Appointed Vice President Of Public Affairs

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees held on Friday, September 12, 1975, Mrs. Gertrude M. Hochberg, longtime Director of Public Relations, was elected as Vice President for Public Affairs effective on October 1, 1975.



Mr. Hannon will resume his duties as full-time Director of the Library Services as of October 1, 1975.

Gertrude Meth Hochberg

was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania as a journalism major and began her career as a reporter on the

Wilkes-Barre TIMES-LEADER, her hometown newspaper. After working as a copywriter in New York, she became an advertising executive in Providence, Rhode Island, where she was elected President of the R.I. Advertising Club and an officer of the American Federation of Advertisers (AFA). At this time, she also taught school at the Rhode Island School of Design and later at Bryant College. In 1964, she was named "Advertising Woman of the Year."

Mrs. Hochberg viewed her appointment as Vice President of Public Affairs as an opportunity to achieve the goals she has set for Bryant College. One of her goals is to increase the recognition of the serious and purposeful Bryant student body. Mrs. Hochberg also plans to promote the excellent skills of the faculty in preparing students for life as well as a livelihood. Her

unique appointment (the only woman Vice President in the state) will demonstrate to the community at large the commitment of Bryant College to the advancement of the status of women.

Congratulations from the community to a woman who has dedicated her life to the betterment of Bryant College.

Appointed Director of Public Relations at Bryant College in 1950, she helped gain the recognition for the growth and development of this institution which resulted in the expansion and relocation of this 112-year-old institution. In 1971, the College was moved and all new buildings constructed in Smithfield, R.I. It was the publicity for the dedication of this modern new campus that won her the ACPRA "Award For Excellence In News Information" at the joint conference of the New England and Middle Atlantic combined AAC & ACPRA conference in New York in 1973. In 1975 she received the Eleanor R. Collier Award for "Outstanding Contributions of Higher Education."

Student Center

The Student Center Building Committee met again Thursday, September 18, at 3:30 p.m. After much controversy surrounding the activities of the committee, it was decided to compromise and reach an alternative.

The committee generally agreed that the original Student Center project was no longer feasible. Because of new developments, the financial stability of the 1.9 million dollar project is uncertain. Mr. Dick Towmey, Director of Development, who has headed the Student Center Fund Raising Project has resigned (see page 2). Also, the Kresge Foundation grant for one-half million dollars has not come through, as expected.

There is also a time factor to be considered. The original Center would be constructed with metal building materials, while the alternative could use wood. The use of metal might not enable continued construction throughout the winter, while wood construction could. Thus, the compromised center could conceivably be completed by September 1976.

No plans as to what the building would house or where the building would be located have been defined. Before any plans are finalized, the committee has agreed to gather input from the community. The committee has agreed to have representatives present at the

Student Senate meeting of September 22, the general faculty meeting of September 25, and the Council of Administrators meeting, to answer questions and gather input. In order to encourage community participation in the project's future, Dr. Kelley has appointed Dr. Fullerton Acting Chairman of the Committee, until permanent confirmation from Dr. Gulski.

It seems as if the Committee has regained its' sights and reestablished proper priorities. It is imperative for the Bryant Community to reflect upon the unsatisfactory methods that Bryant College has used in the past to accomplish goals, and remember the essence of the report of the tree men; Collins, Kriebel, and Needham. In their report prepared for the Board of Trustees last May. They stated that: "Surely there should be participation by students in the planning of this center. The building cannot be truly useful unless it reflects student input; more important, the process and practice of student participation will strengthen the program and the College... Merely to name a committee of faculty and students and administrators, which is then handed plans of the building is demeaning and dysfunctional. We hope that this process can be seen as reflecting the problems our recommendations are designed to ameliorate."

GUY DAVIS

It could be the end of October before Guy Davis will know if he still has a job here at Bryant. The time factor depends on the arbitrator who met with Mr. Davis, Dr. Smith and their respective lawyers last Thursday on the issue of the Davis contract renewal. The disagreement came about when the Rank and Appointment Committee approved the reappointment of Guy Davis, but Dr. Smith did not.

The normal procedure for the reappointment of a teacher is, first the chairman of each department recommends to the Rank and Appointment Committee, all the teachers without tenure who should be reappointed. Since Guy Davis was the Chairman of the Math Department and did not have tenure, his name was included on the list of those recommended. Next, the Rank and Appointment Committee makes a decision on those recommended and sends their choices to Dr. Smith for his approval. The Committee all agreed that Guy Davis should be reappointed, but Dr. Smith disagreed. When a contract is not accepted, the teacher may go through grievance

procedures, where a Review Committee will re-examine the contract. Guy Davis followed this procedure and the Review Committee voted in favor of a reappointment. When Dr. Smith did not concur with their decision, they agreed on binding arbitration.

