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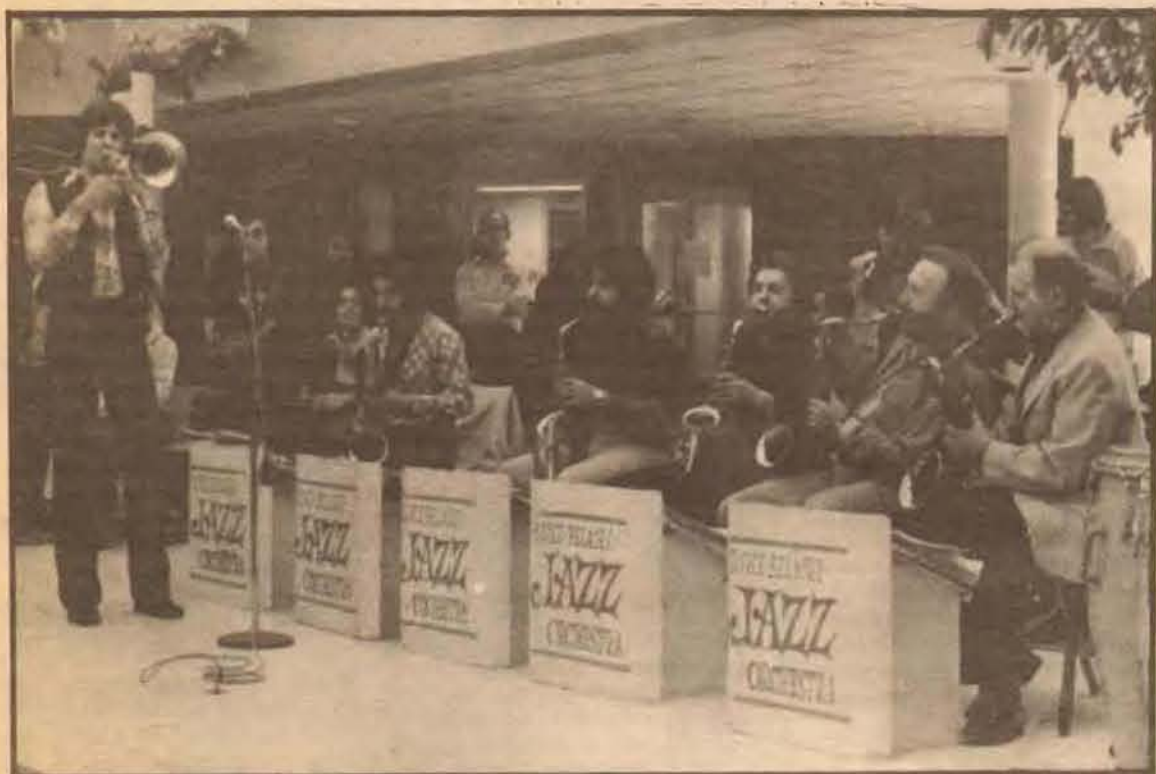

On Thursday, April 5, Bryant was the setting of its Eighth Annual Jazz Festival. Sponsored by the SPB and the English Department, the day featured three jazz bands with performances spread throughout the day.

The festival got off to a start at 10:00 a.m. with the Art Pelosi Jazz Quintet in the auditorium. At noon the 16-piece Duke Bellaire Jazz Band held Part I of their concert in a fully-packed Rotunda. At 1:00 they moved into the auditorium for Part II of their concert. A large number of Bryantonians were in attendance and by the conclusion of the concert at 2:00 were quite enthralled with the music.

The day was brought to an end with a Dixieland Concert by Tony Tomasso and His Jewels of Dixie in the Dining Hall. Saga honored the occasion with a Mardi Gras Buffet (which combined with the concert made it very difficult to find a place to eat!).

Once again this year's Jazz Festival was a great success, due largely to the efforts of Dr. Fischman, its coordinator.

## Disco Paper

An original research paper, entitled "Dance to the Beat of Disco" by Bryant College student, John S. Tatarka, 1979, has been selected for presentation at the 4th New England Undergraduate Research Conference in Sociology to be held on Saturday, April 28, 1979, at Providence College.

The paper was submitted initially for the Cultural Anthropology course taught at Bryant by Associate Professor Joan F. Marsella. The student spent three days observing close to 800 disco dancers at the Chateau de Ville in Warwick Rhode Island, to determine characteristics of the typical "disco people," their behavior, and their motivation. Some of the findings of the research include the fact that both males and females at the disco are very dressy; generally prefer mixed drinks; do their talking away from the disco area; also, females often dance together to indicate to observing males their proficiency at the dance.

## WJMF Wants Gift

Dear Editor,

As members of the Bryant College community may or may not be aware, recent FCC regulations on 10-watt non-commercial FM radio stations have left WJMF with the following alternatives:

1) To prove to the FCC that WJMF's position of 91.5 on the FM dial has the least preclusionary effect to the FM band that any other frequency. This means that WJMF's broadcasting is secondary to that of

larger more powerful commercial stations. In other words, WJMF can be put off the air or forced to change frequency if a larger station wants the frequency.

2) To prove to the FCC that another position on the FM dial has the least preclusionary effect to the FM band. This is subject to the same provisions described above.

3) To increase the effective radiating power of WJMF to at least 100 watts from the present 10 watts.

