

## Parkos Speaks for Board of Trustees

President Trueheart will Lead the College into the Future

While Chairman of the Board of Trustees Dr. Gregory T. Parkos was on campus this past Friday for a scheduled Board of trustees meeting, *The Archway* had an opportunity to interview him.

Parkos graduated from Bryant in 1950, and received an honorary degree in 1988. He has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees since August 1992.

**The Archway:** What is the relationship of the Board of Trustees to the campus?

**Parkos:** It's difficult to define the differences between managing the college and acting as a member of the board of trustees.

Essentially, management of the college is the responsibility of the administration. The role of the Board of Trustees is to ensure that the management is running the institution well and fulfilling its mission.

**Q:** How does the Board of Trustees stay informed?

**Parkos:** Obviously, we read any publications. The trustees receive *The Archway*, as well as other magazines, columns, financial reports, and studies done. I find *The Archway* interesting because I'm interested in editorial comments and critical letters. Because I live in Los Angeles, I'm not on campus except maybe half a dozen times a year. While here on campus, I meet with alumni, students, faculty, and administration. Part of my way of life is to ask people how things are going.

ing. I'm not just trying to do a job, I really care and sometimes that means I get a lot of complaints.

**Q:** What concerns you most when you read *The Archway*?

**Parkos:** The Public Safety Beat concerns me. The trustees are responsible for the community, because we become the care givers for the students while they are here. I find it upsetting that a person at a college would commit vandalism or abuse another person. Why aren't students angry over this? We need to solve this problem, not by adding more Public Safety officers, but by peer pressure.

However, I do not think there is too much cause for concern.

**Q:** What do you think is the driving force behind an anonymous letter, such as last week's letter to the editor?

**Parkos:** Whoever wrote the letter had a reason to write it. I wish they had been more explicit so we could deal with it better. Someone may think if they put an ugly letter in *The Archway* it will get some professors fired. But that is not what we do. That's not our way. We are sensitive to problems and keep our ear to the ground.

There was a difficult situation a couple of years ago. Faculty were upset, there was a lot of articles in *The Archway*. Nobody got fired, nobody got reorganized out. Everybody tempered.

The trustees are here to be sensitive to problems, council and advise. The minute we become sensitive to problems, everybody becomes sensitive to them. We are in this boat together. We're not going to get anywhere beating up on each other.

**Q:** There seems to be some growing discontent among the students and faculty; even administration is leaving. How does this affect morale?

**Parkos:** Yes, I am aware that there is a morale problem. I know there is a concern in the administration on down to the staff and students, about turnover and morale. I think each administrator leaving has a unique story. Only they can best tell why they are leaving. I think there is no common reason for their departure. But, are the trustees aware that there is a morale problem? Yes, the trustees are aware.

**Q:** What may be causing this discontent?

**Parkos:** These are difficult times. Everyone is going

## Professor Haas to Study in England

Don't expect to see Dr. Haas around Bryant College campus next semester, because he'll be traveling to England to do research at the University of Cambridge. Dr. Haas plans to further educate himself by studying the philosophies of Adam Smith, "The Grandfather of Capitalism."

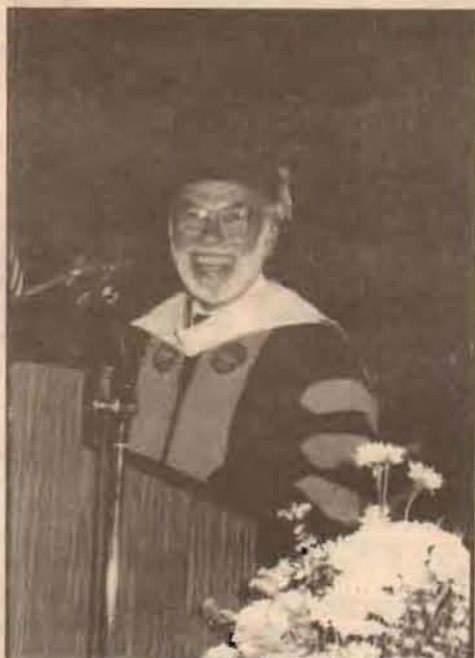
"My goal is not just to understand Adam Smith, but to be able to analyze his thinking, and to open new ideas to readers," says Haas. He wishes to obtain information which will later assist him in publishing a book or a series of essays. Haas believes not only will he benefit from this experience, but the students at Bryant will benefit as well.

"I hope to be able to clarify everyone's false understanding that under capitalism everyone pursues their own self interest regarding any situation," says Haas.

