## Music Comes to Bryant

After its meager beginnings last February the on campus singing group Bryant Singers has worked up to performance level just in time for the grand opening of Bryant's first official music room yesterday. The group is composed of students, faculty, and administrators that have put their talents and the newly refurbished music room to good use these past months.

The room is a special site the college has designed and developed as a place for students and musicians to get together to practice.

English department chair Mary Lyons hosted the event, and has been very anxious awaiting its grand opening. "This room is a welcoming of music to Bryant, something that has been anticipated for a long time now."

Students Tim Robbins and Meagan Fraleigh helped President Trueheart cut the ribbon to mark the official opening of the room. "Music is such a part of life, I am pleased to see the students at Bryant wanting to be involved with it," commented Trueheart about the music room.

Meagan Fraleigh is the President of the singing group and is currently making plans for singing at college events although an official schedule is to be announced. "The music room is great," said Fraleigh, "and as for the group we would love people to come down and join."

Chorale Director Mark Colozzi is also a music instructor in the Cranston Public school system. His band at Cranston High East was one of two bands selected to perform at the rally for President Clinton in Providence last week.

"The choral group meets once a week and with every rehearsal I feel we move a step forward," said

Colozzi. I hope to see the college expand more in the area of fine arts," he added.

The music room is also being used for students who play musical instruments. There have been several meetings with jazz musician

Many students looking to attend Bryant in the future are asking about a music program, and are pleased to know one has been started. The administration feels that having the music room contributes to the cultural activities on campus and makes the composition of the college more interesting.

The music room is located on the first floor of the Bryant center just off the south dining room.

## SPB Sponsors Fifth College Bowl

College Bowl, "The Varsity Sport of the Mind" is a question and answer game of academic knowledge and quick recall. Like the popular radio and television series of the 50's, 60's, and 70's, the game features two teams of four players each competing to score points on Toss-Up and Bonus questions. These questions cover all topics from literature, science, history, geography, religion, social sciences, and the arts, to popular culture, sports, and current events.

This year there will be eighteen teams competing in College Bowl with a panel of seven faculty members serving as officials. The faculty panel will include Dr. Coakley, Dr. Ketcham, Dr. Levin, Dr. Ugo, Dr.

Keeley, Dr. Barry, and Dr. Betsch. Competition at Bryant begins with the Campus Tournament to select the "Varsity Team", scheduled for November 15 in Papitto at 7pm, and November 17 in the Heritage Room at 7 pm. College Bowl is being sponsored by the Student Programming Board.

The Varsity Team will advance to the Regional Tournament on February twentyfourth at UCONN Storrs campus in Mansfield Connecticut. The National Championship Tournament will be held April 21-23, featuring the fifteen regional champions and a sixteenth wild card team.

This is College Bowl's nineteenth year at America's campuses, and will be Bryant's fifth year in competition. Bryant is one in over 300 campuses competing in College Bowl 1994.

Let's face it. Bryant has fallen behind. In 1990, Bryant was rated number two in U.S. News and World Report's specialty ranking. At that time, Bryant had the highest student satisfaction rating. In 1991 and 1992 Bryant rankings declined. Presently we are number three among specialty schools, sixth in student satisfaction, and sixteenth in alumni satisfaction.

Two years ago we restructured and currently we are "re-engineering".

Today, residence halls stand empty. Faculty, students, and administrators have expressed discontent through anonymous and signed letters. We have lost our pride in the community.

Instead of Bryant comparing itself to Bryant, they have been comparing itself to Babson and Bentley. We have been getting down on ourselves these past couple of weeks. Now we need to convert criticism into accomplishment.

We know the students care about the College, but we need direction. What can we do to make things better? We need a common goal, but we need someone to define and visualize this plan. We urge President Trueheart to write an open letter to the community and to use every means of communication at his disposal, including *The Archway* and WJMF.

We, the students, faculty, and administration still have the ability to solve our present problems. Furthermore, we have the power to attain the number one slot. But, without a clear mission statement and a charismatic figurehead to lead us towards this goal, Bryant may be in danger of becoming merely a footnote.

# PUBLIC SAFETY BEAT

## Burglary

October 31, 1994- A student reported that several CD's, bottles of cologne, a bag of books, and other various articles were stolen from a residence hall. The items were first estimated at \$200.00, which changed after the individual's roommate reported more items stolen. According to the victim, both the room window and door were closed and locked and there were no signs of forcible entry. An investigation has been initiated.