On Thursday, September eleventh, a Professor Teele of the American Arbitration Association heard Dr. Smith and Guy Davis present their cases in a session that lasted almost eight hours. The lawyers representing Dr. Smith and Guy Davis have three weeks to submit their statements; after which, Professor Teele will have up to 30 days to make his decision.

Guy Davis feels confident the decision will be in his favor and said the real reason his contract was not approved "was due to union activity." Dr. Smith would not comment about what the arbitration decision might be.



Renovated Rathskeller To Open

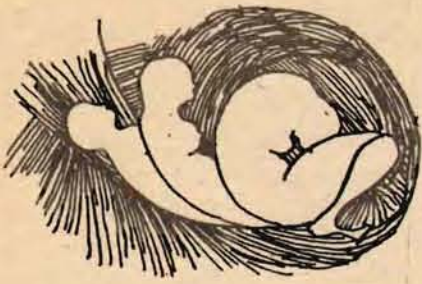

In 1972 Congress passed a law prohibiting discrimination by sex in any educational program that receives federal funds. It took three years to work out the regulations for enforcing the laws, and on July 21 of this year, these laws went into effect.

All the nation's public school districts and approximately 2,700 colleges and universities are affected by the new statutes and more sports will be open to females and more money will be spent on them.

For the first time, Bryant now has a Women's Sports program under the very able direction of Ms. Holly Norton and for once schools must provide the funds necessary to insure equal opportunity for women who want to participate in sports, not necessarily on a dollar-for-dollar basis, but separate teams must be provided in all sports where one team will not accommodate all who are interested in competition.

This is an excellent opportunity for Bryant women to assert their athletic abilities and improve on our physical as well as our mental health. Strong competition and a healthy team spirit can only help to bring the women at Bryant and the entire Bryant community closer in an aura of fairness and equality.

I've written this letter to comment upon the lack of consideration shown by Maintenance and the Student Affairs Office endured by the resident students during Summer Session and Intersession. The dorms were supposed to be fully air-conditioned according to the agreement between the students and Bryant.

The air-conditioning system was out of order from the very first sweltering moment I entered my suite, and stayed that unbearable way till the last sticky second of my summer stay here on the campus.

A week of this extreme heat dragged on and I was forced to see Mr. Barlow about what could be done to rectify the situation. I was told that the air-conditioners would be working in just a short while: a short while is fine, but another week went by and still my suite suffered.

Finally the dorm students got together and each suite complained to Mr. Barlow. A couple of days later Mr. Barlow paid my suite a visit and said the AC was now in working order. He told us to shut all windows and the cool air would soon refresh us. After four hours of waiting our suite was really hot, we then knew for sure the AC was still not working.

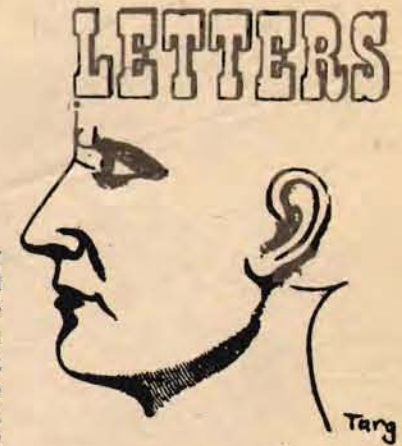
It was during the third

week that it came to my attention from a student and also from a maintenance worker that the AC system would not be repaired, at least not for this summer. The reason for this being that Bryant purchased their AC systems from Whirlpool Corp. the year that this model would no longer be manufactured. The school knew this would enable them to buy the AC's at a very low cost. But they also knew that it would be impossible to obtain parts necessary for repair of these AC's.

At first I was amazed that a situation like this could occur here at Bryant. I learned otherwise.

Original intentions for an intercom system were only met halfway. The intercom system was completely installed in each classroom, however, the wiring of them was not. There was also to be an additional blacktop layer applied to all roadways and parking lots on the campus; this never surfaced.

In thinking all these things over I wondered why a full disclosure of the situation was never given. Why didn't Mr. Barlow inform us the first week of summer school that those in authority ordered this AC, and explain fully the existing situation?



Maybe the reason for not "coming clean" is that as a result the Bryant dorm students would have reacted violently to this dilemma. I doubt it. More likely he wanted to keep this information quiet. The maintenance man who told me about the AC situation said to "keep it quiet." WHY? Why keep it quiet? The reason being not to attract attention. WHY? What would this attract attention to? Maybe it would attract attention to those people in authority at the time of the school's re-location. Those who were responsible for spending and ordering within a limited budget.