In addition, Haas hopes to learn more about a slavery sculpture which he is presently working on. This is a relief sculpture, which is a 3-D model against a flat surface. According to Haas, the sculpture reveals the horror of people trapped in slavery. At the Wilburforce Museum in England he plans to research the history of African art and the evidence of slave trade.

Cambridge University was founded in 1318 as a 'studium generale,' acquired statutes in 1570, and was incorporated by the Act of Parliament in 1571. The University is complimented by 31 independent self governing colleges. All lectures, and public teaching are provided by the University. Arrangements for individual teaching can be made through tutors, and college supervisors.

Dr. Haas will be residing at St. Edmunds College while researching and occasionally lecturing at the University.

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# Will History Repeat Itself?

Judging by the looks of the first several pages of this issue, momentum appears to be picking up. We see it and we feel it.

The community is speaking up, especially the students, and change seems to be on the horizon.

But why are we facing these problems now? Six months ago we were supposedly at a high point after achieving AACSB accreditation. Change, however, occurs rapidly. This past summer, re-engineering started and since then, several administrators have left the College.

This week, *The Archway* received an anonymous letter from a Bryant administrator who called for immediate action to change the leadership of the College. We are disappointed we are unable to print the letter, but it is against our policy.

The administrator stated they were unable to sign their name out of fear of losing their job. What does this say about the environment we are now living, working, and growing in?

Perhaps, we do need new leadership to enter the next stage of the College's development and growth. We are not claiming the old leadership was not effective, because achieving accreditation was an essential step, but now the College is turning corners and opening new doors. Our current leadership is no longer appropriate for the future direction of the school.

So, where do we go from here?

If we look back at history, maybe we can find some answers. In 1975, students, faculty members, and maintenance workers went on strike. The students demanded the removal of the President and the Vice-President of Academic Affairs, and called for a formation of a committee to review the budget.

We believe a strike is not something to be taken lightly and we are in no way encouraging one (yet). However, we do not want students, faculty, staff, or the administration to underestimate the power of unity. Even though nearly twenty years has elapsed, and the student body of 1975 may differ from that of 1994, the goal is similar and the same results might occur.

# Gay Student Speaks Out

To the Editor:

I am writing this article for all the other gay, lesbian, and bisexual students here at Bryant. I'm writing to make you aware that being gay, etc., at Bryant does not have to be a totally miserable experience, even though I know it can be.

As many of you have seen, Bryant has a student group which meets once a week. I know you have thought of going a million times, but you are worried about someone finding out or having your confidence violated.

This is what kept me from going and I soon found out my fears were totally unwarranted and I was sorry I waited so long to go.

I had spent so much time alone pondering "Can I be the only one?" Not in a million years. Not here at Bryant, not anywhere.

Coming from a family with two gay sisters and about five gay cousins, I soon learned that there are more gay people around than I could have ever imagined. One of my sisters lives in San Francisco and gay life is very visible there. The problem here in New England is that it is not so visible. You have to do a little detective work, but the people are here.

The group is one way to meet people; nothing more, just a way to talk to other people and realize we all share a common bond. The meetings are informal and very confidential. No one is interested in exposing you or

someone else their only interest is getting to know you. We have even discussed the possibility of meeting off campus.

You should also know that we are a member of RINGS, the Rhode Island Network of Gay Students which is a collaborative of Rhode Island colleges and universities including Johnson and Wales, Brown University, CCRI, Rhode Island College, URI and a few others.

Our main goal is to create a network of support for LesBiGay students around the state. We meet in Providence weekly and it is a blast! It really is fun to meet other students since we all generally meet at the same clubs. Since joining the group at Bryant and RINGS, I have made many friends at Bryant and from other colleges as well.

The bottom line is that everyone deserves happiness and Bryant isn't particularly a place where you can be openly gay; so at least be out to yourself. There are plenty of people you can contact to find out more, their names are listed in the October 28 issue of *The Archway*, as well as on various pink triangle flyers you see hanging everywhere (but hope no one sees you looking!).

This year we have had numerous inquiries about the group and if you are one of those people, do yourself a favor and stop by Judy McDonnell's office; she is supportive and is the faculty facilitator of our group.

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# PUBLIC SAFETY

## Burglary

October 23, 1994- A student reported that someone broke into their townhouse. The student had been playing CD's outside the townhouse and upon returning found all of the remaining CD's stolen. Although the back door was locked, the front door wasn't. The student stated that a large gathering of people who they didn't know were outside the townhouse. Fifteen compact discs were stolen as well as a walkman tape player. Total value was estimated at \$385.00.

