Providence woman struck twice in a row

A Providence woman who survived a car crash involving one drunken driver minutes later was struck and killed by another, police said.

Joyce Dorbor, a Johnson & Wales University hospitality worker, was preparing to celebrate her 50th birthday with friends when she died.

The van she was riding in struck another car on Allens Avenue around 12:25 a.m. Saturday. The driver, Oswaldo Orellana, 27, of Providence, was drunk, police said.

No one was hurt in the accident, but about two minutes later, as Dorbor stepped from the van, a car driven by another drunken man struck and killed her, police said.

She died at RI Hospital about two hours later, police said.

Dennis Zebro, 39, of Warwick, has been charged with driving under the influence, death resulting, a felony punishable by up to 15 years in prison, police said. He was released after posting \$200 bail, police said.

Tests showed his blood-alcohol level was more than 1 1/2 times above the 0.10 legal limit, police said.

Orellana was charged with driving while intoxicated and released. Tests showed his blood-alcohol level was more than twice the legal limit, police said.

Dorbor had worked for Johnson & Wales since 1991 and checked student identification cards for the school's meal plan in the last two years. She was divorced, said John Dion, chef manager of the Hospitality Center in Cranston.

Two reactors shut down at Russian nuclear plant

Two nuclear reactors were shut down Tuesday at a power plant in central Russia following a minor electrical malfunction, an official said.

There was no radiation leak at the Balakovo plant on the Volga River as a result of the incident, said Nuclear Power Ministry spokesman Georgy Kaurov. The problem was caused by a malfunctioning electrical switch in the junction box out-

side the reactor building, he said.

Immediately after the shutdown, at 12:41 a.m. Tuesday (2141 GMT Monday), a maintenance crew replaced the switch. They were working to restart the reactors, the spokesman said.

According to Kaurov, the problem was not serious enough to register on the international scale for nuclear incidents. The Balakovo plant, with four VVR-1000 reactors, is considered one of the safest in Russia.

Boy sues city for being attacked at school

A 14-year-old boy is seeking \$100,000 from the city because he says school officials failed to protect him from students who attacked him at Rogers High School.

Michael Hamill also claims the officials failed to notify police of last fall's attack, in which he suffered a concussion, two chipped teeth, a cut inside his mouth and a hole in his lip.

Lawyer Bruce Gladstein filed a personal injury claim on Hamill's behalf February 14. The claim is on Wednesday night's City Council agenda.

It is the council's policy to refer such matters to the city solicitor's office. A claim must be filed with the city before a lawsuit can be filed.

According to the claim, a cafeteria worker overheard a group of boys plotting to jump Hamill when he arrived at Rogers last November 8.

"At that time, the cafeteria worker either went herself or sent someone to get one of the supervisors of the school (e.g. principal or dean)," the petition said. "At that time, little or nothing was done to prevent the incident overheard by the cafeteria worker."

At about 7:30 a.m., Hamill was jumped and beaten by a group of

boys as he entered a side door.

"Michael was knocked unconscious by the severity and the duration of the punches and kicks," the petition said. "When Michael awoke, he was woozy and bleeding profusely from the mouth."

Hamill claimed two teachers ignored his injuries and passed by him as he made his way toward the dean's office. Another teacher eventually helped Hamill into the office and got him some ice.

Dean Barry Coofer "seemed agitated" when Hamill was unable to tell him what had happened and left his office to monitor the halls instead of tending to Hamill, the claim stated.

"At no time during this entire incident was 911 called or Michael given any medical treatment (other than an ice pack)," the petition said.

Coofer suspended a 17-year-old boy who admitted punching Hamill after the two had argued that morning, but police knew nothing of the incident until Hamill's mother called them from Newport Hospital, where the boy was being treated, according to the petition.

The suspended boy was arrested November 8 and charged with assault, according to police.

Rogers Interim Principal Mary Beth Pike said she had not seen a copy of Hamill's claim and refused to comment.

