## News Briefing

BOSTON - Scientists say that they have successfully cloned two identical, genetically engineered calves, a step that may lead to the mass production of drugs for humans in cows' milk. The two male calves, George and Charlie, were born last week after being created through a combination of cloning and genetic engineering. Researchers say the calves mark the most viable step so far toward "pharming" - developing pharmaceuticals using farm animals.

Technology created to treat human waste in future space colonies has laid the groundwork for a cheap and easy way to treat waste worldwide and clean up coastal waters. The remarkably low-tech system uses only plants, microbes, limestone gravel, cement, plastic pipe and gravity to remove 99.9% of fecal bacteria. It also removes more than 80% of environmentally harmful chemicals in sewage that are ordinarily dumped into the ground or ocean. Researchers say the new wastewater system functions like a natural wetland, purifying water and attracting wildlife.

WASHINGTON - Scientists around the world are preparing for a total solar eclipse, a rare astronomical show that will send the moon's shadow streaking across the central Pacific and Atlantic on Feb. 26. A total eclipse occurs when the moon is the right size and at the right distance to block all but the sun's corona, the flaring outer envelope of the sun. The event will prompt a tropical eclipse festival for hundreds of researchers on a string of islands in the Caribbean. In the United States, only a partial eclipse will be seen. Viewing will be best from southern Florida.

A widely accepted proposal to add seven top-level Internet domains to the current crowded .com, .net and .org may be scuttled by a position paper from the Clinton administration due out next week. Each country runs its own domain, and generic ones such as .com are administered by Network Solutions, a private company. The report, according to sources familiar with the document, would allow only one to five new domains, revamp the autonomous group that administers worldwide addressing to bring it under closer U.S. control, and continue Network Solutions' lucrative monopoly.

Football celebrations seemingly know no bounds this time of the year. Kraft has commissioned cheese sculptor Allen Hendricks to transform a 640-pound block of Wisconsin cheddar into a replica of the Lombardi Trophy in Green Bay; the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra opens each of its concerts this weekend with *Go! You Packers Go*, the Green Bay Packers' fight song; and a customized version of Monopoly, featuring the winner of Super Bowl XXXII, swings into production during the final minutes of Sunday's game. The Monopoly Commemorative Super Bowl Edition (\$35) begins shipping Feb. 1.

Last year in Nevada, \$70.9 million was bet legally on the Super Bowl. This year, \$5 million to \$10 million will be bet via the Internet on this Sunday's Super Bowl, estimates David Herschman, CEO of the online gaming site, Virtual Vegas. It's uncertain whether those Internet bettors are breaking U.S. laws. Most state and federal anti-gambling statutes were written before the World Wide Web made Net gambling viable to a large audience, leaving a lucrative loophole. Legal or not, it's here and thriving. At least 120 sites now offer everything from sports betting to casino games, bingo and lotteries.

His address begins at 7 p.m. in the MAC. Bryant students, faculty, staff are each entitled

## Bentley Edges Bryant Men 91-85

Smithfield, RI)- Junior guard Jamie Baker had a team-high 22 points and sophomore forward Lamar Reddicks added a career-high 20 points to lead Bentley College past Bryant College, 91-85, in a Northeast-10 Conference game Tuesday night.

The Falcons win their fourth straight, while Bryant falls for the second consecutive game.

Junior forward Jim Burton (South Boston, MA/Catholic Memorial) scored 22 points in a losing effort.

The game was an exhibition of great three-point shooting early as

13 of the first 18 field goals went for three. The Bulldogs took a 33-22 lead at 9:11 of the first half on sophomore guard Jason Bennett's fourth trey in the first 10:49 of the game. Bentley clawed back to within two at 45-43 on junior guard Derek Klimkowskis three-pointer with 2:46 left. Bryant scored seven of the last nine points, however, to take a 52-45 lead into the locker room.

This was an amazing display of shooting by both clubs. The teams combined for 18-30 three-point field goals (60 %), and shot 56 percent from the field.

The Bulldogs extended their lead to 56-46 on freshman guard Chris Rosefs basket 1:27 into the half, but the Falcons steadily whittled away at the lead, closing to within one several times. Junior forward Jamie LeFlemis 18-footer with 5:34 left gave Bentley its first lead (82-81) since early in the first half. The team traded baskets until senior guard Alex Mavroukas twisting basket gave Bentley an 86-83 lead with 1:45 to play. Senior forward Rudy Hallis free throw and senior guard Jack Perris 16-footer sealed the win for the visitors.