## Burglary

October 23, 1994- A burglary occurred in which fifteen CD's, a wallet containing over \$600.00, a walkman, and a lap top computer were stolen. Suitemates stated that people had stopped in to see the complainant who was not there. The room was left in an orderly fashion and there were no signs of an obvious search, the victim suspected it was someone they knew who had been in the room before. Three of the suitemates were able to identify by photograph an individual seen coming out of the townhouse the same day. A warrant was provided to DPS in order to search through the suspect's room. Only a Sony walkman was found, which was turned over freely by the suspect, but it cannot be determined whether it was the one which was stolen. Serial numbers are being sent to the complainant. The items stolen are estimated to be around \$2000.00.

## Harassment/Vandalism

October 28, 1994- A student called DPS due to the fact that several males were trying to get into their townhouse. When the officers arrived, no one could be found. Approximately fifteen minutes later, DPS was called back to the same location. A screen had been torn off and broken. The student stated that a particular suspect, whom last name is unknown, became out of control last week and was removed by DPS. This suspect might have something to do with the vandalism. An investigation is under way to find more information on the suspect.

## Vandalism

October 28, 1994- A student reported that their motorbike had been vandalized after being removed from a particular lot and then was resting against a nearby car. A rather unpleasant note was left by the person who hit the bike.

The student also informed DPS about an earlier occurrence where a truck backed into the same bike.

## Larceny

October 28, 1994- A student stated that the tailgate of their truck was missing. A report was filed with both DPS and Smithfield Police. A follow-up investigation is under way.

## Burglary

October 28, 1994- A burglary occurred in a townhouse in which compact disks and a leather jacket were stolen. The townhouse was vacant for approximately five minutes prior to the report being filed. The student will give a list of the CD titles when they know which ones were stolen. An investigation is under way.

## Possible Possession of Stolen Property

October 28, 1994- If you recall from last week, two flags were stolen off campus. Someone, who wishes to remain anonymous, stated that they spotted these flags hanging from a window in a particular hall. The situation was investigated by DPS. An officer also observed a McDonald's flag and two funnels as well as the red and white flag spotted in the window. Local McDonald's were called in order to see if they were missing a flag, but no one stated they were. The person who reported the other flag stolen stated that it was the same design, but not the same flag that was stolen because it looked too old. Both flags were returned, but the two funnels were destroyed.

## Drug Confiscation

October 28, 1994- A DPS officer on mobile patrol approached a car which had the smell of marijuana coming from it. Two students tried to conceal the marijuana from him in the glove compartment. Smithfield Police was requested and confiscated the drugs. Both students were then read their Miranda Rights. In one of the student's room, approximately 24 small marijuana plants were found along with another bag of marijuana. One of the students was charged with a felony of cultivating and possession of marijuana and the other student wasn't charged by Smithfield Police.

On-campus charges have been filed. As well as charges in court

## Vandalism

October 29, 1994- A student came back to their townhouse and found a derogatory message written with peanut butter on the wall. The student was not sure if the doors were locked. The kitchen had trash thrown around it and the refrigerator

was pulled out. The student didn't know of anyone who could have done this and was told of the escort policy which they choose to use.

## Alcohol Violation

October 29, 1994- A DPS officer noticed a student loading alcohol into a bag. ID was requested by the officer, which stated that he was under age. The student was cooperative in this matter. Five cases of beer was confiscated and destroyed. Charges have been filed.

## Alcohol Violation

October 29, 1994- An officer saw two visitors running through the woods carrying alcohol. Both were stopped and were asked to show the officer their ID's. One had ID stating that he was under age and the other didn't have any. The visitors and their host were very cooperative in this matter. All alcohol was confiscated and destroyed. Charges filed.

## Alcohol Violation

October 29, 1994- While an officer was investigating a possible assault, a student approached him with an open container of beer. Because the student was outside a building with an open container, he was asked to empty the can, which he refused. Finally, an officer took the can. The student refused to leave the area. When asked to show his Bryant ID, he showed DPS a driver's license. After being very hostile, he was physically restrained by his suite mates. Charges have been filed for all violations.

## Vandalism

October 30, 1994- A student heard the sound of glass breaking at approximately 3:30 am. After looking out the window, the student didn't see anything and therefore, went back to sleep. When the student later approached his car, he found his tail light broken.

To the Editor:

Why was Bryant's alumni satisfaction 16th out of 25 in a recent *U.S. News & World Report* annual review of 25 business specialty schools? Of course, they just forgot to submit alumni satisfaction information.

