ResHall networking Scholarships shams hold little better than ever validity in court

Welcome back to Bryant! We're happy to have everyone back on campus and anxious to assist you in using its technology to your best advantage. Last year, Information Technology connected over 250 of you to the campus network, providing Internet access from every residence hall and townhouse. This year we anticipate doubling that number to 500, or about 30% of the total resident population. To make this process smoother, we have instituted several changes to the installation process.

This year we have again contracted an outside vendor to install your network card if you need help, only this year the service is provided free of charge. A technician from DataCare will be in Meeting Room 3 of the Bryant Center every Monday through Thursday from noon to 5 p.m., until September 30. After that, we will provide installation assistance on an appointment basis only. The bookstore will be selling 3COM network cards and patch cables throughout the year for your convenience.

Once your network card is installed, or if your system already has a network card, you still need to inform Information Technology that you are ready to connect your computer to the net. Make note of the number above the data port in your room and head for the Koffler Technology Center. Connect to the World Wide Web via Netscape and go to the address http://web.bryant.edu/ ~resweb. This page provides you with an electronic form you must fill out for network access. An email message is sent to our Network Services team, who will activate your data port and contact you with further information.

Please note that if you were connected to the Internet from your residence hall last year you still need to use the ResWeb page to get reconnected this year. Not only do we need to activate the data port, but the IP address you used last year is no longer necessary. We now use a new addressing scheme called DHCP, which issues your computer an IP address each time you connect to the net.

Everyone should be aware that although we are not requiring you to sign up for an appointment to have your network card installed, that does not mean your machine will be ready to pick up the same day you drop it off. Chances are that many people will be bringing in their PCs the first several days, and there are only so many machines that can be worked on in five hours.

Once you have been connected to the ResNet, if you have any problems with connections or computer problems in general, you can contact one of our Resident Computer Consultants, or RCCs. We have set up an RCC troubleshooting line for you to report problems. Just dial ext. 6550 and leave a voice message detailing your problem, and an RCC will contact you will a solution or to set up an appointment.

Federal Trade Commision news

Two Seattle, WA-based companies and their principal officers have aggreed to pay an estimated \$288,000 into a redress pool from which partial refunds may be made to students who paid between \$40 and \$70 for either high-paying summer jobs in the Alaskan fishing industry or on cruise ships, or for scholarships or other college financial aid, the Federal Trade commission announced today. the FTC had charged the defendants--Progressive Media, Inc. and Collegiate Communications Group, Inc .- last November with misrepresenting that the employment and financial aid directories they sold through telemarketing calls actually were "programs" that guaranteed students jobs with free room, board, and transportation, or free financial aid from a "\$6 billion pool of unclaimed aid." Teh FTC also alleged that the defendants' money-back gaurantee turned out to be false.

The charges in this case were filed as part of "Operation Midded Fortune," a federal-state enforcement crackdown on business opportunity and employment schemes that involved more than 75 actions by the FTC and securities regulators or Attorneys General from 25 states. as the upcoming school year approaches, the FTC advises students looking for financial aid that no scholarship search service can guarantee that a student will receive a scholarship, and that such promises are a red flag for fraud. In addition, the FTC said, money-back

guarantees for scholarship or employemnt services often come with conditions that are impossible or, at best, difficult to meet.

The individuals defendants in this particular case are Matthew G. Lucas, Kevin Lustgarten and Mark Buchan. The FTC filed its complaint detailing the charges in federal district court in Seattle, and the judge on November 4, 1996, issued a temporary restaining order freezing the defendants' assets. The court granted a preliminary injunction tha tcontinued the asset freeze and prohibited the alleged misrepresentations on December 10. Trial was set for April 8, but the defendants then entered into settlement negotiations with the FTC, within which they agreed to reimburse approximately \$280,000 in funds collected.

Six signs that program may be a scam

1) "The scholarship is guaranteed or your money back." No one can guarantee that they'll get you a grant or scholarship, since they are based on financial figures and grades. Get refund policies in writing--before you pay.

2) "You can't get this information anywhere else." There are many free lists of scholarships. Check with your school or library before you decide to pay someone to do the work for you.