I mean, why not bring attention to all that "misplaced" money and all those "unforeseen costs." Those that had higher priority over a proper AC system for the dorms, wiring of the intercom system, and a blacktop for the parking lots. Why not tell the students at the outset the proper condition of the AC's? Why not, I don't know.

MBA Highlights

From The Dean's Desk

Here are some thoughts on matters that require the attention of graduate students.

1. GMAT Exams

If you have been admitted conditionally pending taking the *Admission Test for Graduate Study in Business* (ATGSB), or if you have been required to retake this test, or if you plan to apply for admission to an MBA program, you should take this exam as soon as possible. The next exam will be given on Saturday, November 1, at Brown University, URI, or Providence College. Your registration for the exam must be received in Princeton no later than October 10. For further information, or application blanks, check with The Graduate Office.

2. Course Changes

Any graduate student who finds it necessary to withdraw from a course, must notify the Dean in writing. The effective withdrawal date is the day the letter is received by The Graduate Office. This date is particularly important for it will determine the amount of refund, if any. Merely dropping out of class without the approval of the Dean does not constitute withdrawal. If the student is a Veteran, he should inform the VA Representative on campus, Gordon Bentley. Also make certain to inform your instructor of your withdrawal.

3. Attendance

It is expected that graduate students will attend all classes. But if a student knows in advance that he cannot attend, as a matter of courtesy he should inform the instructor. If he cannot do that, he should inform The Graduate Office.

4. Spring Semester Planning

The Graduate Office will be planning for the Spring Semester over the next few weeks. Once again there will be a preregistration period followed by a registration period. Classes will begin for the Spring Semester on Monday, January 5, and the Semester will end on Friday, April 30.

5. Summer and Fall Planning

This year there will be a joint Summer and Fall preregistration conducted during the Spring Semester.

6. The Advantages of

Registration
It ensures the student a first consideration for a class of his choice. With sufficient preregistration, it enables The Graduate Office to forecast that a given class will actually run. We initiated preregistration for the Spring of 1975. Our limited experience already indicates that most students who preregister will actually attend. But only about half of our graduate students have been preregistering. We would welcome an increase in this area. It would greatly facilitate your enrollment and our planning.

ALBUM REVIEW "Gorrilla" By James Taylor

James Taylor's new album, "Gorrilla," serves largely as an old vehicle for new material. The old vehicle being the soft melodic style characterizing his music ever since his hit single, "You've Got a Friend," catapulted him into the mainstream of popular music, the new material expressed in the lyrics he writes.

In contrast to much of the music on today's market, "Gorrilla" has placed more emphasis on the written word than the medium in which it has been delivered; to put it plainly, Taylor is more of a poet than a musician who fills voids with monosyllabic grunts. The listener will probably find that the lyrics will be attracting more of his attention than the accompaniment. Not that the album is lacking musically either; with helping hands from Graham Nash, David Crosby, and wife Carly Simon, the musical portions of the album can hardly be called lack-luster.

Although the style is recognized immediately as that of James Taylor, there is nothing on "Gorrilla" that is readily traced as being a remake of another cut on a former album, a common pitfall among today's artists. This, in and of itself, ably demonstrates Taylor's talent.

For those whose only familiarity with "Gorrilla" is the pop single, "How Sweet it is," be forewarned that the rest of the album does not flow in the same vein. That particular song is a remake of a mid-sixties hit, and the beat is highly reminiscent of the Motown sound of that period. However, the interpretation is quite pleasant, adding a subtly contrasting element to the rest of the album.

The purchase of a new James Taylor album might be likened to that of buying a new collection of a favorite writer's works. In either case, the purchaser knows fairly well what it is he is begetting, albeit new. The most significant difference could well be that while Taylor has provided his own musical accompaniment, the reader of the written must supply his own. Rating: **** $\frac{1}{4}$ on a four star basis.

Author of a number of articles on guidance and education, he has been a consultant on these matters to industry, education and government.

Mr. Nelson is involved in many civic organizations and has been active in The Greenwood Improvement Association, P.T.A., Little League, Cub Scouts and Housing for the Elderly.

He is married to the former Linda P. Nelson of Cranston and resides in Warwick, R. I.

The motto of Bryant College is "Education for Business Leadership". In reading the proposed alternative for the Student Center Building, I must ask if students are being "educated" on being led by decision makers, or are we getting "educated" on decision making while being "led". I am referring to the alternative of the original 1.9 million dollar Student Center Building promised to the students by the Board of Trustees last May. (Was this proposal considered as an adult passifier?)

Was the alternative proposed for the sake of a budget or the sake of the students? Should proposals be made with money as the main consideration, and the needs of the students considered second? Let me suggest that the lack of consideration for the students led the alternative plan.

