Why must we take Liberal Arts as a Minor?

So much confusion has been happening as of late for the class of 2000. You may have heard of the petition going around by the freshman class to stop mandatory the Liberal Arts Minor program. While many of the sophomore, junior and senior friends of freshmen have mentioned that they did not have to minor in Liberal Arts, but could minor in business fields such as CIS or Marketing, the implementation of the modes of thought into the curriculum forces freshmen to hold minors in strictly liberal arts programs. This means that minors cannot be taken (from this point on) in any of the major concentrations available for study; students must now either take a double major in the non-liberal arts field which interests them or take classes in that field of study without really receiving a diploma stating that they had done such. Could this alteration of the curriculum be worked around for the favor of the students here at Bryant?

Working up to the end of the line has you finding that every turn you take brings you to a dead end with only little cracks to maneuver through. So I did; I found cracks in the system and found who to talk to by going from office to office and

finding the names of the professors of who were in charge of this drastic change. These professors were Professor David Ketcham, of the Finance Department, and Professor Joe Urgo, Chair of the English Department. Upon asking these two professors what change has happened, they both gave me basically the same answer: for this college to become accredited as part of the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), minor concentration fields must be limited to those of a liberal arts nature. Otherwise the prescribed minor of liberal arts that is implied with this accreditation would be null and void.

To become part of the AACSB, the college has to follow certain rules to gain the accreditation. Bryant had to change the curriculum so that they could follow the rules. These rules were simple to enforce, yet complicated to create. It took the faculty three years of hard deliberation to find out how to rearrange the curriculum so as to conform to the specifics needed for the accreditation. They basically had to maneuver the curriculum so that 50% of the courses were that of Business, such that of your major, while the other 50% of the curriculum goes to that of Liberal Arts. So it was up to these professors to make it mandatory that we must take a Liberal Arts Minor, hence enabling

the student body to be able to graduate from an accredited college.

Starting at midnight last night, five Bryant freshmen (Chris Mackin, John West, Jeremy Stammad, Rupert King, and Mirko Greffkin) decided to go around from room to room in Hall 14 asking people to sign a petition requesting for the allowance of students to override this minor concentration restriction. They continued in this fashion up until 3:30 p.m. today (don't worry; they took a nap or two in between).

These upstart students received well over 450 signatures (more than half of the freshman class) to the petition. With this, the students brought the issue to floor of the senate. While the senate did not exactly know where to go with this issue, the students decided to fall back on the words of one of their Professors here at Bryant to go directly and see the President. President Machtley was happy to hear them out on the spot and decided then and there to send out a mass mailing about this issue, in hopes of clearing up the confusion.

So, be on the lookout for information in your mailboxes in the upcoming week. If you have any questions regarding the logistics of this newly developed and implemented curriculum, I urge you to seek the answers from either Professor Urgo or Professor Ketcham.

PUBLIC SAFETY BEAT

VEHICLE TOW

March 21, 1997- A vehicle was parked in a Resident Director's parking space. After several attempts to find the owner, the vehicle was finally towed.

THEFT

March 21, 1997- A wallet was taken from a book bag that was left in an unsecured locker in the men's locker room of the Gym. Ten dollars and other personal items were in the wallet. A check of the area was made, but the wallet was not recovered.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION

March 21, 1997- DPS responded to a residence hall for a possible scent of an illegal substance coming from a room. While no drugs were found, DPS discovered beer and other alcohol. Because all the people were under 21, the alcohol was confiscated and destroyed. Charges were filed.

FIRE ALARM (False)

March 22, 1997- DPS officers responded to Hall 2 for a reported fire alarm. The cause was not found, and the on duty electrician had to be called to reset the alarm.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION

March 22, 1997- DPS officers, while clearing a call, observed several individuals with open containers. When they were asked to dump their containers, all with the exception of one refused. The remaining were charged.

THEFT

March 22, 1997- DPS responded to a residence to take a report of stolen food. Upon arrival, the resident told officers that sometime during the night someone entered their townhouse and stole food out of their freezer. Officers advised the residents to make sure their door is locked. This is still under investigation.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION

March 22, 1997- DPS responded to disperse a large crowd in a residence hall. In the room was a keg covered up by a curtain. The keg was confiscated and destroyed. While on this call, a resident student became abusive with a supervisor. Disorderly conduct charges were filed as well as the charges for the alcohol violation.