Disney pressured by its sweatshops

Walt Disney Co. shareholders overwhelmingly approved a new contract for chairman Michael Eisner, which easily could be worth \$300 million in stock and salary over the next decade.

By the same 7-1 margin, shareholders at the company's annual meeting on Tuesday also defeated resolutions requiring Disney to do more to police foreign workplaces and to examine pay policies to tie them more closely to job performance.

Speaking to a crowd of 10,000 in the arena where Disney's Mighty Ducks ice hockey team plays, Eisner defended his new 10-year deal as strictly performance-based.

He noted that since becoming chief executive in 1984, the total value of Disney stock has soared from \$2 billion to \$50 billion.

Eisner went out of his way to take personal responsibility for the debacle involving his friend Michael Ovitz, who spent 14 months as Disney's president in a botched attempt to carve out a role as Eisner's second in command.

Disney bought out the last four years of his contract for \$38.8 million in cash, plus stock options that easily could be worth more than \$100 million over the next few years.

Eisner said Disney rewards risk-

taking and is willing to tolerate the mistakes that inevitably result.

"I'd like to think this mistake thing doesn't apply to me," Eisner said, but he admitted the Ovitz affair was a mistake.

"It won't happen again," he said.

He noted that Wall Street and the media applauded Ovitz's hiring. Eisner said he and Disney's board also thought it was in the company's best interests at the time.

Other company officials who took the floor were subjected to occasional boos, accusations of arrogance and claims that the morale of rank-and-file workers is sagging.

Before the meeting, dozens of picketers outside the arena supported the resolution seeking to police foreign workplaces for sweatshop abuses.

Signs compared Eisner's salary to that of foreign workers who make Disney's licensed merchandise.

"It would take a Haitian 16.8 years to earn Eisner's hourly income of \$9,783," said one sign.

Disney Director of Corporate Operations Sanford Litvack defended Disney's policies regarding foreign workers. He said the company is aggressive in enforcing a strict code of conduct for licensees and contractors.

Loud cheers went up when someone in the audience called Litvack arrogant, and boos erupted when he denied that morale among Disney's workers had suffered because of recent benefit cutbacks.

As a result, ACA-accredited camps provide written employment agreements and personnel policies. An employment agreement should give the job description, salary, pay dates, benefits, and terms of employment. Personnel policies spell out how the camp handles time off, absence form work, performance evaluations, and requirements for health examinations.

Never forget your beliefs

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We are in that uncertain time between the seasons. Winter is declining, or is it? "Spring is just around the corner," or is it, indeed? Perhaps these winter days of cold and of unseasonable warmth are a sign that serious winter storms still await us. Perhaps the relative mildness of this winter is a sign of a tumultuous spring-to-come. One season of holidays has passed, and another will soon be before us. How do we consider this time that we have? What shall we do with it?

I remember the story of the sage, Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berdichev, who, one day, told his community to attend a brief meeting in the village square in the middle of the day, in the middle of the work week. Oh,

how they complained! What could the rabbi have to say that was so important that they should interrupt their work or that anyone should have to postpone the business at hand? The rabbi assured them that the matter he wished to proclaim was of the utmost importance. Would they please come? They did, and—gathering at the appointed time in the appointed place—they awaited his momentous announcement. After a moment of silence, their teacher proclaimed: "I, Levi Yitzchak, say to you that there is one God in heaven and earth, and that what we do every day, every hour is important!" That was all. That was everything!

The people understood that they had been called away from their daily tasks to be reminded, for the work that most of them were doing

was not value-centered, was not bearing witness to the values that, they said, were central to their lives. It is not enough, the rabbi was saying, to remember once in a while on Sabbaths and on holidays. In the daily rhythms of life, in the work and the living that we do, do we give the clearest expression of what matters to us? In these uncertain days of transition between the seasons of our lives, it is a good time to pause and remember, to reflect and recommit. Uncertainty about life's storms may be balanced by our own determination to respond in ways that express what is really important to us.