## Fire Alarm-False

October 31, 1994- An officer on mobile patrol was dispatched to Hall 5 for a fire alarm. The building was evacuated and there were no visible signs of fire or smoke. Two students stated they pulled the alarm. One of them saw the pull box cover hanging off the wall and thought that if they pulled it, it would silence the alarm, which it didn't. Both students stated that they heard someone going down the stairs prior to the alarm, but didn't see anyone. SFD was notified and the system was reset.

## Vehicle Boot

November 1, 1994- A student's car was found illegally parked in the Country Comfort parking lot. After checking with the dispatcher, it was found that this was the third outstanding violation and a vehicle boot was attached. The total fine was paid and the vehicle released.

## Vehicle Boot

November 1, 1994- A car was parked on the grass in the senior apartment lot. DPS attempted to get in touch with the student but soon realized that they no longer reside on campus. The vehicle was then booted. All fines were paid and the vehicle released.

## Harassing Phone Calls

November 1, 1994- Two students stated that they had been receiving harassing, sexually explicit phone calls throughout the semester. The calls normally occurred between 3 and 5:00 a.m. The caller calls back about two to four times. Statements were sent to the suite mates to give them accounts of the events. They were given a harassing phone call log and were explained of the escort service on campus. Smithfield Police Department's number was given to them if they wish to file a report. DPS will be monitoring this incident.

## Simple Assault

November 2, 1994- A student complained of being assaulted by another student. While at a party, the student grabbed the victim's neck and started squeezing tightly. The accused student was interviewed and volunteered to

stay away from the other person and requested that person stay away from their residence on campus.

## Larceny

November 2, 1994- A student reported that three hubcaps were stolen from their car. The estimated value was \$1200.00. The student gave a description of the hubcaps and asked if any information was found to be contacted.

## Fire Alarm-False

November 2, 1994- A DPS officer was dispatched to Townhouse G block. The students were cooking, which set off the fire alarm. The alarm was reset and all units were clear.

## Fire Alarm-False

November 3, 1994- An officer on mobile patrol was dispatched to Hall 13 for a fire alarm. The cause was said to be a heat sensor as a result of the heating vent being covered.

## Vandalism

November 4, 1994- An officer on mobile patrol observed two students jumping on several vehicles, including the Bryant van. An officer then heard the sound of glass breaking. One of the suspects stated that they were pushing and shoving each other in a friendly manner. One of the students stated that they accidentally struck the Bryant van's tail light. Both students had alcohol on their breaths. Both were cooperative in this matter and will be made to pay for the damages they caused.

## Vandalism-Disorderly Conduct

November 4, 1994- A student received a complaint that bottles were being thrown out a window of a residence hall. DPS officers saw one person throw out the bottles from the window and later found a towel wrapped around one of his fingers. When he removed the towel, it was apparent that he cut himself. He stated he cut himself in the bathroom earlier. Charges have been filed.

## Vandalism

November 4, 1994- A student's car in the C-3 lot had a large dent two feet long and one foot high. The damage is said to be estimated at \$500.00. The incident appears to be a random act.

## Burglary-Non forcible

November 4, 1994- A student was awakened by voices at 4:00 a.m. They then noticed that someone was in the room. When the victim discovered this, they told the person to leave, which they did. No forcible entry was committed. Smithfield Police then arrived and the suspect was read their rights. The suspect then admitted to entering the victim's suite to re-steal the CDs that were taken on 10-31-94. Charges have been filed through the college.

Driving So As To Endanger/ Verbal Abuse

November 5, 1994- An officer observed someone speeding while turning onto the Dorm Village Road. The vehicle failed to stop at an apparent stop sign. He was observed by a mobile officer and followed to the Country Comfort parking lot. The officer asked for the student's ID. The odor of alcohol on his breath was apparent. Other confrontations with this persons and others with them have occurred in the past which involved both DPS and the Smithfield Police. This person is not a resident student. Charges were filed.

## Attempted Burglary

November 5, 1994- While entering their suite, a student could hear voices from the bathroom. When the witness pulled on the jacket of the intruder, a Nintendo game fell out along with three cartridges. The suspect then pushed the witness into the wall and ran out the emergency door. Persons involved in this incident are asked to come forward as a positive identification was gained and it is just a matter of time before DPS identifies and makes an apprehension. Cooperation may gain you some leniency but no promises.

## Trespassing

November 5, 1994- A DPS officer received a call from the Nautilus room attendant stating that four youths were trying to break into the MAC through a side door. The four then fled the area. This happened the previous two weekends with the same four people. All suspects were then found shortly after near the Bryant Center. Letters of trespass were sent to the parents of these youths as they are minors.