## Disrespect and Broken Promises

It is me or does the administration at Bryant seem to be narrow-minded and slow to change. What we need is an administration that will not break promises or find excuses for their slow actions. What am I talking about? For those who are unfamiliar, then let me fill you in on the administration's incompetent behavior and actions.

Broken promises seem to be the way this college is ran. DPS stated new locks for Halls 14, 15, and 16 would be installed over Christmas Break. Update: DPS hasn't even received the locks yet, even though the Director of Public Safety said that the locks would be installed over Christmas Break. Seems like they are several weeks (if not months) behind. What type of incompetence is this when a set of keys to those halls was lost last summer and the college (especially George Coronado) has yet to replace them. How are we supposed to look at this situation? The story from the Coronado camp is that there is some type of shipping delay. How can locks be delayed? Did someone hijack the truck that was carrying the locks to Bryant? Or did the truck driver forget to get gas and is stuck somewhere in New Hampshire? The point is, I am tired of the excuses or "reasons" Bryant gives. If leadership is action, then I guess Director of DPS isn't a very good one.

How could I say something like that? Well, maybe it is because those keys were lost last SUMMER, which gives the Director some six months to replace them. If it weren't for that letter in October, who knows where if he would order them. His failure to replace those locks is an incompetent move because it puts over 800 students at risk. Sure nothing has happen yet, but the fact that there is a greater opportunity for something bad to happen. And isn't DPS responsible for the student's safety? Personally, the best safety procedure is to prevent but how can you prevent crimes if your keys are lost and you do not change the locks. Think about it. Now we do not know when those locks will be changed. Maybe it isn't a big deal to many of the students but to me, it is a big deal because it illustrates the type of characters that administration trust to run this college.

Secondly, the Archway has been moved to the third floor of the Bryant Center. What most people do not know is how the administration treated the Archway staff. In this case, Executive to the President, Mark Furtado, then interim Vice-President of Student Affairs, mistreated the Archway Staff with his ultimatums and threats. Our move from the MAC is solely done for the new football team that will be at Bryant College. As much as the Archway supports the new football team, Mr. Furtado remarks and actions showed little respect for the campus newspaper. In a meeting with the Interim VP of Student Affairs last September, the managing editor and myself, he indicated that the Archway has to move and was giving us a space in the Bryant Center. When we (managing editor and myself) voiced our concerns about the move, particularly the fact that we had to share office space with the Ledger, Mr. Furtado responded with an ultimatum. In his eyes, the Archway would continue to work with old computers (from 1993) if we did not move into the Bryant Center. If this is the type of leader that is leading this college then we're in trouble. I say this only because, Bryant claims to be a student-centered college and that it respects and listens to comments of its students. I would categorize Mr. Furtado's actions and comments to us as being controlling and disrespectful. I know I will hear from the administration, but if this college is to be anything it claims to be, then LISTEN administration.

The way the administration treats its students is very important because it builds school spirit. If you want strong school spirit, then treat student leader with a little more respect. Do not gossip and plan ways of getting rid of the editor because you disagree with his views. Student leaders are working toward the same goal, and that is to make Bryant the best it can be. However, if we do not feel confident in the administration, then it weakens the school's spirit. Do not use your power to try and control any up information about events such as the keys being lost or the turmoil in DPS and get down to making Bryant a better place to learn and grow for the students. These are just some examples of what I am referring to.

Leading a unstitution such as Bryant means being proactive. We want Bryant to be look highly upon, but it takes active leaders who care about their job and the people they serve. Just delivery what you promise and respect the students even if you disagree with them.

## Disappointed

I recently sent this letter to President Machtley, Director of DPS, George Coronado, and Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, Robert Sloss:

Dear President Machtley:  
Subject: Emergency "Blue" Phones

It has come to my attention that the emergency phone located in the new townhouse parking lot has been out of order for over a month. I noticed this prior to our winter break. I have contacted George Coronado on two occasions; the first during break and the second on January 21, 1998.

His initial response was that the vendor and electrician had been contacted to determine what was wrong with the phone. On the second call, his response was that the vendor had called back and stated it would cost \$2,000 to fix the phone.

He also asked me why I am so passionate about getting this phone fixed. Since I was not allowed to fully answer this question when it was asked (I was cut-off and told it was a generic answer), I will take the opportunity now.

