World News



BOSTON - Fifty doctors who treat victims of child abuse have denounced the medical evidence presented by defense experts at Louise Woodward's murder trial as inaccurate and unscientific. In a letter to news organizations, the pediatricians said the theory used to defend the British au pair - that baby Matthew Eappen died from an old injury that re-bleed - is unsupportable. "All of us just felt outraged that this type of medical testimony was being allowed to be passed off as truth," Dr. Robert M. Reece, head of the Institute for Professional Education at the Massachusetts Prevention of Cruelty to Children, said Wednesday.

Three Civil War-era reward posters for runaway slaves were pulled from a Christie's auction following reports on their racist content. The unidentified seller has decided to donate the posters to a museum or historical society specializing in black history, Christie's said Tuesday. The posters and five other items had been grouped into three sets, each valued at about \$1,000. One of the posters offered a \$200 reward for a "Negro man John" with a "remarkable fine set of teeth."

Arizona State University's crime prevention coordinator has been arrested and charged with burglarizing a campus office. Radawna Michelle is charged with burglary, possession of burglary tools and theft, university police Chief Lanny Standridge said. A police officer responding to a report of a suspicious person Friday night recognized Michelle leaving a university office building. A later check of the building found several compact discs and some cash were missing. Michelle had some of the missing discs and alleged burglary tools when she was arrested minutes later, Standridge said.

JACKSON, Miss. - The teen-ager charged with stabbing his mother to death and fatally shooting two classmates is blaming the rampage on his desire to be accepted by a group of satan-worshipping friends. In a jail house interview to be broadcast on ABC Wednesday, 16-year-old Luke Woodham apologizes to the victims' families and says his actions were influenced by group leader Grant Boyette: "I tried so hard to get his acceptance... 'cause he was the only one who accepted me." Six other group members have been charged with murder conspiracy in connection with the shooting.

MILWAUKEE - A 45-year-old man and his 30-year-old sister, who had at least three children together, were sentenced Tuesday to eight and five years in prison, respectively. Circuit Judge David Hansher thought the severe punishment was necessary to keep them apart and prevent them from having sex. The woman pleaded with the judge, "I just want to have a chance to be out there. I'd separate from my brother." Both have been stripped of their parental rights to three of their children, the oldest of whom is 7.

After nearly 40 years of manned space flight, the effects of weightlessness on the brain, spinal cord, peripheral nerves and sensory organs remain largely unknown. But NASA's Neurolab mission, to be launched next April, is designed to tackle the key questions of how the loss of gravity influences the nervous system. "Understanding how space flight affects humans makes it possible to learn to endure longer-term space flight in the future," says a Neurolab program scientist. "This will be the most complex life sciences mission ever flown."

NEW YORK - ITT shareholders finally get their say on Wednesday. After a succession of financial and legal maneuvers punctuated by some choice trash talk between rival executives, the battle for ITT could be decided by a shareholder vote at ITT's long-delayed annual meeting. The vote will likely determine whether ITT and its Sheraton hotel and Caesars casino chains go to Hilton Hotels with a \$9.3 billion bid or to Starwood Lodging Trust with a \$10.2 billion bid.

Making a Difference

On Wednesday, November 5th Phi Kap had its annual Cardboard City. Every year the brothers set-up a few shacks made out of cardboard boxes in front of the Bryant Center and stay out overnight. Not only does this catch the attention of everyone going to dinner, but a press release is also done and local media usually picks up the story. This year Channel 6, an ABC affiliate, aired scenes from the event to homes all over the state. Hopefully this inspired others to help the cause and make a difference.

Phi Kap also made a direct difference in the lives of the poor and less fortunate. Starting three days prior to the event, brothers sat outside the dining halls and asked students to sign-away meals from their meal plans. Aramark in-turn makes a donation of one dollar for each meal signed away to the McAuley House soup kitchen and support center. Thanks to the hundreds of students and faculty who contributed, many men, women, and children will have a little more hope this holiday season.