Or maybe they just asked some recent alumni.

Despite the prestige and "delight" implied by Bryant's third-place ranking in the annual ranking by an independent, national source, it is simply a reminder of how much Bryant College has fallen.

When *U.S. News & World Report* published its first college review of specialty schools in 1990, Bryant College ranked second to rival Babson College. Bryant had the second-highest student selectivity and the highest student satisfaction of the top three, beating both Babson and Bentley.

Bryant's fall from number two was evident in the 1991 and 1992 surveys, falling over six percentage points each year as its academic reputation, student satisfaction, and student selectivity dropped. Only its financial resources (i.e. the Endowment Fund) gained in this period.

But why are the Alumni dissatisfied?

One of the reasons is the clear transformation of Bryant from an institution providing a reasonably-priced, sound, business

education to an expensive, highly structured, business. (Yes, I'm calling Bryant a business - after all, that is how it is operated - and expensive - a result of double-digit percentage tuition increases in six of the last eight years.)

Another reason is the frustration of seeing Bryant decline as a result of decisions and policies of the Bryant Administration. Most of my fellow Bryant alum are proud of Bryant and what the college has done for and meant to us. It breaks my heart to see it decline so rapidly because of mismanagement.

You can compound the frustration current alumni feel by going back to their last few years at Bryant. A review of back issues of *The Archway*, available in the library, will detail the letters and articles by both students and faculty on growing frustration with the Bryant Administration and its pursuit of the AACSB accreditation. Any spring semester (a common time of discontent) will display the frustration felt in the recent years.

A recent *Archway* editorial implied that unhappy alumni not only hurts the re-engineering process (hey, at least the Bryant professors are keeping up on the latest buzz words/concepts to teach the students! - but it probably came from one of those

"non-doctorate, non-qualified" faculty) but the fundraising process as well. I can't speak for other donating alumni (I don't know of many,) but I know my donations are designated to two restricted scholarship funds.

So what should be done about this frustration?

Bryant needs a clear and focused vision on where the institution is going and what it needs to do to get there. Included in this vision must be the concerns of the students. They are the "customers" after all.

Once this direction is completed - and the ambiguous one currently called a mission statement doesn't count - it must be clearly conveyed to everyone in the Bryant Community. Secret plans and goals may work in high-level government positions, however, they do not belong at a struggling, private, business college. Only through the coordinated efforts of the administration, faculty, staff, and students can Bryant regain its lost rankings and alumni support.

through a lot of turmoil. There is a lot of economic pressure on the institution. More students are at Bryant on financial aid. It is almost impossible to put a young person through college without some help. Families have been affected by the economic situation of the last several years.

**Q: What are your thoughts on re-engineering?**

**Parkos:** I don't like the term re-engineering. It is just a catch word. We have several options, however. We could go the easy way out and say we are going to take the first 800 students who apply, but if we do that we are cheating the students by lowering our standards and this is not acceptable. The other alternative is to be aggressive about enrollment.

The board of trustees runs the College like a business and we have to live within tuition. To keep the organization in the "black" we must continue to make adjustments for the level of income.

**Q: You mentioned that Bryant is a business. Do you think running the institution as a business can harm education?**

**Parkos:** It can't harm it because business is the education. Are the students the client or are they the product? Maybe the customer is society and the students are the product. The product is the student graduating from the institution.

Students are both the customer and the product. The customer is society - where our students go to spend their lives.

**Q: Have you had an opportunity to see the "book" in the library?**

**Parkos:** I have looked at the book and I hope the administration is taking those suggestions seriously. Those ideas will help as part of the re-engineering. Re-engineering, by whatever

word you may want to call it, is a necessary function. Is it going to remove services? Is it going to remove staffing? Well, good management wouldn't allow this to happen.

**Q: What is your response to Bryant once again being rated the third best business specialty school?**

**Parkos:** Sure I am disappointed we are number three. I've lived my life wanting to be number one. I think the administration should be sensitive to what areas they evaluated to make us number three rather than number one. However, we are still at the top.

Babson and Bentley are the

same as Bryant. These three institutions are all excellent institutions with slight differences. Babson may focus more on finance, Bentley more on accounting, we may have more interest in liberal arts.

**Q: What is the future direction of Bryant?**

**Parkos:** As the management of the College, we should be wrestling with what is the proper role of an institution like this at this time. We need a focused mission.

**Q: Is President Trueheart an appropriate leader for what you discussed as the future direction of the college?**

**Parkos:** Absolutely. I think he is a very appropriate leader. He loves this institution. He is almost emotional about his love for this institution.