This change could also be accompanied by a change in frequency. This would guarantee the permanent operations of WJMF on one frequency - WJMF becomes a primary rather than a secondary station.

In order to insure the future existence of WJMF as a full-fledged radio station, the Board of Directors of WJMF has decided to pursue the third alternative, that is, to increase power to 100 watts.

The power increase will cost WJMF an excess of \$7500. Presently, WJMF has been nominated as the recipient of the 1979 senior class gift. We, the Board of Directors, feel that this would be the wisest choice of this year's graduating class in lieu of the options given. As a result of the power increase from 10-100 watts, WJMF's signal would reach into Mass., Conn., and the southern parts of RI thereby affectively reaching about 90% of the Bryant College commuters. Having almost used up my book of Commuter Meal Tickets, I now feel quite qualified to essay on "A Commuter's Guide to SAGA."

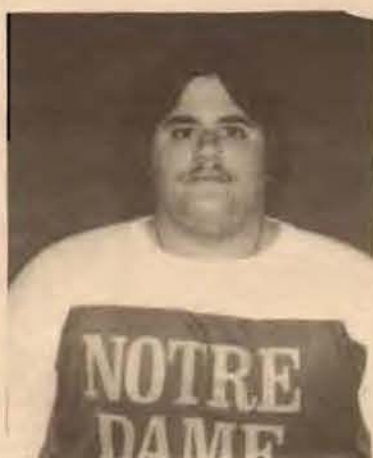

## Theatrical Thesis

### Death of A Salesman: Moving

On Tuesday evening, I had the pleasure of seeing one of the most powerful theatrical experiences in recent memory. Although not flawless, Trinity Square's presentation of "Death of a

Salesman" is tautly directed, brilliantly acted, and creatively staged.

A great part of the credit attributable to this production must go to Ford Rainey as Willy Loman. Mr. Rainey effectively captures the desperation and futility of a born loser who struggles through life

while his values are eroding.

These values form a major part of the play's meaning and impact. They stress that America is a land of opportunity, that for a man to be successful in life he should be well-like, athletic, and have personality. Also, for a man to be a "man", he should be able to make repairs

around his home. In the end when Willie's values are destroyed, and Biff and his father embrace for the last time, it is quite moving as the audience can all identify with a man whose hopes and dreams have died, though his love for his son has not. (In fact, I could hear a few women crying around me.)

It is a great credit to both the director Larry Arrick and Mr. Ford that every part of Willy's character is exposed so powerfully and meaningfully. In addition, Carmen de Lavallade gives an excellent performance as Willy's wife Linda, the devoted woman who is Willy's foundation and support. She is also the one chiefly responsible for covering up the lies in the house and sympathizing with his self-delusion.

Willy's desperation becomes increasingly apparent in Act II when he visits his boss Howard to ask him to work in New York, rather than continue as a traveling salesman in New England. Howard's reluctance to give him the new job and his dismissal from his old job add to Willy's dilemma. However, this scene turned out to be the most

conspicuously awkward in the play. The reason is a substitution of a video-recorder for the standard tape recorder. This relatively new device does not belong because it is not in line with the time of the play. As a result, this particular scene did not turn out as meaningful as it should have.

The set design by Robert Soule is conservative with the exception of two small screens that flash apartment windows, highway signs, trees, and finally Willy's fatal car crash. Although the apartment windows seemed like a rather insufficient way of indicating the setting, the change from apartments to trees was a creative means of changing time sequences back to Willy's revered past. Also, his car accident was done quite dramatically.

In conclusion, "Death of a Salesman" is a fine American classic which was given a fine tribute at Trinity Square. However, I am not speaking only of the play itself. The audience showed its appreciation by giving a standing ovation at the end.

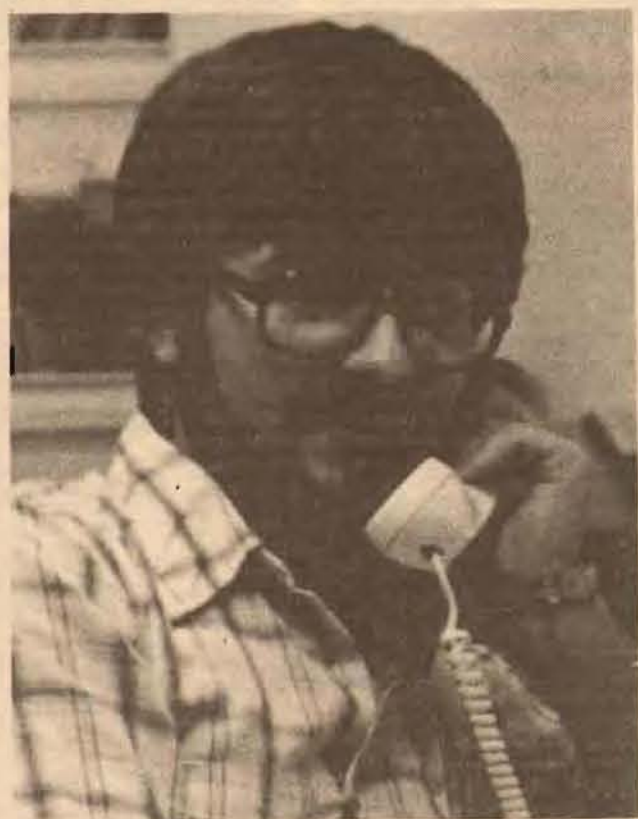