3) "May I have your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship?" Don't give out such information on the phone without getting information in writing first. They may set-up an unauthorized withdrawal

5) "The scholarship will cost some money." Don't pay anyone who claims to be "holding" a scholarship or grant for you. free money should not cost a thing.

6) "You've been selected by a 'national foundation' to receive a scholarship," or "You're a finalist" in a contest you never entered. Before you send money to apply for a scholarship to check it out.Make sure the program or foundation is legitimate.



ARMY ROTC CORNER

Welcome back and I hope everyone had an enjoyable, relaxing summer. The busiest time for ROTC is the summer months and this past summer was no exception. Early in the summer we awarded scholarships for the upcoming school year, and throughout the summer ROTC cadets attended a variety of training all over the country. Allow me to bring you up to date on what the Cadets from Bryant College did this past summer.

Army ROTC awarded over \$156,000 dollars of scholarships to six Bryant students over the summer. Scott Gill, Danielle Porter, Patrick Gray, and Vladimir Herisse were all awarded 2-Year scholarships worth \$12,800 per year. John Calcagni and Victor Soto were awarded 3-Year scholarships worth \$9,000 per year. These Bryant students competed against other students from colleges nationwide. Each applicant was evaluated on: academic excellence, demonstrated leadership potential, physical fitness, extracurricular activities, and oral and written communication skills. In addition to the amount of scholarship awarded, each cadet will receive \$450 per year for books and supplies, and \$150 per month of school enrollment for living expenses. Each recipient has demonstrated mental and physical fitness, integrity, moral courage, and high leadership aptitude necessary to receive such an award. Two of the scholarship winners, Vladmir Herisse and Patrick Gray, spent six weeks this summer attending Camp Challenge competing for their scholarships. Camp Challenge is six weeks of rigorous, intense training at Fort Knox, Kentucky. While at Camp Challenge, cadets live the life of an Army Soldier. Cadets go through a series of demanding and stressful leadership challenges, confidence courses, water survival training, first aid, marksmanship, physical fitness, rappelling, land navigation, and a 3-day tactical training exercise. The training is designed to develop each cadet's leadership ability and instill the traits and values it takes to become an Army Officer. While at camp, the cadets compete against each other for the scholarships that



ness, as well as additional landing techniques, and then get to practice them while dropping from a 250foot tower. In the third and final week, "Jump Week," troopers will execute five parachute jumps from heights between 1,250 and 2,000 feet, with at least one jump being executed at night. Congratulations to both Jeff and Eric for becoming the Army's newest paratroopers, and let me be the first to call you two "Airborne."

Our senior Cadets where busy as well; Cadets Seth Anderson, Brad Crough, Eric Fortin, and Jennifer MacDonald attended Advanced Camp 97, at Fort Lewis, Washington. Cadets from across the country attended the 5-week camp. Cadets were evaluated in a variety of leadership positions as they put their skills to test through a variety of structured, realistic training events. Training consisted of land navigation, physical fitness, recondo rope course, field leadership reaction course, hand grenade and machine gun assault course, branch orientation, and squad and platoon operations. Following camp, cadets were given the opportunity to participate in a variety of training from Airborne and Air Assault school, Cadet Leadership Training, and Drill Cadet Leadership training with active Army units across the world. Leadership Principle of the Week: Know yourself and seek self-improvement. To know yourself, you have to understand who you are and what your preferences, strengths, and weaknesses are. Knowing yourself allows you to take advantage of your strengths and work to overcome your weaknesses. Seeking self-improvement means continually developing your weaknesses. This will increase your competence and the confidence your subordinates have in your ability to train and lead them.

