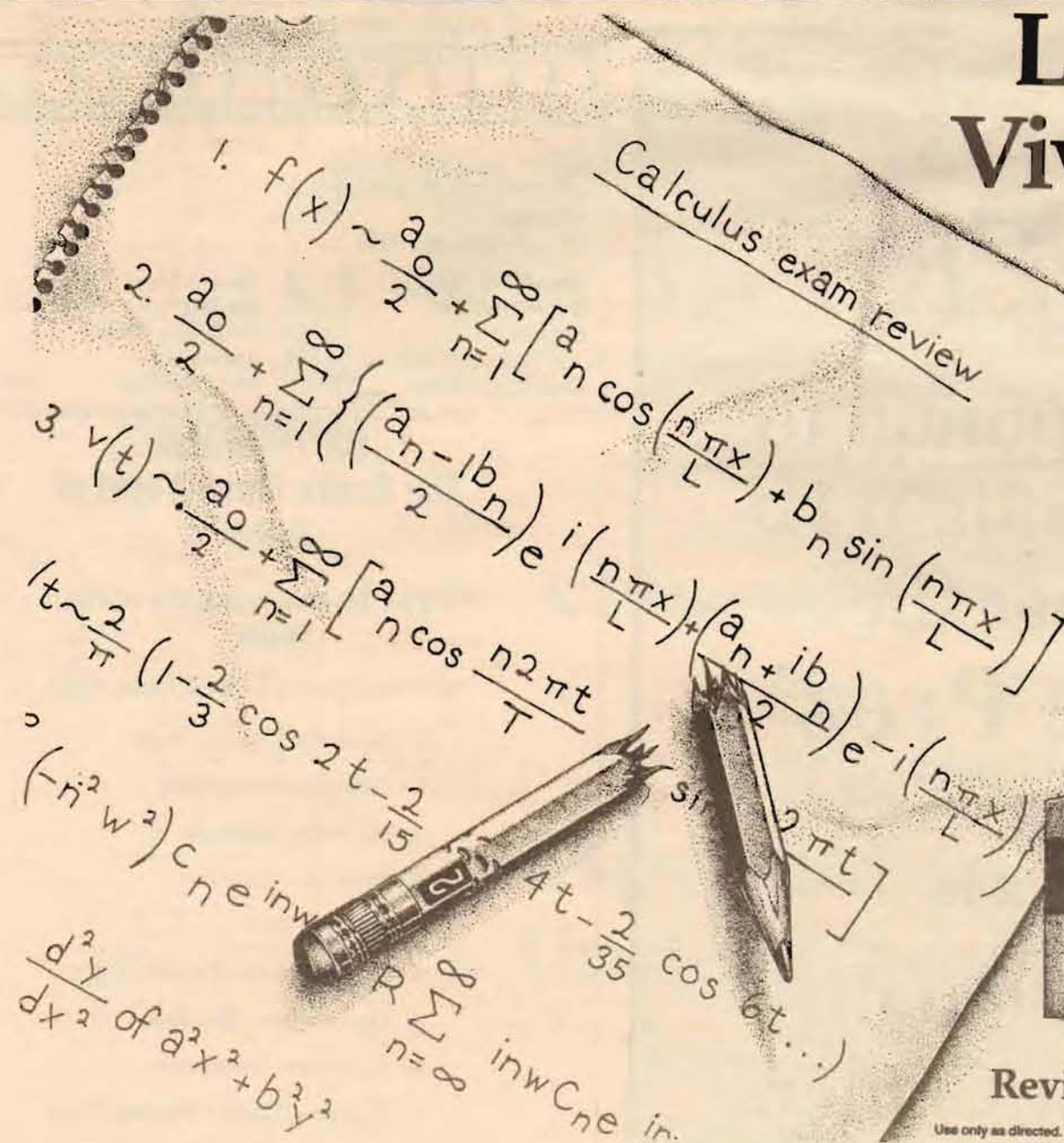

Overall the team's record stands at 13-0, and their individual match win-loss record is an unbelievable 123-20. This weekend the team is off to U Conn to play in the New England Championships, and they hope to place better than fifth which they placed last year.

Softball Wins Six Straight

The women's softball team won six of their last eight games to improve their record to 24-17, 9-7 in the NE-10.

Yesterday, the team was home to face UMass Lowell and came away with two solid 9-1 victories. Pitchers Kelli Eggsware and Lauren Smolinsky both threw four hit games to record the complete game wins.

The team traveled to Stonehill on Tuesday, and came away with two much needed conference wins. In game one, Smolinsky threw a three hitter to record the complete game win, 9-2. Jen Flanagan only allowed five hits in game two to record the 10-1 win.

"In the Stonehill game and today's game [against Lowell] everyone did their job. The pitching was excellent, and the hitting was great," coach Bob Reall added.

The top half of the batting order came through for Bryant in the Stonehill games. In total, they combined for 14 hits in the first game, and 10 hits in the second game. Leading this onslaught, was Jayna Fontaine who collected six hits in eight attempts, and Wendy Powell who also had six hits, but in 10 attempts.

Over the weekend, Bryant traveled to Vermont for a four game road trip.

On Saturday, they played conference rival St. Michael's and were able to sweep the double header 9-6 and 13-2. They also played Division I University of Vermont on

Friday, but came up on the short end of the stick. They lost the first game 3-2, and then dropped the second 14-4.

The team continues to get solid play from Wendy Powell. Powell batted .367 last week, with three runs. She also hit for the cycle (single, double, triple, and home run). For her effort, she was named to the NE-10 Weekly Honor Roll.

Powell is currently second in the conference in hitting with a .458 average. She is also second in doubles with 17, and fifth in home runs with six.

Overall, the team is third in the conference in hitting with a .333 average, and second in runs scored with 262 in 37 games.

The season is winding down for the women, and they are looking to make a run for the playoffs.

"We are in good shape in the conference, but anything can happen," Reall added. "If we take two from Springfield this Saturday, we might have a chance for third."

Currently, the team is in fifth place and are in a five team race for four playoff spots. However, they do have the upper hand in tie breakers. They have defeated Bentley, Quinipiac, and St. Anselm, all of who are fighting for those final spots.

The team will be home this Saturday to face Springfield at 12:00 p.m., and Sunday to face Roger Williams at 1:00 p.m. On Monday, they will play their final home games of the regular season against CW Post at 3:30. They will then wind up the regular season on Wednesday at Salve Regina.

David Nagelhout, a senior, said, "Nationals is what every team strives for each year. I am glad that in my final year, Bryant College has finally made it."

Senior Matt Sadoski said, "After four years of hard work and dedication, it is an honor to make it

to a level (Nationals) where many schools can only dream of."

Once at Carson City, the team struggled, especially at picking up spares.

By the end of the first day, Bryant was in 12th place. And by Saturday Bryant was in 15th place where they finished.

Individual highlights from the week include Nagelhout's, average of 206 with a 228 high game and

Coach John Holmes stated, "The tournament was tough for everyone. Bryant made it (Nationals) this far, and should be proud of themselves."

"We are a young team filled with Sophomores and Freshmen. It was a good building-block for next year's squad," Coach Holmes concluded.