## Safe-Sex Strategies Against STDs

*Congratulations to Tracey Young, the winner of the October Enigma drawing for 25 points (Tracey, I need your SS# to credit your account). There are two unanswered questions in the "in" box today (keep them coming!); while I'm looking for the answers, we'll hear from Harry...*

Sexually-transmitted diseases (STD's) are both life-threatening and life-changing in their consequences. With the emergence of viral and antibiotic-resistant bacterial STD's, people are no longer assured of cure. Thus, the only protection is prevention.

In this era of AIDS, people are no longer satisfied with "reduced-risk" prevention strategies. They now desire to eliminate all risk. These strategies are called "safe-sex strategies." Those persons who adhere to them will not contract STD's through sexual contact. Control of the prevention of STD's then lies within sexually-active persons - they can choose complete protection against infection.

The following are three dependable safe-sex strategies. The most effective, although not the most popular method, is sexual abstinence or celibacy. This is a guaranteed 100-percent safe sex strategy. It may not be a life-long choice, it can be just "for now." While this may not be sexually rewarding, it does allow for a period during which a person may totally focus on themselves—to develop a career or channel energies toward favorite projects or causes.

A second method offering complete protection is life-long monogamy, during which sexual rela-

tions are limited exclusively to one uninfected partner who is also monogamous. The partner's infection status is the most important factor in determining if sex can be safe. In a mutually faithful sexual relationship there are also social, intellectual, emotional, and spiritual rewards. There are no restrictions regarding sexual activities, with the exception of anal sex which is never safe.

The final strategy is to practice serial monogamy with uninfected partners. This means a series of mutually exclusive sexual relationships. However, the safety of this method can only be guaranteed if there is absolute certainty of the

faithfulness and lack of infection in both sexual partners. Prior to using this strategy, two things must be determined: the prospective partner's infection status and the prospective partner's trustworthiness.

These safe-sex strategies do require periods of abstinence, which makes them unpopular. Being abstinent requires tremendous self-discipline, since it is contradictory to most people's sexual desires. These strategies can be successful through a development of self-control and self-esteem, as well as motivation to stay healthy or, in the worst cases, to stay alive.

Each year 12 recent college graduates get paid to travel all over North America. They attend the Super Bowl, Mardi Gras, and the World Series acting as goodwill ambassadors for Oscar Mayer Foods.

## The DUNS Number for Research

Dun & Bradstreet, one of the largest publishers of business information, is the creator of a unique numbering system used to identify particular business establishments. The acronym DUNS refers to the Data Universal Numbering System, a system that assigns a nine digit number to individual companies. This number is then used to identify companies, in much the same way as a social security number is used to identify individuals.

Where is the DUNS number found? In all of the major DUNS business directories such as The Million Dollar Directory (Table 2 REF HC102 .D8 1994), the Dun's Regional Business Directory, New England Area (REF HG4057 .N35 D86 1994), the Dun's Healthcare Reference Book (REF HD9994 .U5 D86 1993/94), and the Reference Book of Corporate Managements (Table 2 REF HD2745 .D85 1994). The number is found just above the company name; e.g.:

D-U-N-S 00-120-0443  
Hasbro Inc. (RI)

The DUNS number is also found in the company field on the ABI/Inform and Business Dateline indexes on Proquest, and on Compact Disclosure listed with the company profile information under the CUSIP number.

What is the function of the DUNS number? There are two ways the DUNS number can be used to conduct business research: first, to verify a company, and upon verification, to search for more information on the company in the print and on-line service produced by Dun & Bradstreet.

To verify a company, one can search the Dun's Business Identification Service, a microfiche product found near the reference desk in the library, which contains listings of 5 million companies with their DUNS numbers. The information given on each company is limited to company name, address (minus zip code), and a symbol indicating whether the company is a single location

(SL), headquarters (HQ), or a branch. This identification service is useful for verifying the existence of small private companies, for determining the extent of a company's operations and locations of its particular branch offices, and since trade names are linked to corporate names, for identifying local owners of national franchises.

When looking for extensive or unique information on a company, librarians use the DUNS number to conduct on-line searches in the Dun & Bradstreet corporate databases. These somewhat expensive databases provide comprehensive and detailed information on companies that can be used to evaluate a company's credit rating and financial status, as well as to provide up-to-date directory information.

Along with the SIC code number (see the next "Off the Shelf" article), the DUNS number is one of the most important numbers for any business person to know and understand. It is an essential guide to determining corporate relationships.

## The Indian Market - a Whole New World of Opportunity

In 1993, Morgan Stanley entered the Indian market with a decision to issue shares of its newly launched Mutual Fund to the Indian public. Within a week, Morgan Stanley had collected over a half a billion dollars (approx. 20 billion Indian rupees) from the investors.

