

1995 Graduate to Serve on Board of Trustees

A Bryant senior will soon be a member of the Board of Trustees. A unanimous vote by the Student Senate approved a Board of Trustees proposal to include an alumni from the class of 1995 on the Board of Trustees. The alumni will assume all the legal and fiduciary responsibilities of a full trustee for three years beginning August 1, 1995.

"This proposal is truly unique," says Trustee Liaison Officer Priscilla Angelo, "because no other college has been discovered with a similar program."

According to Angelo, the recent graduate will be able to provide a fresh perspective to the Board of Trustees because he or she recently left the curriculum and campus life.

"This is a very exciting opportunity for Bryant because it provides recent student input to the Board of Trustees," commented

According to the Board of Trustee's proposal, the addition of a recent graduate is part of an increased effort to expand the number of alumni serving as members of the College's councils, including the Board of Trustees. The increase in alumni trustees has been substantial, moving from representation of 22 percent of the Board in 1990 to 41 percent by the beginning of the next academic year.

In its' proposal, the Board of

Trustees stressed the importance of adding a recent graduate to the Board because this alumni/ae can provide the most timely information on the student's experiences at the College. Student Senate President Rob Fontanella also noted an alumni serving on the board provides students with more of a direct link and bridges the gap between students and the Board of Trustees.

"This is monumental in the Trustee world, as well as a stepping stone for higher education," said Fontanella.

Fontanella, along with fellow Senate Trustee Task Force members Sean Connoly, Joshua Hansel and Eric Bertrand '94 initiated the proposal in January and presented it to the Board of Trustees for review.

The Task Force members coffected statistical data on other colleges and universities similar in size, geographic location and competitive business program. They looked at what kind of representation students had on college council and how students were chosen for service. According to Fontanella, the time was right for the proposal. "The Board of Trustees has been becoming more accepting of input, opinion and contact from students. The proposal was a natural milestone to take."

The search for an alumni/ae trustee will begin in February with requests for nominations from the Bryant Community. All graduate and undergraduate students from

the class of 1995 are eligible. Candidates must be in good academic and disciplinary standing, have demonstrated leadership skills and achievements as well as a commitment to community service and Bryant itself.

The nomination process will begin in February of each year when the Board of Trustees will invite nominations of senior students. Selfnominations as well as peer nominations are welcomed.

The nominee must prepare a written statement describing their Bryant experience and why they wish to serve as a trustee.

The first recent alum will be elected at the May 1995 meeting of the Board of Trustees for a maximum one three-year term beginning August 1,1995.

Trustees selected serve for three years, but may be considered for additional trustee service in the future. A minimum of one year must elapse before they can be eligible for reconsideration by the Nominating Committee. If reelected, the alumni may serve for a maximum of two additional terms or six years.

The Board of Trustees wants to ensure the success of the program, said Angelo, and plans to support the alumni in any way possible. For example, they plan on encouraging employers of the alumni, who may be reluctant to let their new employee leave work, to encourage Board of Trustees duties and activities.

At the dedication, Alan S. Feinstein said, "Someday the heroes will not be sports figures or celebrities. Rather, they will be people who know that the only thing that matters when we come to the end ... on the road to eternity is what we have done to better the lives of our fellow men."

Here at Bryant this year's theme is Community and Public Service. The Greek community, Resident Assistants and others already engage in many reach-out community service projects. Other individuals and organizations need to consider service projects as well.

College students have a unique opportunity to serve others with their time, knowledge and energy. Why not channel this energy into projects that serve others? Service is rewarding and self-fulfilling. You get the satisfaction of helping alleviate community problems, and, if you're lucky, maybe even helping solve one or two. Also, community service gives you experience you can't get in a classroom - getting things done and working with people is a lot more challenging in the real world than it is on paper.

Coping With Depression

When most people think of depression, they envision someone slumped in a corner with worried tired eyes that just can't motivate themselves to go on after a tragic event, death or problem. However, that may not always be the case.

Bryant College will be participating in a National Depression Screening coming up on October 6 in conjunction with counseling services. It is just part of Mental Awareness Week that was developed by

Harvard psychiatrist Dr. Douglas Jacobs. The intention is to raise awareness of depression as an inherited disease and not something that an individual can control.