One thing that I don't think many people wonder about when they sign-away a meal to a charity is, "exactly where does the money go?" To tell you the truth, I put the whole event together and all I knew was that it would benefit McAuley House soup kitchen in Providence. Well, on the day after Cardboard City I went to McAuley House and spoke to Sister Wilma. The written philosophy of McAuley states that it exists with a three-fold purpose: 1. To feed, clothe, and take care of the various needs of the poor. 2. To pray and fast that the Spirit enlighten the ministry at the house. 3. To challenge those in society who have more than they need to share it with their brothers and sisters. The sisters in the house serve a late breakfast and a dinner in the after-

noon. They also offer services to anyone that needs them, such as helping families with their rents, getting children into the public school system, and helping to get the jobless jobs. They basically do everything that they can at McAuley House and they are totally funded by donations, grants, and volunteers giving their time to help. It is because of this that your donations are so important. For anyone that didn't make a contribution but would like to, the address of McAuley House is 163 Niagara Street, Providence, RI 02907.

If you have never done any charity work I would like to point out that it is not unrewarding. Just knowing that you are making a positive difference in people's lives makes you feel great. And it doesn't have to be an inconvenience either. I didn't just sit on the ground for 8 hours straight last Wednesday night. We played football and Frisbee for hours. We got hot chocolate delivered by several sororities. Plus we all got on television. It was cool.

I would now like to especially thank all the other Greek organizations here at Bryant. We got total support from every fraternity and sorority. When I gave a representative from each a meal sign-away sheet, I got them all back the next day completely filled out. I am pointing this out because I want the 85% of the student body that isn't Greek to see that we are not just a bunch of party animals that cause nothing but trouble. Each and every Greek organization here helps the less fortunate in our community. Besides McAuley House, Phi Kappa Sigma donates several times a year to the Leukemia Society of America. Phi Kappa Tau takes part in the Sponsor a Child program. They are also planning a hunger strike in February where they won't eat for 36 hours in an effort to raise money for those in need. Delta Kappa Epsilon holds an annual clothes drive and they soon will be sponsoring a blood drive. Beta Theta Pi holds an annual auction and roadrace to benefit the Leukemia Society of Rhode Island. They also have their annual Putt-A-Thon in the rotunda, which raises money for the Hole in the Wall Gang, a camp for terminally ill children. Every year Tau Epsilon Phi has their 48-hour Teeter-Totter-A-Thon which all proceeds benefiting Tannerhill, a local charity for abused and neglected children. Tau Kappa Epsilon volunteers their time each year at Ronald McDonald House. Delta Chi raises money each year for United Cerebral Palsy. Theta Phi Alpha raises money each year for Glenmary Missioners of Ohio, the American Cancer Society, and the American Diabetes Association.

Delta Zeta raised nearly a thousand dollars last year for Gallaudet, a school for the speech and hearing impaired. Sigma Sigma Sigma raises money each year for the Robby Paige Memorial, a charity that benefits terminally ill children. Phi Sigma Sigma raises money for the National Kidney Foundation with their annual Jail-n-Bail. There is probably no other day of the year, though, that as much volunteered charity work is done than when

The Rhode Island Special Olympics are held right here at Bryant. Just seeing the look on all the participants faces when they compete is enough of a reward for every Greek organization to show in full force to help.

Last year I sat in psychology class as everyone in it, including the professor, debated Greek life. When the subject of charity work came up my professor said that it was nice that Greeks did so much for the community but he saw no reason why you had to be in a fraternity or sorority to volunteer. 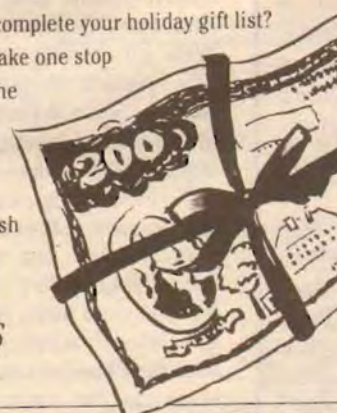

Registration will always be a problem at many colleges across the country. It is a problem at Bryant. A majority of the students here feel it is unfair because they always seem to get high numbers. The logic to the number system is that once you get a high number, the next time you will receive a low number, thus ensuring that every student at some point will be given a fair chance to register early in the process.

After talking to several students, they feel there is much needed improvement in the registration process. Some students feel it should be done on a first come, first serve basis. The main problem that students were angry about is that they always get shut out of classes and then fall behind. They claim that when they get shut out, they end up taking classes that will have little meaning for them and sometimes have to postpone graduation.