Pepsi decided to release its range of drinks in India. For the last three years, Pepsi has been trying desperately to break the stranglehold of the local Indian soft-drinks. This year, Coke entered the market too. An all out Cola War has begun. Both Pepsi and Coke are having heavy losses. In fact, Pepsi had a loss of over 10 million dollars this year in India. When the Pepsi C.E.O. was asked what their targets would be for the next five years, he replied that they were willing to sustain the same losses for as long as it took to finally gain a market share. That is the kind of opportunity India provides and the extent of risk which the foreign companies are willing to take as long as they know that in the long run they are going to rake in the moolah.

India has been labeled as the "hottest emerging market" by *Fortune* and other widely read magazines. The reasons for this meteoric rise from obscurity to worldwide prominence are very apparent.

The Indian middle class consists of 200 million people with an average of \$1800 per year i.e. 25000 Indian Rupees. However, the upper echelon of this segment of people has an average annual income of up to \$25,000 (Rs. 700,000). These figures may look small to you, but when translated into rupee terms and the buying power they possess, the results are really mind boggling.

Another factor is that India has the third largest pool of technological and educational talent in the world. What this boils down to is that foreign companies wanting to do business in India - there are an amazing number of them now - can draw on this talent and hire employees who have a great knowledge and awareness of the way business is conducted in India and on a global scale.

China has been compared to India in all the above respects and some people truly believe that the Chinese market is better. However, the most important factor which tilts the balance in India's favor is the language spoken by the large majority of the educated people - English. Almost 20 percent of

the Indian population can read and write English with a fairly high degree of proficiency. Another 15 percent has a working knowledge of the language. The Chinese do not speak English.

A plethora of foreign companies are landing on Indian shores to take advantage of the lucrative opportunities available. Some of them are directly entering the market while others are soliciting Indian collaborators. Jardine Fleming which runs the most profitable unit trust and Mutual funds in the world is one big investor in the Indian markets. The Maytag Corporation of USA has joined hands with a large Indian group to produce its trademark goods in India and take advantage of the profits to be made in the consumer goods industry. Lufthansa has taken that same Indian group as its partner in running a private airline in order to tap the hitherto untapped aviation market.

You might wonder what actually brought about this drastic change. The prime reason is that the Indian government has removed a lot of restrictions on foreign companies wishing to invest in India and has provided a great impetus for the flow of overseas interests into the country. In fact, most people in India unanimously agree that the new economic policies of the government of India - Manmohan Singh, the finance minister, has been given the award of Best Finance Minister in the World for the second year in succession - have led to this amazing turnaround. In 1990, when Mr. Singh first took charge as Finance Minister, India had a foreign exchange reserve of US\$ 2 billion. Today, India boasts of a reserve of US\$ 25 billion.

However, there are still some inherent problems in the Indian market and business environment. Most of these problems deal with the lack of infrastructure available. For example, it can take months to get a telephone line installed. The main reason for these troubles is the enormous population. Nevertheless, as more and more companies come to India, the basic infrastructure facilities will improve and this will lead to further development and expansion.

All in all, most people - including *Fortune*, *Newsweek* etc. - know and will agree with me that India is one of the best - if not the best - places in the world to put one's money in. Chances are you may be laughing your way to the bank.

## Michael P. Metcalf Memorial Grants The Rhode Island Community Foundation

A number of generous donors have established a fund within the Rhode Island Community Foundation to honor the memory of Michael P. Metcalf, publisher of the Providence Journal and a man of deep and varied interests. The purpose of this fund is to provide grants of up to \$5,000 to college students to subsidize experiences intended to broaden their perspectives and enhance their personal growth. These enrichment experiences are not limited to the academic year. They may include, but are not limited to, travel in this country and abroad and a variety of internship and public service programs. Acceptable programs do not include those that are a regular part of the student's curriculum or his/her institution's offerings - such as a sponsored junior year abroad or a departmentally sponsored summer research program. It should also be noted that grants are not intended for purchase of equipment or other capital expenses.

**Eligibility Requirements:** Applications will be accepted only from College sophomores and juniors who are legal residents of Rhode Island. The enrichment experience is to occur between June 1995 and September 1996. Plans must either include an established program or be well-constructed and have a clear purpose. Applicants must show financial need for support in completing that project. They will be expected to complete and submit a final project - in writing and perhaps another medium - communicating the value of the experience in furthering their long term goals. Criteria for evaluating applications include: clarity and thoughtfulness of application, creativity, and motivation of proposed project, evidence of self-direction and initiative, and financial need.