Cadets Jeff Holt and Eric Fortin attended the Army's Airborne School at Fort Benning Georgia. Airborne School is a three week course designed to teach new paratroopers how to jump from an aircraft by parachute. The physically demanding course is broken down into three weeks of intense training. During the first week, "Ground Week," soldiers are instructed how to execute a parachute landing fall, make individual exits from a mock aircraft door, and begin to exit from a 34-foot tower. During the second week, "Tower Week," troopers learn about the Swing Landing Trainer and the Suspended Har-

BRYANT ONE CARD

All resident students, other than those residing in a townhouse, must participate in a meal-plan. If you purchased a Meals Plus Plan, you will be entitled to a number of meals, plus there will be a balance of "points" on the card which may be used as discretionary spending money at the following locations: The Bagel Express, Bookstore, Heritage Dining, The Scoop, Subway, Pizza Hut, Images, The Info Desk, Salmanson Dining Hall, and South Dining Hall. Additional points, (minimum of \$25.00), may be purchased through the Bursar's Office.

Your Bryant One Card may also be used for vending, laundry, and--sometime in September--for copies in the Library. Discounts will be given by using the One Card for those services. The above services are activated only after you have deposited funds to your vending stripe or have transferred points to vending. Either of the transactions mentioned above must be done at the CVC machines, located in the Unistructure near the ATM and at the Bryant Center near South Dining Hall.

As in the past, if you should loose your Bryant ID, please report it to the ARAMARK office immediately. ARAMARK will continue to lock out cards for dining hall entry when the card is reported as lost, though we cannot prevent anyone from using the vending stripe.

The magnetic stripe used for vending, is an off-line function. There are no tracking capabilities for deposits or usage of your card. This means that should you lose or damage your card, refunds cannot be issued for any funds remaining on your vending stripe. Having dollars on the vending stripe is like having cash. For this reason, we are restricting the dollar value allowed on the vending stripe to \$20.00. You may add cash to the vending stripe at anytime, by visiting either CVC unit. Since your ID is now worth money, PLEASE be careful with it.







Head coach Chris Guay is relying on the experience of ten returning starters to propel Bryant to its first winning season since 1987.

"I have high expectations after last season. We were very competitive. Hopefully, we'll be able to pull out of some of the one- and twogoal losses we suffered last fall."

A balanced offensive attack is spearheaded by forwards Kim Gregory and Kathy Harrison. The duo accounted for over half of Bryant's goals last season. Sophomore sweeper Andrea Hurley turned heads as one the conference's best young players. In net for the Bulldogs is Stephanie Smith, who turned in a solid freshman campaign, posting two shutouts despite missing three games due to injury.

Men's soccer preview:

Jared Dewey, the Bulldogs are primed to make their first post-season appearance in three years.

After a quiet sophomore campaign, Dewey was nearly dominant last fall. The allconference selection scored a school record of 16 goals and tied school bests for points (seven) and goals (three) in a game. The explosive senior needs eight goals to become Bryant's all-time leading goal scorer and 32 points to become the college's career scoring leader.

Other key returners for the Bulldogs are senior Scott Mann, a very capable midfielder who tallied 16 points in '95, and senior sweeper Ken Verzella,

The goalkeeping job is wide open. Incumbent Dan Cain seems to have the inside track, but will be pursued by senior Matt Woijtas and as many as three freshmen

Women's tennis preview

In his seven seasons as the head coach of the Bryant women's tennis team, Bob Coker has never had a losing season. With five of the Bulldogs' top six singles players and two strong doubles pairs returning this fall, it appears that the streak will remain intact throughout the 1997 campaign.

Junior Helen Matteson seems to be the heir apparent to Lisa Sarandopolis, last season's #1 singles player. Coker expects much from senior Yolanda Sorrell, a winner in both of her singles matches last fall. Senior Captain Tracy Caprio and senior Beth Anderson, who posted a 9-5 mark in '96, will also figure prominently in Coker's plans this season.

Jennifer Kiellar, an outstanding

doubles player who earned NE-10 Player of the Week September 23 of last year, will be in search of a new partner at #1 doubles. Kiellar and Sarandopolis teamed up to record an 11-7 mark last season, including wins in their final four matches. Kiellar started last season in sizzling fashion, picking up wins in her first five matches at #4 singles.

Jen Flaherty, named the conference rookie of the week September 23 of last year, led the team in wins last fall with 12 in #4, #5, #6 singles play. An excellent doubles player, Flaherty could pair with either Sorrell or Gayle Zahnke at #2.

In addition, four highly-touted freshman will provide depth for the Bulldogs.

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
