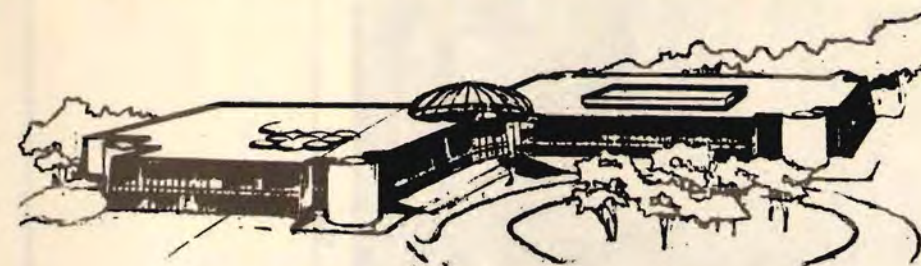

Sky Divers Reach New Heights

The Skydiving Club has been organized at Bryant College in order to promote one of the fastest-growing sports in the United States.

Any weekend or holiday (weather permitting), one can watch Bryant skydivers jump from altitudes of 2500 to 10,000 feet at Richmond Airpark in South County. In cooperation with the Rhode Island Skydivers' Association, lessons are given on these days and within three hours one is ready to board the Cessna 182 for a first parachute jump.

Though the time necessary for instruction is relatively short, skydiving is comparatively safe with the proper training. Presently, the club boasts 21 members who are actively jumping each week.

Another of the club's goals is to form a collegiate team in order to compete with other college skydiving teams in the New England area. Though it is currently one of the newer clubs on the Bryant College Campus, the Skydiving Club is definitely a rapidly-expanding organization.

GLC Sets the Stage for Greek Policy

Student Senate: The Student Voice

The Senate is the representative body for the students. The preamble of the Senate Constitution states: "We the students of Bryant College believe in the necessity of having a political body organized for the purpose of representing students. We believe in bringing to the attention of the College all matters which directly or indirectly concern the general welfare of an individual student or the student body as a whole."

In an effort to achieve this goal, the Senate has committees to deal with problems a student

may have. These include academic grievance, non-academic grievance and student-faculty relation committees. Funding for existing clubs and organizations falls under the auspices of the Senate. If a group of students wishes to form a new club, this can be arranged with the help of the Senate. The Senate is responsible for student programs and entertainment; for example, movies, mixers, and concerts. Freshmen Orientation originated in a Senate committee. New Senate programs in the works include a judiciary board and a

referral service to help students seeking information on any subject relating to their life at Bryant.

The Senate is composed of 24 senators—six from each class—and an executive board. Elections for senators are in October and elections for officers are in March. This year's Senate officers are Gregory Evans, President; Matthew McManus, Vice President; Berj Kasabian, Treasurer; and Joanne Lipsky, Secretary. The Senate invites all students to make themselves known to it. It's your voice—use it!

Youth Guidance is an organization which is designed to help underprivileged children in the Morin Heights area of Woonsocket, Rhode Island.

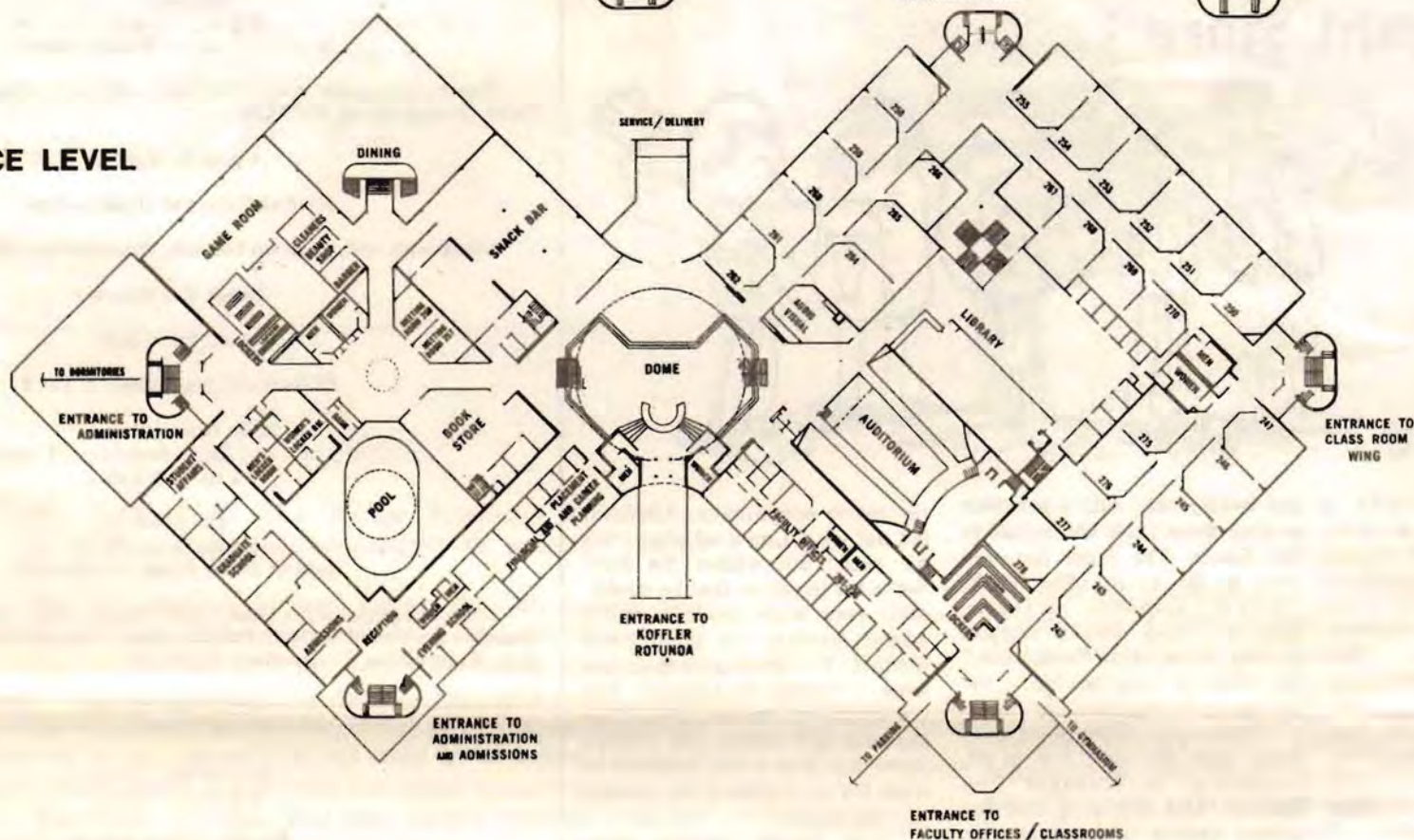