This has been a very important place for him. He is a smart person, and he holds firmly to his beliefs.

I think he is appropriate and I can't assume morale problems, discontent and turnover can be solved by just eliminating people.

That reaction is just as foolish as the manager who thinks the only way to run a business is to cut labor. We are going to destroy this institution if we take anything away from the quality of our product.

The product is the students and we shouldn't tinker with the quality of this product.

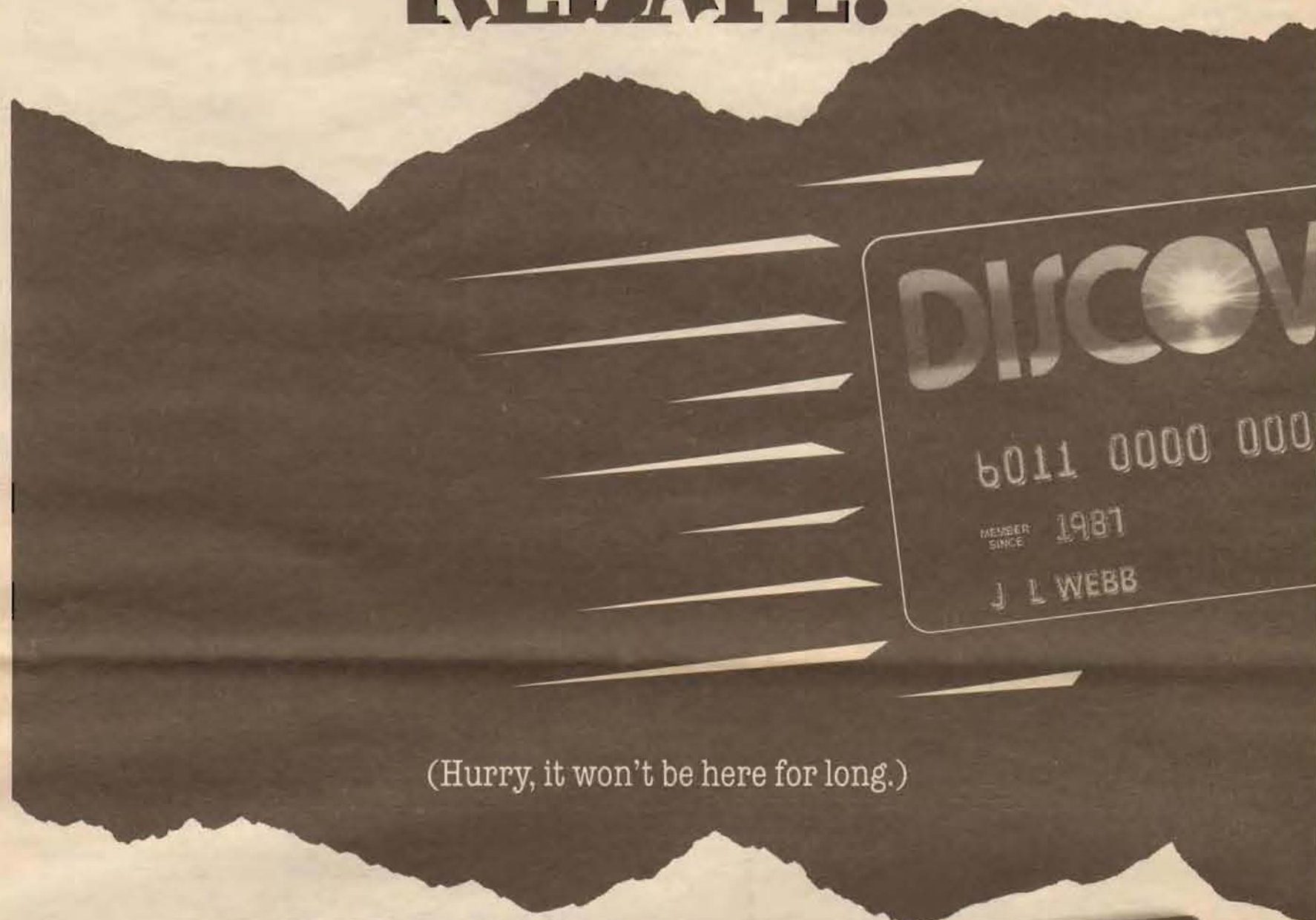

## A Gene-ius

*Congratulations to Tracey Young, the winner of the October Enigma drawing for 25 points (Tracey, I need your SS# to credit your account). There are no unanswered questions in the "in" box today, but why should that stop me?*

Tuesday's Providence Journal carried an editorial about "The Bell Curve," "Stupid 'findings' for stupid people," and a headline about an article that appeared in the journal Nature Genetics; "Study says faulty gene may be elusive cause of manic-depression." Seems like everyone's hunting for genes these days (at least every scientist.)