The death penalty: No solution

Hats off to John Slattery (Peabody, MA), who cast the deciding vote that defeated the Massachusetts bill to reinstate the death penalty.

Amidst all the harsh rhetoric and personal attacks on this man, I did not hear even a whisper of a search for solutions to the factors that fuel the criminality that plagues Massachusetts and the nation.

"If you screw up we'll kill you, but don't ask us to foot the bill early on to help you become a productive contributing citizen," seems to be the refrain. But then again, in a country that was barely able to force itself last year to raise the minimum wage to (gasp!) five whole dollars an hour (could you even subsist on that amount??), I suppose I shouldn't be surprised.

Not that I disagree that some people deserve the death penalty; I don't pity every scumbag who commits a heinous, unprovoked crime. Simply put, capital punishment is seldom a deterrent and unilaterally fails to solve the problem.

It makes some people feel good, though: "Boy, we really taught him a lesson, didn't we?" Unfortunately, it was a lesson we weren't willing to teach him before he got to that point. Much like Charlie Brown wetting his pants in a dark suit—a nice warm feeling for a few minutes but no plausible gain. Why, I ask you, is the murder rate so much lower in Canada? There's no death penalty there. Strict gun control, though. Strong social services, too. In Britain, western Europe, Japan, Australia, etc., it's pretty much the same story. The USA is, to my knowledge, the only industrialized democracy in the world with capital punishment, and curiously we have the highest murder rate. Some deterrent.

Hand in hand, the same proponents of capital punishment start foaming at the mouth when you mention gun control. Wouldn't it dawn on you that a country awash in guns would also top the murder list? So much for the cliché that guns make you safe from crime. If so, we'd be the safest country in the world.

I recall the killing several years ago in Louisiana of a Japanese exchange student. He was dressed in a Halloween costume and was shot to death when he rang a doorbell at the wrong house. His mother later said she didn't hate Americans because of this but felt sorry for us; if we feel so threatened merely by a stranger at our door, we are worse off than we think. What really scared me was how many people told me they thought the Louisiana homeowner did the right thing.

After the recent questionable verdict in the trial of au pair Louis Woodward, perhaps Mr. Slattery thought twice about giving Massachusetts legendary out of touch bureaucracy power over life and death.

We have to look back in history to the executions of Niccolò Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, two immigrant union organizers and anarchists from Brockton, MA. They were framed, never allowed a proper defense, and executed in the 1920's during a wave of anti-immigrant hysteria.

Certainly, innocent people have been executed and exonerated after the fact. Unfortunately, they couldn't be there when the charges were dropped.

Karl Krupski of Peabody, MA, made a good point this weekend when he said, "My sister-in-law is a lawyer and says that if you don't have the money for a good lawyer, you don't stand a shot at a fair trial."

The previous year, my license was suspended for six months, although I was never notified of it, for a stop sign violation ticket which I had paid on time. At my hearing, when I produced proof of timely payment, the bureaucrat told me "we know you paid on time, but we go by the date that we posted it," which was almost a month after I sent it.

How can you win with people like this? Even if you're 100% right, you're still wrong; and the reverse is true for them.

And you think I believe in giving clowns like this power of life and death? Not in your life!

Accept performance that meets your standards; reward performance that exceeds your standards; and correct performance that does not meet your standards. Determine the cause of poor performance and take appropriate action. When you hold subordinates accountable to you for their performance, they realize they are responsible for accomplishing missions as individuals and as teams.

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients except vegetable oil spray. Use your hands to mix ingredients thoroughly. Shape mixture into 6 patties.

Grill over medium-hot coals 4 to 5 minutes per side or until no longer pink. Or preheat broiler and lightly spray the rack of an unheated broiler pan with vegetable oil. Place patties on rack. Broil 3 to 4 inches from heat for 4 to 5 minutes per side or until no longer pink.

Serves 6; 1 burger per serving. Preparation time: 10 minutes. Cooking time: 8 to 10 minutes.