Interest in the subject of business is high in other countries, and, as a result, American business colleges are welcoming a growing number of international students into their scholarly ranks. Here at Bryant, enrollment of international students has quadrupled over the past five years. Foreign students investing in an American education are highly motivated and, consequently, avid library users. They have interest in resources informing them of "news from home," as well as of political and business developments in their particular country. The Hodgson Memorial Library houses a number of print and electronic resources featuring international news.

Library subscriptions to daily newspapers reporting from other countries include: **The People's Daily** from Beijing (in Chinese), **The Financial Times** (<http://www.FT.com>), a daily world busi-

ness newspaper in English, and the **International Herald Tribune** from France. The current issues of these newspapers are shelved on the lower level of the library, in the periodical area. The library also subscribes to **The Japan Times**, **Business India**, and **The Far Eastern Economic Review**, weekly publications printed in English. **Cambio16**, a weekly journal from Spain, is published in Spanish. Monthly international journals include **The Journal Francais** (in French), **The Japan Update** (in English), and **Canadian Business** (in English).

If your interest is news from emerging markets, take a look at **ISI Emerging Markets**, accessible from the library homepage (<http://www.bryant.edu/~library/>). This product reports daily from the emerging markets of individual countries located in Central and Eastern Europe, Asia, and Latin America. For many of the countries, the daily news coverage is available in the language of origin

as well as in English. Students can easily transfer the text to disk and print it out later.

The World Library and various country libraries in Lexis/Nexis also provide news from these countries in both English and language of origin.

Lastly, there are numerous quality internet sites providing access to international news. Try the following: **NEWSTAND**, <http://www.ecola.com/news/>; **YAHOO**, <http://www.yahoo.com/news/newspapers/>; **HOT LINKS**, <http://www.naa.org/hot/hot.html>; **NEWSPAPERS ON-LINE**, <http://www.newspapers.com/>; **AJR NEWS LINK**, <http://www.newslink.org/menu.html>; and **CRAYON NET**, <http://crayon.net>.

The influx of international students into American business programs should continue to grow, enriching the learning experience for the student populations of these colleges and universities and ensuring the continued growth of international news sources.

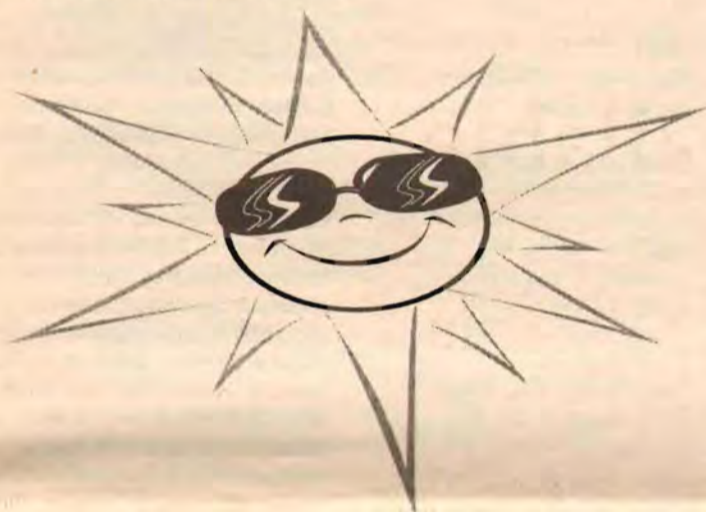
TRAVEL TIPS: Photocopy all important documents such as licenses, I.D.'s, passports and airline tickets. Keep the copies at home, separate from your luggage or hidden in a body pouch. Use the copies as proof of your identity. Don't flash large amounts of cash or valuables in public. While walking, look alert assertive, self-confident and in control.

TRANSIT TIPS: Familiarize yourself with the area. Locate your destination on a map. Have the street address and directions in your hand before you hit the road.