Murray and Herrnstein's rehash about the genetics of intelligence is riding a publicity wave and generating a great deal of attention, as pieces in The New Republic and Business Week attest. Is the Nature Genetics study legit and the other bogus, as the editorial slant of the ProJo would suggest?

The authors of "The Bell Curve" contend that black people of America score lower, white people average, and Asian folks higher on intelligence tests for genetic reasons and that these tests are accurate predictors of individuals' social and economic success. Proponents of this view argue that social programs aimed at improving the environment in which young blacks grow up are a waste of taxpayer funds and should be discontinued.

The authors of the paper about manic depression argue that families with a higher incidence of manic depression are more likely to share a particular DNA segment on chromosome 21.

Previously, a similar paper concluded that the shared DNA flaw was on chromosome 18. (There are 23 pairs; pick one and write your own paper.)

Certain simple human traits, like the diseases Cystic Fibrosis or Hemophilia, are the result of differences in one small region of human DNA, which nevertheless required several years of research to pinpoint. Complex traits like manic depression or intelligence, which "may" result from the interactions of hundreds of genes, are extremely difficult to measure clinically and therefore difficult to study experimentally. Scientists approach these difficult cases with statistics, to establish correlations between putative carriers of the trait and

DNA patterns. Since humans have approximately 150,000 genes spread intermittently among 3 billion

letters of DNA code, and no two humans (except identical twins) share identical sequences, the statistics are messy and approximate.

Until someone can demonstrate that individuals with a specific DNA sequence demonstrate a trait and those without it do not, it remains skeptical. Correlation does not prove causality. The keyword is "may" (translation "it's not proven but we wanted the publicity.")

## Going Global - The Wonders It Can do for Bryant

During the past weeks there has been a great debate raging on what the College should do to cut costs and increase revenue. To add to the melee, the U.S. News and World Report released its rankings of American Colleges. Once again, Bryant was ranked third - a distant third. This led to a spate of articles in The Archway and other Bryant publications. Most of these articles dwelt upon the fact that Bryant was placed third. However, there were a few which called for drastic measures in order to improve that standing. In the following article, I will try and suggest a different point of view.

My main point is not about raising revenue or cutting costs, though it may eventually lead to the above, it is about raising the recruiting standards at the College and incorporating more international students into the Bryant community. In my opinion, these measures will result in better academics, more alumni satisfaction and definitely a better ranking.

I am an international student from Bombay, India. Every student coming in from a foreign country has to overcome a great many barriers and difficulties in order to gain admission into an American college or university. Most of these barriers deal with the lack of information and data about the educational institutions.

Therefore, it is imperative that Bryant focus on publicity within and outside America. This will definitely cost money. However, in order to save on this necessary expenditure, the college can assign international students returning to their homes for vacations, the task of interviewing potential students and spreading the name of the college in their home countries.

Another very important factor is that most students coming in from countries like India, China, and other South-East Asian nations are very well able to afford an American college education. However, instead of randomly charging them more, the College should encourage a select few excellent students by offering scholarships and grants. Other than that, most international students do not mind paying a little extra in order to obtain a solid, broad-based education in America.

As mentioned earlier, Bryant should attempt to increase its admission standards. The incorporation of international students will definitely lead to the above. The reason for this is that these students put a lot of time and effort - more than most others - into their applications and their preparations for the SAT and other exams. This is because they want to make sure that if they leave the sheltered and secure environment of their homes, they go to a place which will

offer them the best they can desire. In order to do that, they tend to perform well on their tests and hence more international students in Bryant will mean higher average scores of the entering class.

Because it costs foreign students more money to come here - it costs Indians 35 times more than it costs Americans. They are almost always working hard and performing well in their courses. Most foreign students think that now that they have left their homes, come to a new country, and are spending so much money, they should make full use of all the facilities they have at their disposal. These factors work as additional driving forces for us and the College should encourage such students by offering more financial aid and help.

The above will definitely lead to a marked improvement in academics and the overall reputation of the College. The cultural diversity of the College and the versatility of its students will bring in a new atmosphere of excellence and competence. This has to lead to a rise up in the rankings - if not by place, at least by percentage. The end result will be that Bryant College will no longer be just another business specialty school, it will have the opportunity to become the business specialty school.