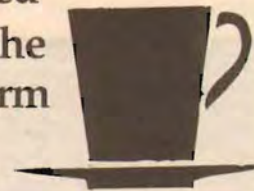

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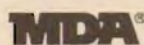
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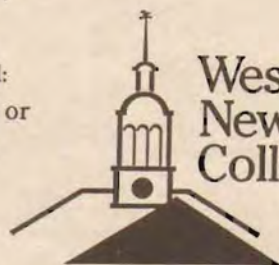

DEWEY NAMED TO ALL-NORTHEAST-10 SQUAD

Senior forward Jared Dewey (Sharon, MA/Sharon) has been selected to the Northeast-10 All-Conference Men's Soccer second team.

This marks the second consecutive season he has earned all-conference accolades. Dewey was an all-NE-10 first-team choice in 1996.

"Jared is an outstanding player, one that we are going to miss," second-year head coach Seamus Purcell said. "His speed and explosiveness made him one of the conference's most dangerous offensive players. His accomplishments give our younger players something to strive for."

Dewey led the Bulldogs (7-7-2) in scoring for the second straight

season with 21 points (9g-3a). Last season, Dewey broke the school mark for goals in a season, tallying 16.

In his final collegiate game November 2 (a 4-0 win over American International College) Dewey scored twice in the first 9:30 to become Bryant's all-time leading goal scorer (35 goals). He later added an assist to finish his career with 79 points, one shy of the school record of 80 points, established by Silverio Araujo in 1986-1988.

Dewey also owns the Bryant record for points in game (seven vs. Sacred Heart 10/30/96), and is one of three Bulldogs to score three goals in a game.

VOLLEYBALL:

BRYANT SWEEPS
The Bryant College volleyball team swept past Southern Connecticut State University and the University of Massachusetts-Lowell by identical 3-0 scores in a tri-match this afternoon.

The Bulldogs improve to 24-11 overall. UMass-Lowell, who defeated Southern Conn. State, 3-0, goes to 18-14. Southern Conn. State falls to 2-29.

Senior Jennifer Carvalho recorded 42 assists and senior Janet Rooney tallied 14 kills in the Bulldogs win over Southern Conn. State. Junior Monica Carnevalini added 13 kills and 12 digs for the victors.

In the final match of the day, Carvalho led Bryant with 27 assists and nine digs. She is 72 assists of breaking the Northeast-10 Conference single-season assist record of 1,409 she established in 1994. Carvalho currently has 1,338.

It was the final regular season home matches for senior Carvalho, Rooney, Wendy Jackson, and Olga Perez Bonnelly.

In the other match of the day, junior Katie Toomey registered 15 kills and eight digs in the River Hawks' 3-0 victory over Southern Connecticut State.

Junior Matt Roloff was the Bulldogs' top finisher at the NCAA Division II Cross Country East Region Championship held Saturday in Kings Park, NY. The 1997 first-team All-Northeast Conference selection finished 51st out of 197 runners.

Roloff was followed by senior Shawn Nassaney (70th-37:00). The men finished 21st overall.

On the women's side, junior Jackie Ely was the highest finisher among Bryant women (60th-21:08). Freshman Jennifer Ceolinski came in 111th (22:12).

WOMEN'S SOCCER:

HURLEY NAMED FIRST-TEAM ALL-NE-10

Andrea Hurley (Norfolk, MA/King Phillip) has been named to the Northeast-10 All-Conference women's soccer first team.

Hurley, a sweeper, is the first Bulldog to make the first team since 1991, when Melissa Roberts earned the honor.

After a slow start, Bryant won six of its last seven games to finish 8-9. The Bulldogs were ranked eighth in the Division II New England Regional Poll.

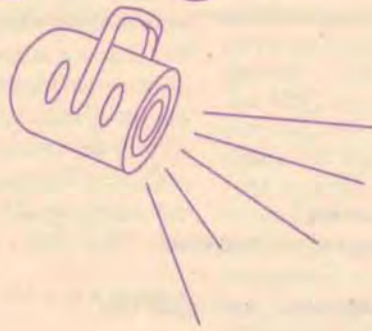

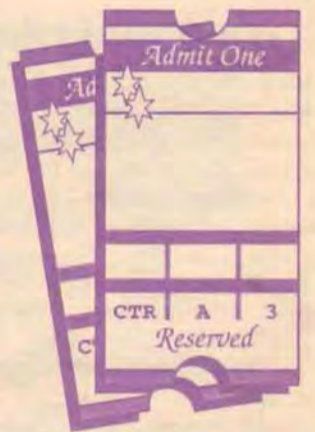