FIRE ALARM (False)

March 22, 1997- A fire alarm was reported in a townhouse. A check was made of the entire unit. A smoke detector was found activated on the second floor. After checking the

unit, the alarm was reset, and all units were cleared.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION/ DRUG VIOLATION/THEFT

March 22, 1997- DPS responded to a residence hall in regards to an alcohol/drug violation. Officers found illegal drugs/alcohol and a stolen sign from the reserved lot. All items were confiscated. The alcohol was destroyed, and the drugs are being held as evidence. Charges have been filed.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION

March 22, 1997- DPS spotted two students walking with back packs and asked them to reveal what they were carrying. The two individuals then ran into a residence hall. Other officers responded and found them. In their possession were three cases of alcohol. Both students were under 21. All of the alcohol was destroyed. Charged have been filed.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION/ FAKE ID

March 22, 1997- A DPS officer stopped a student carrying a case of beer. When asked to produce any ID, the student showed an ID that was altered. The alcohol was confiscated and destroyed. Charges have been filed.

VANDALISM

March 22, 1997- DPS was called to a vandalism in a residence. Someone had punched holes in a bathroom wall. An investigation will continue.

FIRE ALARM (False)

March 23, 1997- DPS responded to a Hall 3 for a fire alarm. After a check of the floor was made, it was found that a heat sensor was activated in a bathroom. The electrician was called to reset the alarm, and all units were cleared.

ALCOHOL VIOLATION

March 23, 1997- During a fire alarm, DPS discovered three kegs in plain view. All were confiscated and destroyed, and charges were filed for the people living in that particular suite.

DRUG VIOLATION

March 23, 1997- DPS officers responded to a residence hall for a report of a strong smell of marijuana. It was apparent that it was coming from one particular room, and when DPS knocked, after waiting some time, they were let in. They first denied having any illegal substance. Because DPS had probable cause, a search of the suite was made. Two bags of marijuana and other paraphernalia were found. SPD

responded, and the residents were arrested. Charges have been filed on campus as well.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

March 23, 1997- DPS responded to a residence hall to take a report of a fight. Because some students looked injured, they were all asked if they needed EMS assistance, but all refused. When asked if any wanted to press charges, they all refused. Shortly after, things settled down, and DPS cleared.

VANDALISM

March 23, 1997- A student walked into DPS to report that someone broke his door knob while he was out. Because the lock was beyond repair, the entire door had to be replaced. This cost will come out of the floor's room deposit. DPS is still investigating.

FIRE ALARM (False)

March 23, 1997- DPS responded to a residence for an activated fire alarm. Upon arrival, it was discovered that the smoke detector on the second floor was set off. No cause for this was found. The alarm was shortly reset, and all units were cleared.

Catching up with a runny nose

Do you have a cold? The common cold affects millions of people every year. It usually starts with a sore throat, sneezing and a runny nose. There are ways to prevent the common cold and facts that you should know.

The common cold is caused by viruses and lasts approximately seven to fourteen days. Don't be fooled by the myths: you can't catch a cold from a draft, from having wet hair, or from a sudden drop in temperature. Some common activities such as smoking and consuming alcohol can increase your chances of catching a cold. Smoking or living with a smoker kills the small filtering hairs in the nose and throat. This will increase your chances of getting a cold because you cannot filter out the virus. Your appetite will be reduced, which then decreases the possibility that you will eat essential vitamins and minerals. Alcohol suppresses your immune system, which will cause your body to become susceptible to the cold.

If you eat a variety of foods and get enough rest, you will help to prevent the common cold. Regular exercise will renew your energy and reduce your stress. This will also help to prevent the common cold. Practice preventive health care and know when to seek professional help. Before using any medication, read the label.

Recognizing our heritage

Publication of this issue of the Archway occurs during the week of the holiday of Purim in the Jewish calendar. A minor feast, Purim is highlighted by the reading of a special scroll, called the Megillah, which narrates the ancient Purim story. The Megillah is identical with the Biblical Book of Esther.

The key protagonists in the story are, on the one side, Queen Esther and her cousin Mordecai, and on the other side, Haman, who has been appointed prime minister of Persia. The king of the realm is a weak-willed character who time-and-again is moved to action by events that are incidental to the main issues. Vashti, the former queen, is herself removed as a result of one of the king's emotional outbursts. She remains in memory as a silent and silenced witness to the independence of women in a time and place ruled by insecure men. It is perhaps ironic that, alone of all the books in the Bible, the Book of Esther makes no mention of the deity. It is as if God, too, is silent in such a time,

when human beings are responsible for working out their own destiny.

The figure of Haman has become a conventional stereotype for the anti-semitic. According to the narrative, Haman suffers a loss of pride when he is apparently slighted by

identity as a Jew. At the turning-point of the story, it is her disclosure of her identity to the king that turns the tide against Haman.