HOTEL TIPS: Make sure the neighborhood is safe. See that smoke detectors work. Ask to see a floor plan of the location of your room. Avoid rooms at the end of long, dimly lit corridors. Store valuables in the hotel safe. When you leave your room, hang your "Do Not Disturb" sign and play the radio loudly, to give the impression the room is occupied.

The Glenn Miller Story

For those of you unfamiliar with Glenn Miller, and especially the film, *The Glenn Miller Story*, starring Jimmy Stewart and June Allyson, Pennsylvania 6-5000 was a telephone number at which Glenn Miller's wife could reach him while he traveled to a far away city. Miller later used the telephone number as the title for a song he dedicated to his wife (I have it re-mastered on a CD, and it's great.). I chose it for the title for this week's column not because I'll be talking about Glenn Miller or swing music, but because I wanted to address the issue of how students can best get the services they would like at Bryant — by asking for them.

A couple of weeks ago, I spoke extensively to a student who wanted to get off the meal plan because he didn't believe Aramark was providing the right kind of service to students. We disagreed in our discussion almost from the beginning and never came to agreement either on what Aramark should be doing or how they should be addressing student needs. What most concerned me about our conversation, however, was that he had never taken the time to speak to the Director of Dining Services, who would be the one person most able to listen to his concerns and do something about

them if they were valid.

For traditional age students, a major developmental task for the college years is to develop autonomy. This means college students should be learning during the college years how to become more independent, and how to get their problems and concerns resolved on their own. This may not be easy — in fact, it will require students to take personal responsibility for determining their life's direction.

One of the most common problems we face in Student Affairs is the number of complaints we receive from parents. These are a problem not because the complaints aren't valid, but because the students themselves aren't trying to resolve their complaints on their own. Were we to resolve every complaint that came to our desk from parents immediately, without involving students, we would be compromising the ability of our students to develop the autonomy and personal responsibility they will need as adults. Our method, therefore, is to call the student afterwards to hear their complaint directly, then work with him or her to find a solution (Frequently, the complaint from the student is far less severe than was originally reported by the parent, but that's to be expected and is understood.). Part of finding a solution for the student may be to refer him or her to another office on-campus that can help them

— all with support and direction from us. So what might the student learn from this encounter? Well, perhaps they might understand that they might have resolved their problem far more easily and quickly had they simply asked us for help in the first place. Or they might learn more about how the College works, so they can get future issues resolved more efficiently. But most importantly, the student would have taken an important step toward the development of adult-style autonomy, and that is and must remain a major goal of the educational process at Bryant.

Please understand me. I'm not suggesting that students shouldn't tell their families when they have problems or concerns at the College that aren't being addressed. I fully expect and hope students will let their families know all that is happening with them while they're at Bryant. I'm also not implying that we have yet to achieve a campus that is perfect and in which students will have no complaints. I'm simply suggesting that when students have problems or concerns about their Bryant experience, they should allow the people most able to fix their problem to try to do so. You might be surprised how willing employees in all areas — whether clerical, faculty, maintenance, administration and other areas — are to help you. In fact, getting help might be as easy as picking up the phone.

Invasion of the concept-snatchers: Games-as-films vs. films-as-games

For years, movie studios arrogantly assumed their hit films could be neatly translated into interactive games. But hundreds of flops (entertainment software based on the hit movie "The Mask," for instance, sold less than 1,000 units) and dozens of corporate re-engineerings later, most have backed away from that simplistic conception, perhaps realizing that movie plots actually get in the way of game-play.

Now, though, the trend is gathering steam in the opposite direction. Game studios, with Hollywood dollar signs dancing in their executives' heads, are aggressively pursuing movie deals. Id Software wants someone to make a movie out of its hit title "Quake." Acclaim Entertainment sees its not-yet-released "Turok: Dinosaur Hunter" as a strong movie hopeful. And Boss Film's new game company is tailoring some of its new entertainment software to appeal to mass movie audiences.