Consider the decision to reconstruct the snack bar. First, since almost one-half the student body here is comprised of commuters, these students should have a place where they can eat without leaving the Unistructure. Ther alternative calls for taking the present snack bar and converting it into 25 or so faculty offices. In talking to some faculty members, they expressed their discontent at destroying the commuters meeting place. Ther conversion plan for the snack bar was also discussed at the Federation meeting this week, and once again teachers expressed their distaste for the move. If these offices are not for present faculty members, but for new faculty, where will these new professors teach? I believe that over 80% of classroom space is used every hour. My "alternative" to the alternative is to use the commuter lounge. If offices are really needed, the other half of the commuter lounge could be used.

How would this community feel about walking in the cold rain and snow to eat. (Remember we are students not mailmen.) Perhaps you might want to drive your car over to the new center. Fine, but is there parking space provided for in these new plans? In essence, I am saying that the entire college community should be consulted before the desision is made.

Now, to consider the transformation of theRathskeller into a counseling center. Since the "Rat" is presently being refurbished, why spend money on it to convert it into a counseling center. If the "Rat" was allowed to remain in its present condition, students could use it for small parties.

The questionnaire which we filled out should have been more specific. It should have listed an alternative, thus enabling true student input. When the questionnaire said snack bar, I was thinking of two, not just one snack bar in a field. How can this vague questionnaire be used in making any decisions other than those applicable to the original Student Center is beyond my comprehension. Why not devise a questionnaire with the new alternative proposal and see what the student's reactions are. Remember, to have a good questionnaire, you must first define what you are asking questions about, secondly, explain the results, and

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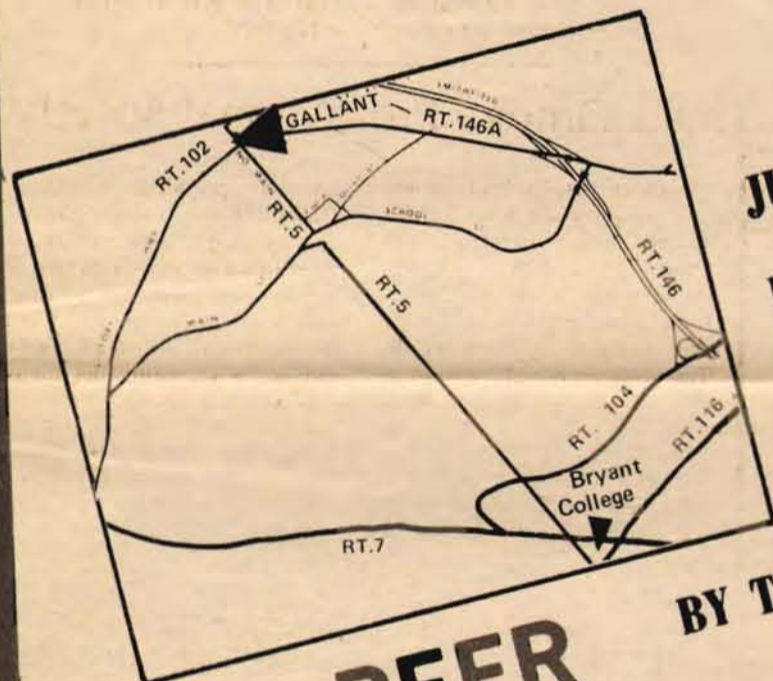
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Bryant Vanquishes Worcester State

Bryant's Varsity Soccer squad blanked Worcester State 5-0, in the season opener for both teams last Saturday afternoon.

Under partly sunny skies, and aided by a slight cross wind, the Indians scored two goals in the first half. Kevin Homon, Bryant's top scorer in each of the last two years tallied the home team's initial goal after 27 1/2 minutes of play. Taking control of the ball at mid-field, Homon dribbled down the far side of the field before scoring from a bad angle; he had just about three feet in which to work with. The second goal for Bryant came about seven minutes later as Co-Captain Jeff Arpin drilled home Jeff Kusz's boot. Kusz was credited with the assist. Previously the visitors' fullbacks missed several opportunities to clear the ball from in front of the Worcester State goal. This play closed out the scoring at the end of the first half, leaving Bryant with a 2-0 advantage.

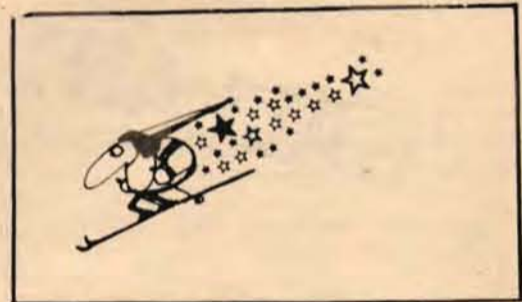