I would not want to be the person that has to explain to a student's family that their son/daughter was assaulted or raped because the emergency phone that they ran to had been out of order. Furthermore, I would not want to have to explain to the family that the phone had been out of order for over a month: not to mention the possible legal and public relations ramifications.

Mr. Coronado also stated that the phone has only been used once in the last five years. I'm glad. I would hope that the phone never needs to be used, but I would like it to be in working order if the need arises.

Also the sign on the phone states "Out Of Order. Sorry for the Inconvenience." It is not a "convenience" issue. It is about safety and protecting the campus.

I would also like to suggest that the emergency pole phone in the commuter lot be painted and lettered again so that it is clearly an emergency phone. If you have any questions or replies, please feel free to contact me at X4192 or Box 1445. [This was the end of my letter]

It is important to keep everyone safe here at the college. It does not stop with emergency phones. We were promised that new locks would be installed on our doors. It has not happened.

I understand that there were shipping problems, but do not promise things you cannot deliver. I am disappointed that the lock issue is not resolved and I don't believe that waiting until Spring Break is the answer. We need to be safe on this campus and if that means sacrificing sleeping in late for one day so that the locks can be replaced, so be it.

## Wanted: Heroes to Save a Few Lives

Imagine for a moment that you could be the 1 in 20,000 match to save the life of a young child. To that child you would be a hero and to the rest of us a life saver.

Members of the Bryant Community will have the opportunity to register to become a hero. No burning buildings are involved, just a simple registration at the Blood and Bone Marrow Drive on Wednesday, February 11th in Janikies Auditorium, sponsored by the Student Programming Board and the Office of Student Activities.

Although there are more than 2 million donors registered nationally, there are still patients who do not find matches. There is still a serious need for more donors, especially donors from minority populations. Of the 2,453,678 volunteers listed with the National Marrow Donor Program, only 526,076 are from minority ethnic groups, said Laura McDonald of the Rhode Island Marrow Donor Program. This makes it difficult for minority patients who are searching for a match since their most likely chance of finding a match is from someone of a

similar ethnic background.

Becoming a donor is easy. The first step is to have a small amount of blood taken which is typed for markers called HLA antigens. This information is entered in the NMDP computerized registry. While listed on the registry, if a donor's antigens match a patient in need, the donor is contacted and counseled about the donation process.

Currently there is cost for individuals to register to be in the NMDP registry. The cost for members of the Bryant Community is free for the first 50 people, which has been made possible by a federal matching grant received by the Office of Student Activities. Funds have been allocated for people of color to be tested at no charge.

### What's so great about tutoring?

What goes on in the Learning Center and Writing Center? The staff of both centers thought it would be helpful to SHOW you what we do through the eyes of the people who work in both centers.

Most of the work we do is devoted to one-on-one, personalized tutoring. The Learning Center has tutors on staff that do content-based tutoring while the Writing Center's consultants work exclusively with writing. A student confused about cell reproduction could get help from a Learning Center tutor while a student writing a paper about cell reproduction could get help from a Writing Center consultant.

This issue of *Through Smoked Glass*, then is focused on what happens during a tutoring session. Tutors and consultants also make suggestions to students thinking of visiting either center to ensure that their time is used wisely.

Once the student realizes that I'm acting as a guide through the writing process, s/he talks freely about how the book relates to the paper. As needed, I prompt the student with questions. For the most part though, I nod my head in agreement. Before long, without even realizing it, the student has verbally expressed the entire paper to me including the part that s/he was originally stuck on. I'll ask the student: "So why don't you write all that in your paper?" Next comes my favorite part of the session an understanding grin from the tutee. Just like that, the student is no longer "stuck."

Such discussions help the student realize that s/he knows more than s/he thinks s/he does. This can be a real confidence builder. What a lot of people don't realize is that the Writing Center is not just about helping people write a good thesis or use sound evidence. The Writing Center is also concerned about building writers' confidence-something that, as writers we could all use.