"One day, people will routinely make movies out of video games," says Larry Kasanoff, producer of such hits as "Terminator 2." I reached Kasanoff at his Santa Monica office only a few hours before he boarded a plane for Thailand, where he's filming "Mortal Kombat 2," the sequel to the most successful game-turned-movie ever. Kasanoff believes it won't be long before movie studios begin lining up for the rights to hit video games in the same way they do now for best-selling books. But that vision overlooks one crucial thing: Kasanoff is the only person in history to create an unqualified hit film out of a game, "Mortal Kombat," which raked in some \$70 million at the domestic box office. In contrast, "Super Mario Brothers," based on the wildly popular Nintendo game and starring Bob Hoskins, failed miserably, grossing an estimated \$21 million domestically, according to Entertainment Data, Inc. There have been bigger bombs: "Double Dragon" took in an embarrassing \$2.5 million, and the mega-hit game "Doom" has simply languished at Universal Studios. After enduring rewrite after rewrite, "Doom," in the words of someone familiar with the film project, is now "doomed."

Unfortunately, most of today's starry-eyed game company executives are setting themselves up for similarly sad disappointment. The problem? Making a hit movie — like batting over .300 or writing a best-seller — is really hard. And movie makers no more need the encumbrance of interactive game scenarios than game makers need the artificial boundaries created by movie story lines.

"People buy games for the game-play," says Mitch Lasky, vice president of business development at Activision, Inc., a game developer. Lasky's take on games-turned-movies is nearly as blunt: "I think we may be overestimating the mass market appeal of some of the products," he says, pointing out that a hit music title sells many times more copies than even the biggest game hit.

Like most game companies, Activision is hedging its bets. Its popular "Zork" may soon become a television series, and the company has submitted its "Spycraft" property to the Hollywood script mill. But Activision isn't counting on anything. In fact, Lasky emphasizes that the company never alters its games to make them more appealing to mass audiences.

Many years from now, video and computer game makers may become the John Grisham's of the film world — providing idea-starved studio executives with the original settings and stories they so crave. But as Kasanoff notes, the game business is going to have to overcome at least one stifling problem:

"The people who make the decisions to green light movies," he notes, "don't play video games."

In addition, be sure to use Netscape in the Office of Career Services. Bookmarks are available for students to explore additional sources of internships, summer jobs and career information.

Internship Insight: United HealthCare

During my junior year, I decided that I wanted an internship for the summer before my senior year. I felt that an internship would be an excellent chance to gain hands-on experience in the actuarial field before I began my job search in my senior year. I looked at the internship opportunities that were posted, but there were not any that I was interested in. I then went to the computers in the Office of Career Services and browsed through the CD-ROM (Career Search) that has listings of many companies. I narrowed my search to the insurance industry in the Hartford/Springfield area. Career Search provided me with a list of hundreds of companies, their size, and different professionals to contact. This CD-ROM is updated often with new companies or company information. Check it out!

From this listing, I sent out cover letters and résumés. Every company that I sent to, they'd back from in one form or another. United HealthCare called me a couple of months later to schedule a phone interview. A person in the actuarial department interviewed me on the phone for almost two hours. He went through every detail on my résumé plus asked other questions. He also gave me more details on United HealthCare and the opportunity to ask questions of my own.

Approximately a month later, I was called back with an offer for the summer. It would be a paid internship in their downtown Hartford office. I was assigned to the Large Groups National Pricing team. My main task was to update claim distribution tables. First, I had to figure out how this was done in the past, since there was no documentation available. Then I used Lotus 123 to analyze, combine, and project data that would be used in the claim distributions, which are a part of a company-wide software release. I then had to test and analyze any changes and explain why they had the impact that they did. I also had to completely document any work that I did, so that this project could be reproduced at any time without having to do the investigative work that I had to do in the beginning. At the end of the summer I had to do a presentation on this project to all of the different people in the actuarial departments.