## Answer to Last Week's MSU Question

Q: Who set up the first blood bank in England?

A: Dr. Charles Richard Drew

Dr. Drew set up and administered the first blood bank in England in 1940 through 1941. This was an American Red Cross project, its' purpose to collect and store blood. Dr. Drew was subsequently dropped from this project because he differed from the policy of refusing the blood of black donors. He maintained that there was no scientific difference between the blood of blacks and whites.

Charles Drew was born in Washington, D.C. in 1904. He graduated from Amherst College (undergraduate) in 1926 and joined the faculty of Morgan State College in Baltimore, Maryland. In 1933 he received an M.D. degree from McGill University in Montreal, Canada, returned to the United States and taught pathology at Howard University Medical School in Washington, D.C. (1935)

Dr. Drew's research at the Columbia Medical Center in New York City led to the discovery that blood plasma could supplant whole blood in transfusions. His research was responsible for saving thousands of lives during World War II.

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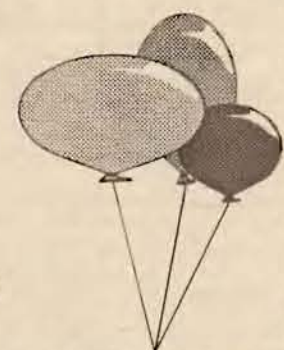
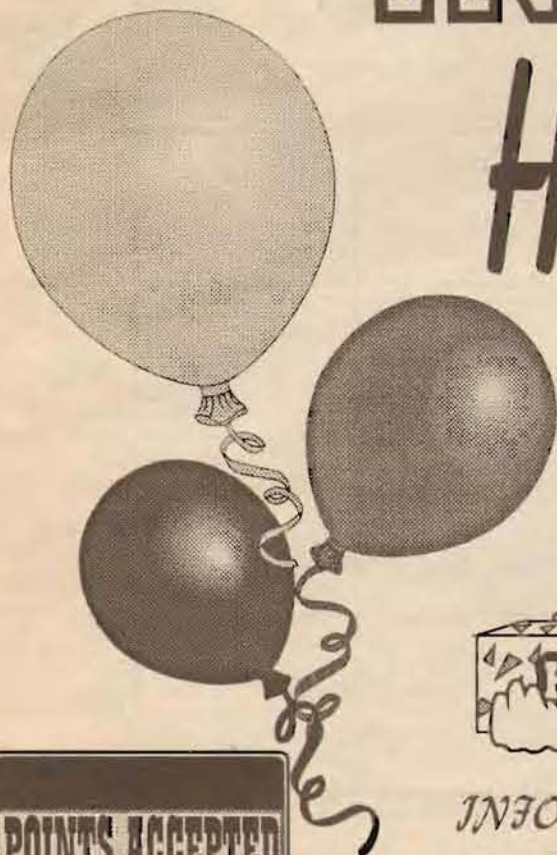

with a time of 29:51; Darrel Cook, 67th, with a time of 30:30; Jeffrey Hiltbold, 68th, with a time of 30:31; and Steve Michaud, 71st, with a time of 30:50.

"Everyone had excellent times, and knowing I have them back next year is exciting," Smith said. "[However] I was disappointed with the sixth place finish."

The team is very young, in fact, they are only one senior and one junior on the team, Steve Michaud and Michael Walsh, respectively.

The rest of the squad are sophomores and freshmen. This should give some of the other NE-10 schools something to worry about next season.

The team will wind down the 1994 season this weekend as they travel to the NCAA Regionals in Kutztown, PA this Saturday.

Coach Smith says he has only one goal for this race, "To finish in the top five in our conference. I know that is where we should be."

The women's volleyball team had a near perfect week by winning six and only losing one, to improve their record 26-10 on the season, 6-3 in the NE-10.

Last night was senior night, and a large crowd turned out to honor the graduating seniors Maria Bras and Kim Potrzebowski. This was their final home match of their careers and the night truly belonged to the seniors as they each played a key role in the Bulldog victory over UMass Lowell.

In game one, Bryant came flying out of the gates, and jumped to an early lead. However, the River Hawks were able to stay close the entire game. Then Potrzebowski served a ball which was just too hot to handle for a point and a 15-8 victory.

The next game was much different, Lowell jumped out to an early 6-3 lead and seemed to be in control of the match. Meribah Dean then came to the line and served eight unanswered points to give Bryant an 11-6 lead.

Lowell was able to get the ball back, but they were not able to hold off the Bulldog surge and Bryant won 15-7 when Bras hit a kill down the line to end the game.