Like Esther, each and every one of us knows what it is like to be part of a minority in a large and diverse realm. In fact, today's America is so diverse that at one time or another even members of the so-called majority have probably experienced the feeling of being in a minority. Like Esther, who initially concealed her identity, we too may have accepted the conventional wisdom that "discretion is the better part of valor," and refrained from acknowledging our heritage. But Esther also teaches us that there is a moment of truth, when one must stand up and be counted. As the rabbinic sage Hillel used to say, "If I am not for myself, then who will be for me? But if I am for myself alone, what am I?"

Rhode Island Special Olympics was established in 1976. In 1981, Bryant was selected as the site for the Northern Rhode Island Games.

In years that followed, the students began to organize all the activities associated with the game with minimal help or supervision from the Rhode Island Chapter of Special Olympics. The Bryant Community is in charge of all activities from raising money to fund the games to performing the closing ceremonies.

Living by our values Wanna Catcha Movie?

A few weeks ago, I was speaking to a student about damage in general, and specifically, damage he had suffered to his motorcycle while it was parked here at Bryant. What I discovered during our discussion was that over the years, he had had damage done to his motorcycle several times, with repair amounts approaching \$2,000. While he doesn't blame Bryant for the damage, he would certainly appreciate efforts the College could take to reduce damage. But he reserved his harshest criticism for those who had committed the vandalism, whether those persons were students or the guests of students. He wondered out loud, and so did I, "What is the cause of this behavior?"

Last Sunday, I was attending a national professional conference in Chicago which featured an undergraduate student panel. The Bryant student on the panel asked the same question. He wanted to know why students cause damage. He already knew that such incidents tend to be related to alcohol consumption, but that wasn't enough for him. Just because someone's inhibitions are down, he wondered, why does that so frequently lead to students or their guests damaging college property or the property of others? We have seen a reduction in the amount of damage and vandalism to College property this year, but what about the property of our fellow community members? Doesn't that deserve our respect as well?

What, in fact, are the values some of our students and their guests have that allows them to damage the cars, motorcycles, clothing, and/or other possessions of others? Many of us believe this reflects a crisis of values among some of our students.

We all live by our values. Things like mutual respect, compassion, reverence, shared responsibility, and justice are ideas and ideals by which we can live our lives. Damage and vandalism don't reflect these values, but perhaps are indicative of someone who lives by values such as "look out for number 1," or "I've got mine, you get yours." Is it any wonder why these same people scratch cars, break light poles, or steal from their fellow students? What can we do as a community to stop them?

No single person can handle a problem like this alone. But perhaps we need to stop "enabling" vandals on our campus. The best way is never to make heroes of vandals, anymore than we make heroes of thieves. Most of us wouldn't tolerate it if we saw someone stealing another student's money, books or clothing, yet we seem far more tolerant when we see them break a window or furniture, or knock over someone's motorcycle. By our silence in these situations, we are reinforcing this kind of behavior and, in effect, letting the vandals win. If we are to have a community characterized by mutual respect and understanding, a community in which people care for others and are cared for themselves, then vandalism — whether committed against the College or against other students — must become a thing of the past. We can speak out against damage and encourage our students to take responsibility for their actions, but the most important and most basic thing we can do is to live every day according to the highest values of community. If we can do that, vandalism will become a distant and fading memory at Bryant College.

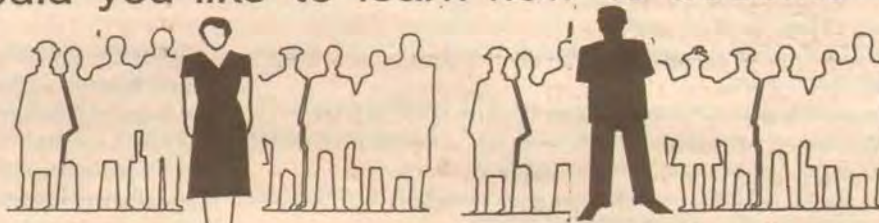

AHA SETS CPR CLASSES FOR LIFEGUARDS

Planning on working as a lifeguard this summer? Know someone else who is? The American Heart Association reminds all potential lifeguards that they will need to be trained in the lifesaving skill of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) in order to obtain a license by the RI Department of Environmental Management.

The American Heart Association, RI Affiliate, is conducting classes now throughout the state for individuals interested in being licensed by the state as a lifeguard.

Lifeguards must take the Healthcare Provider CPR class, which is taught in a four hour class for renewals and an eight hour class for first time trainees. These programs include training with the AED (automatic external defibrillator). Healthcare providers need to renew their training each year.