I experienced a very laid-back, friendly environment. They have a year-round business/casual dress, and Fridays are dress down days. Everyone was great and helped me to fit in right from the beginning. My internship experience at United HealthCare was great and made my interest in the actuarial field grow.

My advice to those seeking an internship is to send out résumés to organizations that you may be interested in. The more you send out, the more chances you have of getting the internship that you want. Don't give up hope; there are many places that are looking for interns but simply don't advertise. Make sure that you are very familiar with spreadsheets and word processing programs, because they are used for almost everything, especially in the actuarial field.

If you are interested in United HealthCare, I recommend that you send your cover letter and résumé as soon as possible. I'd be happy to answer any questions readers may have about the program. I can be reached at extension 8221.

United HealthCare is seeking junior actuarial majors with a minimum GPA of 3.2 and permanent residency of Connecticut. Submit résumé, cover letter, and student transcript directly to the human resource office in Hartford. 'Parenting in the 90s' Conference

Psychologist Mary Pipher writes from the front lines of her clinical practice dealing with young teenage girls. "Most are trying to cope with overwhelmingly dangerous world of junior high school, where drugs and alcohol are the norm, and any differentiating characteristic is fair game," she wrote in a now-famous book called *Reviving Ophelia: Saving the Selves of Adolescent Girls*.

Pipher will be bringing her experiences and wisdom to a conference entitled "Parenting in the 90's: Rebuilding Our Families; Raising a Healthy Child in Our Society," on Saturday, March 1, at St. Mary Academy-Bay View in Riverside, Rhode Island.

The conference begins at 8 a.m., with Dr. Pipher's keynote address at 9 a.m.

"She sets the context for the problems we as a society and our children face," said Sister Elizabeth McAuliffe, President of Bay View. "As she points out in her latest book, *The Shelter of Each Other*, we need to focus on rebuilding our families in our homes, our neighborhoods, and our communities."

A panel of noted Rhode Islanders will respond to Dr. Pipher's remarks at 11 a.m. Moderating the panel is Dyana Koelsch, Senior Political Reporter at WJAR Channel 10. Panelists include Dr. Carole Jenny, Co-Director of the Child Protection Program at Hasbro Children's Hospital and an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at Brown University's School of Medicine.

She will be joined by the Honorable O. Rogerie Thompson, Associate Justice of the Rhode Island District Court, and Laureen D'Ambrá, Esq., Child Advocate for the State of Rhode Island.

In addition to her private practice, Dr. Pipher is on the faculty at the University of Nebraska and holds degrees in both cultural anthropology and psychology. She also is author of *Hunger Pains: The American Women's Tragic Quest for Thinness*, and has written award-winning fiction and book reviews.

The conference, presented by the Bay View Alumni and Parents' Associations, is sponsored by Rhode Island Hospital Trust Bank and Bradley Hospital, Hasbro Children's Hospital, Mental Health Association of Rhode Island, Rhode Island KIDS COUNT, and the Office of the Child Advocate.

Bryant Downs Bentley, 83-76, In NE-10 Opening Round

Senior guard Noel Watson scored a game-high 22 points as Bryant defeated Bentley, 83-76, in the opening round of the NORTHEAST-10 Men's Tournament.

The fourth-seeded Bulldogs (17-9) now face top-seeded St. Michael's in the conference semifinals Thursday night in Winooski, VT.

The 17 wins is the most since Bryant posted an 18-10 mark in 1980-81.

Bryant took its first lead since early in the first half when a three-pointer by senior guard Herman Thomas made the score 71-70 with 5:24 remaining. Watson's jumper with 2:45 left put Bryant up by three (75-72). The Falcons cut the lead to 77-75 on a free throw by Ed Madden, but a pair of free throws by sophomore forward Fred Wande put the Bulldogs up 79-75 with :40 remaining.