From 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Bryant Center, students will be able to have a private ten minute screening in a secluded location that includes an anonymous written screening test later reviewed with a professional to help detect any tendencies in a family history for depression or depression related diseases. Videos, information tables, speakers and off campus professionals will also be involved in the screening.

This is the first time anything of this nature has been offered at Bryant, and the school was contacted by an outside organization to participate.

"This event is to make individuals more aware of this second form of depression," commented Director of Counseling Services Bill Phillips. "Some people don't get help because they see it as a personal weakness, but this inherited disease should be treated like any other medical problem."

Karen Davis reported in Monday's Providence Journal (September 26 issue) that water tests at Smithfield's sewage treatment facility revealed cyanide levels up to 100 times greater than environmentally safe levels and hundreds of dead fish in the Woonasquatucket river confirmed the chemical tests.

Although the culprit is unknown, cyanide waste is said to be typical of jewelry or metal plating industries. During my own visit to that same sewage treatment plant last fall, I heard about potential problems with cyanide from the local jewelry industry. It got me thinking ... what does

the jewelry industry do with cyanide?

One of the very desirable properties of gold is that it is extremely chemi-

cally stable; it doesn't form salts and it doesn't rust (or, as we say in SCI 265, itdoesn'tform oxides!) So solid gold or gold-plated jewelry can remain beautiful for years despite being exposed to the oxygen and moisture that ruin anything made with iron (like my Fiat's body panels). Gold's chemical stability poses a real problem to the manufacturer-how to purify gold from crude ore and how to electroplate with it? The solution is cyanide!

Cyanide ions form soluble charged complexes with gold atoms. In simpler terms, cyanide enables gold to dissolve the coming weeks.

in water. Topurify gold from crude ores, manufacturers wash finely powdered rock with cyanide then collect the gold from the wash solution. Gold can also be plated from solution using these goldcyanide complexes. In either case, gold istheproductand cyanide, copper, nickel, and zinc are waste products. Regulations require that the waste cyanide isn't dumped down the drain, but apparently this has happened earlier in September.

Cyanide blocks an organism's ability to use oxygen (respiration) by destroying enzymes called cytochromes that are involved in the conversion of glucose and oxygen to carbon dioxide, water, and energy.

Volleyball Falters Slightly

The women's volleyball team went 2-3 last week to drop their record to 8-4 overall, 2-1 in the NE-10.

"For the most part, we have been playing well," co-captain Kim Potrzebowski said.

"We still have some small patches we have to fix, and we need to blend more."

On Tuesday, the Bulidogs traveled to Bentley and were defeated in three straight. Prior to the Bentley game, the team traveled to East Stroudsburg, PA for the Pocono Classic Tournament.

In the opening rounds of the tourney, the team lost to Mercyhurst in four games and East Stroudsburg in five.

The team finally broke through and defeated Mercy College of New York in four games. The one high point of the tournament came when co-captain Maria Bras was named for to the All Tourney Team. Bras collected 79 kills (4.9 per game) and had a kill percentage of .318.

Bryant had one scary moment in the tournament when starting setter Jen Carvalho went down with an ankle injury, and wound up on crutches. Fortunately for the team, Carvalho returned to action Tuesday against Bentley.

"We have a few new people on the court, and we are still trying to get used to playing with each other," Potrzebowski said. "Once we accomplish that, we will surprise a few teams."

The team has a few players amongst the leaders in the NE-10. Bras is fourth in aces per game with .6 and first in kills per game with 4.6. Meribah Dean is fifth in kills per game with 3.20 and in kill percentage with .338. Carvalho is fourth in the conference in assists per game with 9.1.

The team itself is also at the top in a few categories. With 45 games played, they are first in kills with 579 (12.9 pg); and third in aces with 102 (2.3 pg), digs with 678 (14 pg), assists with 461 (10.2 pg), and kill percentage with .232.

Currently, the team is looking down the road at events upcoming.

"We should come together and find ourselves at the top when we need to be there," Potrzebowski. "We are always looked upon as an underdog, and that should help us surprise a few teams at the end of the season."

"Basically, we are an egg getting ready to hatch, at the end of the season we will be at the top," Potrzebowski.

The Bulldogs will be at the Springfield Invitational this Saturday, they will then return to Springfield on Tuesday.