**Grant Information:** Maximum grants will be for \$5,000. These are one-time awards. The Michael P. Metcalf Advisory Committee will review all completed applications in February and all applicants will be notified of the Committee's decision in writing in March.

**Application Procedure:** A special application form along with other required materials should be mailed to Michael P. Metcalf Memorial Grants, The Rhode Island Foundation, 70 Elm Street, Providence, Rhode Island, 02903. Telephone: (401) 274-4564. This applications can be duplicated on a computer providing the same format is followed.

## Cuts We Can't Afford

One of the worst aspects of the re-engineering or reorganization or rebudgeting or whatever euphemism you'd like to apply to the term for cutting the budget, is the cost extracted in human lives and careers. When an administrative position is cut, we don't feel or see the results immediately. Those cuts occur in departments with which most students are not well acquainted. Therefore, we do not personally feel the loss. Other cuts will affect some of the most visible members of Bryant's workforce, and people with whom we have formed friendships will be out of their jobs.

One of the ideas being considered for implementation would be the firing of all of Bryant's yellowmen and replacing them with an outside contractor. It is important to stress that no definite decision has yet been reached, and the matter is still under consideration. Still, I thought I should devote this week's column to the yellowmen in hopes that Bryant's administration will see how truly integral they are to the Bryant community, and how we would all feel their loss.

As I sat and talked to several yellowmen, I began to think of how the easiest way to make cuts and fire people is to forget you are dealing with human beings who have hopes, desires, and fears for their future. In not considering the humanity of those being cut, the process becomes more surgical and less complicated by feelings.

In negotiating the current contract, which expires at the end of February, the yellowmen took a \$1.50 per hour pay cut for any new hires, and while the new hires did get benefits, their families did not. Also, new Bryant yellowmen received no pay raises throughout their first year of employment, and all yellowmen

received three and a quarter percent pay raises during the second year. They also receive the well deserved benefit of free tuition for themselves and their families.

Bryant may be able to hire outside contractors to do the work of the yellowmen for less money, but will the contractor provide the myriad of services that the yellowmen do? All of us know they do not just clean, repair, and paint. They also set-up for special functions and help out in other ways too numerous to list. In addition, the job is always done right. Questions are never asked, and excuses are never given. Their willing-

ness and friendliness is almost certainly guaranteed. A simple look around this campus is evidence enough of the pride Bryant's yellowmen take in their jobs. I wonder if a contractor would make the same investment of effort as the yellowmen do?

On Saturday, November 5, NECHA defending champion Southern Connecticut State College was determined to defeat the Bryant Hockey Team.

Southern had two opportunities to beat Bryant during last year's season, but the champions lost the first game and barely tied the second. ### Women's Cross Country Takes 10th at NCAA's

The women's cross country team finished up their season with an impressive showing at the NCAA Regionals. Overall, they finished 10th and collected 318 points.

"We ran as well as we did in the conference meet," coach Charlie Mandeville said. "The course was tough, and everyone's times were about thirty seconds slower."

Karen Palczynski made her final race a memorable one, by being the top Bryant finisher. She finished 21st with a time of 19:34 for the five kilometer course. For her accomplishments, Karen was named All-American, this was the team's first All-American since 1986.

"What made Karen Palczynski's time so great, was she was actually :02 faster, while everyone else was slower, it just showed how much harder she had to work," Mandeville added.

Next across the line, was Palczynski's house mate, Heather Cronce. She finished 40th overall with a time of 20:00, making her final race a memorable one also.

"Heather just never has a bad

race," Mandeville said. "There are times I will forget she is out there, because I know she will come through. Every week she only varies from about two or three places, and a few seconds from a good week to a bad week."

Jess Duval was the next finisher across the line for the Bulldogs, she finished 63rd overall with a time of 20:22. Duval was followed by Amanda Friedrich who finished 88th overall with a time of 21:02.

In the final race of her career, Karen Calderoni had another great run as she finished 109 with a time of 21:24.

"Karen Calderoni had the best season of her career this year," Mandeville added. "She really made her senior year count. It is going to be hard to replace all of them (Palczynski, Cronce, and Calderoni)."

The final two finishers for the Bulldogs were Carrie Stygar and Jody Russo. Stygar finished 132nd overall with a time of 22:07, while Russo finished 141st with a time of 22:33.

"The last couple of weeks, we had a lot of rest, and that is what made the difference," Mandeville added. "We just used the time to talk about the course, and talk about how important the race was."

Mandeville also cut two races out of the schedule this year. "We peaked at the end of the year, and