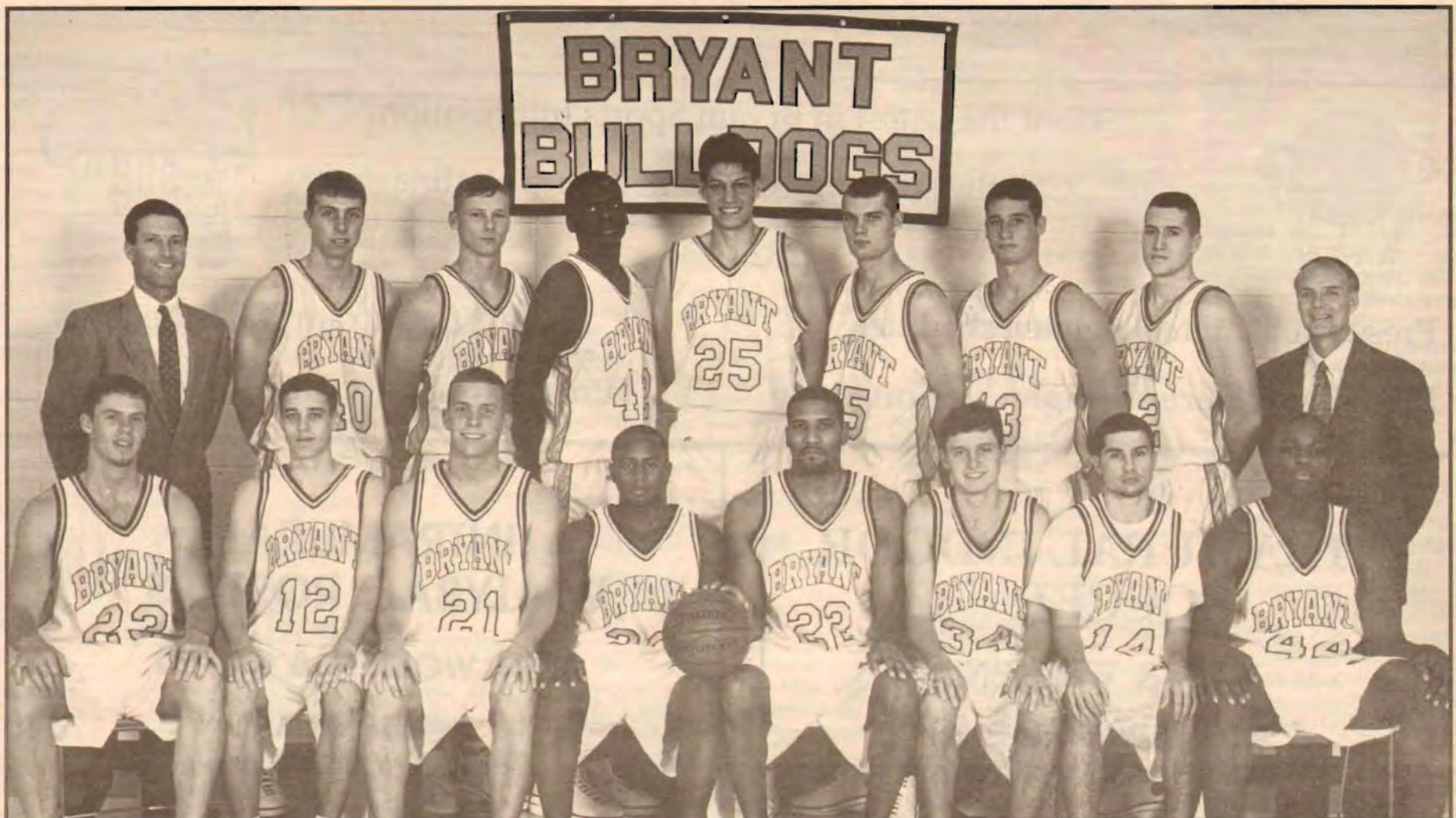