In the final game, Lowell put up a fight once again, but it was not enough. Once again Potrzebowski hit a ball which Lowell hit back into the antenna, Bryant won the game 15-10.

The seniors made their final night a memorable one. Bras had 16 kills and 16 digs, while Potrzebowski had 11 digs and nine service points.

"This was a great match for us to get ready for the NE-10's this weekend," coach Karen Mendes said. "The team we will face this weekend all run similar offense to Lowell, tonight was a good warm up."

Prior to the match against Lowell, the team traveled to Stonehill and were upset in three games.

Over the weekend, the Bulldogs hosted and captured the Halloween Classic. In the first match, Bryant defeated Franklin Pierce 15-9, 15-1, 15-8. Southern Connecticut State University was the next victim as they won 15-4, 15-4, 15-10. The Bulldogs then clinched the tournament crowd with a win over Saint Rose (from Albany, NY) 15-10, 15-2, 15-12.

Potrzebowski and Dean were named to the All-Tournament team, and Bras was selected Tournament MVP.

The Bulldogs had one scary moment early in the tournament when freshman setter Jen Carvalho went down with an ankle injury. Carvalho had to be carried off the court, and did not return to action until last night.

The other win of the week came against Assumption, as Bryant won easily in three games, 15-1, 15-5, 15-4. In this match Dean had 12 kills and no errors. Prior to this

match, Dean also had a perfect match against Merrimack, when she recorded 15 kills and no errors.

Despite the ankle injury, Carvalho was named NE-10 Freshman for the fifth week in a row, seven of eight times if you are counting. She averaged 10.3 assists and 2.1 digs per game. She also became the first player in Bryant College history to surpass the 1,000 assist mark in one season.

Currently, Carvalho is third in the conference in assists per game with 9.67. Her teammate, Bras is second in digs per game with 3.82 and kills with 4.42.

The team is first in digs with 16.91 per game and first in kills with 12.54 per game.

They are also third in kill percentage with .232, fourth in assists with 10.61 per game, fourth in blocks with 2.32 per game, and fifth in aces with 2.01 per game.

Next up for the Bulldogs is the NE-10 Championships at Springfield College this weekend. A schedule of all their games will be available from the Athletics department.

## Women's Cross Country Take Second

The women's cross country team had a strong showing at the NE-10 Championship last weekend, by finishing second overall with 68 points.

Springfield, as expected, was the race champion, but Bryant was more concerned about Quinnipiac. Bryant's worries were settled when Quinnipiac finished 20 points behind the Bulldogs, in third place.

"Everyone is running great," coach Charlie Mandeville said. "I didn't think we were going to beat them (Quinnipiac) without Mandy LaPierre, but others were able to step up."

The first runner across the line for the Bulldogs was Heather Cronic who finished seventh overall and blazed the three-mile course in 19:28. Following her was Karen Palczynski in eight place with a time of 19:36. Jess Duval also had an impressive showing, finishing 10th with a time of 19:44. Cronic, Palczynski, and Duval were all named to the All-Conference team for their performance. This was the first time since 1988 Bryant has placed three runners in the top ten.

The next finisher across the line for the Bulldogs was Amanda Friedrich, finishing 23 overall with a time of 20:33. She was followed by Karen Calderoni, finishing 26th with a time of 20:40.

"The race went real well," coach Mandeville said. "Just before the

two-mile mark, Karen Calderoni had seven Quinnipiac runners ahead of her. I said, 'Here come the hills,' and she past three runners."

The final two finishers for the Bulldogs were Carrie Stygar and Jody Russo. Stygar finished 44th, with a time of 21:27; while Russo finished 45th, with a time of 21:29.

All seven of the Bulldogs runners finished in the top half of the race.

"This was the best race we have had all year, we are peaking at the right time," Mandeville added.

"Last year at this time we were burned out, this year, we are much stringer."

Team scores for the race were as follows: Springfield 23, Bryant 68, Quinnipiac 88, Saint Michael's 120, Bentley 140, Stonehill 148, Saint Anselm 155, and Merrimack 175.

The team hopes they can use this energy in their meet coming up this weekend, the NCAA Regionals in Kutztown, PA.

"This week if we can repeat what we did last week, we should break into the top ten," Mandeville added.

However, this will be the last race for three of Mandeville's most talented runners, Karen Calderoni, Heather Cronic, and Karen Palczynski.

"It is Heather, Karen, and Karen's last race of their career. They should have a great race," Mandeville added. "It is going to be tough to replace these three."

"You only get a group of runners like this once every six years."
