Rima is an international student who has completed three internships during her junior year at Bryant. Last semester I was

interviewed to talk about my career path as an international student at Bryant College around the time I was preparing myself mentally to move to New York City for three months. The whole idea seemed challenging and strenuous however it was a smooth sail thanks to the support of friends and colleagues. I distinctly remember the day I walked down Wall Street to attend the firm wide summer analyst orientation. My stomach churned, and I observed the thrill, excite-

ment, and electricity around me. People walked in a hurry, cell phones and taxi honks filled the background, the smell of coffee percolated through the air, all in all it was a daily phenomenon.

Goldman, Sachs & Co., an icon of success among the investment banks around the

world. Being the reigning champion, Goldman believes in its people and work ethics that revolve around meritocracy. "Meritocracy", a word I first heard at Bryant College at the liberal arts class I took under Prof. J. McDonnell. Nowhere on the Goldman Sachs campus on Wall Street will you find its name embellished on buildings or street walks. It is the people who embellish this culturally rich firm. I was amazed by the kind of people who work here.

There does not exist the famous Wall Street "a\*\*hole" factor in this firm. I was greeted by the manager of my division and was given responsibilities any analyst would be given in the firm.

My internship program was very comprehensive in nature and I was put on projects even before one had closed out. I was able to communicate with our colleagues in international offices and our traders on the floor. No one treated me as an intern, but an individual who was serious about getting the job done flawlessly. There were days when I started at 6:30 am and finished only by 10:30pm. This spirit of hard work and excellence defines the Goldman culture and it does not go unnoticed. My manager was pleased that I was able to shoulder my responsibilities well and I always wanted him to give me a constructive feedback on my work.

My only advice to other fellow classmates at Bryant is to work hard, strive for excellence, be open minded to diversity and culture, have a passion for learning and above all learn the value of humility. You can be the best at what you do, but without humility you cannot work well in a team and lose respect among colleagues above all your clients. As I reflect on my years at Bryant, I feel lucky that I am a part of a school where people are friendly and cooperative. Bryant is a place where professors take time out to inculcate the culture of learning, so that one day we can carry our Bryant marks and spread it globally.

## Bulldogs Tabbed For Third In EFC Preseason Poll

SMITHFIELD, R.I. (The Bryant College football team was projected for a third-place finish in the Eastern Football Conference Central Division in the 2000 preseason conference coaches poll.

The Bulldogs, who went 5-4 in their first varsity season a year ago, were ranked behind American International, which won the 1999 division and conference championships, and Bentley. American international received nine of a possible 11 first-place votes and had 63 points, while Bentley edged out Bryant with 47 points to the Bulldogs' 44. Pace, with 41 points, was fourth in the poll, followed by Assumption (23 points) and Stonehill (14).

C.W. Post was a unanimous choice to repeat as Atlantic Division champions, as the Pioneers earned all 11 first-place votes.

Bryant returns 20 starters (eight offense, 10 defense, two specialists) from the 1999 team, including five players who earned all-conference honors. The Bulldogs begin the 2000 season Sept. 9 in Fairfield, Conn., against Division I-AA Sacred Heart.

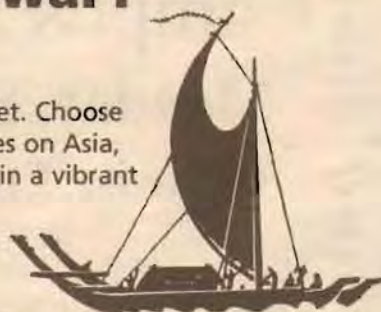