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

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

### Beef Tostadas

6	6-inch corn tortillas	1/2	teaspoon garlic powder
1/2	cup finely chopped onion	1/2	dash hot pepper sauce
1	pound ground round	1 1/2	cups shredded red cabbage
1/2	teaspoon ground cumin	1/2	cup salsa cruda
1/2	teaspoon salt	1/2	cup shredded low-fat cheddar cheese
1/2	teaspoon oregano	1/2	teaspoon chili powder
1 1/2	to 2 teaspoons chili powder		

Preheat oven to 450°F. Place tortillas on a heavy baking sheet; put another baking sheet on top of tortillas. Bake 8 to 10 minutes, or until tortillas are crisp. In a nonstick skillet over medium-high heat, combine onion and ground round. Sauté until meat is browned. Drain off fat and add cumin, salt, oregano, chili powder, garlic powder and hot pepper sauce. Stir until well mixed. For each tostada, spread 1/2 cup meat on crisped tortilla. Add 1/2 cup cabbage, 2 tablespoons salsa cruda and 2 tablespoons shredded cheese. Serves 6.

## Super Bowl XXXI1 in San Diego

After losing thirteen straight Super Bowls, this year the AFC sends the Denver Broncos to the slaughter house. But of the thirteen previous losers, this Broncos team may have the best chance the AFC has at winning the big game. They have the most talent compared to any of those teams. The problem is that they are playing defending world champions, the Green Bay Packers. The Pack are again loaded offensively and have an aggressive defense. But the Broncos are America's sentimental favorite because of John Elway. Elway has accomplished everything in the league except winning the Super Bowl. But Cheeseheads shouldn't be discouraged because of the Elway situation. They have a chance to win back-to-back Super Bowls.

### Green Bay Packers

On offense there are not many teams better than the Packers. A solid running game and an explosive passing game cause problems for almost any team. Running back Dorsey Levens came into his own this season with over 1,400 yards rushing. A big back who can run both inside and outside

Big 345 pound Gilbert Brown has been a solid run stopper when he has played. Reggie White is old, but still better than most other ends in the league and Santana Dotson is quietly having a solid post season.

In last year's blowout of the New England Patriots, safety LeRoy Butler blitz like there was no tomorrow. Don't look for him to blitz as much this year. A smarter quarterback and better protection will keep Butler back, but look for him as an extra defender in the box to help stuff the run. If Butler is up this will put more pressure on the Eugene Robinson to cover the middle.

The special teams for the Packers have not played as well this year. With the loss of return man Desmond Howard the Packers have not been able to gain field position. With Chris Jacke kicking last year, the Pack had a good special teams unit, but he's gone as well. Special teams could be a deciding factor in this game.

For Green Bay's defense to be successful depends on their ability to stop the Denver running game.

### Denver Broncos

The Broncos offense finished as the best in the league due mainly to the offensive line. Although they are the smallest in the league, they are one of the best. Run blocking for Terrell Davis and pass blocking for the John Elway has been very strong for the team this season. Look for the Broncos to run outside

because Gilbert Brown won't be able to roll out there in time.

However, the success of this game depends on Shannon Sharpe. It doesn't matter if Sharpe catches just one ball, but if he creates mismatches that will be big. Seth Joyner has already proven that he can't cover anyone, and asking him to try to cover Sharpe would be asking the impossible.

Despite all this, Elway is still the heart and soul of the team. His ability to make plays and quick reads during blitzes will be keys for the Broncos.

Defensively, the Broncos can not hope to stop Green Bay unless they can get to Favre early. If they can force him into mistakes and then capitalize on them Denver should be alright. Look for Denver to rush Favre upfield and keep him in the pocket. Neil Smith and Alfred Williams have both turned on their games in the playoffs. Keith Traylor, the Broncos 300 pound tackle will have to stop Levens in the middle.

The Broncos have the best set of linebackers in the league behind All-Pro John Mobley. The secondary is solid but has its weakness. Darren Gordon has been

good, but he can be beat. Steve Atwater will need to play up in the box to help with the run, so that leaves Tyrone Braxton to cover the middle.

The Broncos have the best return team in the league with Gordon and Vaughn Hebron. But that is a tradeoff for a very poor coverage team. Punter Tom Rouen had a 12 yard punt last week and Jason Elam has been very inconsistent this season.

If the Broncos want to take the pressure off their offense, than their defense has to force Favre into mistakes early.

The Broncos come into this game as 13-point underdogs, but don't look for this game to be that far apart. The Bronco offense should have no trouble scoring on the Packers, but their defense needs to stop Favre and the Green Bay offense. With that in mind look for the rings to be worn by the Packers. The streak will continue into its 14th year for the AFC. Its not that the Broncos are not as physical as AFC teams have been in the past. The problem is that the Broncos are more talented than any other team except the Packers. Make mine 28-24 Green Bay in a very close game.
